It was a period of considerable reorganisation, the most important innovation being the appointment of a Club coach and a consequent effort to structure practise sessions better than in the past. Much was achieved, thanks to the energy of John Pym and those Club members who assisted in the organisation of practise sessions. There is, however, considerable room for improvement and I hope that in the forthcoming season we will build on the changes of the past year.

We were a little more successful than in the previous season, but have a long way to go before we restore ourselves to the top of the grade competition. More importantly, though, our approach to the game, both on and off the field, was of its usual high standard. For this we are indebted to the captains of each team, to the teams' secretary and to the Club secretary, all of whom accepted their responsibilities in an exemplary fashion. In particular, we are indebted to Leon Darmody, for his tireless work, much of which was behind the scenes.

Social cricket, country tours and the social life generally of the Club continued to be of a high standard. Much of the credit for after-match organisation should go to Elvin Robb who organised, persuaded, and at times builted Club members to work behind the bar and to organise social events. We are also indebted to the groundstaff at the Village Green and the David Phillips ovals for their consistent efforts to ensure that we have first-class pitches. The overall quality of our grounds and our facilities are still the envy of most Clubs in Sydney.

l look forward, with confidence, to a successful 1985/86 season.

#### FIRST GRADE CRICKET REPORT

During the pre-season practises, the general feeling was that the 1984-85 season would be far better than the previous season when we finished in the middle of the competition ladder. The legendary John Pym had been enlisted as Club Coach for the year. This he did with the enthusiasm that only he could muster. Chris Chapman made a welcome return to the Club, Jamie Baker had just returned from a season in England and Paddy Grattan-Smith had indicated that he would be playing the full season.

The season started extremely well with a clear victory over North Sydney with Jim Robson scoring a magnificent century. The other pleasing feature about the batting in this game was that all of the first six batsmen scored over 20. Although Jamle Baker was the only other batsman to score over 50, I though that it was a good way to start the season declaring at 6 for 307. Peter Bishell showed that he was an extremely good bowler taking 5 for 64 off 26 overs and insuring a victory.

In the second round we played Sutherland and at the conclusion of that game we were equal competition leaders with two wins. It could not be said that the batting was, apart from a magnificent 90 by Chris Chapman, above mediocrity. Apart from Jamie Baker with 43, no other batsman scored over 20. Too many batsmen threw away their wickets. Although this did not cost us 6 points in that game, careless batting cost us dearly throughout the rest of the season. Glen Clark, after using dublous means to gain selection in his first 1st grade game, justified the agony he caused one of the selectors. After batting well and being unlucky to be dismissed he picked up a wicket in his first over of the second day and set the scene for the remainder of the game. We could be considered a little lucky in that we recovered after a couple of catches were dropped.

Dropped catches accounted for a number of losses last season. Unfortunately, we did not learn from our mistakes. One catch against Mosman cost us 165 runs and any chance of a victory.

True enough, on occasions, far too many loose balls were bowled, but if vital catches are put down at crucial stages, the game can be lost there and then. Not many batsmen score a century without giving at least one chance. If those chances aren't taken and, far too often throughout the season they weren't, it is unfair to place blame on the bowlers for the total which the batsmen have to chase at the end of the dav.

In the bowling department, Paddy Grattan-Smith deserves special mention with 45 wickets at an average of 24.02. He showed that he could bowl long spells economically as well as always looking like taking wickets. On many plumb batting tracks Paddy bowled extremely tightly as is evidenced by an average over the season of only 2.5 runs per over. His bowling against Bankstown was possibly his best effort of the season although this was not reflected in his figures of 1-93. When it is disclosed that he bowled 28 overs on a dead plumb wicket on which 360 runs were scored and only 6 wickets lost, the importance of his bowling becomes clear.

In the batting department, Jim Robson scored runs consistently throughout the season. 727 runs at 48.5 speaks for itself. Time after time he had to come in after the loss of a few quick wickets. With better support from other batsmen Jim would surely have scored even more runs.

Bruce Handley, white losing some of his fielding skills had a fine season averaging 24. He too suffered as a result of failures of earlier batsmen. No. 6 is a difficult position to bat, especially with the increasing numbers of one day games. Batsmen at No. 6 or 7 often only have 10-15 overs to bat and are expected to throw the bat. His 88 against Wests, if other batsmen had given better support, could have led to a victory.

Dick Pym continues to bowl well but is definitely getting older and possibly wiser, but definitely more mellow. Having had a "bean ball" bowled at him, Dick was unable to fight his own battles and stooped to engaging the assistance of the umpirel. He was dismissed the next ball and then acted in his more usual manner. To be fair, he did score 40 showing and afterward telling the batsmen how it is done.

Bruce Everett stood behind the stumps for the first four games before dropping down the grades to concentrate on his batting. Peter Dodd was selected to add unnecessary age and weight to the side. He was, however, a match for "Jungle" at St. George Trivial Pursuits. Peter's first catch is one he will remember - Ian Davis - Iow in front of first silp. Jamie Baker won't forget it either - he dropped him off the previous ball. Dick Pym would not forgive me if I didn't mention he was the bowler on both occasions.

Stuart Keers should be looking forward to the next season after coming to grips with batting in first grade. In five innings last year he averaged less than 20 and threw his innings away almost all the time. This year it was 9 innings, 278 runs at 38.88 with a memorable 97 run out.

Greg Livingstone and Jim Dixon Performed well on occasions this season but, when compared to previous seasons, they could perhaps have done better.

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Chris Chapman had a fine season scoring 469 runs at 36.1. He continues to pulverise attacks. I have already mentioned his innings against Sutherland. Sydney Cricket Club also felt the full brunt of his front foot shots, with Chris scoring 93 in 195 minutes on the Village Green. If Chris and Jungle can carry on next year and get some support from the higher order batsmen, we should be able to be semi-finalists next year.

Before finishing, I would like to thank all those who assisted "behind the scenes" throughout the season. Mrs. Handley, with the retirement of Bruce will be sorely missed. Tom Boyce and semi-retired David Lemon are always around when needed, especially at 3.40. Not being brave, I refuse to add the names of those others who assisted because the printer is sure to leave one name out of the manuscript and my memory and bad manner will be blamed. I hope a sincere and collective thank you to those concerned will be appreciated by those to whom the comment is directed.

#### SECOND GRADE REPORT 1984/85

Overall Second Grade had an average season. Our batting and bowling were reasonable, however, our catching was atrocious. I'm certain that if we caught as many catches as we missed, our end results would have been reasonable. Three batsmen scored 400 plus runs, Mike Kilborn established himself as an excellent second grade player and in two innings especially showed that he will soon be a handy first grade player. Stuart Keers in seven matches scored constantly and was rewarded with first grade status.

Glen Clark was easily the most improved player scoring 469 runs and taking 38 wickets. This shows how important extra cricket is to improve ones performance, as Glen played the off season in England. Jim Large tried hard but I feel that If he wants to get better results on Saturday then he should make time to spend 2 hours at training each week. It's pointless to give up six hours of time on Saturday unless you maximize your chances of success by attending practice.

Both Steve Campbell and Peter Jourdain were probably disappointed that they did not score more runs, both always tried and will be rewarded with better success next year. Mark Hamwood had reasonable success for the year but will be first to admit that with more consistency he would have had better results. Like Steve and Peter I think work commitments jaded his performances.

Frank Maly had an excellent first half to the season but could not seem to get wickets in the second half. In his bowling he may have tried too hard and may have been more successful. If he relaxed and waited for wickets to come. He has immense potential with the bat and concentration on playing with more patience will make his batting a lot more effective. He never stopped trying and was a pleasure to captain.

Greg Robinson bowled with line and length and showed how important this is, as he bowled long spells for few runs and caused batsmen to get out. Mick Ryan in the last two games showed that he can be a second grade bowler, he bowled with control, and concentration and did not give away easy runs. I hope he can continue to do this next year and become a permanent second grade player.

I'd like to thank all players who played in second grade for their efforts. Special thanks to Gordon and Denise for their help. The ground staff must also be complimented on the excellent improvement in the main wicket area and I hope this standard will be maintained. Our practice wickets were mostly reasonable but were unavailable at times for no apparent reason.

A good score on the village green; Stuart Keers 104 and Jim Large 73 batted excellently. Mark Hamwood took 3-41 off 21 overs. Poor fielding and two easy dropped catches saw an easy win escape us.

#### ROUND 5: UNSW 173 Drew with Balmain 8-173

Excellent tight bowling abetted by poor fielding saw Balmain reach 8 for 173, Peter Bishell 5-53 off 23 overs and Glen Clark 3-66 off 23 overs bowled excellently. We recovered from 4-27 to make just 173 (Mike Kilborn 47, Jock Martel 29, Steve Campbell 26 and Glen Clark 24 n.o.). On the last ball John Sackett was dublously run out. So after 5 games we were on 5 points.

#### FOURTH GRADE REPORT 1984/85

The performance of 4th Grade In the 1984/85 season was generally on a par with that of 4th Grade sides in recent years. The side lost about half of its games, averaged slightly less runs per wicket than the opposition and finished around the middle of the table.

The season past, in fact, turned out almost as a carbon copy of the 1983/84 season. Early season success (and hope) in October and November, a mid season slump in December and January with a stronger finish in February and March. This emerging pattern points to a few issues which, if correctly addressed, will strengthen the club and lead to better performances in the future.

The best results are obtained in the early matches when the club is at full strength. Good young players in their first couple of years of University have Joined the club and play an important part in early victories. The rot sets in when these players, together with a few more experienced club members, drift away from the club as the holiday season and exams start. Team line-ups become transient and losses frequent. A greater effort must be made in future to retain talented players, such as Steve Crayn, Leigh Gray and Brad Reed, for the full season.

The sides put on the field during the lean period mid-summer were not generally inferior to those fielded by the opposition, though. The application, however, of our players was often less than that required to secure victory. Two or three players did the job needed but the remainder of the side showed little fight. All players must realise that a side which can exert pressure and withstand pressure will win almost all its games in 4th Grade. Coupled to the ability of a side to exert pressure is its fielding. The standard of fielding in 4th Grade was less than that required. The only answer to this is practice.

Despite its shortcomings, the 4th Grade side was one of the more successful teams in the Club for the season 1984/85. Nine batsmen scored half centuries with four of these batsmen achieving this feat on two occasions. Five bowlers took five or more wickets in an innings.

Batsmen Jim Wilcher, Peter Scolari and Elvin Robb performed consistently throughout the season without receiving the support they deserved. Pat Crammond, Steve Crayn, David Thew, David Jenkins and Don Dixon all scored runs in their limited appearances. In the spin bowling department we were served by two off-spinners who were often too good for the opposition; David Quinlin and Steve O'Brien rarely got the figures they deserved. Our medium pace bowlers often did enough but were let down by poor fielding on too many occasions or saw our batsmen chase a total badly. Peter Watkins, Steve Debello, Elvin Robb and David Thew all recorded good figures. Mention must also be made of the two wicketkeepers who were on duty for the majority of the season. Michael Back and Steve Carter put in above average performances and showed a lot of potential.

Looking to the future the club should be well served in higher grades by the players mentioned above as they gain experience and as long as they maintain their enthusiasm. Other players such as Martin Speiser, Phil Williams, Murail Varatharajan and Andrew Szabo should develop into players who will serve the club well in seasons to come.

# FIFTH GRADE B REPORT 1984-85

Once again, statistically wise, the most significant feature of the season past was the passing parade of playrs through the 5B side. Fortunately for most players, this was usually to higher grades, but unfortunately, for the team as a whole performance and consistency were the main sufferers. In all, 43 players represented, with over half these playing higher grades later on in the season, due in many instances to players making themselves unavailable.

If the club in particular is to remain a force in grade competition far greater emphasis must be placed on selecting sides early in the season to contain players who are available for at least 90% of the games throughout the season. Players who are available for less than half the season are of little benefit to the club, regardless of their individual standards, as team spirit and harmony can only be nurtured by having a large nucleus of regular players within the team throughout the season. Lower grades in particular suffer severely when players are lost through promotion, not through ability, but just to fill vacancies.

The records show the 5B's were successful in only three matches out of 17; two of these being won convincingly and the third by the narrowest of margins. A number of narrow losses, however, were recorded against teams that finished up in the upper half of the competition and, but for a vital catch here and there, we should have finished with an additional 3-4 scalps under our belt.

Unfortunately in batting we lacked the discipline necessary to register consistantly high scores - both individually and team wise. Players all too often risked their wickets in playing rash shots too early and often paid the price. Rarely did we have the good fortune to witness the opposing batsman do the same.

Only on two occasions did we score more than 200, and only on one of these was the score the result of significant contributions by more than half the batsmen. Only two players scored more than 200 runs during the season; however a number of memorable innings were played, notably from Vel Popovich, Mick Back, Dave Thew and Murail Nagarajan. Vel, in fact, outperformed all of the regular batsmen and each deserves the batting trophy with the highest average over the season.

In bowling, we lacked experience, with not nearly enough concentration on line and length, the two main ingredients of an attach required to knock over most fifth grade sides. The two occasions our bowling was on target the opposition crumpled. Girl Varatharajan being the destroyer each time. Girl certainly has the ability to do well in higher grades and only lack of experience and self confidence are holding him back at present. His overall statistics of 27 wickets at 17.3 earned him this bowling trophy. However Peter O'Donnell's 15 at 17.4 was not far behind. Peter served the side well also in batting and no doubt with more experience will be featuring in higher grades in seasons to come. David Bell, a late comer during the season performed well with the ball, and also enterprisingly with the bat. He also will be on the selector's short list next season.

#### Five B Report Cont.

Before briefly recounting on match results and performances, I would like to record my appreciation and thank all those who participated throughout the season, with special thanks to Mike Gregg, V.C., who ably substituted, in my absence, against Western Suburbs and Randwick, and to Greg Holt, who again did a very commendable Job in rounding up a team each Saturday, often against considerable odds.

ROUND 1: Greg Clark's meritorious 6/85 off 19 overs into the wind (a gale) kept Parramatta to a respectable 229. Our reply of 113 soon revealed the side's batting deficiencies. However, Val Popovich and Mural! Varatharajan helped to restore some respect in the second innings.

ROUND 2: Jim Farley (55) and Vel Popovich (32) laid the foundation to a modest 152, which unfortunately, was just shaded by Balmain B's 8/143 - 1 man short. Tony Davey (3/45) and Girl (2/35) were the best of the bowlers.

ROUND 3: On the D.P. South billiard top, Bankstown were well held to 8/316 mainly due to Craig McIntosh (4/77) and Bruce McDiarmid (2/66). Unfortunately the weather on the second day prevented us from responding in similar fashion.

ROUND 4: A modest 155 with Williams (44) and Taylor (35) was almost enough to score against Balmain A. However assisted by the groundsman, the opposition prevailed on a count back when wet weather intervened, despite tight bowling from Ralph Merrell (3/32 off 12) and Murall Varatharajan (2/31 off 16).

ROUND 5: Another modest 166 was insufficient to trouble Mosman 6/169.

ROUND 6: The winning of the toss for the first time was an omen of things to come when Girl rampaged through Waverley B (51) taking 7/26 off 17, setting us up for an easy win despite the late appearance of former State Chinaman bowler David Hourn.

ROUND 7: A record 6th wicket partnership of 150 by Vel Popovich (67) and Mick Back (77) should have seen us through against Sydney Uni. A. The fact that it didn't, was due solely to poor fielding. Jim's marathon 4/140 off 33 deserved better.

ROUND 8: A paitry 82 was soon knocked off by Penrith before tea without losing a wicket.

ROUND 9: After containing Sydney Uni. B to 161 due mainly to a fine spell by Peter O'Donnell (4/56) of 19, we were cruising at 2/121 with Dave Thew (80) well in command. The fact that we just scraped in by one wicket off the final ball of the day, with the third last ball passing between the stumps and not taking the balls was due in no small measure to a last wicket partnership of 20 by Peter Fitzsimons and Girl.

ROUND 10: An indifferent 153 was insufficient against Fairfield A (4/202).

ROUND 11: The batting was again found wanting with only 96 on Majors Bay synthetic insufficient to cause Wests (6/101) any concern.

#### TOUR MANAGER: Jamle Baker

This season saw the return of the Country Tour. The squad composed a fine blend of experience, characters and learners. Snake threatened to come along, but wasn't sighted.

DAY 1 (Saturday) - SINGLETON

It's 8am and an intrepid group of travellers begin to gather outside the Uni in Anzac Parade. We are greeted by the vision of a brown BMW, complete with massive windsurfer, and a form no one can mistake - Kyogle. The lure of a Country Tour has drawn him from the City of Churches (not that he's ever been in one).

DAY 2 (Sunday) - WALLABADAH, TAMWORTH

Breakfast at the Agricultural sees us dodging awkward questions from the publican's wife over her daughter's activities of the night before and her possible present state. Chemical calls "Yes, No, Yes, No, Wait" when questioned about his night. Jungle, displaying his vast experience, is dragged from his bed moaning "!'!! never tour again" just prior to our departure.

Big Orca is spotted head and shoulders above the The big winner of the day was Jimmy Wilcher who backs a 16-1 shot home in the last. He is overjoyed by his success and proceeds to tell everyone in sight. As we walk out the gate leaving the track he approaches another car to tell its inhabitants of his good fortune. Before he hardly gets started the driver tells him "I know, 16-1 in the last and you shot 38 in Tamworth this morning". Jim is still dumbfounded.

That | night sees Jungle, Chemical and Pales depart, Jungle secretly harbouring thoughts that the tour would slow from here. Needless to say another useless Jungle theory. The Wallabadah pub We are befriended, or at least certain that night is a big one. toursts are, by the lady at the B.B.Q. backgammon players, sundry women and a mother/daughter combination (the elder of which showed a strange fascination for jamming a pencil up tourists' "chutney lockers"). Marty labels Pete O'Donnell "Floater" in keeping with his social style. Jamie opens the four account at Kyogle's expense. The publican, who was a bookie earlier in the day, informs us that we get an apperance in the local T.V. news coverage of the races and he has got it on video. Stars at last. Marty experiences Floater's driving skills first hand on another crazy drive to the shearer's quarters. He emerges from the HR a pale, blabbering idlot. Later on he is the first tourist to go looking for Herb. "It just keeps on happening".

DAY 5 (Wednesday) - GLOUCESTER | Another refreshing start to the day with hot showers on a brisk, country morning surrounded by the sounds of nature - birds singing, sheep blaring, cricketer's roycing. We head for Gloucester over the Great Dividing Range. Breakfast at Nundle sees the General Store ravaged by a hoard of hungry tourists.
