REPORT OF THE MANAGEMENT COMMITTEE

Gentlemen,

The Eighteenth Annual Report and Financial Statement of The University of New South Wales is presented for your approval.

There were five teams representing the Club in the 1967-68 season, four playing in the Municipal and Shires Competition, and the fifth eleven playing City and Suburban fixtures. The 1967-68 season proved to be the most successful in the history of the Club with the winning of the 'A' and 'B' Shires Premierships, the Club Championship and the success of the Third Xl which came second in the South Section of the 'C' Shires Competition. The Fourth Xl came eleventh out of twelve teams in the same competition.

Although some players were lost to the Club before the season began, their replacements, both new and promoted players, acquitted themselves admirably in all grades and showed that the depth of talent in the Club is increasing with every season. Teamwork was again the essence of the Club Süccess. It is worthy to mention that the First Xl victory was the third for that team in four seasons; the Second Xl had their third premiership win in five seasons, whilst the Club Champion—ship has been ours for four consecutive seasons. The Third Xl is now starting to enter into calculations for premiership honours and the foreseeable future should see yet another U.N.S.W. team as premier.

The Club has had one of its more successful seasons as an Intervarsity force and although the result sheet of two wins and three defeats does not appear all that impressive, on each of the three unsuccessful occasions the Club could have won if the conditions had been a little more favourable. It is hoped that the Intervarsity programme will become more stable as from next season with a tentative programme being arranged for the next four seasons. Victories were obtained against Tasmania and Western Australia whilst narrow defeats were suffered from Sydney, Newcastle and Monash Universities. It was pleasing to see the N.S.W.— Sydney Intervarsity started this season and it is hoped that it will be an annual event.

The Fourth Xl and Fifth Xl are suffering at the moment the growing pains of the Club but as we have seen with the Third Xl this season, it is only a matter of time before these teams also gain honours for the Club. Nevertheless, these teams occupy an important place in the Club, training young members for the higher grades and initiating these players into University cricket.

Social matches were again to the fore. To our traditional matches against Randwick, Paddington and I Zingari were added games against Waverley and the World X1. The scorecard reads three wins and three losses. All matches were played with goodwill and enjoyment with University's reputation as a host perhaps being enhanced. A

game against the BlindCricket Association was declared drawn following the breakage of all the balls.

The Annual Dinner was again carried out in a manner befitting a Premiership Club and we were honoured to have as Guest Speakers, former South African Test Umpire Mr. J.H. McMenamin who proposed the Toast to Cricket, and Mr. Norman May, well-known radio and television personality, to respond. Mr. George Parry of Auburn Club proposed the Toast to the Club, to which Mr. Ian Lowe replied. Mr. Ray Little from the N.S.W.C.A. presented premiership trophies which were received by Mr. J. Pratley ('A' Premiership), Mr.R. Turner ('B' Premiership) and Club Championship trophy received by Mr. T. Creer. The Patron, Mr. E.H. Davis, presented the Bursar's Trophy to Mr. G. Cole whilst Capt. John Morris presented his personal trophy for fielding to wicketkeeper Mr. Royce Levi. In all fifty-four people attended.

The Management Committee as a whole has had a successful term in office but it is hoped that future Committees will have the benefit of larger attendences at meetings to help relieve the burden of those who do attend.

Finally, the Committee wishes to thank all those who gave both moral and material support to the Club.

FIRST GRADE

The 1967-68 season concluded with this Club emerging as A Shire Premiers, B Shire Premiers and Club Champions. On behalf of the first eleven I would like to both congratulate the other teams in this Club on their performances throughout the season and to thank both the players and the captains of these teams (this does not infer that a captain is not a player) for assistance without which our win would not have been possible.

We also congratulate Lane Cove C.C., not only on being minor premiers but also for their gentlemanly acceptance of the result of the final. I am sure that each of us, at the get-together after the game, hoped that we would have reacted as well, had the positions been reversed.

The assistance which I received from my Vice Captain, Jim Pratley, from the Team Secretary, Phil McEarchran and from both Barry Andrews and Jim Healey left me nothing to do but attend to the actual performance of the team on the field. Such help not only lifts a great burden from the captain, it also welds eleven (or more) players into a team. One wonders how many past University Captains would have been successful had they had such support.

Traditionally the captain's report contains a resume of the achievements of the outstanding players during the previous season. While I feel that it is necessary to break with this tradition in this case I cannot do so completely; not to mention Royce Levi would be an unpardonable rudeness. In the considerable number of years during which I have played this game, I have played with few players who could match Royce's gentlemanly approach to cricket. I have certainly not played with, or against, so brilliant a wicket-keeper. This club is indeed fortunate in having so fine a player and I hope that he will be with us for many more seasons.

Though I do not wish to mention the achievements of all players, I do wish to mention the achievement of this University's greatest player. John Middleton once again accounted for his usual half hundred of the cream of the oppositions batting line up. In doing this he once again won the bowling average. Once again he was one of the best fieldsmen in the competition and once again on numerous occasions he saved his side from defeat with courageous batting. Many players have great natural ability but too few play the brand of cricket that can lift and inspire a team with the realization that this is, after all, a man's game. John Middleton is one player who has this ability and I sincerely hope that this will not be the last capatin's report to tell of his exploits. If he goes ahead with his plans to retire this club will suffer its greatest loss yet.

Finally I would like to thank all those who played in the side throughout the season for the generous support that I received.

2ND XI REPORT - 1967/68

The "B's" won the premiership for the second year in succession. On results, this was the best season a University of New South Wales 2nd XI has had, there being little doubt that the team was the best in the competition. The teamwork and team spirit developed over the past couple of seasons reached fulfillment. This season we were going to win - last season we hoped to win.

In some ways, however, the season was not entirely satisfactory. The standard of the other teams was poorer than in previous years. We were "worried" only about Burwood and they were not as good as before. Many of the wickets we played on did not help towards good cricket. More often than not the scoring rate, both when we batted and when we were in the field, was considerably less than a run a minute. Both our batsmen, and those we bowled to, seem to have forgotten how to use their feet to slow bowlers. Let the runs come rather than take the game to the bowler was the usual attitude. This is not meant as criticism, as the writer was as much, or more, at fault as anyone else, but rather an expression of concern.

The team had the nucleus of 7 or 8 players who have played together regularly for two or more years now. From last year's side, Alan Bishop left us, Daryl Lacey retired after a few games and Dave Pocock lost form. Many batsmen were tried in their stead but none measured up. The batting, however, was much safer than last year. Graeme Cole emerged as a very good opener and Alex Taylor had his best season for years. Simply, we made as many runs as we needed, except once only.

The bowlers, Ray Bayfield, Phil Schofield, Bob Turner and Graeme Cole, along with Chris Relton for the last half of the season were again too good for the opposing batsmen.

The fielding again was unsatisfactory. Young players must realise that batting or bowling is not all there is to cricket. Mistakes were made for which schoolboys would have been castigated. At this level, a fieldsman should be able to field where he is put. A fieldsman should know the spin on a ball hit square off the wicket. A fieldsman should know that returns to the wicket should not be aimed at the keeper's big toe.

Perhaps I am too critical. But a cricketer should do more than try to do his best. He should aim to develop his play so that his best becomes better.

Some of the matches are worth rating. Against arch-rivals Burwood we were 3-7 chasing 137 with our seeming nemesis, Ted Watt, threat-ening utter destruction again. John Pigott and Peter Ward had a fine stand with Pigott mastering Watt as none of the rest of us have yet been able to do.

We had made 168 against Canterbury, the eventual finalists, and they were 2-88 when Gracme Cole in his best effort for the Club (up till then) took 7-44 and won the match for us.

We waited until the last game before Xmas for our first outright. Bob Turner toom 6-30 and 6-50 against Pennant Hills, using a cross-breeze with extreme effect. Graeme Cole, in his first game as opener, after 34 in the 1st innings made a brilliant 63 NOT OUT in the second, hitting five of the last six balls of the match for four.

Against Sutherland, with time against us, Alex Taylor played the best innings I have seen from him, with strokeplay that few others in the Club could match.

The all-day game against Epping had a good finish. We closed at 8-186 and had them 5-40, but then had an epidemic of dropsy. Ray Rowell played the only noteworthy innings of the season against us. Finally, after much field-placement juggling they needed two to win off the last ball of the day. They got a single. This made it a tie worth three competition points. If they had not scored off the last ball, the resulting draw would have given us only two points.

Against Ryde, their two innings total equalled our first innings score. A new opening pair, Turner and Barrington went out to knock off the run with Turner having instructions to take the bowling in an effort to score his first run of the season. He was 1.b.w. first ball, making the third leg of a hat-trick. Bob, by the way, did later in the season score a run.

Our only loss, and only batting failure, was to Burwood in Round 15. After being 0-38 we achieved 101 with opener Cole being 9th out for 48.

The final was against Canterbury. We won by an innings and 42 runs. As a game it was disappointing being so one-sided. But there were two wonderful individual efforts. John Pigott made 166 - a Club record. He had not touched a bat for three months, took a few overs to have a look and then broke the bowlers hearts. The Pigott coverdrive made up for much of the jabbing and prodding that went on during the season. Graeme Cole bowled his best ever for the Club and took 5-56 in the first innings. Then, in the second innings, with a wet ball for much of the time, he took 9-69. He had taken the first nine wickets, so in an effort to get Graeme the lot, the Captain bowled. Directing his attack (as usual) two feet wide of the stumps he somehow hit an edge and unfortunately someone caught it. The one regret about Graeme's bowling effort was that we didn't see how some good batsmen would have fared. Though overshadowed by Pigott and Cole, there were two other outstanding performances in the Final. Chris Relton went in at a very delicate 5-97 and had a

stand with Pigott of 199. Chris' 63 was a fine innings, always composed and quite chanceless. Bob Turner took 4-24 in Canterbury's first innings off 18 extremely accurate overs. Bob's accuracy has much to do with getting wickets for the bowlers at the other end.

A couple of the season's statistics are worthy of note. In the 15 matches in which there was play, we were only dismissed three times. Only once did an opposing team score over 200.

Turning to individuals, Graeme Cole was the outstanding performer. He finished as the most successful bowler, which was no mean feat. His emergence as an opening batsman had much to do with the improved batting results. He made at least 20 every time he opened and only once was there an opening partnership less than 37 when he went in first. He is of course, a superb field, although very little went to him in slips.

Phil Schofield had one of his best seasons. Before Xmas he was the leading bowler and given a little more help from the wickets would have had really outstanding figures.

Ray Bayfield, as always, bowled extremely well. So often did he beat everything. Against Ryde, the batsmen were totally incapable of putting bat to ball. Ray is the man I would most recommend young players to model themselves on in playing cricket the way it should be played.

Bob Turner was as accurate as ever and collected his usual bag of wickets. In three seasons with the Club he is yet to be collared. Bob was a great help as vice-captain and was always dedicated to winning by the shortest possible route.

Chris Relton did good things with both bat and ball and in the field. He has much talent, but is one who would do even better if he used his head more. Not often enough did he do things like bowl the well disguised faster ball he successfully used in the Final.

Keeper Clem Barrington after being sidelined with injury at the start of the season performed admirably again. Clem was more unobtrusive than before which meant he did his difficult job even better.

Alex Taylor batted very well. He was out for less than double figures only once in the season and, but for a string of doubtful l.b.w.'s against him, would have made many more runs. Alex showed more sprightliness in the field and took the catch of the season at Epping.

Peter Ward had a poor season. Apart from his fine innings at Burwood early on, he couldn't get going. His bowling suffered because he didn't get the new ball and the pitches gave him no help.

In past reports I have tried to avoid the "in conclusion" platitudes. But I must say that no captain could have been associated with a better bunch of fellows than the "seconds" of these last 3 seasons.

THIRD ELEVEN REPORT.

Unlike my counterparts, Messrs Bundy and Lucas, on the preceding pages, I am unable to tell the story of a competition winning team. But the performance of the Thirds, in finishing second in their Division of the 'C' Grade, is indicative of the depth of strength in the Club last season, and is a performance of which I am most proud, when the wayward results of past seasons are considered.

The figures at the end of this report show that the thirds managed to average 164 runs per innings, against an opposition average of109. Predictably, from these figures we were a team whose strength was its bowling, which was backed by batting which was usually adequate.

We lost two games in November, at exam time, and did not record a further loss until March, in a fixture which I beleive determined the result of this 'C' Grade Premiership. This fixture was against the ultimate premiers, Wentworthville, who thouroughly deserved their success in this, their first season of M & S Cricket.

In a season otherwise noteworthy for the wonderful team spirit and sense of responsibility in the Thirds, this Wentworthville fixture struck the only sour note. As every member of the team knew, the game had to be won to give us the Competition lead. Yet four members of the side were over an Lour late, resulting in our starting at a psychological disadvantage, as well as losing the advantage of one of the few tosses we won.

Two of thes gentlemen (?) spent half the morning chasing one another out to Penrith, because they had not bothered to find out where Wentworthville is.

I would not claim we would have beaten Wentworthville, who are the strongest all-round 'C' Division team I have seen,

however, had every player been on time, I doubt that the almost total surrender which did occur, would have taken place.

It was our bowling which carried us to our position in the Competition. The club had, in this season, its greatest ever wealth of pace bowling talent. After the lst. and 2nd. XI's had taken some of the cream of this talent, the thirds obtained the services of Lowe, Southwell-Keely, Emery and Preiss. This was the most hostile attack in the club, for the prime stock-in-trade of three of these gentlemen is sheer pace, which is combined with matching temperament. As a result of the Blitzkreig attack delivered by this Panzer division of pace, the highest total recorded against us was 131, (Yes! by the Fourths!) and those who bowled with less menace rarely had the opportunity to display their ability.

After a season of considerable disaster in higher grades,
Ian Lowe showed that he had lost neither pace, nor skill, and
had a superb season in which he went wicketless only once. As
an eleventh hour selection for the 'A'Grade final he proved
his seeason's form by adding 6 'A' Grade wickets to the 49 he
took in this team. Paul Emery deals mainly in moving the ball
at a slightly less malicious pace than his fellows, and usually
shared the new ball. Apart from an early season lapse when
he clearly considered that first slip was the wicket, he
usually maintained pressure and made batsmen play at each
delivery. Unfortunately for Dick Preiss, near-misses don't
count, or his average might have been in the P.S-K: bracket.

In the first five games, Peter Southwell-Keely took 25 wickets for 87 runs. To have sustained this performance would have been comparable to a batsman scoring a ton at each visit to the wicket, and also would have resulted in Pete becoming a permanent member of higher grades. He was, in this season, both the fastest bowler in the Club, and in the Competition.

His performance against Bankstown, speaks for itself. After some frightful batting by us, Bankstown needed only 35 to win outright. In four overs, he took 5-4, and we could almost scent victory, with the score at 5-16. Some forth-right batting by their captain took them to victory, but this was a spell of fast bowling worthy of some far higher grade of cricket.

Our bowling was backed by excellent fielding, which rarely varied in standard. Ron Quinn was neat and efficient behind the stumps, Dick Preiss outstanding in slips, while John Phipps set the example in the open spaces. Overall every player did his best, and the result was consistently good.

All our losses, and the disappointing draw against Cumberland I can be directly attributed to batting which lacked the essentials. Usually we managed to make enough runs for the bowlers to do the rest, but that was all. It was a case of batting talent not realised, plus a traditional third grade weakness of not getting a start. Since 1964-5 there has not been a 3rd XI opening partnership in excess of 50. Had Alan Ridley and Phil Crossley played a full season, I am sure that this would not have been the case, but Alan seemed to be on semi permanent 2nd XI duty (Where he never did himself justice) while Phil played only late in the season. Phil played an outstanding innings at Wentworthville when he carried his bat for 63, and almost single handed saved us from outright defeat. Dick Preiss also showed more skill than a no.9 on that occasion.

John Phipps and Hugh Hopkins consistently got themselves out, being invariably caught in blatantly set traps. Both love to hit the ball hard, but must curb this admirable tendency and look at the field placings occasionally if the are to succeed. Ron Quinn also suffered from over impetuosity, but came good at the end of the season, when he had accutomed himself to

turf wickets. Jim Dormon failed to live up to the promise shown in 1966-7, whilst we missed the tenacious batting of Stan Livingstone, who, for the first time on record, missed the greater part of the season due to being unfit for various reasons.

That was the third grade season. We had more success than ever before, and played the game in the right spirit. The loss of Ian Lowe and P.S-K. next year (due to overseas study) will mean rebuilding of the XI, and will throw more responsibility on to the batsmen.

Ian Lowe leaves the club with a 100% captaincy record. Twice during the season in my absence, he led the team to outright points. Although this was partly due to a spurious tactic of bribery of his team-mates (not emulated by the captain despite the encouragement of the tippling members of the team) it was a just achievement for one of the finest club members we have had. As Vice-captain, Ian helped maintain the team spirit which made this season memorable for all the players.

Bruce Dockrill, although having only a fair season with the ball was a very useful member of the team both batting and fielding. I'm sure he will be greatly missed next season as he leaves the Club (due to work) for some time and I'm sure the 4th XI and the Club join me in wishing him all the best and hope it will not be too long before we will see him bowling those benders at David Philips again.

I would like to congratulate our stablemates the 3rd XI and their 'noble leader' on their showing in the 'C' Shires finishing second, behind Wentworthville, too strong a side for 'C' Shires. Invariably clashes between 3rd's and 4th's turn out to be the great games of cricket as shown in the last encounter this season. During this game T.C.'s face showed worry on more than one occasion especially when we scored the highest completed score against them for the season - congratulations.

Finally I would like to thank the team members for their support and co-operation and it was a pleasure to lead them during the season. The team was enthusiastic at all times, despite our limited success and I feel sure enjoyed their cricket - I look forward to playing with them next season.

FIFTH X1

An unusually poor approach to the game was the fighting fifths get up and win the first match of the season. Due to the fact that a full team rolled up (by 2.15 p.m.), North Sydney Vets were limited to the meagre total of 7-136 (split batting time). At 1-10, Read joined Downes at the crease and they contributed a record 110 runs (Read 54), Downes 47) before Read was run out after hitting down to long-on. Soon after this however, the performances deteriorated to a considerable extent, but the team struggled through to victory.

It is a pity that interest wanes as the season progresses, but a combination of the long vacation 'where many country players return home weakening all grades, though inevitable, the fifths most of all), unprepared grounds (e.g. Prince Henry) and poor equipment (e.g. no bails, one decent bat), affected the teams roll up and performance.

A few of these problems can, and must be overcome by next season as the club is, to be quite frank, deriving a bad name in the eyes of the other clubs. This could affect the chances of the U.N.S.W.C.C. entering Grade Cricket. It is also quite embarrassing for those members of the Team who do manage to arrive for a game.

By replacing poor equipment with new and ample equipment so that every grade kit is as good as the next, the first problem is solved. The allocation of David Phillips South to the fifths next season should cancel out the unprepared pitch factor. Finally a more active recruiting campaign among the freshers and, Finally a more active recruiting at university in the latter half of in particular, those enrolling at university in the latter half of the cricket season would be highly beneficial to the fifths and the clubs strength and status as a whole. The new on-campus practice pitches and nets should prove a valuable aspect and games on the village green should also egender interest and hence recruit players.

In conclusion I would like to thank all those hard-core, devoted and cavalier types who have managed to see out this last season in the fifths. With the spirit, enthusiasm and interesting, if unorthodix (eg. O'Loan's batting, Howard's catching, Bell's keeping and Fogarty's bowling) cricket these fellows possess, we are generally "certs" to win our share of matches with just 9 or 10 players.

I only took over the helm of the fifths in the last six weeks, but I can promise a real game of cricket to look forward to each weekend during next season, hook or by crook.

Coming through Swansea on the way it looked like no play would be possible in the whole match, but thanks to an enthusiastic groundsman, play started an hour before stumps. No wickets were lost that night, but on the second morning, with the wicket still damp we fell victim to Whitehead et al, and were all out for 113 - Horwitz 39 the only innings of note.

Newcastle batted, and at stumps were 6/207, thanks to some shocking fielding by New South Wales (which drew Vice-Chancellorish criticism). The third day, however, was ours. The last three Newcastle wickets were captured for six more runs, and then, in four hours we scored 293. The highlight of the innings was a superb knock of 129 by David Wills, supported by Andrews (52), Horwitz (35) and Wells (39 not out).

This left Newcastle with 200 to win in 150 minutes. They achieved it mainly through Steve Tarbox, whose 118 not out was at least as good as Will's. So we lost, but not nearly as dismally as in the first innings.

Sydney University, led by Ron Alexander, won the toss and elected to bat on a docile pitch.

The visitors amassed the rather large total of 317 runs due mainly to the batting of skipper Alexander and the indifferent fielding of UNSW. Alexander produced strokes worthy of a class player but his performance was marred by giving six chances in a total of I36 runs. He was given good support by Peter Jones (46) in a 6th wicket partnership of 84 runs.

The NSW attack was reasonably tight with Max Jones excelling in a sustained effort of medium fast bowling. That the weather was extremely hot adds even more to this effort. Chris Relton produced probably his best display of bowling for the club and his controlled off-spinners were a source of constant worry to the batsmen. Pratley's leg-spinners provided support for these bowlers.

NSW commenced their innings and were in trouble at 2 for 40 with Cole and Herbert back in the pavilion. 'N•ddy' James and David Wills retrieved the position with a third wicket partnership of IO7 before Wills left with 42 runs. James continued on his way to a well deserved IO7 runs and his dismissal was due more to fatigue than to the bowling. The loss of 4 wickets for only 9 runs put NSW in a precarious position but a 10 wicket partnership of 56 runs between Jim Pratley and Max Jones put the home team with-in reach with a total of 280, 37 runs behind. Sydney University representative bowler Mick Pawley finished with 5 for 92.

On the final day NSW were without the services of Max Jones due to illness. This left the side with a depleted bowling attack.

Nevertheless Dave Gillard assumned this added responsibility and mainly caused the position of 6 for 43 that Sydney found themselves. Relton continued where he had left off from the first innings andprovided support for Gillard. At lunch Sydney was 8 for 96. Mick Pawley then hit hard and often to compile 39 runs and Sydney totaled 172.

This left UNSW only a little time to score the required 210 runs to win and after losing Healey and James, both run out, the batsmen just played out time..

REPORT ON THE SOUTHERN TOUR

Participants in the long-awaited Southern Tour left Sydney early in January. Eleven made the trip to Tasmania, while one (the redoubtable Peter Horwitz) eschewed the beauties of the island state, preferring to remain in the comparative safety of Melbourne. The team was a happy one, and even the ill fortune which prevented it from returning undefeated only temporarily dampened spirits.

In both Hobart and Melbourne the team stayed in residental colleges. It is a tribute to the good sense of all participants that the managements of both colleges expressed willingness to accommodate teams from this Club on future occasions.

The first match of the tour was the inaugural Inter-Varsity against the University of Tasmania. The home team won the toss and elected to bat on a grassier wicket than those to which we are accustomed. Jones and Gillard opened the bowling, but were unable to separate the opening pair. When McEachran broke the partnership at 30, State representative Graham Farrell treated us to some delightful batting and the score mounted quite rapdily. Captain Jim Pratley cut short his promising innings in the thirties, bringing to the crease Lewis, who played a hard-hitting knock to top-score with 47. After his departure the innings sagged, and only a somewhat precarious partnership of 25 for the last wicket enabled Tasmania to reach the modest total of 193. Our best bowler was Max Jones, hostile throughout to finish with 4-44 from 15 overs, with solid support from Phil McEachran, whose accurate bowling was rewarded by 3 wickets. Graham Cole enlivened the closing stages of the innings, taking 2-16 in two action-packed overs.

We battled after tea, and early misfortune struck when a mid-pitch misunderstanding resulted in the loss of Cole. Rogers joined Harry Herbert, and was just starting to take control when he pulled a long hop straight to the hands of deep backward square leg. Wills played quietly until stumps, and on the second morning he took charge completely to compile 88 and pilot us to a first innings lead. After he lost his wicket at 213, only Pratley stayed with Herbert for any length of time. When the innings was closed at 8-303, Herbert had carried his bat for a patient 113, defying the local bowlers for over 6 hours and hitting 11 boundaries. It was a match-winning effort.

Tasmania again started soundly, with the openers adding 22 before Jones took the first wicket. Cole then struck for three quick wickets, including the prized scalp of Farrell, and two good catches from the bowling of Gillard to send the home team crashing to 6-70. The match took on a lighter note the next morning with Rogers and Andrews opening the bowling and Ridley claiming the last wicket with the total 140.

Needing 30 to win, we opened with Ridley and Gillard. The locals landed a strong assault, capturing three wickets in the first two overs, but Andrews and Ridley weathered the storm to carry us to a comfortable win before lunch on the third day.

After a day spent in absorbing local colour, the team flew to Melbourne and made the long journey to Monash University. A team training run through the grounds of that institution tapered off preparations for the attempt to deut the home team's proud record of Inter-Varsity victories.

We won the toss and batted, losing the wicket of Cole with the total at 9. Rogers then joined Herbert, and the two consolidated the position until Rogers was adjudged l.b.w. for 31. Wills dominated the scene until he too fell victim to an l.b.w. decision. After Harry Herbert was dismissed at 157, the innings sagged slightly but 200 was passed with only six wickets down. Four curious l.b.w. decisions then rapidly terminated the innings, giving the umpires a near-record tally of six such decisions and us a total of 228.

Gillard and McEachran each captured a wicket before stumps, at which Monash stood 2-24. Fielding on the second day in above-century heat, the N.S.W. team dismissed the powerful Monash batting line-up for only 129 in a sustained display of determination. Jones, Horwitz, McEachran and Pratley all bowled well on a pitch that played rather unevenly, and the "big-name" batsmen folded up one by one. Only Chapman stayed any length of time, hitting 8 fours in a dashing innings of 46.

Batting on the same wearing wicket after fielding in the extreme heat, we fared even worse. Only Horwitz (19) and Wills (10) of the early batsmen reached double figures, and only a partnership of 27 by captain Pratley, who top scored with 21, and opening bowler Dave Gillard enabled us to who top scored with 21, and opening bowler Dave Gillard enabled us to reach the meagre total of 89. With a furious assault in the closing minutes, Jones and Gillard removed the first three Monash batsmen for only four runs to leave the match very delicately poised, with the balance cast a little our way by the crumbling wicket. 21 wickets had fallen on this second day and it seemed unlikely that the wicket would improve.

Unhappily, the wicket miraculously improved overnight and was a perfect batting strip for the third day. Chapman played another magnificent innings for Monash, and our fielding gradually deteriorated in the exhausting conditions. After some tense moments following the dismissal of Chapman, Seiler piloted the home team to victory by four wickets.

A festive trip back to Sydney concluded the tour, a successful venture to the south. In conclusion, I would like to thank the members of the team for making my job as manager a pleasant and uncomplicated one.
