REPORT OF THE MANAGEMENT COMMITTED

Gentlemen,

The Twenty Pirst Annual Report and Financial Statement of the University of New South Wales Cricket Club is presented for your approval.

The 1970-71 season saw the Club celebrate its twentyfirst year by regaining the Municipal and Shires Club Championship Trophy and emerging as undefeated Premiers in "A" Shires. This is only the second time that the Club has finished a season with one of its teams undefeated, and you'r marks so to those who contributed to this success. Our "B" Shires team once again filled fifth position in their competition, a result which was a little disappointing after their wonderful start to the season. The loss of key players over the Christmas vacation and, to some extent, the weather were the principal factors which prevented the "B" Shires team from reaching the Final. However, both past and present Members can be proud of the Club's record in Shires cricket - six Club Championships, four "A" Shires Premierships and three "B" Shires Premierships, all in the last eight seasons. Indeed, in the last nine seasons the Club has not finished lower than fourth in the Club Championship, fourth in the "A" Shires Premiership, and fifth in the "B" Shires Premiership. Let us hope that the years ahead will be just as rewarding.

One Premiership which has so far eluded the Club is "C" Shires. Our two teams this season dropped from third and fourth positions, respectively, to fifth and sixth positions. The problem here is the same as in "B" Shires: lack of stability in the sides caused by players dropping out over Christmas. Fortunately, there are always capable replacements available from our City and Suburban players and this eases the problem somewhat. In an endeavour to provide such players with as much cricket as possible, two City and Suburban sides were fielded in 1970-71. Although the second side only played a few games, most of its members were regulars with the Fifths, and some found their way to higher grades. It is hoped that the Club can again field six teams next season.

In January the Club hosted the Intervarsity Cricket Carnival. Rain prevented all but the first day's play, much to the disappointment of the ten competing

universities and to those who had worked so hard in organising the various aspects of the Carnival. The social programme was well-received by all and ran smoothly. The four or five people who did nearly all the work should be proud of their efforts. It was a pity that more assistance was not forthcoming from other Committee Members and members of the Intervarsity side itself. The Club records its appreciation and thanks to Sydney University Cricket Club for their assistance in organising the opening barbecue, in providing the necessary grounds, and in the early planning of the Carnival. We are also grateful for offers of help received from Macquarie University Cricket Club.

Rain also washed out our annual Intervarsity match against Newcastle in December. In February the Club sent a team on a two-week tour to South Australia and Western Australia. Games were played against Flinders, Adelaide and Western Australia, with the hosts being victorious on each occasion.

Once again, pre-season social matches were played against Randwick and Burwood, as well as our annual clashes during the season with Wollongong University College and David de Carvalho's ever-youthful "World XI". The single-wicket competition had to be abandoned when failing light stopped play during the quarter-finals.

The Annual Dinner was held on 24th May and was again a successful evening. Test Umpire and Club Vice-President, Mr Tom Brooks proposed the "Toast to Cricket" and our "Honorary Coach", Mr Wilf Ewens responded to the Toast. Professor L.J. Lawrence, who captained the first side fielded by the Club, reminisced about the early years in his "Toast to the Club". Club stalwart and Life Member, Professor Stanley Livingstone replied on behalf of the Club, and Mr Jim Pratley, "A" Shires Captain, proposed a vote of thanks to the speakers. Our Patron, Mr E.H. Davis presented his Bursar's Trophy for the best allrounder to Geoff Garland for the second successive year. Once again, Captain John Morris presented his personal Trophy for fielding to Rodger Robertson. Geoff Garland relieved himself of the Barr-Turn Trophy, presented by Club Members Clem Barrington and Bob Turner, by awarding it to Rodger Robertson, the Club's Actor for 1970-71. Fortyseven people attended the Dinner, to celebrate the Club's coming of age, but the response from Club Members was a

little disappointing. The Committee regretted having to increase the cost of the Dinner, but the finances of the Club left no alternative.

The financial position declined during the season after a welcome improvement the previous year. The largest outlay was for the Intervarsity Carnival, and the Committee budgeted for only a slight deficit. However, the withdrawal of two teams just a few days before the Carnival resulted in a loss in revenue of something like two hundred dollars from player levies and Sports Association subsidies, and this placed a severe strain on the Club's finances. Support for the "100 Club" was well down on last year.

Committee Meetings were well attended during the season. Each Committee Member was prepared to have his say and there were many lively debates on Club affairs. The Club can only benefit from this type of open debate, and it is hoped that future Committees will continue in this vein. In an attempt to solve some of the many problems associated with selections, a new-style Selection Committee was introduced this year. The Management Committee is well aware that the problems were not all overcome, and has already made recommendations for the incoming Committee to consider for next season.

The Club extends its sincere thanks to our "Honorary Coach", Mr Wilf Ewens, for his valuable assistance at practices during the season. His interest in the Club and his words of advice are greatly appreciated by the Committee and Members. We also express our gratitude to the New South Wales Cricket Association for the grant the Club received at the end of the season. Finally, the Management Committee thanks all those who gave both moral and material support to the Club during the season.

FIRST ELEVEN REPORT

The season 1970-71 saw the University of N.S.W. First XI achieve what it had attempted, but failed, to do in the previous two seasons - that is, win the final of the M & S Competition. It was also the second time in the history of the Club that the First XI had completed the season without losing a match. This performance was a real team effort.

Of the batsmen, Alec Dietsch proved his worth as an opener with runs at the right time. Rodger Robertson started the season with an onslaught on opposition bowling attacks but ran into a mid-season slump in form. However, Rodger combined with Alec Dietsch in the final to put on a match-winning partnership. Darryl Smith never really produced the form of the previous season, probably due to his more sober outlook and the threat of impending marriage. Graham Cole, back in the Firsts after a season in lower grades, provided somewhat of a backbone to the middle order, particularly in times of difficulty. The opposition found it difficult to set a field to his attempted cover drives. David Wills and John Pigott never quite settled down and therefore did not establish themselves as the forces of previous seasons. The young brigade produced some encouraging performances which auger well for the future. Phillip Heaney in his first season in the top team suffered the most of any player from being in a strong side where chasing points is one of the main objectives. A talented left-hand batsman and medium-paced bowler, his opportunities were limited, but one hopes that the experience gained will benefit him in the future. The highlights of his season were runs against Pennant Hills and a catch against Canterbury. Barry Cox, promoted as a replacement midway through the season, established himself as a permanent member with good performances. The improvement in his play was most noticeable, though some tutoring in the finer points of playing the cowshot (from B.G. Andrews, perhaps?) may prove advantageous in the future. Jock Martel showed that he has an immense amount of natural ability. With more experience and more application to the job in

hand, he could become one of the better batsmen to have played with the Club.

Of the bowlers, Geoff Garland again established himself as being of a standard better than that normally experienced in M & S cricket. In this case figures speak for themselves. Greig Robinson showed more maturity in his bowling than in previous seasons and a tally of 40 wickets was a just reward for his efforts. His batting talents, however, will have to wait at least until next season to be uncovered. 'Zed' Pirjevec showed a lot of potential (particularly in the nets) as an opening bowler. This season's experiences should stand him in good stead for future seasons when he should improve his wicket-taking record (providing the fieldsmen take the catches). Graham Cole had limited opportunities with the ball but still managed to turn in some impressive performances.

Bowlers were once again supported by some good, and at times brilliant, fielding. Rodger Robertson and Barry Cox in particular were outstanding. Team spirit was high, as it has to be for success to be attained.

I would personally like to express my gratitude to the team members for their support and in particular to Geoffrey Garland and also to Rodger Robertson for advice and assistance during the season. I would also like to thank those members delegated particular duties for 'performing' same without undue (?) complaint.

In conclusion, I hope that the team's performances enhance the Club's prospects of attaining Grade status where the talents of many players may be developed to a fuller extent than under the present situation.

SECOND ELEVEN REPORT

For the third successive year, the Second XI finished the season in fifth position. In short, it was a season marked by success early and late in the season, interspersed by the now customary, mid-season slump. In general terms, however, it could be described as a successful season, in that the team shared with the First XI the Club Championship crown. Our congratulations go to the premiers, Epping, and to Lane Cove, the runners up and minor premiers.

A place in the final for the team seemed already assured when, after four rounds, 32 points had been amassed. Convincing first innings wins had been recorded over Lindfield and Epping, and even more convincing outright victories over Bexley and Pennant Hills had followed. Few, at this time, would have forecast the mere nine points the "same" team was to earn in the next six games. Wash-outs and wet wickets were partly responsible for the hopeless position in which the team was placed after the tenth round. However, undoubtedly the main factors contributing to the mid-season slump were the huge turnover of players in this period, together with the apparent inability of players elevated from lower grades to consistently turn in satisfactory performances. Although wins were recorded in the final three rounds, including a close first innings victory over third placegetter, Auburn, all chance of making the final had virtually gone after the tenth round.

Unlike previous years, the bowling throughout the season was overshadowed by the batting. Consistent scoring from Alex Taylor, who also achieved his first century for the Club (after almost as many seasons), coupled with forceful innings from Phil Smith, Peter Wickham and John Pigott, with occasional rearguard support from Steve Gibbs and John Owen, usually assured the side a respectable score. When set a target, the runs were always scored. When batting first though, the same domination of the bat was not always realised. At these times, caution often prevailed where more aggression was needed.

Bowling honours went to Peter Wickham who, in his first season with the Club, captured 36 wickets at an average of 11.3. Playing in only five games, George Preston took 21 wickets, and was easily the pick of the

many fast bowlers tried. Had these two players been available throughout the season, the result of the premiership would almost certainly have been different. At best, the attack was efficient without ever being devastating or spectacular. Apparent deficiencies, however, were often accentuated by a lack of variety, in that for most of the season the team contained only four regular bowlers. Sometimes the team took the field with only three recognised bowlers, and on one occasion only two. I think we must have been expecting miracles. Certainly, the presence of a left-hand opening bowler and a slow wrist spinner were sorely missed.

I would like to thank in particular Clem Barrington for his able assistance and advice as Vice-Captain, Bob Turner for his services both on and off the field, and all team members for their support throughout the year.

The 1970-71 season was not the most successful for the Third XI. Inevitably, comparisons will be made with the considerably more successful previous season, and therein lies the tale. (Some may well have it as the "tail"). In a word, the performance for the season was patchy. Reassuring though it may be that, at times, more than half of the previous year's Third XI was playing the season in the higher grades, such a situation caused more than a few gaps for the Third XI. In filling these gaps we could not quite maintain a satisfactory balance, and the required overall stability and performance. Not that it was a dismal season - only one outright loss and two first innings losses - there were just too many drawn matches (5), many due to the weather and being greedy, not enough outright wins.

It was in the batting that the patchiness was most evident (in the bowling, we could generally manage to improvise more successfully, e.g., Leigh Ffrench's phantom spinning to take 5 wickets in an innings, and in combination with Alan Ridley, the pair taking 17 wickets in a match). Very rarely did the batting spontaneously catch fire, with one very notable exception. In the very last match of the season, the batting went magnificently berserk, with Jim Dormon scoring 101 not out and Steve Hure 92, setting a new Third XI and Club 4th wicket partnership record of 158, and a new Third XI highest score of 4-278 (dec.). So effectively did these two batsmen come up to the opposition that the last 150 runs were scored in an hour. (It should also be noted that, inevitably it would seem, rain washed out play on the second day of this match resulting in yet another drawn game.) Insofar as the overall batting performance, and not the weather, that last match was unfortunately the exception. Other than Jim Dormon's 101 n.o. and Steve Hure's 92, only Lloyd Ferreira (73), Alan Thomas (65) and Peter Street (51) scored 50's, although Leigh Ffrench, Mick Evans and John Owen all contributed valuable innings. The disappointing feature was the frequent failure of the middle order batting, and here, although it sounds

hackneyed, a little restraint and concentration would have gone a long way, particularly among the younger members. It is these players who will form the nucleus of the Club in coming years, and a little coaching in batting restraint would be most valuable at this stage.

In the bowling, a lack of continued balance was most evident. For the season as a whole, virtually the only fixed point was Barry Wenke, who could always be relied upon to maintain an intelligent and steady attack. From the other end, each of the pace bowlers, Ian Webb, Vadim Shev, John Owen, Steve Hamilton, all had their moments of glory. Regrettably, the overall spin attack was generally rather thin, with Alan Ridley and, to the surprise of everyone except himself, Leigh Ffrench producing the best performances.

Another season finished, and what of the coming season? In bowling, our general standard, as judged from this season's performances, will probably be satisfactory. However, much of the batting will continue to be fragile until such times as the middle order batsmen show more restraint and perseverance - which is something which has probably been said in every Third XI report every year!

FOURTH ELEVEN REPORT

Before the start of the season I looked forward with anticipation (after a very encouraging season in 1969-70) to at least our No. 3 side being in the final. However, it took only three matches to realise that the clock had been turned back to less encouraging days.

The same problems as those that have plagued our 'C' Shire teams since the Club first entered a team in this grade appeared again. These problems are well known, for they have been mentioned, annually, in reports from the lower grades.

It is very difficult to have a successful team when you have a total of 40 players appearing for the team throughout the season (surely a Club record!). The team took the field at least one player short on five occasions - played Wentworthville with nine men - against Epping No. 1 there were nine changes in the team, not during the week, but on Saturday morning. For the game against our Third Grade, both teams were selected in the dressing-room before we took the field. There is nothing new in these facts, for they are much the same as previous years - with no apparent solution available. However, I feel that the problem lies with the individual and his attitude towards the Club - and, sad as it may seem, this originates from some of the Club's most talented players. In the game against Pennant Hills, at David Phillips, which was a two-day match, three of the Pennant Hills team came down from their holidays on the Central Coast each week to play. I wonder how many of our players would do the same?

However, there were some fine individual performances during the season - notable amongst these were Vadim Shev's bowling against Burwood (8-32 in the 1st innings and 7-36 in the 2nd) and Phillip Dobell-Brown's 102 not out against Auburn-Lidcombe. There were also performances that seem to indicate that a number of players will not be with us next season, but could move on to better things.

Of the bowlers, Steve Hamilton, whose bowling improved greatly throughout the season, will, with a tightening of his batting technique, become a very good allrounder. Dave Stockley, who is bowling with a lot more control, can look forward to a successful season next year.

Of the batting, which was very poor throughout the season, the only ray of light would seem to be Steve Hure, who, although only playing one game towards the end of the season, proved to be a very good hard-hitting opening batsman.

All in all, the performances of the team were a little disappointing although most matches were played under some handicap. I hope that some solution to these many problems can be found, as it seems a pity that the 'C' Shire is the only competition that has eluded the University of N.S.W. Cricket Club.

In conclusion, I should like to thank each member of the Fourths and especially Stan Livingstone for their support throughout the season.

FIFTH ELEVEN REPORT

It was fortunate that the Fifths decided to adopt a somewhat philosophical outlook towards the outcome of their matches. Otherwise morale could have reached an all-time low. They were both not out at stumps and thumped 7 fours between them. Steve Hure finished with 2 for 17 and Brian Akhurst (who proved a most reliable bowler) 2 for 38. It was a great loss to the team when Steve Hure became unavailable for most of the season. Ian Winter doubled up to collect 2 for 25. Geoff Borny made his mark as a very keen fieldsman in this match.
- The next two matches (against Waverley and Briars) are best forgotten except for Steve Kemp's 4 for 9.
- Dave Stockley (employing gamesmanship skilfully) collected the magic hat-trick against the U.N.S.W. 6th XI. Even Rick Wegner took 2 for 12 in this match.
- Against Wondescripts Fraser Ainsworth scored 33 and Rick Wegner 16. Despite the fact that 24 byes were

- John Sindel again performed with a slashing 53 against Trinity Old Boys.
- Dave Iverach slammed the baddies all over the ground to score 85 against The Rest in a trial game.
- Against the Commercial Bank Geoff Borny scored 29. Dave Stockley stayed amongst the wickets with 3 for 29.
- Harvey Blanch finished with 4 for 10 in the second match against the Old Cranbrookians.
- Wilf Ewens (our Honorary Coach) showed us how to play the game with a great double against Manly, scoring 78 not out and then collecting 6 for 26.
- Against Old Cranbrookians (again) Paul Greenfield and Ian Webb scored 32 and 49 respectively.
- Zoran Pirjevic figured prominently in the second match against Briars. He scored 110 slashing runs not out after also opening the bowling in the course of which he collected 4 cheap wickets. Zoran really handles 62 year-old bowlers well. Bob Thurgood also bowled very well in this match.
- In a disastrous outright defeat against Old Sydneians, John Sindel scored a courageous 18 (including two towering sixes) and John Russell carried the brunt of the bowling attack magnificently to finish with 3 for 28 against extremely competent batsmen. Phil Dobell-Brown arrived just in time to collect 3 for 5.
- A resounding victory was a fitting conclusion to the season. Dave Iverach (55) and Boyd Fowler (26) batted well to ensure victory against Macquarie Uni. Dave Iverach collected 5 for 21. Mention must also be made of the fact that Alan Goodwin and Boyd Fowler opened the bowling in most creditable fashion in this game.

In the face of grave selection and attendance uncertainties, the team performed in a most encouraging way, and I think most players who played with the Fifths at least enjoyed themselves.

SIXTH "ELEVEN" REPORT

After a careful perusal of the vast amount of documented evidence pertaining to the team's performance it would not be at all surprising if the figures about to be presented prove beyond all doubt that the "Scintillating Sixths" is the most demanding and go-ahead team the U.N.S.W. Cricket Club has ever entered into non-international competition.

Firstly, to give an overall picture, I must point out that due to overcrowding of the agenda it was found necessary to omit one or two games, but never-the-less it was still found possible to cram in five games over the six month season (and two of these were against the "Fighting Fifths"!). In these five games the team lost 40 wickets for a grand total of 406 runs, whilst the cowering opposition teams managed to fumble away 34 wickets for a disgraceful 755 runs. The team's best score was 9-124 against Colleagues. The definite potential evidenced in this score is only marred by the fact that Colleagues lost 4 wickets for 182 runs (a close thing!).

Now for the statistics of play. Not counting the two games against the Fifths (when the teams were selected before and during play), the 29 appearances at the crease over the season required no less than 20 stalwart athletes with those well-known stayers J. Campbell and I. McIntyre appearing on all three occasions. Seven batsmen reached double figures on a grand total of eight occasions. These seven batsmen produced 229 out of a total 280 runs. It is a noble testimonial to the team that all these batsmen, except one who left the Club and one, G. Tulloch, who was needed as a regular opening bat in Fifth Grade, were allowed to leave the team and finish the season playing for Fourths or higher grades. The remainder of this fine body of men managed to knock up the incredible average of 1.83 runs per dig. Needless to say, these too were allowed to leave the team and finish the season at the Regent.

On the other side of the scene this fine body of men produced equally remarkable bowling figures. Fifteen of the 20 were required to plough through a total of 74 overs resulting in an overall average as low as 7.7

runs per over and 3.7 overs per wicket. Of course, being true sportsmen, no maidens were required.

On summing up, it must be mentioned that one A. Thomas, who fronted down for a bash with the team, walked away with a score of 63 runs, almost twice any other batsman's seasonal aggregate. Best bowling figures belong to G. Borny who captured 4 wickets for 40 runs off 8 overs in his appearance as Captain in the first game. Finally, another allusion to those two doubtfuls who fronted to every game - this can't go on.

REPORT ON THE WESTERN TOUR

From the 7th to 17th February Greig (Okker)
Robinson took his troop of gay cavaliers away on a
well-deserved holiday. Because that's what it was we
did not win the cricket, but we spread plenty of goodwill and helped the brewing industries in both South
and Western Australia.

Our first encounter was against our old rivals Flinders, played on Monday and Tuesday, following an invigorating "surf" at Glenelg (which is flatter than Botany Bay) on the Sunday. Flinders won the toss and decided we should bat. So "Fidel" Smith and "Casual Acquaintance" Rosen strode to the wicket and to the amazement of all put on 55 before Phil departed. Alan "Animal" Wright followed and he and Rosen took the score to 99 before Rosen was out for 62. Wright, "B.C." Cox and Jock "Strap" Martel all scored well, and we were 6-205, "Hans" Heaney departing for a modest score. Then alas, the story of the tour - a collapse; all out for 231 with Hugh "Pig" Hopkins battling for 22. The sad story was that Cox and Thomas both got themselves out with silly play at the crease. Anyway, 231 in 292 minutes wasn't a bad score, particularly when Robinson bowled Goldsworth before stumps and had Sutherland caught first over next morning. Then it was our turn: 1-0 first ball, exit Rosen; 2-9, exit Smith; 3,4 and 5-15 saw Cox, Martel and Wright depart, while at 24 Heaney and Hopkins abdicated. So we were 7-24. The only thing which made the score respectable was "Duck" Whalan (14) and 'Z' Pirjevic (21), ably supported by Barford and Robinson each scoring 6. The highlight of the day was Zoran's six which he hit straight and seemed to be still climbing as it sailed over the fence. We lasted the sum total of 18.5 overs to be all out for 74.

On the Thursday we chartered a bus to the Barossa and all drowned our sorrows (funny, but we certainly drown a great number of sorrows on tour). Friday was spent recouperating, watching the Test and moving on to Perth. We spent a quiet weekend, with Rosen finding another casual acquaintance.

It would be fair to say this was the only time we were on top in the entire match. From 2-38 they moved to 3-176, 4-230 to 6-254 with "Poh" Penter retiring hurt at 110 (including 13 fours and 1 five). Nicholls, Tooke and Eddington all managed 30 or better, then, at 5.43pm, with the score at 6-254, Peter Newman, an ex-Club man batting 9, strode to the wicket. He collected 16 off Rosen's next over, followed by 17 off Z's next (including one almighty six). Needles; to say Peter went on to make an unconquered 80 before Nicholls declared at 7-373.

Now perhaps it was our turn. Alas, no - another good start against the fiery bowling of "Frosty" Taylor followed quickly by a middle-order collapse (from 2-75 to 6-78). The "Duck" Whalan scored the run and must therefore be credited as the hero of the match. Paul Nicholls bowled 33 overs, 6 maidens, and took 7 for 113, while Rod Eddington bowled 22 overs, 8 maidens, and took 2 for 54.

Some consolation can be taken from the fact that W.A. had to bat again. They managed to score the required runs for the loss of one wicket and finished with 1-76.

This ended a happy and enjoyable tour. I would take this opportunity to thank the three host Universities for the cricket and the social life. I am glad to say the team was extremely well behaved and were good ambassadors for the Club.
