### REPORT OF THE GENERAL COMMITTEE

Gentlemen,

The Seventeenth Annual Report and Financial Statement of the University of New South Wales Cricket Club are presented for your approval.

The Club again fielded five teams for the 1966/67 season, four teams playing in the Municipal and Shires Competition and the fifth playing in the City and Suburban fixtures. In terms of the winning of competitions, the Club was not unsuccessful in that the Second XI won the "B" Shires Competition after leading until the second last round, and the Club won the Municipal and Shires Club Championship for the third consecutive year. Consequently the Club becomes the first to win the Championship for 3 years in succession. The First XI, premiers for the previous two seasons, finished in fourth position although defeated only once in the season, while the Third XI fared more successfully than in the previous season, finishing in eleventh place in the "C" Shires Competition. The Fourth XI took out eighteenth position in a total of 22 teams in their competition.

Probably the most reassuring feature of the competitive aspect of the season was the retention of the M & S Club Championship and, of course, the winning of the "B" Shires premiership. It was generally thought at the beginning of the season that, due to the loss of several players from the previous year's successful premiership and championship teams, the 1966/67 season would not be as successful as the 1965/66 season. New members of the Club and, more significantly, young members promoted from the lower grades, proved their worth in the two teams on which the Club Championship is based. The Second XI proved to be the surprise team early in the season, and maintained the advantage by teamwork and by that much maligned and misused platitude, "team spirit". The result was the winning of the premiership.

As is usual, and certainly in a season in which the Club Championship is won, it is the First XI and Second XI teams which, to many, bask alone in the glory, at the expense of the lower grades. The Third, Fourth and Fifth XI teams may not have had spectacular successes, but it is these very teams that must continue to provide the raw material for the more glamorous grades; it is in these teams that experience and the sense of belonging to a club of the University should be moulded. These views are emphasised at this stage as it appears that the Club, in many respects, has "come of age" and is entering a new, and perhaps, critical phase of its development. If tangible success is measured by success in the "A" and "B" Shires competitions - but this, by no means, should be the only measure of success - then the Club has emerged from the doldrums of its formative years, and is now recognised as a club of some stature.

From here, however, the future development is critical. If the Club is to gain wider recognition e.g., Grade status, then it must not merely aim to rest on its past laurels; it must aim for strength and solidarity throughout the structure of the Club. To be realistic, without these there is very little chance that the Club will advance from its present state.

These types of thoughts, and their ramifications, have been the guidelines for much of the Committee's activities during this past season.

Although it may have appeared that the Committee was not particularly
active (e.g., it was not possible to arrange a Single Wicket Competition)
there has indeed been much activity in the formulation of ideas, and
principles which may take some years to come to fruition. Behind these
ideas are the motives to either strengthen the Club's "public" teams,
such as the Intervarsity teams, and to organise social matches for all
members of the club, irrespective of their grading and not merely for
the elite of the Club. Games being considered for members ineligible
for Intervarsity contests, are matches in country towns against local
teams or maybe interstate or even trans-Tasman fixtures. The strengthening of Intervarsity teams, through I/V selection squads, and an I/V
tour of the Southern States, is envisaged.

In the Intervarsity match played during the season the Club had mixed success. The Club was beaten by Newcastle at Kensington, was thrashed by Western Australia in Perth, and defeated Queensland at Kensington. Both Intravarsity matches against Wollongong were unfortunately washed out.

The Club played an increasing number of social matches during the season, and the enjoyment and goodwill of these matches are rapidly making them traditional fixtures of the calendar. These matches were played against Randwick District Club, Paddington Cricket Club, I. Zingari, and Sydney and Melbourne Universities.

The Club's Annual Dinner, which is now a well established tradition, was again successful, more than fifty people attending. Mr.M.B.Cohen, M.L.A., former state representative, replied to the toast to cricket, proposed by Mr.T.Brooks, former Shield cricketer, and Mr.R.Lucas replied to the toast to the Club, proposed by Mr.R.Rowell of Epping Club. Mr.J.Ross, representing the N.S.W.C.A., presented the Club Championship and "B" Shires Premiership trophies. In the absence of Captain J.Morris, Professor S.Livingstone presented the Captain Morris Fielding Trophy to G.Cole, and Mr.G.Borwick presented the individual trophies to Club members.

Finally, the Club wishes to thank all those who gave both moral and material support to the Club.

#### FIRST ELEVEN REPORT

The 1966/67 season was not as generous to the 1st XI as the previous two seasons. Our record of nine wins, six draws and one loss gives an indication that although the team was hard to beat, its general play was not attacking and consistent enough for it to carry off the Premiership. In fact, at the end of three rounds the side had managed a total of five competition points, our worst start to a competition since 1961/62.

Rain, and the problems associated with our home ground, did have a material effect on the result of some of our matches, but with a little more attacking cricket and more dedication towards a concerted team effort, the results for the season would have been more favourable. The team did have the ability to win the competition and should, with the members of this season's XI to form the nucleus for next season, regain the Premiership which had been ours for the preceding two seasons.

The loss of five key members of last year's team in addition to the departure overseas of Max Gosling in November and the inability of Graham Sylvester to be available for the full season, left the 1st XI with quite a gap to fill. The acquisition of Phil McEachran, Royce Levi and Jim Healey, and the return of Peter Ward, helped to nullify this somewhat, and all these players had quite successful seasons. One would need to travel far to find a keener cricketer than Phil McEachran. With more tightness in his bowling and a little more enterprise in his batting, Phil could develop into one of the Club's best ever allrounders. Royce Levi took over the wicket-keeping duties midway during the season and performed his duties behind the stumps in a very polished and stylish manner. Although he didn't really "fire" in the batting department as we all know he can, perhaps next season will see him in his true light.

Jim Healey had a good season with the bat and scored the only century for the 1st XI in the season. Jim finished as the third leading run getter and did much to solidify the batting structure of the team.

Peter Ward shared one of the opening bowling positions with Ian Lowe during the season. Neither of these bowlers really "clicked" but perhaps the story would have been different if a greater number of chances given by opposing batsmen had been accepted. Nothing breeds success like success. Once again, however, the brunt of the attack fell onto the shoulders of John Middleton. John managed to snare 44 wickets at an average of 1300 and upon reflection, if he had bowled as much as he had in other seasons, our attack would probably have had more success.

Towards the end of the season Jim Pratley and Chris Relton gave John able support and prospects are bright for both these players. Jim Pratley had some fine spells of bowling in a number of matches and although consistency is one of the hardest attributes of legspin bowling to attain, Jim was managing to obtain greater success in this capacity in the latter half of the season. However, one should never field at silly leg to Pratley.

Chris Relton came into the 1st XI for the match against Ryde in Round 12 and had the impressive average of one wicket every two and a half overs from then till the end of the season. Next season should be a fruitful one for Chris.

Our batting during the season was our strongest point and only on one occasion was the team dismissed for less than 200. We did, however, score our runs at too slow a rate in some matches to put ourselves into a forceful position and herein lies one of the causes, I feel, for our mediocre position in the competition table. Barry Andrews, against Sutherland, and Jim Healey, against Canterbury, both adopted forceful roles which swiftly turned the fortunes of these respective matches in our favour. It is attacking batting of this nature, tempered with discretion, which wins competitions, but there was not enough of this forceful batting this season. However, it is difficult to replace attacking batsmen of the likes of John Pigott, Kevan Daly, Don Clark and Michael Reidy in the one season and when this is taken into consideration the batting effort this year was quite admirable.

Harold Bundy with his wealth of experience, played some great innings during the season and on many occasions formed the backbone of the batting. Up to the second last round Harold had only been dismissed for less than double figures on one occasion, symbolic of his marvellous consistency. Two of his knocks stand out from the others - his fine 82 in the oppressive heat against Canterbury and his attacking 46 in the long grass at Mona Park where the team just failed to snatch a last minute outright victory.

Barry Andrews had his most successful season with the Club. His batting was consistent and, although he did give one or two chances, he generally seemed to get on top of the bowling each time he went out to bat. Something spectacular always seemed to happen when Barry was at the crease but he did his job effectively and well and set an example for the other batsmen to follow.

An element of complacency was sometimes detected in the team's general attitude and this must be eradicated if the 1st XI is to obtain success in future seasons. In the field the standards set in the previous seasons were not attained, though many fine catches were taken.

Each person, I am sure, consciously tried to do his best and that is all that can be asked for. It is to be hoped that the experience gained this year will be built upon and utilised next season and if this is the case there should be no holding the 1st XI. It's been a happy season and an enjoyable one and my thanks go to the members of the team for their wholehearted support. John Middleton, as vice-captain, was a fine helping hand in times of crisis and skippered the team to an impressive victory over Epping in the last match of the season.

## "B" SHIRES REPORT - 1966-67

The "B's" won the premiership. A fine season's cricket culminated in a final against Burwood which was certainly the best game of cricket the writer has been concerned in, and one which none of the 22 players will ever forget. Nor will the 100 or so people who watched the finish of the game forget it easily.

If there was a single reason why the team was successful, it was because the side was virtually unchanged throughout the season. Of the team which played in the final, 9 of the 11 played in the first round, David Wills joined us for the 2nd round and Graham Cole came in for the 3rd round. None of the regulars were dropped and promotions to the firsts were fairly rare. So the team spirit was there and early wins gave the team the confidence to stay at, or near, the top of the ladder all the season.

The bowlers were the key to every single victory as the batting, on the whole, was poor. The team relied on 4 bowlers most of the time and they combined into the best attack a U.N.S.W. "B" Shires team has had and surely one of the best attacks "B" Shires has seen.

The fielding, prior to the final, was inconsistent. The ground fielding was often well below par but the catching was good throughout and many superb catches were made.

Not only did the batsmen fail to make many runs, but, particularly among the experienced players, there was a lack of an effort to get on top of the opposing bowlers. Several matches were won because of big scores by the lower order batsmen.

A number of the matches are worthy of mention. Against Epping early in the season, the early batting, apart from Wills, disintegrated. Then the old stagers, Ray Bayfield and Phil Schofield, got together and saved the follow-on. They only made 20 runs each but they showed what heart can do. Ray Bayfield did it again against Pennant Hills, scoring an unconquered 51 when we won by 25 runs and Phil Schofield's 58 not out gave us the win over Lindfield.

The outright win over Bexley was probably the best win of the season other than the final. After removing them for 103 we were unaccountably "rolled" for 81. With a promise of free beers if they got up, UNI dismissed Bexley for 147 on the 2nd day and then the batsmen, in their best effort of the season, made 4-170 against the clock with Darryl Lacey making a wonderful 59 not out.

Lane Cove beat us in spite of Schofield's 6-80 off 20 overs, a brilliant 64 by Wills including 2 "6's" and 7 "4's" and a valiant 36 by Lacey batting with virtually one hand after getting a bad knock when fielding.

Against Sutherland, who were near the top of the competition at the time, Bayfield won the match in his 2nd over, taking 3 wickets, 2 clean-bowled and the other an unbelievable slips catch by Wills.

The game against Lindfield had a sensational finish. Uni had won on the first innings in an all day game and we closed in the second innings, leaving them 114 to win in 42 minutes. They failed by 4 runs with the last 2 overs being bowled with every fieldsman on the fence. The Uni. captain was not the most popular man in Sydney that day.

Against lowly Canterbury chasing only 154 we slumped from 3--110 to 8--133. Then Cole, after trying desperately to get out, and failing, won the match with a slashing 67.

Although we lost again to Epping, this was one of the better team efforts. The batsmen combined well enough to pass 200 for only the 2nd time in the whole season, with Alan Bishop making a solid 72. When Epping batted, the fielding was the best of the season, apart from the final, and we had them 8-178 before they, somewhat fortuitously, passed us.

Turning to individuals, the player deserving the most credit was probably Bob Turner. Not only did he take 53 wickets but he could be relied on to bowl from one end indefinitely. He didn't bowl a bad over all season, was never collared and it was a most comforting sight for a captain to see his first ball always land on a length. Graham Cole took 43 wickets and considering he came from playing on mats, he must develop to better things. He is a wonderful slips field and a promising batsman.

Phil Schofield has lost a little pace and didn't always have the new ball but he took 38 wickets and must be one of the most intelligent bowlers playing in Shires.

Ray Bayfield is an object lesson to any young cricketer. No greater trier has stepped on a cricket field and I choose these words carefully. Whether batting, bowling or fielding, Ray gives his all. His figures suffered a little because he swung the ball past the bat and the wicket so often.

The batsmen are not so worthy of praise. David Wills has the ability to be a very fine batsman. And he will be when he learns to pick the ball to hit. He played several fine knocks but got out too often playing rashly. He is young and is also a superb field.

Alan Bishop was a good opener with the right temperament. He has a wonderful pull shot and drives well. He would have made many more runs but for a tendency to drive at balls near the off stump which were not far enough up. Alan was a grand field either in the deep or in the gully.

Dave Pocock started the season badly but towards the end was one of the most consistent batsmen in the team. His efforts in the final were most praiseworthy. Dave, at times, was a little wild in the field but this came good at the right time too.

Alex Taylor always looked the competent player he is. He was one who was not forceful enough, at times seeing more devil in the bowling than there was. He needed one big innings to give him confidence.

Darryl was always cheerful and did much to curb the more tempestuous people in the team (including the captain) when things were not going so well.

Clem Barrington was the keeper and took 30 victims, including 16 stumpings, mostly off Graham Cole. Clem works very hard and was always safe keeping to the quickies and diligently applied himself to the very hard job of keeping to Cole and Turner. Clem is, of course, a great team man as well.

Of the other people who played for the B's, Peter Ward had 2 fine performances with the ball before going to higher things. Ian Lowe tried hard, as usual, but couldn't get wickets. His magic stick must have had the wrong message. Mike Reidy played only one game with the Club this season and gave us a delightful little vignette of an innings. We all hope Mike plays again next season.

Before closing this report I want to try and describe the final in some detail, though it would take a Shakespeare to even remotely recapture those 2 wonderful days of cricket.

#### The Final

The game was played over the Easter weekend against Burwood at Rothwell Park. Uni had to win so the good fortune began with beautiful weather throughout and a good wicket for both bowlers and batsmen.

Uni lost the toss and fielded. Off the 4th ball of the match the Burwood captain was brilliantly caught at gully by Bishop off Bayfield 1-0. Soon it was 2-5 and 3-29, this time with a great slips catch by Cole. Burwood then batted most aggressively and well to reach 195 shortly after lunch. All told 8 catches were taken. The bowling was good and the fielding the best I have seen from a Uni "B" Shires team.

We started the chase soundly enough. Alan Bishop hit 3 "4's" off successive balls and was then run out for 27. 1 for 35 and Pocock came in. The score was 1-93 at tea. Promising enough. Then Ted Watt of Burwood bowled us out. From 1-98 we slumped to 8-139. Cole, Schofield and Barrington fought hard but we were out for 170 with Watt taking 8-30 off 16 overs. Burwood went in again and were 0-2 when a light appeal was upheld.

On the 2nd day, Bob Turner was not fit, with a bad bruise on his bowling hand and Darryl Lacey was also ill. But miracles were to happen. Ray Bayfield skittled the Burwood captain for a pair and in what must be their finest hour with the Club, Ray and Phil Schofield, aided again by tremendous catching and fielding, had Burwood 6-28 and 9-62. At lunch they were 9-75 with Ray and Phil having bowled for 2 hours 20 minutes unchanged. The Burwood last wicket pair went on and added 55 precious runs to take the score to 117, giving us 143 to win. Had the game and the premiership slipped away again?

The opening was solid enough once more and the score went to 55 before the 2nd wicket fell. Dave Pocock again batted superbly for 28. When he went in it was 3-82. Wills came in and attacked. At 3-105 needing only 38 more we dared to hope. I won't even try and describe the feelings of everyone playing and watching. Suddenly Wills hit a full toss back to Watt. Alex Taylor was out to a doubtful looking 1.b.w. and then the wickets tumbled. Darryl Lacey had gone in at No.7 and it was now 8-127 as Parrington joined Darryl with 16 needed. We were almost despairing. Darryl bravely hit a 2 and a 4 but then Clem was out. 10 to win as Bob Turner went in to try and survive 7 balls from Watt who had taken 6 wickets, giving him 14 for the match. Somehow Bob stayed. So it was up to Darryl. He played the first ball. He swung the next for 2. He cover drove the next for 4. One more, just one more like that, we prayed. So Darryl swung the next hard and high towards a man at mid-wicket who leapt for it but it was over him and through to the boundary. We had won the premiership.

This was a game of cricket.

#### THIRD ELEVEN CAPTAIN'S REPORT

The overall picture of the third eleven's cricket in 1966-67 is one of a team which incorporated the following features into its play ... excellent team spirit, excellent bowling, good fielding and atrocious batting.

On the basis of performances we were improvers, moving from last but one in 1965-66 to just into the upper half of this overpopulated competition. The primary reason for this was undoubtedly that we were a team, the nucleus of which was maintained for most of the season, whereas in the previous season the thirds were subject to constant changes in membership.

But the improvement should have been so much better. Above, I have referred to atrocious batting, not atrocious batsmen, but with one exception, the specialist batsmen in the thirds can only look back on a wasted season of lost opportunities. The technical ability to score runs consistently was there, but application and concentration were sadly lacking. I can only hope that the object lessons provided by Ahmad Afzal and Stan Livingstone have been absorbed for next season, for of all the bowling attacks we faced during the year, only one (Sydney) was good enough to dismiss us for the low totals which we recorded.

So it was left to the bowlers to win our matches, and on most occasions they were equal to the task. Lacking a good spinner for most of the season, the bowling depth was shallow, with three pace and one slow medium bowler. But these four, Emery, Preiss, Southwell-Keely and Livingstone, carried out their jobs well. A tribute to the skill of the pace bowlers is that on only 6 occasions in 25 innings did opposition opening partnership exceed 20.

The fielding was good, with the exception of one fixture, against Lane Cove, where the dropping of six catches in the first half hour was instrumental in our losing the game. Generally, Paul Emery at cover, and Peter James in slips, were outstanding, and John Tainsh behind the stumps was ever reliable.

The player of the year was, however, Stan Livingstone. He was picked primarily for his bowling in which department he took out the aggregate with 40 well earned wickets. His slow medium "benders" were a constant source of worry to opposition batsmen. His batting is based on a fundamental the rest of us forgot ... concentration. And he added fight and determination to this. Against Sydney's near first grade attack he defied some excellent pace bowling to nearly carry us to victory. Against Manly, in conjunction with Bob Vagg, he doubled our score for the last wicket. In these efforts, and others, he provided the object lesson for the batsmen to learn for next season.

I have said before that there was one exception to the general specialist batting 'ailment' we suffered. This was Ahmad Afzal whose batting matured in this season. Ever aggressive, Ahmad added to this quality, responsibility and consistency. He rarely failed to make runs and deserved his trophy.

Paul Emery also deserves special mention, for in my opinion he is destined to reach the top in this club. Young, keen, and with a will to learn, he possesses the natural ability to develop into a medium pacer of the highest order. He has the left-hander's natural inswinger and can move the ball sharply off the pitch. If he can harness these attributes he will be a match winner for many years.

Finally, my thanks to a team who represented the University well and were a pleasure to lead. Their support for a "noble leader" who is target No.1 for the caustic comments above, about batting, made this a wonderful season for me and I thank them for it.

I must also thank Fay Duncan, who as an 'honorary' member of the team, kept the neatest scorebook in the competition despite the difficulties of wind and rain at David Phillips Field.

#### FOURTH XI REPORT

The Fourth XI was again the Club's No.2 team in the "C" Shires competition, but this year no stewards enquiry was needed as we finished 18th in a field of 22, and well behind our stablemates of the Third XI. The previous season, you will remember, the positions were reversed.

The team's record for the season was 4 first innings wins, 4 outright losses, 3 first innings losses and 4 drawn matches, and this was somewhat of a disappointment in view of the team's good record of the previous season. No valid excuses can be offered - admittedly we were caught a couple of times on wet wickets, but the real problem was the team's inconsistent batting. Although there were a number of fine invididual performances, it was indeed rare for the batsmen to "come good" at the same time.

The bowling, however, maintained quite a good standard throughout the season, especially when the unresponsive David Phillips wicket is taken into account. Graham McRae was the most successful bowler, taking 26 wickets at an average of 10.34. Graham's medium pacers proved most economical, his best figures being 5-14 against Lane Cove and 4-20 from 19 overs against St.George. Bruce Dockrill and Dick Preiss were the other leading wicket takers with 21 and 18 respectively, but both Bruce and Dick played in less than half of the team's matches. Tom Downes also bowled economically and achieved the rare feat of a hat trick in the match against Lindfield 2. Kevin Howard secured 16 wickets with his slow left hand spinners, and bowled very well with limited opportunities.

It was ironical that when the team made its highest score of 275 against Balmain 2 and felt reasonably confident of victory, the bowlers were unable to dismiss the opposition for under 400. On the other occasion that the batting came good with a score of 240 against Randwick, rain washed out play on the second day.

As mentioned before, there were some fine individual batting performances. Bob Vagg scored a magnificent 78 not out against Randwick, Peter Street a run a minute, 66, against Balmain 2, and with Keith King compiled an opening stand of 100, Stewart Frith a match winning 62 against Wests and Tom Downes 57 against Pennant Hills. Bill Bushby contributed a number of useful scores and if he could only be a little more patient, I feel sure he would score a mint of runs. Of the newcomers, Lloyd Ferriera made a number of good scores and impresses with his aggressive attitude to the game, and Ian McLean showed great promise and should score his share of runs next season. Mention must be made of Bryan O'Loan, whose mastery of the french cut was a joy to behold.

Perhaps the most memorable match of the season was the all day game against Lindfield 2. Sent in to bat we were all out for 84 and at tea Lindfield with 3-69 seemed certain of victory. The first over after tea proved quite sensational. Tom Downes gained his hat trick which started the Lindfield collapse and the side was dismissed for 77. Bruce Dockrill was at his liveliest, bowling unchanged throughout the innings to take 6-34 from 18 overs, and Tom Downes had 4-20 from 13 overs.

The fielding of the team this season was mediocre and not, I feel, up to the standard set in previous seasons. I do hope that next year will see a marked improvement in this department.

Finally, I would like to thank the team members for their support and co-operation during the season. The team was enthusiastic at all times despite our limited success and I feel sure enjoyed its cricket.

Once again the team consisted of a hard core of regulars - those members of the club who are bad players but dress well - and an ever changing combination of others, forming an "instant team". Such, however, is the understandable and inevitable fate of the last team in a large club, and I am sure all team members will agree it certainly lends for variety. Indeed half the fun of the match is attempting to predict the number of players that will come and what time it will start.

In such an atmosphere I feel the policy of non-competition is understandable and justifiable, eliminating the inevitable feeling of frustration and disappointment that would otherwise overtake the players at the completion of the match. This policy, I find, is adopted by new team members almost spontaneously, as soon as the memory of former competitive matches is discarded, resulting usually in an unvictorious but very enjoyable game.

The only disappointing feature of the season was equipment which, this season, was even particularly poor. I would debate the inevitability of lower teams receiving lower grade gear, particularly when the weekly subsidy per club member is not subject to the same sliding scale. Surely there are other methods to create an incentive for promotion.

I look forward to seeing members in an even more enjoyable coming season.

#### INTERVARSITY: U.N.S.W. vs NEWCASTLE UNIVERSITY

Newcastle, winning the toss, batted first in what proved a rather disappointing Intervarsity match on a very true, if slow, Daceyville wicket. With Jim Pratley withdrawing first before the match began, N.S.W., already weak in pace, had to battle hard against an attacking Newcastle batting side. Only Horwitz was effective early against the onslaught of John Archibald, but N.S.W. recovered from 3-188 to 9-241 before a last wicket stand took the Newcastle score to 289. Bishop was out to the second of the three balls bowled in the gloomy light when N.S.W. began their innings.

We suffered another setback when Rogers was out soon after play started on the second morning; and although Dowse handled Whitehead (a State Squad opener) particularly well, he did not receive the support from the middle side and Whitehead completed a superb spell by bowling Cole with the score at 217.

And then the 'Wales' recovered. The Newcastle decision to change their batting order nearly proved disastrous. Vagg immediately bowled Curran (who hasn't scored a run against N.S.W. since prostrated by that formerly great fast bowler, Lowe, in Newcastle in 1966), and Peter Horwitz bowled superbly into the wind, to have Newcastle 5-75 at the close. On the third morning, however, Whitehead was dropped before he had reached twenty, and with Newcastle electing not to make a finish of it, we only had three hours to score 292 for victory. Dowse (67), completing an excellent double, and Bishop (33) had a century opening partnership. Rogers showed some intervarsity form at last, and Andrews hit hard and briefly, but we were never really up with the clock.

Our congratulations go to Newcastle, who turned the tables on last year, and who proved to be typically happy novocastrians. It is a pity, however, that the umpiring was uniformly bad, and that very little off-the-field support came from non playing members. Our thanks must also go to the caterers (particularly the Bishops) for some superb lunchtime extravaganzas.

On the previous Saturday the skipper, Rod Marsh, had been banging Test bowlers Guest and Mayne for "sixers".

Pratley bowled 20-odd overs unchanged, was very accurate and never collared without looking very dangerous. Lowe was hit around but next morning bowled much better to clean up the tail and take 5 wickets. The fielding was always keen and a couple of fine catches were taken, especially one by Leighton at the wicket down the leg-side off Lowe.

N.S.W. batted and Geisker and Dowse both failed to score. McEachran made 40 good runs before running down the wicket to Mann, another Sheffield Shield player, and getting stumped. One cover-drive by McEachran was the stroke of the match. Sylvester stayed for over 2 hours for 12 before being run out. Skipper Andrews fought hard and was in charge at tea. He then holed out on a full toss on the third ball after the break. Wills showed what a promising batsman he was and the experience was very worthwhile as was shown a few weeks later against Queensland. The tail didn't wag and the game ended at 5 o'clock on the 2nd day.

Everyone thoroughly enjoyed the trip. The weather was marvellous, the products of the Swan Brewery were well received and, most of all, the Perth people's hospitality was wonderful.

# UNIVERSITY OF N.S.W. V QUEENSLAND UNIVERSITY Played at David Phillips Field from 7 - 9th February 1967

Middleton won the toss and N.S.W. was in the field. The wicket was lifeless from the very beginning of the match; a sharp contrast to the fast and fiery wicket predicted by the groundsman.

Queensland, with some indifferent batting, managed only 208 runs. Of the batsmen, only Loxton and Maclean looked like getting on top of the attack at any stage. Loxton's 87 was a real mixture. At no time did he look like a Sheffield Shield player, but after a patchy beginning he did manage a number of fine strokes towards the end of his innings. Maclean looked by far the best of the Queensland batsmen. He was just starting to display a wide range of strokes when he was out to an extremely fine piece of bowling by Pratley.

The N.S.W. attack was very tight and gave little away. Middleton, as usual, bowled well and he was well backed up by McEachran and Pratley. The New South Wales innings began disasterously, with the first four wickets falling for 11 runs. A partnership of 30 between Healey and Wills helped to stem the tide, but with the dismissal of Healey at 41 the position was desparate. However, a magnificent partnership between Wills and Horwitz, of 138 runs, restored N.S.W. fortunes and placed the team in a winning position. This was the best batting of the match, with Wills playing many powerful shots all round the wicket in his score of 77, and Horwitz producing a stream of classical outside shots during his innings of 73.

With the dismissal of Wills at 179, the remainder of the N.S.W. players batted carefully and saw the side to a total of 223; a lead of 15.

Queensland, batting again, was only able to manage a score of 181. Again, at no stage did the Queensland batsmen look like getting on top of the bowling, although Maclean again batted well and was well supported by Moore who scored a chanceless 51 not out.

Middleton was again the best of the N.S.W. bowlers, managing to produce the odd fiery ball on an extremely docile wicket. Pratley, Relton and McEachran provided valuable assistance. N.S.W. was left to score 166 for the outright win and this they achieved for the loss of four wickets. Of the batsmen, James and Dowse batted extremely well. Dowse provided a solid innings of 37, whilst James proceeded to play "every shot in the book" in his score of 47.

This victory was our first ever against Queensland University at home.

Socially, it appears our visitors had a good time. What with Morgan flashing dangerously around middle stump, and McSweeney being called for chucking, it can only be assumed that the Queenslanders enjoyed themselves.

# THE UNIVERSITY OF N.S.W. V MELBOURNE UNIVERSITY Played at Snape Park on 27th December, 1966.

Melbourne won the toss and sent N.S.W. in to bat on a rather dubious looking wicket.

The N.S.W. batsmen, after an indifferent start, managed to put together a total of 168. McEachran batted solidly and held the N.S.W. side together with a fine innings of 75.

A total of 168 appeared to be easily within the reach of a particularly strong Melbourne batting line-up. Alex Taylor and Clem Barrington had a calm and serene 9 and 7 win, and Ward and Lowe finished 2 holes in front; the others, however, failed dismally (Garland and Andrews surrendered 3 and 2, and the Vaggs abdicated 5 and 4, down to Lucas and McEachran, the cracks, who were butchered, 4 and 3) and Briars won by 5 matches to 2.

There were some consclations, however. Alex Taylor (handicap) Graham Cole (stableford) and Rob Lucas (stroke) won the individual events, and Lucas with 46 putts was 5 in front of his nearest rival. But we couldn't even win the Bradman cup.
