### PRESIDENT'S REPORT

Each year it seemingly becomes just that little bit harder to sum up the previous season's endeavours. The mixed playing results of last season and the increasing administrative burdens and pressures of all the associated activities, both on and off the field, certainly reinforce that perception.

In the area that is the overriding purpose of the Club, the playing arena, the University had some highly notable team and individual performances:

- > 7th Grade Premiers
- > 4th Grade Finalists
- > 1st Grade Finalists (limited over competition)
- Jason Young's initial State Shield selection and his 663 runs at a 1st Grade Batting average record of 60.27.
- Matthew Phelps' initial 2nd XI State selection and his 1st Grade Club Aggregate record of 874.
- Michael Slater's continuing International success, including the proud achievement of being part of the team that reclaimed the Frank Worrell Trophy.

The 1st Grade side again showed potential and the performance was encouraging considering that Greg Livingstone and Jim Robson had dropped down to 3rd and 4th Grade, respectively.

Looking forward, there continues to be many encouraging developments:

- > 1st Grade has several very promising younger players.
- The selection of Jason Young and Matthew Phelps in the State Shield squad for the forthcoming 1995/96 season.
- The appointment of Geoff Lawson, the Club's coach, as the New South Wales Shield coach the NSWCA Selection Committee obviously concluding that if you can coach the 'Wales' lads (and survive) you are well positioned and conditioned to take on the demands and expectations of the Shield job!

Well done Jason, Matthew and 'Henry' - we're proud of your achievements to date and wish you continuing success.

The administrative aspects of the season were demanding - in some senses too demanding for the comparatively meagre administrative resources the Club has traditionally had at its disposal. This is of particular concern to the Club's Committee, the extent of that concern implicit in the calling of a "Think Tank" of all Club members in early May. The extensive, useful discussions covered:

- Re-examining the Club's objectives.
- Assessing the adequacy of our Coaching and Practice.
- > Serious comment upon Selection policy and the Club's expectations of its Captains.
- Developing a Management Plan to address the Sydney Cricket Association's ("SCA") 'Criteria for Assessment' the checklist by which Clubs' on-going participation in the SCA's competition will be assessed.

The heavy off-field load, which also included extensive discussions with the University over the re-evaluation of the Sam Cracknell facilities, was shared by the Committee generally but I want to thank John Carmichael, Mike Gregg, Matthew Phelps, Greg Livingstone and Michael Kovacs in particular. Curly's initiative and flair in Sam Cracknell activities was of enormous psychological importance - and he was a particularly worthy winner of the "Clubman of the Year" Award.

### UNSW CRICKET CLUB 1ST GRADE REPORT 1994/95

Congratulations firstly to Greggy and his 4th Grade side on a sensational season which deserved more than the, nevertheless, outstanding achievement of making the final. Witnessing their efforts against Sydney Uni, their dominance of this opposition for the **entire** game and their impressive display of cricket skills "the crowd had come to see", but without being provided a fair opportunity to win the game, drew attention to another of the many flawed rules that our competitions are run under (the less said about other "flawed rules", particularly by this author, the better). 4th Grade, and particularly Greggy, should be extremely proud of their performances throughout the year as they have done themselves and the club a great service at the end of some otherwise barren years.

On the same note, the 1st Grade side of 94/95 go into the club's history books by being the first side to make the final of the recently introduced one-day competition. Being in the semi-finals last year and then going down in a hard fought contest this year (against the most credentialled one-day side in the competition) evidences our ability and skill, as well as our suitability to this form of the game. Our fielding (until the final where, for some reason, it departed us-in all departments) was the undoubted strength along with a bloke called Mathew Phelps (more about his season later). Kurly was the key and with significant contributions from Pratty, Jack and Legend we were a most formidable contingent. Phelpsy carried the batting single handedly as the stats indicate. All of the bowlers contributed wonderfully (again as the stats indicate) with special mention to Wazza and Mullos for their invaluable contributions on debut. 95/96 should simply present the players with the incentive of crossing that fine line between disappointment and the spoils of ultimate success.

The main competition was one of ups, but mainly downs. The players themselves know only too well what downs were experienced and accordingly this report will not dwell on these aspects. For the record, though, those downs can be summarised by our position on the ladder and the difficult, frustrating, and often depressing match analyses undertaken in the dressing room after our many disappointing showings.

Some of our "ups" were monumental:

Michael (Kurly) Kovacs - For a couple of reasons I would have to describe Kurly's 94/95 performances as the pinnacle of individual effort. smashed the club's 1st Grade record for dismissals by a wicketkeeper in a 36 catches and 2 stumpings (and 7/2 in the one-dayers) was magnificent and all the more so in the fact that, bar one missed opportunity in the one-day final, this represented (to the best of the authors, and consulted colleagues, recollection) every chance that went his way. Perhaps of equal significance and import as this record breaking achievement was Kurly's selfless contributions to the smooth running of the side, and the club generally. Off his own bat Kurly became caterer and allround organiser of all that goes on at "the Crack". Even with his hands full in performing these functions, Kurly's on-field performances remained of the highest standard and, typically, he would be the first player to recognise something needed to be done and do it, or the first to jump up and carry out any of the skipper's requests. Kurly's value to our side as the keeper is obvious, his other less tangible contributions could easily go unnoticed. As the skipper I almost expect his outstanding on-field efforts, however, even though Kurly received the much coveted Clubman of the Year award, I feel further compelled to publicly acknowledge his efforts in this first grade report because of the benefits that have flowed to the team.

Jason Young - Our newest first-class representative had another outstanding year in 1st Grade scoring 663 runs at 60.27. Youngy was a very motivated and committed individual this year and he was justly rewarded with his first State cap. All of the young and aspiring club players should take note of the focus and commitment that is required, even of someone with Youngy's talent, to make it to the top. The comments relayed to our club as to how impressive Youngy's contributions had been to the State Squad are a great credit to him and provide a wonderful reflection on our club - well done Youngy.

Matt Phelps - 1994/95 will hopefully be looked back on as the coming of age of our next first-class player. Anyone who witnessed Phelpsy's batting this year can only envisage that, provided his head stays clear and a modicum of luck goes his way, he'll be donning the whites alongside Youngy very early on in the next Shield season. There was no better or more dominant batter in the competition (perhaps excluding the Test players) and his ability cannot be ignored by the State selectors. Phelpsy broke Jungle's 1st Grade aggregate record by scoring 874 runs (at 54.63) which is an awesome feat, particularly considering he was on the receiving end of several very ordinary umpiring decisions. If we can manage to get Slates, Youngy and Phelpsy on the park together we could boast the strongest top three to have played in Sydney Grade since Bradman (and any other two batsmen who showed up with him). On top of his efforts in the main competition Phelpsy scored 349 runs in 5

one-day games at an average of 87.25 and proved to be our safest and surest pair of hands in the slips. Again, Phelpsy's attitude and commitment to his cricket should be a great example to those who have aspirations to playing the highest standard of 1st Grade cricket, or beyond.

Those three were our stand-outs in an otherwise disappointing season in the main competition. Others who deserve special mention are Morgs (who took out the bowling award - 28 wickets at 22.32 - passed the 100 1st Grade wickets milestone, and was continually the man applying pressure and bowling where we needed him to in tough situations), Traff (who substantially returned to form - though still a way off, particularly with his fielding - taking 37 wickets at 22.57 and also passing that 1st Grade 100 wicket milestone), and, to a lesser extent Legend (232 runs at 29.00 - whose efforts I believe were much maligned; he was the only batsman apart from Phelpsy and Youngy who looked capable of a big score and has the time and skills (question temperament) to be a top class opening batsman).

We must look forward and be certain in our own minds as to what is required to be successful and to turn our performances around. We have an outstanding one-day side that needs to be more ruthless and a little more fine-tuned in the fielding department. That should be providing the basis for more success in our two-day games but unfortunately it isn't. Players, and particularly the younger guys with stacks of ability, aren't giving themselves there best chance. By this I mean they are not ensuring that all of the controllable aspects that affect physical performance are not fined tuned so that practise, and that uncontrollable concept of form, can govern their performance. There should be no reason fitness levels aren't at a much higher level (and hopefully Phelpsy's sessions are addressing this), batsmen should be focussing on skills that will improve their footwork etc. bowlers should be doing agility exercise and sprint work, and all players should be getting used to having a ball in their hands (for want of a better expression), and this should all be happening now, well before official training sessions begin so that the more specific cricket skills can be honed in net and centre wicket sessions.

1995/96 is going to be a successful year for the 1st Grade side and, hopefully, 2nd and lower grade sides that continue to put pressure on the higher grades through top performances. That is not going to just happen because it is written in the annual report, each and every aspiring player in the club must take on this responsibility. With Livo to take on the long-awaited coaching role things must already seem bright. There should be no excuses and none will be acceptable for a club with our proud, though relatively short, tradition of outstanding performance and, accordingly, acheivement.

Two final points. Congratulations to Henry on his appointment as State Coach. There could not be a better person for the job which is all that really needs to be said. And congratulations to Slates on his part in bringing home the Sir Frank Worrell trophy and his continuing success with the bat at this highest of levels. Slates has been, and continues to be, a cricketer who commands admiration and respect. He is a fine figure-head for the game and someone we as a club and as individuals can be very proud of.

### Second Grade 1994 - 95

Following a relatively successful 93/94 where a number of younger players were "blooded" there was a belief that the team would again be a semi finals contender. Unfortunately this was not the case, and while many reasons were offered as to why, it was simply a matter of not playing consistently well as a team.

To often the bulk of our run scoring was left to one or two players while our fielding and in particular our catching at crucial stages would undo a lot of the good work which had been put in. Such lapses made it very difficult for us to regularly keep the upper hand in contests which were in the main quite even.

Despite the disappointment of not achieving what we had set out to do ie make the finals, some of the younger players showed themselves(after a settling in period) to be very capable and ones who could well make a greater contribution to the Club in the years ahead. I speak specifically of Ben Nott, Warren Saunders, Dave Carson and towards the end of the year Darren Stephens. These four all made contributions which showed they have ability to move successfully up to first grade and with the necessary commitment on their behalf that should be something they achieve next season.

A quick review of the stats shows the story of our year. Two centuries along with fourteen half centuries were scored between nine players. In the bowling department six took more than ten wickets but nobody reached twenty. Clearly we lacked consistency and it was this factor more than anything else which prevented us from winning more games.

On an individual scale some excellent performances were recorded. Matt Hayward began superbly scoring 260 runs including a magnificent 149 v Bankstown, in the first three games and deserved his promotion to firsts. Mike Kilborn in his return to the Club after many years also earnt a first grade spot by scoring 215 with a high score of 108 v Wests. Andrew Johnson in an otherwise disappointing season for him put together a most elegant 82 to ensure victory against Mosman, while Andrew Shaw revealed his great skills against Penrith making 74 under very difficult circumstances.

On the bowling side Dave Gainsford destroyed Wests with a great 5/54 the enigmatic Mark Mullen returned a fine 6/19 against Mosman and Geoff Lawson in one of his few appearances in lower grades for the Club took 5/23 against North Sydney.

Such performances while revealing the ability in the side, were however to few and far between.

I mentioned earlier four of the younger players who by seasons end had really developed into firinge first graders. Ben Nott came into the side late last year and proved an invaluable member of the team. Scoring 318 runs at 26.50 including 2 half centuries as well as taking 30 catches and one stumping, Ben matured as the year progressed and was rewarded with a first grade appearance in the one day competition. Warren Saunders was another who had a couple of games last year and who by the end of this year was probably the best all round player in the team. Scoring 226 at 22.60 and taking 17 wickets at 28.47 "Wazza" was always involved. Darren Stephens was new this year and after throwing off his injury problems was promoted to the team for the last five games. He took his chance grabbing 13 wickets at 11 to set himself up for next season. Dave Carson appeared only twice in seconds before being given a well deserved chance in firsts.

These four are to congratulated not only for their success on the field ,but also for their willingness to work at making themselves better players. It is hoped that they will maintain their enthusiasm and be an integral part of the Clubs future success.

The year was more than anything, quite frustrating because we failed to play up to the level which we are capable of. Twenty three players were given an opportunity in second grade this season. It is hoped that the experience gained by those players will be used effectively next season irrespective of which team they happen to be playing in.

Looking forward to a bright and successful 1995/96

### THIRD GRADE CAPTAINS REPORT 1994 -1995 SEASON

The arrival of the 1994 - 1995 season was greeted with great expectations. However, as the season progressed those expectations were to be dampened as is witnessed by the sides win/loss record of 4 wins and 7 losses for the season. Whilst this record may initially appear to be somewhat disappointing, nevertheless, the fact remains that had a number of the early season close results been reversed I am sure that the confidence of the team would have grown accordingly and ultimately lead to a successful season. A quick review of the results would note that in the first 7 rounds before Christmas of the 4 losses that the side suffered 3 of those results occurred due to the teams inability to chase totals of no greater than 231 runs and in fact in our first 9 games we also failed to win a further 2 games by only 1 wicket.

There can be no doubt that the season's lack of success can be largely attributed to the sides inability to chase totals, which is no better demonstrated than our game against Mosman where we failed to chase a total of 105. During the season only 2 sides managed to score in excess of 250 runs against us, which is an extremely commendable effort considering that half of the games were played at David Phillips and one of those sides was the eventual premiers. It was extremely disappointing that only 1 batsman managed to score in excess of 300 runs during the season being Greg Livingstone whose 577 runs for the season, was a major contributing factor to the early season scores that the side did manage to post.

Whilst the overall results of the season were disappointing there are a number of positive aspects that can be taken away from the season. A number of the players who commenced the season in 3rd grade successfully progressed through to 2nd grade where they gave further evidence of their undoubted talents and in this regard I refer mainly of Mark Mullen, Darren Stephens and Tim Buckett. It was also pleasing that during the season Darren Sue, Paul Mongan and David Jebb had the opportunity to play 2nd grade cricket. The progression of players to higher grades is one of the main purposes of 3rd grade cricket and from this view the season can be looked upon with some satisfaction.

It was also of considerable pleasure to witness the development of the team towards the end of the season with the injection of a number of new players and I believe that a number of these younger players have the potential to form the nucleus of a strong 3rd grade side and indeed their talents should see them progress through to higher grades of cricket. I refer particularly to Rob McLaughlan, Paul Mongan, Hamish Knott and Peter Carson. Thus whilst the season as a total may be regarded as having been somewhat disappointing, I believe that the foundations have been layed for a successful campaign in the future seasons.

It would be remiss of me not to give recognition to the performances of the older stages who played in 3rd grade during the season and who at various stages were able to demonstrate to the younger players the skill levels and attributes required to succeed at both 3rd grade and higher levels and apart from Greg Livingstone who I have already mentioned, I would also note the performances of Glen "Orcka" Clark, Geoff Lawson and Michael Back.

Season 1994 - 1995 was certainly a most interesting one from a captain's perspective with in excess of 30 players having played 3rd grade during the season, I would like to thank each of those players for the effort they put in during the season and in particular I would like to give thanks to Livo, Orcka and Henry for the contributions they made to the development of the younger cricketers in the side.

#### 5th GRADE

For the second year running the season was a mixture. Some good team cricket was played, some good individual performances were registered, a great deal of fun was had, but, finally, the outcome - running a close fifth and just missing the semi-finals - was disappointing.

The season opened with expectations high after the good finish to the 93-94 season but the early results were poor and cost the team dearly in the end. A Shane Chapman 86 and 5 wickets to "Young Chap" Maddock were the highlights of a 70 run loss to Sydney Uni. "H.G" Nelson's 6 wicket haul was the only bright spot in the loss to Bankstown. Some determined batting by Delamotte, Searle and Robbo saw a winning position reached against Balmain but rain ensured there was no play on week 2.

Robbo dropped out to destroy the futures of H.S.C. candidates and Robert "Thomas" Stark assumed the mantle of power. After a poor 157 was totalled Wests assumed they were to be winners. However, "Thomas" exhorted, snorted and inspired. Dan Culhane got 4 wickets, the skipper 3 and West lost by 35! Round 5 and Penrith scored 267. Our batting finally fired with Yerbury smashing 67 and Sanders 62 while Gerber scored a solid 41. Chritie was n.o. 35 with Robson on 24 when the game was won 5 down. Mosman scored freely to total 7-249 in the first 60 over game but were easily beaten after openers Gerber (100) and Searle (92) added 173 for the opening stand. Wales were 4-258 From 56.4 overs.

Robbo's return to the captaincy coincided with a dismal showing against Saints. The batting was ordinary to total only 214 on our home "road". St George had no touble passing the total.

Fairfield were near the top of the competition but on a damp wicket their young jocks were never at home against the wiles of the skipper and his "experienced" apprentice ("Thomas" Stark) - 4 and 3 wickets respectively dismissed Fairfield for 119. Thanks to an aggressive cameo from Channa de Silva (53) we were able to declare 4-120. On a very flat second week wicket Fairfield scored 6-198 before giving Wales a second hit. 39 overs were available and all the batsmen contributed well and at the required run rate (Rudd 46, McLachlan 37, De Silva 30 and "Kit" Carson 29). This left Robbo and "Thomas" to hit the winning runs. The outright pushed the team back into semi-final contention.

The weather intervened in the Campbelltown game and we divided the overs and lost. Gerber's 64 and McLachlan's 55 were notable contributions. Alex Lamb showed he will be a valuable aquisition taking 5-36, including 4 caught and bowled. Petersham scored 164 after some abyssmal fielding. Andy Muller chipping in with 5-33. Week 2 - rain. Finally we got on and crawled to 9-158. After nearly 7 more overs Robbo and Andy saw Wales home. Parramatta was the next 60 Over game. Their 188 was not enough (Shephard 4-75, "Thomas" 3-25). Wales replied with 3-189 (Gerber 78, "Haircut" Leahy 88). Waverley used 59 overs to score 199 and Wales replied with with 9-192 after 49 overs (Yerbury 67 [again!], Rudd 40). Again another tense 5 over crawl saw Robbo and "Thomas" guide Wales home (9-200 in 54).

Sutherland were dismissed for 204 despite the Wales catching which gave their top scorer a second start when he was 0. (Robbo 5-44 including a great stumping by Ruddy). Searly just had time to get his third 0 in a row before the end of play and week 2 was a washout. Poor catching costing us a probable win on week 1!! Hawkesbury were on top of the comp. but, again despite the catching, only totalled 230 on our home "road" ("Daintree" Robson 4-66, Robbo 3-26 off 17.3). Week 2 rain!!

The last round was against Nth Sydney and an outright was required. Wales batted first on a

wet wicket and as Nth Sydney mixed and matched players from various grades, Wales scored 206. Only Sohail Mohideen's 80 and Leahy's 30 saving us. Nth Sydney then folded for 112. Shephard 5-51 and "Thomas" Stark, showing what all good bowlers can do to the tail, finished the innings with a hat trick - caught, L.B.W.! and bowled. Wales declared at 2-73 in the hope of gaining full points. It seemed on as Norths slumped to 8-40 but the "road" had been resurfaced and two batsmen put their head down and no further progress was made. Robbo 5-24, Daintree 3-33.

Over the season several players moved up the grades notably "Kit Carso", and others will surely do so if the application is right. Batsmen such as "Gerbs", if he works on his patter, "Yerbs", if he learns to control himself, "Searley", if gets through the first over, "Jody/Steele" Rudd if he gets more sleep. His keeping improved when he got the job on a regular basis. Chris Delamoote was really running into form as keeper and batsman when a knee reconstruction ended his season. It's to be hoped he will return.

"Daintree" did not get the returns he deserved. His bowling was often hostile and he bowled long spells and always wanted one more over. Unfortunately "H.G." Nelson had his season ruined by injury - if he had partnered "Daintree" it would have been one of the most lethal opening pairs in the comp. Meanwhile, Robbo bowled with more flight than ever(!!), while "Thomas" Stark was always the competitor, whether with bat or ball, and remained a wicket grabber when things looked grim. "Shep" added a sting to the spin bowling and his fielding was a revelation to other Wales 5th graders. Alex Lamb's cameo appearances revealed the promise he has and he will do well when he plays a full season.

It is to be hoped that everyone enjoyed his season and that in the coming season the 5ths will play, from Round 1, like the semi-finalists they deserve to be.

## Sixth Grade Report

With a record such as ours, the bare statistics of wins and losses are certainly not the important figures to be looking at. Then again considering most of the other stats, they're not worth looking at either. But, since you insist on reading on here goes.

The result was only one team score of over 200, which was still not good enough on the day. We were very consistent however, making scores between 150 and 190 in eleven of our 14 innings at an average of 169. The sixth grade reputation for turning up talent was again in full cry as the young leggie/batsman/fielder/genius/other superlatives welcome, Carson turned up to provide some uplifting performances. With a 58 (practise game V's Sydney Uni) and a 38, both not out, in his first three games, some very tight leg spin and the occasional act of brilliance in the field he soon moved up to, what was it, second grade?? A lesson for us all in sixes. Other standout performances with the bat were, as previously mentioned, few and far between. Wayne Robertson decided to belt the opposition all over the field for 96 very entertaining runs one Sunday but still we could not win. Other fifties were scored by Craig Cawell, Andrew "Bezerkski" Czerski, Craig "not available next week" Neal, Jeremy "aren't you too young to bet at the TAB" Ruz, and Greg "G-squared" Gering. To say that our batting was woeful would be an insult to anyone previously labelled woeful.

The bowling department had some better performances to speak of, although generally it was an all round effort on the day rather than one stand-out performer. #### UNIVERSITY OF NSW CRICKET CLUB SEVENTH GRADE Premiers 1994-95

The 1994-95 season was a very successful one for 7th Grade. Our cricket was consistently good, often outstanding, and nearly always enjoyable. As a bonus (and, arguably, as a result) we won a premiership, the third for this grade in four years.

7th Grade has traditionally played in the NSW Catholic Cricket Association competition, based in Moore Park. This year, sensibly, that competition merged with two others to form a combined Moore Park comp. - a Super League, one might say. Over fifty teams were represented, being divided into 6 grades. We played in the third of these.

Out season began as it finished, with strong wins. Four on the trot, in fact, which saw us to the top of the table, with eyes already on a trophy. Whose eyes, however, was another question, as the usual early season game of 'musical chairs' was taking place. When the music stopped, Simon Gerber was sitting in 5th grade, having posted 100+runs in two games and established prima facie psycho status.

A setback occurred in Round 5, when we lost to Coastal in a very, er..., 'intense' game. [Ultimately, this team was the only one we failed to beat: we lost to them again in Round 12, and they were beaten (surprisingly) in the other semi-final. This was something of a shame, as we were looking forward to a showdown - particularly in a match which allowed us more than 50 overs to bat.] Four more wins followed, before a shaky run into the semi-finals, which involved two wins (one by forfeit), two losses, a draw and an unfortunate holiday-time forfeit of our own. All this left us second on the ladder, and confident of success in the semi-finals.

Our confidence ultimately was justified. After being placed precariously at 4-87 in the semi-final, we proceeded to 9-285. Cock-a-hoop, we destroyed Randwick's batting: they were all out for 80. The final was very similar: again we scored 9-285, and again we demolished the opposition batting the following day. Waverley ultimately reached 210, dismissed in the last available over, but at 6-39 the game had been all but ours.

The most pleasing feature of these games, apart from the results, was the thoughtful manner in which the team played. Our sensitivity to the dynamic of the game, in particular, gave us a significant competitive advantage. Pressure was applied at all times, whether running, bowling or batting, and if the initiative departed us, it was won back expeditiously. Furthermore, improvement in team play was made throughout the season.

Although the term is used advisedly, the following were largely responsible:

- Warren CAMPION: Once again, Wazza prepared some tremendous DP pitches for us this year. Unfortunately he did not make use of them as often as he should have. Once he cures himself of the Mark Waugh syndrome ("These bowlers aren't good enough to bowl to me, so I'll get out"), he'll score a lot of runs. Four fine finals slips catches ultimately outweighed a dubious sense of humour and unjustified pressure on the skipper for a bowl.
- Andrew CAVILL: 'Cav' performed splendidly with bat & ball all season, as well as being our quickest in the field. More work on the off-spinners should secure him a regular spot in Grade, but his consistent application - and at times powerful hitting with the bat, as well as his constant enthusiasm, may be enough.

- Nick CONOLLY: 'Hippie' was our strike bowler this year. Although at times expensive, he was never far from the wickets, and certainly never dull. His old-style windmill action was entertainment enough, but a fiery attitude and a 'Master Blaster' added further value. Finished as leading wicket-taker after an explosive, five-wicket spell in the Grand Final.
- Peter CRANMER: Always unassuming, PC found form at the right time, scoring 66 and sharing the most important stand of the season: 82 with Ruche in the semi-final, which took us from a precarious 4-87 to safety and beyond. Made point his own.
- Anthony GREENHILL: 'Knoll' was the outstanding bowler this season. Line, length, outswing, and a straight seam yielded 24 wickets for very few runs. Made No 11 simply because he bowled the most overs, he was dismissed only once during the season, and that was run out. All this and safe hands will make him a fine Grade bowler.
- Andrew LINDSAY: A late starter, 'Norman' was a valuable addition to the side. He scored runs at the top of the order, and took wickets as well. If he ever plays a full season for this club, he won't play it in 7s.
- Craig NEAL: Still probably the hardest hitter in the club, Craig must learn to be patient. A net session with Confucius would be a good start. Nonetheless, a strong contributor, with a ton against Mascot (16 fours) and a match-winning if chancy Grand Final innings of 86.
- Minh NGUYEN: A veteran of at least two 7th Grade premierships, Minh started the season late, and was denied by circumstances the chances he deserved. A squareleg sensation!
- Matt PLUNKETT-COLE: Started the season with a bang, and ended it with lots of screams, working weekends at Luna Park. In between he missed a Grade spot only through ill-luck; or, more precisely, through chicken-pox. Has talent and applied it well.
- Ruche WICKREMASENA: Mr Consistency: consistently last to the game, consistently lunching at Kingsford McDonald's and consistently scoring runs. Although Ruche didn't pick up a half-century, this was only through lack of opportunity (i.e. over limits), not lack of application. Took a good few catches behind the stumps as well.
- Anthony WUNSCH: Not his best season, but that's probably because for a change he didn't have to carry the attack. And it was still very good. Wunschy claimed runs, wickets and his usual large helping of bad luck. He was one of our best fielders, too. (This year I needn't lament his lack of attention by Grade selectors I guess 3-50 off 19 sometimes just isn't enough.)

Many others contributed to the team over the season: 32 players turned out for 7s in all. Congratulations and thanks go to all of them for making this a very enjoyable - and successful - season.
