## FIRST GRADE REPORT

The Club can look back on season 1995/96 as a year where a few of the younger players were given the opportunity to start their 1st Grade careers.

He started his bowling career this season with a smorgasbord of deliveries at 1st Grade level. He finished

## SECOND GRADE REPORT

#### Where to start?

How about statistics....statistically speaking, we finished the year with 40 points. This positioned us in tenth spot on the competition table. Our overall quotient of 1.1351 was the sixth best in the competition. A mediocre result, but a result not without some positives. Firstly, both in terms of our position on the ladder and overall quotient, season 1995/1996 represents a significant improvement on season 1994/1995. Secondly, our finish to the season suggests further improvements in season 1996/1997. Why? After Round 10 we had 12 points and were equal last with Wests and Petersham. We could have thrown in the towel but we didn't. In the last five rounds we had four comprehensive victories, including outright points against Campbelltown.

## What really happened?

The captain's view...it is not showing any captain's bias to say that our efforts in the field were outstanding all season. Our bowlers were nothing short of magnificent. This is backed up by statistics. Our overall bowling average of 21.8 runs per wicket was the third best in the competition. As a measure of our bowlers dominance over the batting opposition, only once did an opposition team score in excess of 250. Special mention must go to Warren Saunders (30 wickets at 15.8), Greg Hackney (20 at 17.4), David Gainsford (16 at 23.13) and Mark Mullen (24 at 23.5). Our ground fielding and catching was always of a very high standard and supportive of our bowlers. I cannot recall any "costly" mistakes. Special mention must go to Michael Morson (who broke the 2nd Grade record for wicketkeeping dismissals with 31, 29 caught and 2 stumped), Brad Schirmer, and Stephen Norbury.

The same superlatives cannot be thrown at our batting. If asked to summarise our batting performances after Round 10 I would have said very disappointing. However, thanks to three successive scores in excess of 300 to finish our season, my final summary is disappointing. Statistics do not lie. Our overall batting average of 23 93 runs per wicket placed us fourteenth in the competition. Not one batsmen achieved an aggregate of 500 runs or an average in excess of 40. Only one century was scored during the season. Special mentions must go to Hamish Nott who, in his first season, topped the aggregate with 464 runs at 29.0. Also, Duncan Coots who lead the averages with 423 runs at 35.25 and Brad Schirmer with 381 runs at 27.21 (plus 80 odd in two 1st Grade outings at the end of the year).

#### Were the any stars?

My player of the year goes to Brad Schirmer. In his initial season of 2nd Grade he was always amongst our best batsmen. His aggregate and average do not do him credit. He seldom failed, always scoring 30's. More often than not he provided some backbone when we were in serious trouble. His lesson to learn should be to ensure that he scores more heavily when he gets good starts. At times he played a valuable role as a medium pace bowler (9 wickets at 30.89). Finally, in my opinion he was the best ground fielder in the competition. He took 6 catches, effected a number of run outs and saved countless runs with his athleticism. Not too far away were Warren Saunders who combined his outstanding bowling with brilliant gully fielding (8 catches), and Greg Hackney who added 332 at 27.67 to his impressive bowling performances.

## How to wrap up?

Despite my assessment of our season as only mediocre my first season as captain was very

enjoyable. For this I owe many people thanks. Firstly, to my teammates. Your team spirit, commitment and endeavour was always first rate (even after Round 10 1). Socially, you could not meet a nicer bunch of blokes. Secondly, to Greg Livingstone and Dennis Cameron's for their efforts as club coach and assistant coach respectively. Thirdly, to Greg Robinson for his efforts as Chairman of Selectors.

Finally, congratulations to Robert Stark and the rest of our Fifth Grade 'immortals' for winning our first premiership since 1980-81.

# THIRD GRADE REPORT

Third Grade finished the season on 28 points from five first innings wins, eight losses and two draws. This disappointing result was largely due to our inconsistent batting and we could look back on games against Manly, Penrith and Randwick as occasions where we had played ourselves into winning positions but failed to finish the job with the bat. With four games to go we were an outside chance of a place in the semi-finals but realistically our batting needed to produce big scores more consistently before we could have expected to beat the better teams in the competition. Despite playing on the superb David Phillips wicket for half of our games the only century scored by the Thirds all season was by the temporarily demoted Steve Norbury. Therein lies a tale.

The team was disrupted to varying degrees throughout the season. Three captains were used; Dave Quinlin, before form demanded his promotion to Second Grade; Jim Dixon, while rehabilitating from surgery; and David Jebb for the last six games. In addition, with Fourth and Fifth Grades in semi-final contention at the end of the season and a number of players unavailable due to injury it sometimes became a matter of assembling an unbalanced side or even struggling to find eleven without unduly disrupting the two teams below. Despite this the spirit in the team always remained positive and our efforts with the ball and in the field were encouraging and satisfying. The following players spent the majority of the season in Third Grade:

Robert McLachlan

"Sludge" had a disappointing season with the bat. While he always looked technically sound he often fell to concentration lapses after he had done the hard early innings work. His bowling continued to improve throughout the season and with many bowlers unavailable in our latter games he made great progress, showing the ability to swing the ball both ways and bowl a superior bouncer. His 6/77 off 32 overs against competition leaders Randwick underlined his improvement.

Paul Urquhart

continued to display a lot of ability and a wide range of attacking shots, but again had difficulty in selecting the right time to play them. He is certainly aware of this problem in his game but will need to continue to work hard towards turning his many promising starts into big scores. His fielding was consistently excellent.

Mark Leahy

played only six games but was the team's most consistent batsman. He was rewarded with promotion to Second Grade at the end of the season having started the summer in Fourth Grade. Next season is a big one for him and now would be the time for him to put some extra work into his fitness.

Sohail Mohideen

had a learning season with the bat but finished well with an excellent 90 in the last game. His tendency to play balls directed at (although not necessarily pitched on) the stumps saw him-often fall foul of Third-Grade umpires but as the season wore on he appeared to straighten up his technique. This is a good idea and he should probably avoid playing across the line of the ball until later in his innings when he is more likely to hit it. His fielding was always of a high standard and with his obvious intention to aim for excellence in this area will always be a significant asset to his team. Sohail's running between the wickets

needs to improve. His calling could be more consistent and recognise for both he and his partner to get home (this comment has not only been included because he burnt his Captain in the last game either!!!).

Luke Latimer

could always be relied upon for an aggressive contribution with the bat or ball. As an always competitive all-rounder he has the potential to turn a game but his sometimes unorthodox prematch preparation may hinder his progress to higher grades. His batting results may have suffered due to the pressure sometimes exerted by the top order's failures - ideally he should bat against the older ball. His bowling was affected by a side injury in the second half of the season but batsmen were never completely comfortable against him.

Mark Carmichael

moved into Thirds after several years captaining Seconds but had a disjointed season due to injury and his agreement to move down to Fourth Grade when they were looking for a semi-final place. His played two important innings in winning games against Balmain and Northern District and was always on hand with considered and valuable advice to his various captains.

Nigel Dornan

was our most successful bowler with 26 wickets at 20. He bowled a consistent line throughout the season and moved the ball both ways into the breeze. He often contributed valuable runs at the end of the innings and probably deserves to bat higher than No.10 in the future.

Greg Dennis

showed enormous promise as a genuine fast bowler. In limited appearances he displayed good pace and ability to swing the ball away late. With these attributes he can progress a long way if he puts in the work. His spells against Randwick late in the season highlighted his potential and in a full season he will run through his share of top orders with the new ball and be effective in cleaning up tailenders. A big find if he can stay keen.

Alex Lamb

was another promising younger player to gain an opportunity in Thirds in the second half of the season. He bowled some good spells of leg spin in sometimes difficult circumstances and showed enough to suggest he can move to higher grades in the future. He is his own harshest critic and while it is good to see him set high standards for himself he has a tendency to let the bad ball have a detrimental effect on his bowling. His batting looked technically sound and will benefit from some extended time in the middle. His fielding was excellent with his speed to the ball either in close at short leg or in the outfield outstanding.

Thirds had various cameo appearances from throughout the Club but most notably from Darren Stephens, Steve Norbury, and Dave Quinlin who all made major contributions to some of our few wins. To the others not mentioned thanks must go for their contribution to the positive atmosphere which prevailed in the team and the fact that the team was never short of spirit or effort.

## SIXTH GRADE REPORT

The 1995-96 season was the most successful for 6th grade in a number of years. Although winning and losing an equal number of games was not necessarily an Olympian achievement, it nevertheless was significant in a grade characterised by university under-performance. Moreover, the team did just enough to make a semi-final, even if our performance in it was underwhelming.

### SEVENTH GRADE REPORT

The team experienced a somewhat indifferent season which realised only three out of a possible thirteen wins. However, despite our relatively poor showing, the team avoided relegation to third grade in the Moore Park and South East Sydney Cricket Association (MPSECA) competition, remaining in the competitive second grade. The final placing for the team was sixth place.

The team's first win came well into the season in Round 5 against the Archers in a one day fixture. Set 186 off 40 overs, the task was never going to be easy, however, it was eclipsed in the 37th over with only four wickets down - the mainstay being Craig Murray who came in at number three and put together an unbeaten 63. Not long after that performance, 7ths scored their second win in Round 7 against Dry Dock Hotel. The win was set up by a solid batting performance in the first innings, amassing 234, with a fill-in player in Peter Schumack scoring 77. The victory was executed by a combination of dismal batting and accurate bowling, mainly by Scott Ryall, another player called up for his one and only appearance. He eventually took 5/63, as the Dry Dock batsmen gave their versions of typical wild village yahoos and our fieldsmen obligingly snared their skyers. However, this is taking nothing away from Scott's loopy leggies which were bowled with outstanding accuracy.

Then came the Christmas break, as the job of captaining the team was handed over to me from the "Going places ..." Dan Culhane. As the first game after the break approached, it was clear that I would have difficulty finding eleven players. On the Saturday morning before the game it looked like we would be lucky to have eight players! This hurdle ultimately was crossed as we managed to get cleven, even if it meant calling up mates that morning.

The game against Coastal was played on a field which was simply below par and was much to the advantage of the batting side. We took advantage of this and posted a most competitive 9/296 on the first day. Four of our players passed 50, with Peter Cranmer (62\*) being the pick. As we arrived on the second day it was clear that our ground was was in use by two teams who claimed a regular booking. As a result of this MPSECA blue, we had to settle on playing under atrocious conditions, with an extreme down hill and short outfield. The result was Coastal running away with the game reaching the target with only two wickets down. I think that if we had won this game, like we should have, then the rest of the season would have been somewhat brighter. This was not to be and a number of other games were lost by narrow margins.

One particular stand-out was the match against Tradewinds the following round. After getting a meagre 129, the team nearly managed to pull-off a remarkable win, thanks largely to the phenomenal bowling performance of Tom Holden, who bagged 7/45 in an outstanding spell. This was backed up by sound fielding and catching; however, the game was lost by one wicket.

Another close match was played in Round 13 against the Coogee Rebels in a 40 over afair. After putting up a somewhat defendable 137, the 7ths again lost by one wicket. The bowling performance was sound with Adrian Karsten taking 4/29 and solid backup coming from Jason Findlay (2/33). Jason nearly won the game for us with a strong second spell of 2/3 but it wasn't enough to secure a win. In the final round against Dry Dock Hotel, the team enjoyed its third win by default (however it looked a formality with the opposition recling at 3/14 at stumps on the first day). Batting first, the team scored a respectable 196, helped along by good controlled hitting by Jason Findlay (23\*) and myself finally finding some touch with the willow with a 60. The following Saturday with Dry Dock at 3/14, there was no play due to the opposition not turning up.

I would like to thank the support given by the players in the 7ths, particularly by the regular team members - Geoff Strudwick, Adrian Karsten, Joe Clarke, Peter Cranner, and Michael Chilov, who all managed to find time to play the majority of the season. Congratulations must also go to Adrian Karsten who was awarded the bowling award (taking 12 wickets at 24) and Peter Hemphill who, while only managing 131 runs at 18.7, showed much skill and a sensible attitude towards the game. I must also thank Dodders Culhane for captaining the team for the first part of the season and Greg Dacey for doing the same on a few occasions. Finally, I would like to extend my gratitude to the Club. for the gear and the opportunity to compete regularly in competive cricket.


