PRESIDENT'S REPORT

Gentlemen,

The Eleventh Annual Report and Financial Statement of the University of New South Wales Cricket Club are presented herewith.

During the 1960-61 season the Club participated in the Municipal and Shires competition in the "A" and "B" divisions. We congratulate Pennant Hills, the "A" Division Premiers, and Lane Cove, the Premiers in the "B" Division. The Club also fielded two teams which played one-day matches organised by the City and Suburban Cricket Association.

In December the Club, in conjunction with the University of Sydney Cricket Club, organised an Intervarsity Carnival, in which teams from the Universities of Queensland, New England, Sydney and New South Wales participated. Our team contained players from Newcastle University College in addition to Club members. The matches were played at the University Cvals at Sydney and Kensington. A similar carnival was held in Melbourne, where the Universities of Adelaide, Tasmania and Melbourne played in a triangular tournament. The purpose of these carnivals was to assist the selection of a Combined Universities side to play the West Indies in Canberra. Unfortunately heavy rain prevented play on the first two days of the carnival in Sydney, but, by re-arrangement of the programme, each team played three matches and none of the matches had to be abandoned, although the actual playing time was curtailed. Our Secretary, Clem Barrington, did a wonderful job in organising the carnival at short notice.

One of the highlights of the Carnival was a dinner at the Coogee Bay Hotel, where our Vice-President, former Test Umpire, Mr. George Borwick, as guest speaker, related anecdotes concerning famous incidents and great players in Test cricket. Our Club is proud that one of our players, Tarry Lee, gained selection in the match against the West Indies and distinguished himself by making the second highest score (42) in the Combined Side's first innings. Our congratulations go to the captain, Bob Mihell of Queensland who scored an unconquered century in the second innings. It would be very gratifying if all future international teams were to play a match against a Combined Universities side. Although the Carnival differed somewhat from the regular intervarsity visits, it may well become a standard pattern for the future. Until the 1960-61 season our only intervarsity matches had been against Queensland, and we should like to think that matches against Sydney and New England will be played regularly.

PRESIDENT'S REPORT, CONT.

The Club also played the annual match against Newcastle University College at Newcastle. Matches were also played against the University Regiment and the Scots College. Details of these matches are given in the report.

As in previous years there was little social activity. The annual dance at the end of the season was very poorly attended. I make an appeal to all members to support the Club's social functions. If these are well attended, the social committee will feel justified in arranging a more extended social programme. About twenty Club members attended a dinner at Aaron's Hotel to farewell Ted Watton, who is spending a year in England.

The Committee is pleased to report that sight boards were erected at University Oval, Kensington, during the season. New nets have been installed at the improved practice wickets and the dressing pavilion is nearing completion. A picket fence is to be erected around the Oval. Last season the Club had the use of Prince Henry Oval at Little Bay. A curator has been appointed and the University authorities plan to make improvements to this ground by the erection of a pavilion and sight boards. The University has acquired land at Daceyville and two unfenced cricket grounds are being prepared on this site, so that the University will have four grounds available for cricket.

The objective of the committee is the acceptance of the Club into the District Grade competition. Consequently, we need more support from younge undergraduates so that we can have sufficient players to field four teams in the District Competition, if the Club is granted grade status in the near future.

CAPTAIN'S REPORT

MUNICIPAL AND SHIRES "A" TEAM 1960-61.

The overall performance of the First Eleven during last season could be regarded as moderately successful, team finished 9th in the competition compared with 6th in 1959-60. Despite a reduction in our points tally from 48 the middle of the competition table. Two deplorable perfor—Auburn—Lidcombe proved impossible to transcend. We cannot university team has the talent to climb well up the competition rigorous, both in attack and defence. This is where our weakness lies in attitude rather than ability.

I must hasten to qualify my remarks about our batting by referring to two of the finest fighting innings that I have ever witnessed in any grade of cricket. Against Sutherland on a rain damaged wicket which strongly favoured the bowlers, Mike Reidy scored a chanceless 60 out of a total of 84, one other batsman contributing 12. Mike's innings of less than an hour was a combination of forceful stroke making and determined defence; he hit eight fours in his sixty. Season, Professor Jack Salmon, in his first match for the

University, scored a chanceless 59, including 12 fours and one six. This was Cambridge batting at it's best. Harold Bundy performed well on this occasion too, with a fighting 41 not out.

If only we could marshall our batting forces more as we did against Bexley early in the season! Faced with 208 by the Bexley team, Harold Bundy and Robin Lucas scored 116 in our best opening stand for some time. Harold contributed 86 and Robin 67.

Among Mike Reidy's other scores were 41 against Burwood, 88 against Epping, 37 not out against Lane Cove, 36 against Pennant Hills, 76 against Burwood, and 41 against Canterbury. Mike must get more support from the rest of us; too often he is left to "carry the baby".

Harold Bundy again performed well on occasions. I predict a really good season next year for Harold - if he resists the temptation to "have a go" as he resisted it against Lane Cove - result 41 N.O.

Tim Creer and Don Clarke batted well at times and both are improving with every season.

Our bowling, once again, proved to be our most consistent and reliable department. Only four times was the 200 mark reached by the opposing team. Duncan Marshall and John Middleton were our two best bowlers throughout the year. Duncan leading the averages with 27 wickets for 14.22 apiece and John heading the wicket takers with 35 at an average of 15.45. Against Sutherland John captured 7 for 10 and Duncan 3 for 1 to dismiss the opposition for 19 - enough to have the result of the match reported in the A.B.C. Sporting . Roundup on the Saturday evening. Duncan secured the excellent figures of 8 for 50 against the strong Burwood batting line up. We can look forward to some excellent bowling from Duncan in the coming season.

If our batting can continue it's trend evident in the final couple of matches our team performance should improve substantially on that of last season.

Finally I would again offer my sincere thanks to the team for it's unswerving support both on and off the field. I feel that we are slowly welding ourselves into a cricketing unit playing as a team and really enjoying it.

CAPTAIN'S REPORT

MUNICIPAL AND SHIRES "B" TEAM (1960-61 SEASON)

The team won one match outright and three on the first innings. Against Roseville, University led on the first innings and was defeated outright by one run, in a thrilling finish off the last ball of the day. Three matches were lost on the first innings, two were lost outright, two were drawn and two more abandoned because of rain.

As in previous seasons, the team lost several of it's best players to the first IX during the vacation period (January - February) and was not at full strength for these matches. The outstanding player of the season was Phil Schofield, who is the best bowler the "B" team has had since Vernon Turner played in 1952-53. Unfortunately for the team, Phil went to the firsts for four matches, but returned to register some fine bowling performances in the last two games against Sutherland and Auburn-Lidcombe. Another fine bowling performance was given by Sam Soper, who finished with 7 for 41 against Roseville.

The batting generally was a little better than in previous years, but there were no big opening partnerships to give the team a good start. The best innings of the season was Don Clark's 102 not out against Auburn-Lidcombe. Peter Ward, Barry Andrews and Alex Taylor were usually reliable and Geoff Garland played a few good hands. Sam Soper and Tan Scott were useful "down the list" batsmen; Ian surprised everyone with a hard hit 50 not out against Burwood.

The fielding, although never brilliant, was quite satisfactory and keener than in previous seasons. Darryl Lacey was always alert and took some good catches, including a beauty off Peter Ward's bowling at Roseville. Sam Soper was keen and safe in the field, and the younger players would do well to follow his example.

Perhaps the most promising newcomer was Frank Martin, who only played in three matches at the end of the season. Frank has real pace, combined with accuracy. It is my opinion that, with plenty of practice, Frank will greatly improve and will become a great asset to the club.

I think that the team played well together and showed real enthusiasm, which is essential to the full enjoyment of cricket.

CAPTAIN'S REPORT

CITY & SUBURBAN "A" TEAM (1960-61)

This year the "A" team did not perform very well at all.

Below is a summary of the year's results:-MATCHES PLAYED 20; MATCHES CANCELLED2; WON 5; LOST 15.

I think that the main reason for the team's poor showing was the fact that it was never well balanced. Something like 53 players took part in the matches played, and as captain, I was never really able to find what these players were capable of.

Individual inconsistency was also another factor. Quite often when our bowling was successful our batting would fail.

However, I think that all those who played in the team will agree when I say that it was a most enjoyable season. Some brilliant cricket was seen from the opposing teams and occassionally some members of the home team showed a little sparkle. I don't think any of us who played at Hunter's Hill will ever forget the century made by their opener, R. Beard, will ever forget the century made by their opener, R. Beard, This excellent batsman crashe 17 boundaries (14 fours and 3 sixes) in his innings which lasted only 55 minutes. By far the best batting display by a University batsman, was by opener Alan Morgan, who knocked the strong I Zingari "A" bowling attack to all parts of the field in a whirlwind 57 (10 fours). Alan was finally caught on the boundary. The tragedy of that match was that none of our other batsmen could back him up and the whole team was dismissed for only 96.

I think that overall, our bowling attack was stronger than our batting. Many fine bowlers passed through the team. Phil Rowe came to us late in the season and showed excellent control and proved he was a very "heady" bowler. "Fresher" Don Brown showed much promise.

The safest fieldsman was Dave Brennan but overall the field ing was not good, and I feel that much more practice in the pre-season period should be devoted to ground fielding and returns to the wicket.

CAPTAIN'S REPORT

CITY & SUBURBAN "B" TEAM 1960-61.

The season opened on a very high note, when we fielded quite a promising side made up of youth and experience with a fair reserve of young players whom we were just not able to play in the first round. It was no time, however, before we were in the usual position (for us), of fielding a depleted side or calling upon "stop-gap" players. This, ofcourse, is hardly the way to promote and encourage team spirit and performance and I can only reiterate my statement of last season that this was one of the chief causes of our unimpressive record.

In a season from 17th September, 1960, to 1st April, 1961, (with six weeks suspended in the Xmas-New Year period) our schedule was:-

Matches 22; Won 1; Drawn 1; Lost 12; Forfeits given 2;

Forfeits received 1; Cancelled 5:/

Our sole win was against Lare Cove at Prince Henry Hospital, but four matches were lost by a margin of less than twenty runs, three of these by less than ten runs. In all, we scored 1013 runs for the loss of 114 wickets (average 8.88) and our opponents scored 1729 in losing 101 wickets (av. 17.12) Statistics which tell their own story.

There were few highlights in what was, in general, a disappointing season, but one which is outstanding was the

innings of 81 by John Salmon against Paddington, when we made our highest total of the season (175) only to go down by the bare four runs in the last over of the day. I, unfortunately, was not present then, but all reports of the innings were in glowing terms, and we were disappointed to lose such a player to the Shires so late in the season. Next best was a very nice 55 by Wal burke against Waverly Veterans but, even this could not save us from defeat by 8 runs in the closing minutes.

Bede Nairn and Wal Burke did not produce their consistency of the season before, although they still managed to finish first and second in both averages and aggregates once mote. Bryan Smith showed solidity on most occasions and Hugh Johnston has the distinction of being amongst the only three to top a hundred runs for the season, his 32 not out against Balmain (at Birchgrove) in impossible batting conditions almost winning the game for us. Some of the "freshers" performed creditably in this department, notably Bruce Dockrill, Ken Le Quesne, Ian King, and Bruce McFarland, and we look forward to better and consistent deed from them in 1961/62.

Despite that nearly 1600 runs were scored from it, the bowling was not our weakest point. Certainly we need a good opening combination (this problem may be solved in the persons of Ken Le Quesne and Bruce Dockrill) and tighter spin bowling, but this seems difficult, not only to achieve, but maintain. Jack Tuckwell topped the aggregates and averages with 33 wickets at 10.67 runs and deserved his success. Gary Stephens bowled creditably well carly in the season till he left for the higher grades (taking 10 wickets at 11.1) and I amnaged to collect 27 "scalps" at 11.37 apiece. In all, sixteen bowlers were tried and this, to me, gives a fair indication of the irregular complement of our teams and the search we conducted for bowling ability. Very late in the season, Ken Le Quesne abd "ruce Dockrill bowled very well, the latter with intelligence and economy.

Our fielding in the main, was down on the previous year's standard, some very easy catches being spilled. It was left to "freshers" like Bruce a cFarland and Carl Berglin to show that there are as many catches "made" as presented. Harold Oliver performed excellently behind the stumps for most of the season (a difficult position when one is taking such a variety of bowlers), and Ian King showed polish and promise during the last few games.

My remarks of last season still hold as regards the "luke-warm" attitude of many of our members and good results will not come until our teams are regular and full in complement Too often we were shorthanded or had to field "makeshift" players (at times from the opposition teams) culminating in the ludicrous position in our last game when we fielded only eight mer. The grounds situation throughout the season was much

improved and, whilst Prince Henry Hospital Oval is very good, change room facilities are an urgent "must". The situation regarding Centennial Park is no better and the sooner we can completely avoid playing there, the better. The ground fees levied for shocking facilities is a disgrace.

Despite these set-backs, the team enjoyed it's cricket and played the games in good spirit. My thanks go out to them and my wishes that 1961/62 will see a greater and more consistent increase in the standard of our performances.

INTERVARSITY,

During the season 1960-61 a Combined Australian Universities Cricket Team had the honour of playing a visiting international team, the West Indies, for the first time since the war. This was indeed a great achievement for University cricket; and the officials who made the game possible must be congratulated. There seems to be no reason why a similar match should not be included in the itinerary of other touring sides.

To be able to select a Combined team from the Universities of every State, it was necessary to devise a scheme whereby as many players as possible could be seen together, so that each player had an equal opportunity for selection. Hence it was decided that the Universities be divided into two zones, Queensland, Sydney, New England and New South Wales comprising the north zone (playing in Sydney) whilst Adelaide, Tasmania and Melbourne, comprising the South Zone 9playing in Melbourne). A series of matches was played in each zone, from which selectors nominated players for the final team of fourteen. This was selected by telephone between the selectors of both zones. Western Australia, being unable to play in the south zone matches, because long distance of travel were involved, were allowed to nominate two players who were included in the final team of fourteen.

This final team of fourteen assembled in Canberra, where they played a match against a Combined Services team at Duntroon. The eleven players to represent the Combined Universities against the West Indies were selected from this match. Congratulations go to all eleven on their selection and on their performances.

The three trial matches to be played in Sydney were to be of two days duration, but owing to rain over the first three days, they were reduced to three one-day matches. This did not hinder the excellent performances of some of the players. Permission was obtained from A.U.S.A. for the last match, Queensland v's New South Wales, to be classed this possible, the Queensland players remained in Sydney for the extra day.

The Combined carnival was concluded by a dinner at the Coogee Bay Hotel in true Inter-Varsity tradition. We owe thanks to our Vice-President Mr. George Borwick, for one of his ever popular talks, the climax of a most successful function. I add my own thanks to all those people who helped make the Combined carnival a success and to Bob Mihell and his Queensland team for their most unexpected personal gift to me.

Auditor shall examine the accounts of the Club, ascertain that the books are properly kept, and report upon the Balance Sheet, and Statement of Receipts and payments submitted to him by the Hon. Treasurer. The Hon. Auditor shall be satisfied that all monies are properly accounted for, and that all documents and valuable securities are in safe keeping."

Clause 45

To be altered by deleting the words "through the Club delegates," and inserting in place thereof the words "or through the other delegate."

DUTIES OF HONORARY TREASURER:

To be altered to read: "The Hon. Treasurer shall receive and disburse the monies of the Club as authorised by the Committee or the Executive. He shall keep account of all such transactions, and the books of account shall always be open to the inspection of members of the Committee. shall lodge in a bank, approved by the Committee, all monies received by him, and shall present to each meeting of the Club an up-to-date financial Statement, together with the Bank Pass Sheet. financial statement shall show movements of funds since the previous meeting, together with details of amounts due to and/or by the Club at the date of the financial statement. He shall present an Audited Balance Sheet and Statement of Receipts and payments to the Annual General Meeting.

Clause 46a

The following Clause to be added: "DUTIES OF HON. TEAMS SECRETARY."

The Hon. Teams Secretary shall act as convenor of the Selection Committee, and shall be responsible for notifying players of their selection.

All Clauses contained within in the Club's Constitution, and as amended or added by Motions passed at this meeting, subject to ratification by the Sports Association, shall be renumbered consecutively from one (1) onwards.
