### PRESIDENT'S REPORT.

Gentlemen,

It is my privilege, as President of the University of New South Wales Cricket Club, to introduce the Twelfth Annual Report and Financial Statement.

The year under review was reasonably successful in all respects except one, namely, that long before the end of the season, there was again a shortage of players. Every University expects to have difficulty in fielding all its teams at full strength during the vacation; when, however, there were at least two dozen players graded in September, 1961 as reserves for the Club's sides, there should have been no problem in fielding every eleven at full numerical strength five months later. There is no doubt that many more players would show an interest if the Club were admitted to the Sydney Grade Competition; on the other hand, one of the best ways of forcing entry into that competition is to field strong teams in the present divisions.

In 1961-2 the Club had teams in the A and B divisions of the Municipal and Shires Competition and fielded two teams to play in the one-day matches of the City and Suburban Cricket Association. The City and Suburban A side, under the captaincy of Clem Barrington, achieved the best and most spectacular results, particularly in the early in the early part of the season; by Christmas, however, many of its players were needed to reinforce the Shires teams and that is why the final figures do not look so impressive. Nobody understands why the A Shires did not win more matches; they are potentially the strongest team in the competition and perhaps the strongest the Club has ever had, but they did not seem to "strike form" together. B Shires were perhaps the unluckiest side, narrowly missing outright wins that would have made a great difference to their position on the competition table. The B City and Suburban team, as ever, had to pay the price whenever the other teams were short of players and so lost many a match that at full strength they would have won.

There is one notable omission in the reports that follow: the four captains have said nothing whatever about their own part in their teams' successes. There is no doubt whatever that John Middleton's and Phil Schofield's bowling, Clem Barrington's wicket-keeping and John Hall's batting and fielding would have loomed large if the reports on their teams had been written by other players; from experience both as a spectator and as a player at various times under three of the four captains, I can also testify that all four led their teams capably, unselfishly and in the very best cricketing spirit. I congratulate and thank them all.

Special mention should also be made of the tour of New Zealand by a successful combined Australian Universities side, of which Terry Lee was certainly a "star". Of the other special matches covered in the report, the Intervarsity games are no doubt the most important and there is no need to be ashamed of the results

achieved there. The Club was also pleased to have teams from Newcastle and Wollongong University Colleges as its guests for one-day social matches at Kensington against the A and B Shires respectively. I hope that future Club Committees will continue to arrange such matches and also matches against Schools, like the very pleasant one played in December last year, under appalling weather conditions, against Knox College. Every player who enjoyed the hospitality of the College on that occasion will hope that our Club can reciprocate this year and will testify that such contests can do a great deal to establish good relations between the University and the schools.

There were several "first occasions" during the season to which I should like to draw attention. One was the first use of the splendid new sports pavilion at the University; it makes cricket more comfortable and the entertaining of visiting teams a pleasure. Another was the first Annual Dinner - a most enjoyable function at which the Club was privileged to have among its guest speakers the President of the New South Wales Cricket Association, Mr. Sid Smith; the former New South Wales Captain, Mr. Alan McGilvray; and the famous New Zealand batsman, Mr. Martin Still another innovation was the first award of Club Donnelly. Trophies for the best batting and bowling averages in the Shires teams, taken separately, and the City and Suburban teams, taken Cynics might add yet another "first", this was the first together. season in which Randwick Oval has been in perfect playing condition! We shall be sorry to lose it, but we look forward to the use of the new University sports grounds at Daceyville and a "new-look" oval at Prince Henry Hospital.

The question whether Club Trophies should be awarded was one of many questions carefully discussed on the Committee, and it was not the only problem on which there was certainly not unanimity of cpinion. Of that I am proud: any Club Committee that does not sometimes differ on questions of principle is moribund and I assure Club members that this Committee was far from moribund. To every member of it I express my sincerest thanks for a difficult task well done; and I am sure that all members of the Club will join me in a special word of praise for the Teams Secretary, Harold Bundy, the Treasurer, John Hall, and - above all - the Club Secretary, Clem Barrington.

# MUNICIPAL AND SHIRES "A" TEAM - 1961 - 62.

This Season the "A" Shires team was successful in only 4 out of 14 matches. This was most disappointing as we felt that this was one of the strongest combinations selected to represent the University Club. Following the longest practice period undertaken by the Club, the team still needed 4 matches to settle down, but for the remaining 10 matches the team played, on the whole, good cricket.

Throughout the Season the team spirit was exceptionally high, averages were forgotten when the occasion demanded and the carefree amiability displayed by every member of the team made it a pleasure to be part of the team.

From the batting point of view there were two highlights of the season, the fire unconquered century by Peter Ward against Epping and the magnificient battling of Mick Reidy and Professor Salmon against Ryde. Even though Professor Salmon made a fine century that day I know he willagree with me when I say it was eclipsed in no uncertain manner by Mick Reidy's batting. Mick's 84, made in as many minutes, was undoubtedly the most delightful shotmaking I have seen in this competition.

The bowling was not as dangerous as in previous seasons but both Peter Ward as our opening left arm bowler and Duncan Marshal as our spinner performed very meritoriously.

On the crumbling University pitch, Duncan was well nigh unplayable, and we were extremely unfortunate in losing him for half the season. Duncan suffered misfortune after misfortune during the Season, and we look forward to the next Season when we once again have him available.

During the Season, several new players performed with the side for the first time; John Chegwyn an opening batsman received very useful experience; Ian King performed splendidly behind the stumps; Geof Garland introduced himself to the side by taking 7 for 20 at Sutherland; John Bryan displayed a clever control of the new ball.

The team fielding improved on previous seasons, though the standard of fielding is still way below the standard which should be reached by a University eleven.

During most of the Season we dearly missed the presence of Professor Lawrence who was forced by Professorial duties to cease playing with the team temporarily. We do hope he can see his way clear next Season to "pad up" once again for the eleven.

I thank all the members of the side for their assistance and co-operation during the Season, particularly Mick Reidy, our Vice Captain, and I wish the team every success in the future.

#### CAPTAIN'S REPORT.

### CITY & SUBURBAN - "A" TEAM.

This year "paved the way" for more successful seasons by this team.

A summary of the reasons results is as follows:

As the summary indicates, this was the team's most successful season to date. This success was due to the remarkable influx of talented players who constituted the team during the Season. It was a delight to be "commander" of a team of ten "Captains" who could excel in all phases of the game. The outright win recorded by the team in its first match proved just what this combined talent could achieve.

The opening bowlers John Collings and Frank Martin must be commended for their ability to use "cunning" and "speed" respectively with the new ball. It was difficult to know what to do with three opening bowlers, but gratifying to know that when Shires recognised theability of the former two bowlers, "old faithful" Don Orrock was there. We were again endowed with talent in medium spinner Ted Ross and "leggy" Sam Soper. The latter, unfortunately for the team, fortunately for the opposition, departed from our ranks during the season to further the knowledge of students, both academically and wicket-wise, at another university. Our strength in spinners was upheld by the addition into our ranks, from time to time, of Jack Tuckwell, Kevin Barr, and "better late than never" Phil Newman.

John Collings won the Club's Bowling Trophy for City and Suburban teams by taking 29 wickets for 217 runs off 64 overs, recording an average of 7.5. These figures include a magnificent bowling feat of 7 for 3 off 7 overs (3 maidens) against Paddington at Trumper Park.

To back up the achievement of these bowlers our batting lineups produced the necessary runs to give us 54% superiority in the matches played. The best individual score of the season was a magnificent knock of 60 by Bruce McFarland who, although only participating in 6 innings, ended the season with an average of 30.2 Vice-Captain Malcolm Miner won the Club's Batting Trophy for City and Suburban Teams by his consistent batting which gave him an average of 21.7 from 18 innings. Other individual scores of merit were B. Andrews, 59; R. Smith, 58; Yes! D. Orrock, 57; J. Collings, 51; T. Creer, 49; E. Leslighter, 50; B. Nairn, 46; T. Gibson, 44; T. Ross, 43; D. Clark, 40; T. Sullivan, 40; K. Barr, 40. The teams overall performance was as follows;

The five wins were recorded prior to the Christmas Vacation, when we were able to field a fairly stable team each week, but such was not the case in the latter part of the season, when we were more or less disjointed, and at times took the field with a man or two short, and on two occasions three men short. I need hardly stress the disadvantage of which a team is placed under such circumstances.

The strength of the team undoubtedly lay in the bowling the brunt of which was borne by three or four players. On numerous occasions the opposition was dismissed for scores which should have been well within the reach of our batsmen but they failed to capitalise on the magnificent job done by the bowlers. Of the matches lost, five were by margins of less than 20 runs.

Bruce Dockrill was the most successful bowler taking 38 wickets at an average of 11.79; in all he secured over 50 wickets for the Club, a performance which speaks for itself. Bruce, who shows a lot of potential, was a great asset to us; he bowled intelligently and economically throughout the season, and could be used for long spells to keep one end "bottled up."

Wal Burke performed very creditably as a new ball bowler, and Kevin Barr lent grand support with his off-spinners. The team's batting, however, was disappointing, and as I have said, we would only have had to perform reasonably well in this department to have added to our record of wins.

Tom Sullivan, after a slow start, proved to be our most consistent batsman and topped the aggregates, whilst Wal Giles, Harris Boulton, and Terry Gibson made a number of useful scores. Terry's 58 against Knox Old Boys was the highest individual score. Unfortunately through the season.

An encouraging feature was the fielding which supported the bowlers very well, and apart from the couple of matches, a good standard was maintained. It was particularly pleasing to see Harris Boulton win the Capt. Morris Fielding Trophy; his ground fielding and returns to the wicket were excellent.

Apart from Centennial Park, where we had one match, the standard of the grounds on which we played was on the whole very good, and in this regard the condition of Randwick Oval in the last half of the season both the wicket and outfield was the best I have seen it.

In conclusion, I would like to take this opportunity to thank the members of the team who gave me such great support and co-operation throughout the season, and I hope 1962/63 brings the team greater success.

### AUSTRALIAN UNIVERSITIES CRICKET TOUR OF NEW ZEALAND.

An Australian Universities Team toured New Zæland for three weeks from 17th December, 1961 to 5th January, 1962. In the original selection this University was honoured by the selection of two of its members - Terry Lee and Stan Gilchrist. Unfortunately Stan was unable to mak the trip, and Terry Lee was this Club's sole representative. The team played six matches in the three weeks, and was defeated only once. Terry Lee headed the batting aggregate and averages and also turned—in some fine performances with the ball.

Results of matches are summarised below:

Aust. Universities 363 defeated Combined Canterbury University and Lincoln Agricultural College 67 and 144.

Aust. Universities 291 (T. Lee 60) and 6 for 250 defeated Combined New Zealand Universities 152 and 138.

Aust. Universities 339 (T. Lee 109) and 1 for 37 defeated Atago University 223 and 153 (T. Lee 8 wickets).

Aust. Universities 284 and 5 for 165 defeated. Victoria University 262 and 8 for 164. Aust. Universities 9 for 303 (T. Lee 160) drew with Manawatu 6 for 326. Auckland University 255 and 3 for 153 defeated Aust. Universities 199 and 5 for 145.

The University of New South Wales team, which included one Newcastle representative (D. March), this year played University of Queensland at the beautiful St. Lucia ground in Brisbane. Of the Sydney representatives, John Chegwyn was the sole "A" Shires player, the remainder of the team having been drawn from lower grades together with the inclusion of T. Lee (Captain), S. Gilchrist and H. Ward, who are members of district grade clubs.

Queensland won the toss and batted first. With the exception of Australian Universities representative Bill Buckle, who scored 33, they offered little resistance to the fine bowling of Lee and Gilchrist and could only score 120 runs. Terry Lee bowled extremely well to take 7 wickets for 30 runs off 19 overs. He was well supported by Stan Gilchrist with 2 wickets for 29 runs off 10 overs. The feature of this innings was thefine wicket keeping of Ian King. He took 4 catches off the bowling of Lee, and one stumping from Gilchrists bowling. The ground fielding was very good in the extreme heat, but several spilled catches marred the overall display.

John Chegwyn and Doug March gave New South Wales a very good start with an opening partnership of 57. Chegwyn '(18 runs) was unfortunately run out when a strong drive from Tim Order was unintentionally deflected from the bowler's foot to break the wicket at the bowler's end. Doug March played the best innings of the University of New South Wales batsmen. He handled the strong Queensland pace attack with confidence, and hooked and drove strongly for 37 runs. At the end of the first day's play N.S.W. had 3 wickets down for 87 runs. On the second day, Creer (26), Gilchrist (23), and Garland (22) batted soundly and the team was finally dismissed for 174 runs shortly before tea. The Queensland bowlers had maintained constant pressure and the opening pair, Kitching and Entschgave a fine exhibition of sustained pace bowling.

For the remainder of theday, the Queensland batsmen defended strongly, and were in a sound position at stumps with 3 for 89. However, steady rain delayed the start of the final day's play until 1.50 p.m. Lee and Gilchrist bowled unchanged and Gilchrist, in particular, handled the conditions very well. Bill Buckle once again topscored for Queensland with 37 runs. Ian King showed that his first innings display was no chance by again claiming five victims (1 caught, 4 stumped). The Queensland batsmen were once more unable to master the spin of Lee and Gilchrist, and were dismissed for 156 runs.

New South Wales now required 103 runs in 100 minutes to force a win. Unfortunately, Doug March had to return home early and was unable to bat. However, Barry Andrews deputised as opener and brought the scoring rate up with three boundary shots over slips. John Chegweyn batted well for 16 runs and, with one hour remaining, University of N.S.W.had lost 2 wickets for 67 runs. Terry Lee then produced some aggressive batting and gave N.S.W.a winning chance by scoring 43 runs in 67 minutes. The feature of Lee's innings was a glorious straight drive off the back foot for six. This was the only six of the match. With Lee out and the score 4 for 92, N.S.W. needed 11 runs in 7 minutes to win. However, the Queensland pace bowlers, who had bowled unchanged, were too tight and the innings finished 6 runs short at 5 for 97. BillKitching repeated his excellent bowling performance of the first innings with 3 for 36 off 9 overs.

The young University of New South Wales side performed creditably and gained a wealth of experience from thismatch. Terry Lee proved a capable Captain, and we look forward to returning Queensland's hospitality next year.
