It is my privilege, as President, to introduce the Thirteenth Annual Report and Financial Statement of the University of New South Wales Cricket Club for the year 1962-1963.

In many respects, this year was the most successful the Club has ever had. The team in the A Division of the Municipal and Shires Competition was among the leading group throughout the season and reached the semi-finals. The team in the D Division was also in the running for the semi-finals until late in the season and must be regarded as rather unlucky not to have occupied higher than fifth place in the final table. The two City and Suburban teams won more than their fair share of matches and when at full strength were capable of holding their own with all but the very strongest teams in that Association. There were the usual difficulties in fielding strong teams during the vacation but they were not as acute as in previous seasons.

The University participated very successfully in the Enter-Varsity Cricket Carnival in Tasmania, winning one of its three matches and performing creditally in at least one of the others. We all offer our sincerest congratulations to the three members of the Club who were selected in the Australian Universities team - John Chegwyn and Peter Ward, from Kensington and Royce Levi, the Newcastle wicket-Imper.

The records of the various teams are given in the pages that folicy, together with accounts of other formal and informal matches played by the Club. It is pleasing to be able to say that the Club has now something like a regular programme of matches against the Wollongong and Newcastle University Colleges together with a series of social matches. Such a game as the one against Knor College gives great pleasure to those involved and may be thought to provide the best possible kind of contact between the University Club and players from a school that may well contribute to our own future strength in both the academic and the sporting spheres.

The second Annual Dinner was held in the University Union and again was a complete social success. The Club offers its thanks to the great test player of former years, Mr. Birt Oldfield, and to an old friends, test umpire Goorge Borwick, for proposing so ably the toasts of Cricket and the Club.

I should like to conclude this introduction by expressing my most genuine gratitude to the members of the Committee, to the Secretary, Treasurer, and Teams Secretary, the four Club Captains, to the hard working, conscientious and co-operative groundsman and to the Amenities Officer, Mr. Cracknell. These are the men who serve the Club without any other form of thanks and without expectation of any other reward than the efficient running of Club affairs and the maintenance of the best possible spirit within the Club. Their efforts in the past season have met with unqualified success.

1ST X1 REPORT.

The 1st X1 had its most successful season since entering the Municipal and Shires Competition, and won its way to the semi-final. Of the thirteen matches played four were lost on the first innings, one drawn and eight won (one outright). The team was not markedly different in composition from last year's side, and the better results achieved were due to its members playing more consistently (though not consistently enough) in accordance with their real ability. With more confidence, a little more concentration at critical moments, and half an ounce of luck here and there, results might have been even better. This team has the talent to win the competition. With the new blood that is becoming available, and a blend of youth and experience, it is difficult to see how it can fail to gain the prize for which it strove so much more effectively this year.

There is no player so good that practice will not make him better. With the exception of a few students, attendance at practice was disappointing, and, even when a sufficient muster was present, poor organisation prevented the best use being made of it. In particular, there was inadequate control of bowlers and not enough fielding practice. It was noticeable that of all the University teams the 1st Xl was the poorest in representation at the nets. In this connection it may be observed that part of the strength of the side this season came from the number of talented players in the 2nd Xl who often performed as well as those whom they replaced from time to time. Selection was sometimes a difficult problem this year, and it is a good augury for the future that there are now somany players of 1st X1 standard in the club.

The team began the season with a narrow win over Pennant Hills and a small first innings difficit against Bexley. Thereafter it won all its games with the exception of those against Auburn, the competition winners, Epping, the runners up, and Burwood, a strong but unlucky side.

It turned the tables on Bexley in the 12th round, but could not do the same with Epping in the rain-affected semi-final. The loss of the first three wickets for four runs in this vital match proved a handicap that could not be overcome, despite good batting by E. Lesleighter and J. Middleton and some aggressive bowling. On the second day, bags, shovels and even a pump were used by groundsman and players to make a little play possible, but all the equipment of the Snowy Mountains Scheme would not have rendered cricket possible during the floods on both days of the final competition match against Roseville.

M. Reidy returned to form with a series of graceful and aggressive innings in the first part of the season. His wristful 84 against Lane Cove put the side in a winning position, and his departure overseas after the tenth round left a gap which was difficult to fill, despite good performances by J. Chegwyn and E. Lesleighter, who joined the 1st X1 during his absence. The team consistently made runs for the third and fourth wickets, but batting was erratic in other parts of the order. M. Kemp continued his unbroken run of successes from the 2nd X1, but struck a bad patch after the Ryde game - unhappily the period of Reidy's absence. With impeccable defonce and a swatting square cut for the rising ball on the off, he stabilized the upper batting order and were held.

As vice-captain, J. Middleton was a source of strength. The team was a happy one and responded well to whatever demands were made. Sometimes the state of competition points made us play more negatively than we would have wished as in our dour crawl to victory against Bexley in the twelfth round. For the most part we set out to win as attractively as we could, and I fancy that, besides registering some success, we enjoyed our cricket.

2nd X1 Report - 1962-63.

The report written in the middle of the season, would ,unfortunately, be somewhat different to this retrospective report. I think that most Club members know of the fluctuating fortunes of the team during the 1962/63 seasons a period of success, followed by a period of "misfortune." The lack of success was probably due, in yet another season, to the long vacation with its subsequent disorganisation of the various Throughout the season more than 30 members played in the team, but le me hasten to add that the individual talents of all of these players were equal: what was lacking was the rigid framework and teamwork established during the imitial stages of the season. I well realise that such reshuffling of teams during the long vacation must always be a factor in University teams but I am emphasising the point as I am certain that the initial success of the team was due not so much to individual performances as to integrated team performances. If someone failed, then there was always someone to back up and eliminate the failure.

I perhaps sould a little too dismal, but I am sure that there was disappointment at not reaching the semi-finals. On the other hand, I think two features were outstanding, and I think they did nothing to lessen the stature of the University: the behaviour of the team on the field and the type of cricket played. I hope that we played cricket as it should be played (and at times it was unfortunate that the opposition did not have a similar philosophy). In this regard I again do not intend to mention individual performances; the scoring of more than 300 runs in an afternoon speaks for itself and the team's approach to the game.

I remain an optimist, I hope that the team in the coming seasonwill have even more success - but it could surely not be a better team than I had the pleasure of captaining in this last season.

Ray Bayfield's bowling - one of the unluckiest swing bowlers I've seen. Remember Ray's best cricket shot when batting? - over the bowlers head for six. Peter Conyngham's great off-drive. It amazed a lot of people, and Norm O'Neill would be proud of it.

One incident comes to mind. Tom Sullivan had played C & S "A"s, "B"s and M & S "B"s for the past four or five weeks. We were playing at Randwick Oval. I happened to be at the bowlers end and Tom was striking. At this stage he had five consecutive "blobs" to his name, and was scratching around at the other end. Before the next ball, the bowler

sat down to adjust his boots. Tom walked down the wicket to me and said "I've had this." Up ran the bowler for the next ball. He hadn't quite completed his action when the ball bounced (clobbered by Tom) ten yards from Basser College, and it took five minutes to find it.

Congratulations to Terry Gibson - some great batting, and off-spinning, and to John Tainsh who kept wickets in really fine style.

John Collings was the mainstay of the bowling throughout the Season. John bowled, every match, absolutely unplayable deliveries, and, you will all agree, deserves a special mention. His "kangaroo hop" ball upset all batsmen. John was never happy about finishing his long fast bowling spell and on more than one occasion, "steadied" down to taking wickets with his off-spinners. Well done, John!

Thank you C & S "A" for making my job an easy one.

INTER-VARSITY CARNIVAL, 1963.

The University of Tasmania was host in February for the first Australian Universities Cricket Carnival. The competing universities were Queensland, Sydney, New South Wales, Melbourne and Tasmania, the general principles of the Carnival being the meeting, under most congenial conditions, of University cricketers from the various states and the matches against Universities not normally encountered in the Inter-Varsity fixtures of the individual Universities. The matches were played over one day, with split batting time if necessary, and a point score competition devised accordingly.

Unfortunately, only 3 of the 4 matches were played, the last match being abandoned because of inclement weather. In this reduced competition, Melbourne finished in first position.

The New South Wales team consisted of: P. Schofield (Capt.) R. Levi (N.U.C.), (Vice Capt.) P. Ward, J. Chegwyn, A. Taylor, G. Sutcliffe (N.U.C.), D. Lacey, H. Boulton, G. Bastock, G. Garland, J. Pigott and I. Lowe. It can be said that this team acquitted itself According to a Hobart newspaper, the team was "an unknown quantity", but the general opinion was that the team would not be among the favoured teams, those of the longer established Universities. However, the University of New South Wales produced several shocks and certainly established itself among the other Universities. fact speaks for itself. At the conclusion of the Carnival an Australian Universities Team was selected on the basis of performances at the Carnival as recognition to the outstanding players. No less than 3 University of New South Wales players were selected in this team: John Chegwyn (opening batsman), Peter Ward (all-rounder) and Royce Levi (Wicket keeper). To these players the team, and I am sure the Club, offers sincere congratulations. It is also my pleasure to assure the members of this Club that their representatives in Hobart played in a manner which brought credit to the University.

1. U.N.S.W. v SYDNEY.

The first match, against Sydney, was played under hot drying conditions. In these circumstances, Sydney elected to bat. Then came the first of the N.S.V. jolts when the first four Sydney wickets fell for less than 20 runs. However, the pressure could not be maintained and as the pitch dried out, Sydney's middle batsmen consolidated their position, the team ultimately scoring 189. New South Wales did not get away to a good start in the chase for the necessary runs, but opening batsman John Chegwyn gave the first of

a series of fine batting displays. Although the struggle was serious, and wickets continued to fall, at all times the batting was bright; the game was tense and the issue in doubt until the fall of the last wicket. Unfortunately N.S.W. failed to catch Sydney's total by 38 runs, and although beaten on the first innings, certainly gave a most creditable performance.

2. <u>U.N.S.W. v QUEENSLAND.</u>

Because the usual 3 day Inter-Varsity match against Queensland had been cancelled, it was decided by both Universities that the Carnival Match against Queensland would, in fact, be the regular inter-varsity match, although of only 1 day duration.

N.S.W. batted first on a moist pitch in conditions which, although fine, clearly showed prospects of coming rain. this morning session the batting was quite slow owing to accurate bowling and a slow outfield. At this stage Peter Ward was proving to be the backbone of the batting, playing soundly in a much restrained manner. By lunch, however, New South Wales was not in a happy position; owing to the slow scoring, only approximately 100 runs were on the board, with only three wickets and sixty mintues in hand, and the rain beginning to fall - a most unpromising outlook! was not to be so. In the after lunch session, a most amazing change in the game occurred. In a bid for quick runs, Ward proceeded to thrash the bowling in no uncertain manner. the other end, the three final batsmen, Boulton, Schofield, and Garland, played sensible supporting roles, with the result that at the completion of the time, the lunch score had been doubled for the loss of only a further two wickets, and Ward had finished with a wonderful 84 not out.

Tribute must be payed to the Queensland team for the manner in which they played. Although rain was beginning to fall quite steadily and the pitch was becoming very wet, they accepted the challenge and from the very first ball, they went for the runs. Two quick wickets fell, but then Queensland started to consolidate. However, this was to be Peter Ward's match; two wickets in one over, and the rout had started. The remainder of the team collapsed against Ward's fine bowling. The final scores: Queensland, 1st innings 55, Ward - 4-3.

Although the weather conditions were now very poor, Queensland batted again but averted an innings defeat. New South Wales thus scored a convincing 1st innings win.

3. U.N.S.W. v MELBOURNE.

In retrospect, this was a most unfortunate match for I am sure that the fate of the match depended solely on the fate of the toss. At the start of the match, weather conditions were appalling; cold winds and rain, and a pitch absolutely saturated by overnight rain. Melbourne won the toss and elected not to bat.

The New South Wales first innings can be summarised very briefly: a debacle. The innings began as would be expected under the conditions - a few quick wickets for few slowly scored runs. But then ... Medium pace bowler Luk found his length, and with the combination of the ball kicking and the fields correspondingly packed close to the bat, the New South Wales batsmen just could not cope with the conditions. In a catastrophic display, New South Wales finished with a mere 48 runs, and Melbourne bowler Luk with the magnificent figures of 8-20, including four wickets in four balls.

This was not to be New South Wales' match. As Melbourne began their innings, the weather began to clear, and Melbourne, sensing victory, started correctly in a cautious and careful manner. In this session, the New South Wales bowling was not accurate and well controlled, and so failed to make any substantial breakthroughs. By the after lunch session the pitch was drying rapidly and Melbourne lost no time in taking full advantage of this. By using hard hitting tactics, they scored quickly against bowling which was virtually trying too hard to be effective. Melbourne then closed at 2 for 171.

New South Wales batted again but under these very different conditions, the debacle was not repeated and the innings defeat averted.

4. U.NS.W. v TASMANIA.

Most unfortunately, this match was abondoned because of the inclement weather. "Most unfortunately", I say, because both teams were looking forward to this match, as they have the same approach to the game. I should just like to add a personal note that I think it a great pity that this Club has not yet played against Tasmania.

We were very fortunate in winning the toss and batting on a perfect wicket. Despite an early setback (1-21) the last N.S.W. wicket fell just before stumps with a huge total of 396 runs on the board. Easily the most outstanding feature of the day was John Pigott's 101 in 108 mins., a magnificent innings. Don Clark (92), and Tim Creer (82) also put up excellent performances, the former being unfortunately run out when his Century seemed certain.

There was heavy overnight rain and play did not begin till 1.35 p.m. on the second day. The rain had made the pitch quite treacherous and the local team were soon in trouble. As a selection trial, the match marked Rogers as a certainty for Tasmania, although later he had to withdraw from that side, but revealed a lack of penetrative bowlers from both Clubs. However, as neither side was at full strength, the match was not a complete guide to the selectors.
