

PRESIDENT'S REPORT

On any view, the 1986/87 season, being a vast improvement over last year, was a success. First Grade improved from twelfth position to fifth, missing out on a semi-final spot on percentages. All other teams, other than Seconds, improved their position on the Competition Table. Eighth place this year in the Club Championship is evidence of the overall improvement. Although not shown by results in the Poidevin-Gray Competition our victory in the Inter-Varsity Competition suggests that the strength of our undergraduates is improving. As these players develop next season the result should be a marked improvement especially in the Poidevin-Gray Competition.

In a review of the season during a Management Committee meeting it was suggested that the reasons for the Club's improvement were basically twofold. Firstly, First Grade performed nearer to its potential and, so often happens, the success of First Grade permeated right through the Club. The success of First Grade is due in no small measure to Henry Lawson. His leadership of the Club as First Grade Captain was outstanding. Practices were far more organised and, therefore, more beneficial to all who participated. It was gratifying to see Henry's enthusiasm, knowledge and hard work reflected in improved First Grade and overall Club performances.

The second reason was that the Club was well organised at the start of the year. A good level or organisation requires a hard working Committee and I can honestly say that most people on the Management Committee fulfilled their allotted tasks. Leon Darmady as Secretary, Elvin Robb as Team Secretary and Greg Holt, who almost single handedly organised a most successful Inter-Varsity Competition deserve special mention for their continued work for the Club. Greg Livingstone, who not only captained First Grade in Henry's absence also helped in the recruitment and coaching of undergraduates. The Club is fortunate to be well represented in both the Sydney Cricket Association and the New South Wales Cricket Association by Terry Buddin who was the inaugural Chairman of the Sydney Cricket Association and a delegate to the New South Wales Cricket Association.

My thanks to the University for such fine facilities for the Club. I cannot think of any other club in the Sydney competition which offers such good facilities. The wickets, especially the Village Green have been exemplary. The fact that the University and the Club were able to successfully hold a four day representative game on the Village Green brings credit to both the University and the Club. The Club is indeed fortunate to be able to provide facilities in the Sydney Grade Competition that are second to none.

Eighth position in the Club Championahip should be viewed as a base from which to make a concerted effort to take out the flag. One ingredient required for any successful club is the recruitment of good players. I would like to express, on behalf of the Club, our thanks to Henry Lawson for his generosity concerning the Sporting Scholarship to first year University students. The benefits which the Club will obtain from such a Scholarship are immense. I hope next year we capitalise on the progress made during 1986/87.

FIRST GRADE REPORT

The performance of First Grade this season was very heartening. Equal fourth on the competition table with 62 points was an achievement, all the players associated with the side this year could be very pleased with what a great disappointment it was that we missed the semi-finals by a few tenths of a point. The playing staff was virtually the name as the previous season with just the loss of Dave Meagher and the addition of Greg Holt and Michael Ryan. Only thirteen different players were used all season and that indicated everyone performed as a team and not just a couple of individuals carrying the rest. One disappointment was our form in the 50 over competition. Our results in the shortened form of the game have been very poor and will need some serious thought next season.

Greg Livingstone had another outstanding year with the bat. He was once again the leading run getter and averaged almost 50. This year he achieved his success at number three, not his accustomed opening spot. Over 600 runs again proved his class and gave us a stable No.3 for the first time in many seasons.

A major reason for Livo's success at No.3 was the success of our new opening partnership of Baker and Holt. Harold in his initial season of First Grade and batting out of his usual middle order spot, did a very good job for his team. Even though he may have been disappointed at not making some more big scores himself, his contribution to the opening partnership and the team was extremely valuable. His safe hands at short-leg saw him top the catching statistics, he also stopped many runs by use of the shins and other bodily parts. Unfortunately it looks as though we will be losing him to the East Albury Crows in the coming year. His combination with Jamie saw four half century opening stands but more importantly on almost every occassion they saw out at least the first thirty minutes play. As a result Livo rarely faced the opening bowlers at their peak.

Jamie made almost 500 runs and not always in a dour manner. His 71 off 76 balls against Parramatta was a key innings in a magnificent run chase for outright victory. It would be good to see him convert some of his long innings into hundreds. His leg-spinners began the season slowly but after mid-season hit the spot more regularly and finished with 25 wickets at 25 runs a piece which is very good wrist spinning, particularly on the flat Willage Green. Jamie's cricket still has much improving to do but he has the ability and determination to make the representative selectors take more notice.

Our number four bataman at seasons end seemed very unlikely at seasons beginning. Tony Pratt made four fine 50's during the year and played superbly under pressure. His partnership with Livo against Wests salvaged pride and almost the two points. He batted No. 9 in that match. Pratty missed the first 3 gauss due to a bad back and his bowling never seemed to regain the zip of the previous year. However, he still took eleven valuable wickets including "five for" against Balmain. At times we had four seem bowlers and Pratty couldn't get a trundle. His all round ability will be very valuable to us next season (as will his dressing-room conversation).

Chris Chapman had a very successful if limited year. He played only 10 matches due to a "mystery virus" (Morgam reckoned it was only morning sickness) but made almost 400 runs in typical attacking style. His unbeaten hundred against Saints was a mtch winner and he struck the ball well in every innings he played. In his 10 games he was involved with eight partnerships of 50 or more and this tells the story of our middle order consistency. Chappo's bowling statistics belie his real lack of talent in this department!

Jungle had his most disappointing year with the bat since the Tarago U/16's. This did not stop him from making a significant team contribution though. His 16 wickets at 21 almost won him the bowling average, he also made two half centuries including a 131 partnership with Chappo against St. George. His around the wicket "off-spinners" and 25 yarder will forever remain folklore when old-timers gather to discuss UNSW cricket. I still consider him a batsman - I wish he would.

Jacky Jourdain began the season in fine form, making a significant contribution to our victory over Randwick. He finished the season with only 240 runs but made good efforts on occassion in the chase for quick runs. He was frequently disrupted in the batting order by the captain jumping in front of him at the last moment. A modest individual performance by Jack but a valuable team one. If only we could get Delg to field for him more often.

James Dixon had an interesting season. The now legendary groin strain restricted his early season appearances and form. Another type of strain didn't help either, but in true Dixon style he fought back with some excellent bowling performances in the second half of the season. Disco probably set a few new records for beating the bat along the way to his 18 wickets at 23. He certainly deserved more success than the numbers indicate. Floppy's batting this year was a cause for concern. Maybe the success of the upper order never saw him under pressure, which he usually responds to. Hext year he will make runs (if only he would give up Rugby).

Dave Gallop had a very good season. His 29 wickets were the highest in Pirst Grade at a very commendable average of 23.31. Morgan bowls one of the best last outswingers in Grade Cricket and frequently made early breakthroughs with it. He worked hard on all aspects of his game throughout the year. If he can add another couple of yards or so of pace and tighten up his control a bit more he will be state squad material. His career may be shortened however, if he continues to follow through on his head! Morg's fielding improved greatly during the season and he discovered a niche in the slips.

Michael Ryan was promoted to First Grade after the first couple of rounds as the left arm orthodox spinner. Chocks bowling performances would have disappointed himself but he took some very good catches and his attitude during matches and training was excellent. Hopefully the experience of this season will be highly beneficial to Chock in the coming year.

Which brings me to Michael Stanley Back. I read with interest Dave Meagher's comments in last years annual report - quote "...a little older, more experienced and thankfully much calmer" unquote. I'd just like to endorse those statements although I'm not too sure about the latter. One thing is certain, Stan had an outstanding year behind the stumps. He set a new 1st Grade record (25/5) and generally performed with efficiency and

agility. The few chances he did miss were difficult ones and he took all the opportunities that you would expect. He certainly contributed to the bowlers performances by not giving batter's a second chance. Stan's keeping was probably in the top three in the competition, unfortunately his opportunities with the bat were limited. He was only dismissed twice all season and averaged 17. He would not bat No.11 in many other teams.

Orca played three games but with the preponderance of seam bowling and a very strong batting line-up meant he was getting little of either.

The overall view of the teams performance was just that - of a team (even the statistics back this up). Attendance at practice was excellent (as it should be for a 1st Grade team). The "youngsters" - Pratt, Gallop, Back worked hard at their games and reaped the rewards. Harold's improvement in technique and batting temperament was great to see. Livo and Chappo both showed that they are experienced and talented players. Jungle's bowling was an added bonus. Jamie's batting developed still further, while his bowling improved at seasons end and will imporve even more next year. Jacky showed that good old fashioned G and D are still vital factors in anyones game. Disco proved he has got considerable skill with the ball.

The Village Green was a delight to play on. We not only bowled well on a good batting track but we chased targets successfully six times.

Two outright victories in succession were fine achievements on perfect batting wickets. (I can't ever remember two outrights in a row in our 1st Grade history).

My thanks to the effort put in all season by the lads and to Livo who captained in my abscence. Also to Barry, Les and Peter Hickman for making the Village Green into one of, if not the best, grounds in Sydney. Thanks also to Slogger Boyce, Dave Lemon and the evergreen Jack Skiller who not only scored diligently and accurately but provided fine insight into our weekly performances. I would also like to publicly express my gratitude to my adorable and tolerant wife Julie who put in so much work to improve Pratty and Jungles afternoon tea and generally made 3.40 to 4.00pm Saturday more enjoyable.

The one overriding ingredient that made the season memorable was that we enjoyed our cricket greatly. A fine group! I was proud to be their captain.

SUMMARY OF EACH ROUND

1. UNSW 170 & 3/58 BEAT RANDWICK 123

We won the toss and batted. At 5/66 and Mike Whitney in full cry things didn't look too swish but Jacky Jourdain played a gutsy 245 minute knock for 63 n.o. and we reached 170. Next week the track had a couple of damp spots and the early introduction of Robson into the attack proved decisive. His final analysis of 22-12-29-2 pleased some and shocked many. Gallop 3-30 and Lawson 4-48 did the rest and the final margin was 47. A first up win to start the season.

2. SUTHERLAND 230 LOST TO U.N.S.W. 5/233

Sutherland batted on a very flat Village Green wicket. We bowled very well to hold them to only 230. Gallop again bowled well for this 4/48, Jungle 3/19 off 17 and Benry 2/35 off 19 headed the bowling figures. Mick Back made four good dismissals behind the stumps. Chasing was never a problem with Baker (46) Livingstone (70) Robson (48) and Chapman (36) all contributing handily.

3. ST. GEORGE 7/288 DEC. LOST TO U.N.S.W. 5/289

The Village Green was once again heaven to bat on. We stuck to our task all day and it was only good slogging by the last Saints pair that lifted them from 7/233. Once again the total was not enough for the visitors. A solid start of 65 by Baker (21) and Holt (42) set us away. Then from 3 for 87 Robson and Chapman put on 131, Jungle making 63. Finally 60 in 39 minutes from Chapman and Lawson (including some very long balls) put the seal on a very good victory. Chappo finished with a magnificent 112 n.o. in 218 minutes. Chasing the large total against a much vaunted attack, certainly gave us much confidence for the rest of the season. Three games played for three victories was unprecedented for a first grade beginning.

4. U.N.S.W. 169 DREW WITH WAVERLEY 3/129

Wever recovered after a bad first session, with only Jourdain (32) and Livingstone (24) getting starts in the middle order. Michael Back saved us at the death with 24 that ultimately enabled us to draw. Mick Ryan's initial 1st Grade innings saw him dropped 3 times before he had scored and was finally out hooking for 13. Wet weather and Morgan falling over (as usual) saved us 2 points and very lucky at that.

5. BALMAIN 9/241 DREW WITH U.N.S.W. 6/167

A great effort by the groundstaff allowed us to be one of the few games to start. Balmain were 5/100 but the wicket flattened out in the afternoon. Whereupon they blocked it out until 12.15 the following day. Pratt and Gallop stuck with it to take 5/70 and 3/47 respectively.

Rain early in our innings and a few quick wickets saw us struggle.

Peter Jourdain looked best with 38 but got out just as he was getting
on top of the bowling. Livingstone 57 n.o. and Gallop 27 n.o. played
well to secure the draw and two more points.

6. U.N.S.W. 205 LOST TO SYDNEY UNI. 6/208

Undisciplined early batting on a helpful wicket failed to support Jamie Baker (47). Chris Chapman (batting physical, emotional and financial pressure) scored a gutsy 46 and Tony Pratt gave us the first real taste of his batting ability with 52 in 161 mins. at No.9. It was really enough on S.U. No.2. A couple of catches went down and an easy run out was given not out. Dave Gallop came back well after a poor opening spell and Chook Ryan took his initial first grade wicket.

Looking back this was probably where we missed the semis - fancy S.U. being our downfall.

7. PETERSHAM 265 LOST TO U.N.S.W. 8/267

Another good all round bowling and fielding performance on a delightful batting strip saw Petes make 8/265 on the first day and all out 265 very quickly on the second. Gallop 2/63, Dixon 2/39, Robson 2/31 and Baker 3/54 all did well. A good start by the openers followed by a short shutter in the middle saw us go from 1/88 to 4/92. Lawson (43 in 39 mins) and Jourdain (55) put on 68 then Dixon and Jourdain 69, put us back in it. Pratty made a solid 22n.o., again at No.9 (will the captain not learn?) and Chook a spritely 3 (off one ball) for victory with 6 overs remaining.

8. WESTS 7/365 BEAT U.N.S.W. 232

We won the toss and inserted and at 2 for 208 things weren't looking too rosy. Fortunately we rallied and limited then to 3651 Definitely our worst bowling performance for many a year. Pratty (3/71) stuck to his task well. Although we did beat the bat on many an occassion we usually followed it with three half volleys. Greg Livingstone played his best ever innings for the club in difficult circumstances. (7/67 at one stage). He and Tony Pratt (still at no.9) put on 135 for the eight wicket and only a diabolical umpiring decision against Tony ended up costing us 2 points - we were bowled out with only 4.2 overs remaining of the last twenty.

9. BANKSTOWN 165 LOST TO U.N.S.W. 9/182

An honest, if not spectacular, bowling effort on a helpful deck only got the Townies to 165. Lawson 2/14 (another comeback?) Gallop 2/35 (a bit wayward) Baker 2/16, supported a decisive effort by James Dixon 16-2-33-4. We made hard work of the run chase before passing them six down. Jamie laid the foundation with an excellent team innings of 48 in 276 mins. Livo (25), Pratty (20), Disco (21) all made good contributions. 34 points at the end of round 9 saw us just out of the running but still in with a good chance.

10. PARRAMATTA 130 AND 6 DEC. 202 LOST OUTRIGHT TO U.N.S.W. 5 DEC. 145

Parramatta won the toss, batted and found themselves in the field by three o'clock. Fine bowling supported by good fielding including Harolds brilliant snare at short-leg to dismiss Wayne Seabrook gave us a real chance at ten points. The bowling honours were shared around. Gallop (3-26) Dixon (1-14), Pratt (1-9), Baker (1-7). Stan Back made three very good dismissals behind the stumps. We batted in a hurry to try and pass them by stumps. Harold made 75n.o. off 112 balls and was set for his maiden 1st class ton when we declared. Lawson 28 off 21

balls at the death ensured we passed them by 5.55pm. Parramatta batted until tea on the second day as we were unable to make the quick breakthroughs of the previous week. They left us with 189 to get in 34 overs. We started slowly but Jamie Baker proved he could really get on with the game by making a match winning 71 off 75 deliveries. Chappo made a swift 39 off 35 and Harold coming in at no.9 completed a fantastic outright win with 15 off 11 balls. All in all we made 189 in 150 mins off 32 overs.

The ten points slipped us into 5th position.

11. HAWKESBURY 89 AND 161 LOST OUTRIGHT TO U.N.S.W. 1 DEC. 132 AND 4/121

The lads from Richmond had made over 300 the week before but came down to earth with a thud. Lawson (6-29) actually let a few go and the other bowlers chipped in. Stan Back made four dismissals. We passed them one down and that was a very "sus" LBW. Jamie (42n.o.), Harold (35) and Livo 52n.o. all played very well. By stumps on the first day Hawkesbury were two down in the second dig still thirty behind. Jamie took 4-64 off 24 the second day and Jungle polished the tail off with figures of 2.4-2-4-3. Mick Back completed his seventh dismissal for the match. This left us 120 to make in 39 overs which we did with 15 balls to spare. Jamie (18), Livo (27), Jungle (26) Pratty (21n.o.) and Henry (17 off 14 balls) all contributed. Another ten points leaped to 45, into 3rd spot.

12. U.N.S.W. 81 & 3/188 LOST TO CAMPBELLTOWN 157

The track played much worse than it looked (thats my story and I'm sticking to it!) Lawson (47) made sure we passed our lowest total ever in 1st Grade (just). At stumps they were 8/114 which just shows you how uneven the wicket was. Gallop (3/38) Lawson (2/44 off 23) and Baker (4/39) were the best. We couldn't make a quick break on the second day but did show them how well we can bat, easily making 3/188.

13. U.N.S.W. 5/297 DEC. DREW WITH PENRITH 2/209

A truly forgetable first day when rain washed out everyone else. A three hour wait and the umpires and opposing captain couldn't agree. After sending us in they had the hide to complain that we batted too long on day two. The 3.10 declaration was too early according to the rest of the team. Everyone batted well with Pratt (77), Livingstone (52), Robson 52n.o. (at last) and Chapsan (40). We toiled hard in the afternoon but their two state players did well. Jim Dixon did particularly well with 2/15 the two points kept us in the semi-final race.

14. FAIRFIELD 8/248 DEC. LOST TO U.N.S.W. 8/252

We were forced to send them in on a flat Village Green (without Henry) to try and force the outright that would assure us a spot in the play-offs. The breakthrough was made early but then we were frustrated by a series of 'play and misses', mostly off Jim Dixon. Jamie bowled well as the afternoon progressed to take 3/60. Disco finished with 2/41 off 23. They declared overnight and we began the chase with confidence. An excellent partnership between Chris Chapman (56) and Tony Pratt (55) took us comfortably to tea. Dispite a couple of hiccups Lawson (24) and Robson (21n.o.) ensured our eighth win of the season.

62 points would put you in the semis easily over the past ten years (but not this time).

SECOND GRADE REPORT

1986 was not a very good year, in anyone's terms, except perhaps for some of the teams we played.

I guess the year was begun in such the way of many games we played; snatching defeat out of the jaws of victory, notwithstanding a Vintage Jock Knock (including the distinctive topspin forehand to midwicket).

After a shortlived resurgence with a last minute win over Sutherland in which Michael Ryan contributed with a "white Roy Fredericks" knock and THAT arm ball, we slipped back into losing ways against St. George.

Despite some genuine highs, such as a dominating win over competition pace makers Bankstown where the whole team proved good pressure cricket is not beyond us, there were a depressing number of games in the tall fish story category ("the one that got away") and others which served as perfect demonstrations of that great(bureaucratic) truth, "Murphy's Law".

However, as General Custer is reputed to have cried "something good is bound to come of all this". Indeed, the rise to fame and misfortune of Adrian White as a left arm intellectual of the future gave great cause for optimism. Steve Debello, successor in title to Orca's "worlds best net bowler" tag showed enough to suggest he is a performer with plenty of ability so long as he can learn to play those slashing square drives to the low, RIGHT hand side of left handed gully fieldsmen. Also, "Lenny" Godber, noted humourist and opening bat showed himself to be a source of real stability in the top order which was lacking in many of our games. And once Glen "Refrigerator" Eades learns that life doesn't end at 50 the sooner we should have a batsman able to average 40 or so over the season and not a creditable, but disappointing 26.

The biggest dissappointment for everyone, I would say, through the season and especially the latter part of it, was our real desire to win reflected in our commitment in the field and our concentration while batting. Far too many simple catches went down or possible catches weren't even attempted to give us the edge of rolling sides for 150 or less on a regular basis which should have been the case. Again, with batting we often showed a lack of discipline right down the order to accumulate large scores. Many a time we would lose three quick wickets before or straight after a break. We did far more to resuscitate flagging opposition fielding efforts by handing them gift wickets than is even usual for a contemporary Australian batting lineup.

What then of the coming seasons. Well, all is certainly not lost, or even missing presumed retired, as the personnel available are capable of matching any of the other teams in Sydney Second Grade. I guess a captain who can direct more attention to the team aspects of the game such as fielding and practice will be a first step and more commitment from the players concerned to the job at hand both on Saturdays and at practice. With some players missing last season from the successful 1985/86 2nd Grade side it might be said that last year we lacked player strength which is not easily replaced. But I don't think this was really the case and I don't think 1987/88 will be as frustrating a season for us because of the obvious desire of all the players involved to play to the best of their ability.

Wishing everyone in the meantime a safe winter and we should all, once again, rendezvous at the Willage Green for further Saturday afternoon follies around August.

THIRD GRADE REPORT 1986/87

This season revealed a third grade side that was far more competitive than last year. A number of factors contributed to our improvement, including:-

A willingness from top-order batsmen to build an innings

The ability to capture early wickets and maintain pressure on our opponents.

Better commitment to weekly training sessions from most players.

Whilst last season's statistics told the story of our poor performance, this year produced some notable achievements. Righlights were as follows:

- Elvin's 106 Vs. Western Suburbs and 93n.o. Vs Sydney University. These innings contributed to Elvin's third grade batting (average) record of 48.50 per innings.
- Mick's century (106) against Campbelltown was a sheer delight.
- Dave Meagher's innings against Western Suburbs (74) and Fairfield (60) were breath-taking!
 - Rookie's consistent performances with the bat, culminated in two fine knocks against Fairfield.
- Clem's great 'ball' skills were rewarded by capturing 28 wickets during the season, including a ten wicket haul in the Fairfield match.
- Steve's determination against Western Suburbs produced 4-82 on a batting paradise.

The efforts of 'new-comers' Brian Cooper, Rob Michie and John Abbott are worthy of special mention. Brian proved to be a tidy keeper and punishing lower order batsman. The Rookie is definately a stroke maker and doubles as a useful medium pace bowler. John, until injured, showed that he is a batsman with potential and demonstrated excellent fielding skills. It was very pleasing to have some 'fresh talent' in the team this season.

Turning to the team's results, we were well positioned at the Christmas break, having first innings wins against Randwick, Waverley, Petersham and Western Suburbs. However, we surrendered our next three matches to Bankstown, Parramatta and Hawkesbury. This run of losses was to prove extremely damaging when the final points table emerged. We finished one win out of the final four due to a sound win over Campbelltown and an excellent outright victory against Fairfield in the last competition round. FOURTH GRADE REPORT 1986-87

Geoff Lawson was kind enough to point out while administering the Cold Golds at the Annual Dinner, that Fourth Grade went from certain semi-finalists at Christmas to relegation candidates at the end of the season. In fact, at the half way stage in mid-December, the record stood at one loss and four wins from seven matches; however, the one and six record from that stage on saw the side relegated to fourteenth position at season's end.

It should be said, of course, that early season opponents met us at our strongest and most enthusiastic. How for instance could Randwick (and their supporters) be expected to withstand the combined onslaught of Robbie Stark quoting Donne and Lee Ashdown's shorts? No contest, even with only 168 on the board.

Round two was probably the team's best performance. After sending Sutherland in and rolling them for 217, we passed their score six down and inflicted the eventual premiers' only defeat of the season. When this was followed by a close win over St. George on a dubious pitch at Cabill, the team was running equal first without a care.

The Waverley match was drawn with Uni in a good position for a win but rain meant no play on the second day. This game saw the best individual batting display of the year when Rookie hit 102 not out in even time, and in company with Greg Chappel's hatter (Jimmy Wilcher) took the side from 7/40 to 8/142 and eventually a respectable 210 all out.

A close loss to Sydney University was followed by a narrow win in the one day over Petersham. From there on it was one way traffic in the other direction with the only respite being a scratchy win over Hawkesbury somewhere in Western NSW. Greg Robinson proved in this match, that if you bowl long enough you'll eventually get them run out.

So what went wrong? This proved to a lively topic and was much discussed, particularly as the losses continued. Jimmy Wilcher's assertion in Round 3 that the Fourth XI was the worst fielding side of all time was a bit extreme, especially in view of some of the abysmal fielding which took place in later matches.

Certainly the poor catching made it hard for the bowling to shine; however, too often they had a paltry score to defend and it is in this area that I would like to see most improvement. The statistics show that Uni averaged only 17.34 runs per wicket throughout the season and that on only 11 occasions did individuals pass 50 runs (Rookie's 102 not out and Nick Prattent's 93 were the only scores over 70). Not being able to occupy the crasse for 100 overs proved costly and is demonstrated clearly by our three outright losses in the second half of the season.

As has been noted in the past, the performance of lower grade sides will often reflect the degree of players turnover throughout the season. This year 39 players participated in the 13 matches while only seven players took part in more than half of these games. This massive turnover did wonders for my phone bill but also heightened my appreciation of the Team Secretary's efforts. Thanks to Elvin and the lower grade skippers for their help in putting teams on fields and to Leon and the Committee for the general organisation and encouragement and, most important, to the players for being there.

POIDEVIN GRAY REPORT
