PRESIDENT'S REPORT

In the 1986/87 Annual Report I stated that "although not shown by results in the Poidevin-Gray competition our victory in the Inter-Varsity competition suggests that the strength of our undergraduates is improving. As these players develop next season the results should be a marked improvement, especially in the Poidevin-Gray Competition." It took an extra year. However I am extremely pleased to be able to state that the strength of our undergraduates has improved to the extent that having defeated the eventual premiers, Sutherland, in the Poidevin-Gray competition round, we finished second in our division. It took an outright victory to the Sutherland Club in the last game to push us back into second place.

Two other sides , namely Thirds and Fifths , made the semi-finals with the younger members of the side performing better than the "more experienced" players. After a slow start to the season , Seconds proved to be extremely competitive. If it were not for the loss of three or four early games by one or two wickets and ten or twenty runs , the side would have been in contention for a semi-final spot.

With the success of our Poidevin-Gray side , Third and Fifth grades , I am looking forward to an extremely successful season next year in First and Second grade.

After finishing fourth two seasons ago and missing out on the semis on percentages, our First grade continued to hover around the middle of the competition ladder. It is difficult to pin-point the reason for this. The team is basically the same as it was two seasons ago, with the batsmen having higher averages than they had in the past two seasons. There is no doubt the ability is there. There seems to be a lack of consistency. With more pressure from lower grade players, a little more consistency should result and lead to a corresponding increase in success.

No Club is successful without a hard working committee and with Peter Godber overseas, Elvin Robb stepped into the breach and carried out the Secretary's function prior to his departure to Lismore and did a sterling job. My thanks to Treasurer, Peter Jourdain and Greg Livingstone for all the work which they did in ensuring the Club properly functioned. Dave Bell deserves special mention for his tireless efforts as Teams Secretary.

Hike Gregg , the dreaded journalist , hardly missed an opportunity to twist the truth to obtain a good story about the various happenings on and off the field. Sometimes I wonder whether there wasn't a total absence of the truth on some occasions! This year the "Saturday Sledge" became so voluminous that Dave Bell was called in to edit and print every second "Sledge". Congratulations to both of you on a fine effort and lets see more defamatory and ego bruising statements next year.

During the off season the Club embarked on its most adventurous project to date - a cricket trip to the United States, England, Ireland and Wales. In all there were thirty thirsty tourists. To the organisers, including Peter Godber, Glen Clark and Marty Palin, a special thank you from the committee. The tour, followed by our success, once again, at the Australian Inter-varsity competition in Brisbane, show that the club is vibrant and committed to providing top quality social cricket in addition to the more serious grade competition. The abundance of this type of cricket is a real advantage in playing for the Club.

The Club is fortunate to be associated with a very progressive and considerate University. The University is the first in Australia to offer sporting scholarships, with two cricketers being awarded scholarships in the first two years of its operation: Atticus Fleming and Warren Faulkner. Warren finished the year in First grade and the Club is looking for big things from him in the future. Atticus Fleming had an excellent season, especially in the P-G competition—figures of 7-44 are indicative of his ability.

The support which the Club receives from the University is much appreciated. The new annual Chancellor's XI game against the students was won by the Chancellor's XI, proving once again that the Chancellor is an adept social cricketer, relying as he did on his ability as a selector and coin tosser, and delegating to the Vice-Chancellor the task of providing the cricket skills sufficient to win the game.

The Club is able to offer facilities which are equal to any other in the competition. With plans afoot for the second storey on the Sam Cracknell Pavilion we can look forward in the near future to having an oval which will match the best in first grade cricket. Ian Moutray is always willing to ensure the Club has the assistance of the Sports Association and try as I might, I am unable to fault the ground staff in the work they do in preparing the grounds. To Messrs. King, Cornish and the rest of the team, a sincere than you. The only disappointing thing about playing at the University grounds is that you get so used to the good facilities you are frequently diappointed when playing away.

I have not yet mentioned Geoff Lawson , the Club's first Australian representative. Having seen him in hospital a few years ago , when he was attempting to recover from his back injury , I did not consider it possible that he would be able to make a successful return to international cricket. I am glad to say that I was wrong. The extra work he has done - weights , excersises , running , bike riding as well as hours in the nets , show what is required to succeed at the highest level. FIRST GRADE REPORT

The 1988/89 season can only be described as disappointing for the 1st Grade side regardless of many pleasing and encouraging aspects. For a club such as ours and with the players we have , to finish near the bottom of the table cannot be accepted.

Livo's First Grade report last year pointed to some areas of concern that had contributed to an average season, "...poor fielding standards and a lack of application in batting at crucial times." The recent season could be summed up in identical fashion, indicating that the higher grade players have failed to address our obvious weaknesses. Each and every First Grade player, in fact every club member, must make a concerted effort to remedy our 'bottom line' performance - that is, being beaten by less talented teams.

We dropped too many catches this year which, along with generally poor ground fielding, meant that we were unable to put sufficient pressure on opposition batsmen. We play our home games on a very flat Village Green wicket and we do not have a particularly penetrative attack (Henry being the obvious exception, but even he failed to dominate on our home ground); that has nearly always been the case during our clubs very successful existence in the Sydney Grade Competition. The difference has been the, at times brilliant, but at least determined and consistent fielding associated with our successful First Grade teams. We could very easily make the semi-finals each year if we hold the important catches, picked up the run-outs and stopped the shots that are hit to or near the field.

However, there were many encouraging aspects during the season. Particularly impressive partnerships from our new opening combination; outstanding season's with both bat and ball by Jamie and Jungle; and each and every player displaying on at least one occasion that they have the sort of ability that could give to another first grade premiership within the next few years (hopefully next year). What I consider to be the most encouraging aspect was the performances of our P-G side and a very young and enthusiastic Third Grade outfit (excluding Messrs. Meagher and Gregg obviously). With so many young players coming through, things auger well for our First Grade future. This, of course, will depend on the attitude of these young players—which will displayed at training next year (ie TRAINING !!!).

An analysis of our individual performances should probably read as follows.

Jamie Baker had nothing less than an outstanding season. Jamie is slowly becoming our most dominant player and must certainly be on the short list for State team selection. His batting has developed from the apparently limited and grafting approach of 3 - 4 years ago, to that of a mature and dominant batsmen today. Jamie has already scored as many 1st Grade hundreds as any player in the club's history, which is an enormous credit to him. We also relied on Jamie's attacking bowling as he provides our main penetration on many of the 'flat' wickets going around Sydney (particularly our own). If Jamie's bowling and on-field attitude can obtain the same maturity evident in his batting, he could go all the way.

Shawy came off an 'MVP'award for the legendary tour of England to attempt to fill the troublesome opening role, that has been of concern since Livo was moved to No. 3 to solve a similar problem. The P-G captain had an excellent first year, his best performances being 72 vs Campbelltown and his maiden first performances being 72 vs Campbelltown and his maiden first grade ton against Manly - in that order. For a 1st Grade Aussie Rules player, Shawy's agility and performances in the field were of some concern and this is an area he really needs to address - being young is no excuse in the field. Shawy has a big future, which has also been picked up by the press. Make the most of it Shawy - starting next season.

Livo , by his standards , had a very average season - but his performances against Parramatta , Northern Districts and Manly were vintage stuff. I think Livo suffered most from an attitude of being too eager to promote the development of the younger players , dropping down the order to concentrate on analysing their games rather than concentrating on his own. To be successful in the next few years , the Uni needs Livo firing at No. 3.

Jungle's season was what we have almost come to expect from him; runs, wickets and catches (and even haring around in the field on occasions). Not only is Jungle our No. 1 batsmen, but he is now the mainstay of our bowling attack. The only worries you have with Jungle are his theories and the odd occasion where someone hits him over the top. I hope he is still the same player when he's a dad, hopefully minus a couple of phobias.

Our start of season No. 5 was Pratty, who's off-season in Scotland really only netted him a wife. His potential has been recognised for some time, unfortunately it hasn't really been converted into performances. Nevertheless, he is still young and obviously a talented batsmen/bowler. Most importantly Pratty is an outstanding fielder and on that basis alone is an important member of the side.

The middle order was a real problem area in our batting along with slavish run rates and an inability to string together too many significant partnerships. We failed to have consistent performances in this area , which may have been partly due to frequent changes in personnel and shuffling the order on numerous occasions. Warren Faulkner , who performed well in P-G and 2nd Grade , may be the answer or our English import Al Cane may be back to fill the spot. Al struggled this year , but we know he's a good player and another excellent fieldsman. Chemical and Trimbole both had opportunities and on occasions showed that they are good enough to be regular first graders , consistency being the key. Trimbo's innings against Penrith converted a reasonable score into a club record and Chemical's innings against Mosman was full of guts and concentration to rescue the club from a record low score. Trimbo had a few problems outside off stump and Chemical was involved in too many run-outs.

Henry made five appearances for us this season and as always (and as expected) was a dominant figure in the games without exactly tearing sides apart (little wonder on a slow, flat V.G.). We still learn a lot through Henry's presence on the field, his knowledge and perspective should make him a Test skipper one day soon.

Kurly's "rookie" season was encouraging, 19 catches and two stumpings was a commendable effort and his undoubted ability could take him a long way. There will be a lot of pressure on the lad with Backy's return next year which I hope brings out the best in both of them. Kurly is learning that there is a time and place for his displays of enthusiasm, his batting is good when he ignores the pull shot.

Clem started the year in Firsts but was restricted in his usefulness due to our abundance of bowlers. He continues to perform in 2nds and is obviously close to a regular first grade spot.

Micky Diabolical (Steve Debello) also played a few 1st Grade games and looked to be ready to hold down a spot before struck by injury. Micky is quick and with more aggression and hard work at practice he could play an important part in the 1st Grade attack which, without Henry and a fit Morgs, lacks that bit of fire power. A few less no-balls would be handy.

Morgs also played a few games late in the season but appears to remain tentative on that hamstring. His off season stint in England may , however , turn the tables.

Whitey played 2 games in 2nd grade late in the season and took a bag in each game. Whitey's main obstacle in 1sts was probably a lack of opportunity and an associated negative approach to his bowling. Hopefully his stint in 2nds will have re-associated him with actually taking wickets and his return to First Grade will return wickets along with his usually steady performances.

Many thanks need now be extended to the people who did actually perform well during the year. Firstly, and most importantly, to Julie who gives so much of her time to assisting the side, particularly in respect of afternoon teas, but also the many occasions the team was invited back to the Lawson's and treated with such hospitality. Many thanks also to Tom Boyce, our scorer, who's support and comments were always appreciated and to Dave Lemon for his appearances and interest (we'll try to produce some better stats next year, Dave).

In concluding , we should not sit back and accept our disappointing First Grade of last year , but should see the coming season as an opportunity to prove our talents. This will require each and every player , at least in the higher grades , taking it on himself to be playing at his peak. This requires fitness (yes cricketers should be fit too) , practice and commitment to our cricket during the summer.

SECOND GRADE REPORT

The record of six wins and seven losses indicates only a mediocre performance. However, there was never any doubt about our ability to win. Our desire to win built up through the season and was helped greatly by the inclusion of some of the successful P.G. players. The feeling in the second half of the season was that we could beat any team and it wasn't until our loss to Balmain (Round 12) that we were out of contention for the finals.

I believe that Second grade is in the best position to push for a premiership in the coming season. A great season by a Third grade side full of P.G. players means competition for places in Seconds will be strong.

The 1988/89 season was highlighted by the great performances of our bowlers. No team scored more than 250 against us after round two.

Our best bowler was Steve Debello with 22 wickets at 18.14. Micky's figures were great and yet were only marginally better than two others, Andrew Clements and Steve Price, both with 18 wickets at 19.22 and 19.28 respectively. Big Clements also had the amazing statistic of only having an average of 1.87 runs taken from each of his 185 overs for the season. These players were ably backed up by Steve O'Brien (18 at 23.87), John Lupton (8 at 21.13), Adrian White (10 at 12.4) and David Gallop (8 at 24.75), so it was no wonder we regularly knocked sides over for around 200.

Unfortunately our batting did not support the efforts of the bowlers. In particular we displayed an inability to chase runs. There were three games in which we failed to reach very achievable targets - against Campbelltown (208), Balmain (149) and Sydney Uni (211) - and two other games in which we lost nine wickets to pass mediocre scores of 151 and 180.

Our leading run-getter for the year was Glenn Eades with 358 runs at 23.87. "Fridge" undoubtedly has the ability to play First grade, but needs to turn many more of his "20's" into big scores.

Nisal Fernando wrapped up the highest average without much trouble, although it is extremely unfair to compare the rest of us mere mortals to Nisal. In his six games he managed 231 runs at 46.5.

A special mention must go to Elvin Robb, who left for the country after round eleven. Elvin's contribution to the club, both on and off the field, has been significant to say the least. His contribution with the bat in 1988/89 was a sold 291 at 24.25.

Our two youngest batsmen, Peter Sinclair and Warren Faulkner, both performed creditably in their six games each. In Peter's six innings he managed 186 at 31 and Warren ended with 174 at 29. We should be looking to both to have long First grade careers.

Of the other batsmen to play a reasonable number of games, Peter Trimble with 192 at 24 and Mark Carmichael with 158 at 22.57 performed creditably. As for the rest of us in that category, we need to improve.

Finally, I would like to officially thank Mark Carmichael, both personally and on behalf of the team, for his unselfish attitude during the season. "Chemical" was named as captain at the start of the season, but for a large part of the season was in first grade. On his return to Seconds he elected not to reassume the captaincy because we were in the middle of a winning sequence. I believe that much of the improved team attitude was brought about by Chemical's enthusiasm and unselfish approach.

THIRD GRADE 1988/89

One of the major objectives I set myself as captain of the Third grade side was to provide the Second grade captain with three or four good young players who are capable of cementing a place in Second grade. I believe this was done. We also finished in the final four, the first Third grade side to do this for at least five seasons - a welcome return to the form which the club used to expect as a matter of course from its Third grade side. In all, a fairly successful season.

If you read the Poidevin-Gray report you will see a number of names of people who appear in the Third grade statistics with the exception of a few "former promising players". After a season of grade cricket I would expect that the bulk of the players who represented the club in the Poidevin-Gray Shield last year will be playing second grade next season.

I have not had the benefit of reading the Poidevin-Gray report, but I assume that one of the reasons which was given for the success last season was the fielding. The same can be said for Third grade. With Damien Cummins., Nick Wood and John Abbott in the side, a captain could not ask for three better fielders. It is sad to note that a dropped catch probably cost us the game in the semi-final against Sutherland, the eventual winners. Who dropped the catch? Yours truly.

There were some extremely notable performances during the season :

- Duncan Coots 3rd grade record of 168 against Sydney University showed what can be achieved by sensible batting - 120 runs in just 11 overs.
- Five century partnerships during the season.
- Six wicket hauls by Dave Simpson and Atticus Fleming.
- Tim Grosser's 90 and Warren Faulkner's unbeaten century in their first season in grade.

These performances show that they are good players and capable of producing outstanding performances. A little more consistency, or just a 10% increase in standard, would just about see every player performing well in Second grade - a worthwhile aim.

"Other Highlights", of the season.

SIXTH GRADE REPORT

The club's sixth team played in the Sydney Catholic Cricket
Association competition, which is played on synthetic wickets
at Moore Park. The A grade started with six teams and the
standard of play was much stronger than the Municipal and
Shires D-grade competition which hosted University sides in
recent years - with the only drawback being the poor playing
conditions and facilities.

The side was only able to win two and draw two of the twelve competition sides - with both wins coming from the Sydney Uni sixth side. This poor showing can be attributed to the strength of the opposition, the sub-standard playing conditions and our inability to field our best eleven, or any eleven, players on many occasions. Opposition teams contained many ex-state and ex-higher grade players and the University will always struggle to match this standard of play with its sixth side.

The positive aspects of the season was the keenness and fighting qualities of the players forming the basis of the team, who continued to give their best in conditions and circumstances which did not allow them to display their full talents. Domenic Cicciari, Steve Lopes, Mick Phillips and Alex Taylor were especially dedicated. Domenic and Steve displayed enough talent and dedication to indicate they will go on to perform well in grade teams for the club - Alex and Mick have already made vast contributions to the club (each in their own way) and added to them this season. The performances of Gary McGregor, with the ball, and Abdul Shameer, with the bat, late in the season displayed much promise for the coming season. Many other players from this team played crucial roles in the Fifth grade semi-final side.

"The club's sixth team has a vital role to play in that most players are introduced to the club through this side and made to earn a grade position with 'on the park' performances - this should not be underestimated. It is important that players in this team are made to feel they are part of the club." This extract from the 1986/87 report highlights some of the problems of this season - and a matter which needs to be addressed by all club members next season.

The Catholic Association competition was a last hour option for the club, following a late decision by Shires that all D-Shires sides have teams in the A,B & C grade, competitions. While conditions at Moore Park are appalling it seems this competition will again be the best option for the University's sixth grade side. The standard of play assures that players earning a promotion are more than ready for Fifth grade's standard - possibly the Catholic Association should be approached to schedule more matches on the turf pitches of the two Universities.

Thank you to all the players who tried their hand in Sixth Grade this season and we'll see you down at the Village Green for pre-season practice sometime in August.

POIDEVIN GRAY REPORT

For many of the clubs the 1988-89 Poidevin Gray competition will be remembered as a washout, but for University Cricket Club I'm sure it will be remembered as the start of something big. After not being competitive in a P-G game for the last four years, this year we won six, had a tie and only lost two games - finishing equal first in our division and were very unfortunate to miss a final berth.

In recent years the interest of club members and players in the under 21 P-G competition has been minimal, games are played on Sundays and public holidays, and its has not been prestigous enough in the club for eligible players in the higher grades to consider it worth the effort (notable exceptions being Adrian White and Michael Back in recent seasons). This season it all changed, the whole club was talking about our P-G side (including a mention on the ABC by Henry about their finals chances) and all eligible players were devising tactics to try to get into the side. The Christmas Eve, Boxing Day and New Year's Day we have struggled to get players for in the past -any players - saw many team members rushing back from Wagga, Newcastle and Tanworth to make sure they retained their position in the side.

So why the change ? For a start we had a respected first grade player (stand-in skipper in fact), Jim Dixon, as manager of the side - keen to get involved and see the side go well. Ex first grade skipper, Dave Meagher, led the successful third grade side which contained the majority of the P-G side. We had first grade players in Andrew Shaw and Michael Kovacs enthusiastic about the competition, willing to make sacrifices for the side and, above all, excellent team players. The effect the advice and interest of a higher grade player can have on new and younger members of the club is enormous - this year we saw the benefits, I hope we see a lot more involvement from the first and second graders in the coming season.

At team selections it was apparent that we could field a very strong batting side with the available talent ,but there was concern however about our ability to bowl out or even contain the opposition with our bowling attack. As it turned out our attack of Atticus Fleming , Alistair McCallum , Peter Sinclair and David Simpson performed above themselves to dominate their highly rated opponents and were instrumental in the success of the side. They were well supported by 'the best fielding side in the club' who ensured the opposition batsmen did not get a second chance or any easy runs. Of the 77 wickets taken by the side , 56 were caught , six runout and six stumpings - which probably best describes the efforts in the field. There were also some outstanding performances with the bat - particularly by Warren Faulkner , Duncan Coots and John Abbott.

Congratulations to the team for their spirit and achievements throughout the season, it was an effort to be proud of. Hopefully a number of players from this side will form the basis of a Uni resurgence in first grade in coming seasons. The 1989/90 P-G side will contain a number of players from this year's side and they have left themselves a tough act to follow.

Finally I'm sure the side would like to record thanks and appreciation to scorer Mrs Coots , manager Jim Dixon , his assistant David Bell and the chief supporter Mr Coots - who travelled the length and breadth of Sydney to lend a hand and urge the team on.

POIDEVIN-GRAY MATCH REPORTS

ROUND 1 - Western Suburbs 78 lost to UNSW 195

Skipper Andrew Shaw ensures a good start to the season when he wins the toss and inserts Wests on a wet Village Green pitch. Dave Simpson (5/28) and Al McCallum (4/28) take full advantage of the conditions and Wests are dismissed for 78. Peter Sinclair (27), Warren Faulkner (22) and Nisal Fernando (38) bat well in difficult conditions to record the club's first P-G victory in four years.

ROUND 2 - UNSW 130 tied with Waverley 130

Uni struggle against a strong Waverley attack and only a superb 56 by Duncan Coots averts a total collapse. Michael Kovacs (14) and Al McCal (14) add vital runs down the order. Uni with its three pronged attack of Fleming (2/52 from 28 overs), Sinclair (1/12) and McCallum (5/57 from 22 overs) fight hard in the field, but it appears it is all in vain with the score at 6/126 with four overs remaining. Enter Atticus Fleming with two brilliant catches and a run-out to see Uni snatch a tie with three balls remaining. Postmatch celebrations were enormous and the match was always referred to as 'a great win'. It wasn't a win but certainly a turning point and bonded the team.

ROUND 3 - St George 189 lost to UNSW 4/201

A great Christmas Eve team performance against a strong opposition. In soaring heat at the Hurstville Velodrome the side contain St George, despite a century by Craig McComb. Pete Sinclair (4/49) and Al McCal (3/50) are supported by all fielders to restrict St George to 189. Then the batting line-up really fires, with a fine 65 by Duncan Coots and a magnificent innings of 78n.o. by Warren Faulkner, to reach the total with plenty of overs to spare. A very impressive performance.

ROUND 4 - Northern District 7/105 lost to UNSW 8/108

The skipper wins another important toss and asks ND's to bat on a saturated Village Green track in a match reduced to 31 overs. After having ND's 7/50 further rain and time constraints make bowling a difficult proposition , Al McCal takes 3/23 and Pete Sinclair 2/34. During the Uni innings a hurricane hits Kensington - but despite attrocious light , torrential downpour and Warren throwing his bat with every shot - the umpires are determined to reward Uni for their efforts in the field , by seeing a result from the match. Warren Faulkner agains bats superbly for 59n.o. to lead the side to another victory. With this being the only game played , Uni now led the competition.

ROUND 5 - Balmain 125 beat UNSW 98

Play is delayed once again and it is a 44 over affair against Balmain at Drummoyne Oval , it was good to see the Uni players returning from Christmas holidays for the match. Once again the Uni bowling attack is supported to the hilt by all fieldsmen with Atticus Fleming 4/25 off 18 overs and Pete Sinclair 4/28 reaping the benefits on this occasion. Against an all first grade bowling attack scoring runs was always a problem , and Warren Faulkner (17) and Andrew Shaw (23) see out the opening attack. Tim Grosser (23) and Michael Kovacs (12) combine to offer some hope , but in the end it was too many runs to score against that attack under the conditions.

ROUND 6 - Sutherland 91 lost to UNSW 7/92

This was the top of the table clash and a match Uni had to win to have a chance of qualifying for the final. Another good toss was won by skipper Shaw on a rainaffected David Phillips South in a 40 over game. An outstanding bowling performance by Atticus Fleming to take 7/44 which restricted the strong Sutherland battting lineup to 91. Another fine team fielding and catching performance. Pete Sinclair (24) once again does the job up the front and is well supported by Andrew Shaw (15) and Warren Faulkner (14). After we lose 4/1 in the middle-order it is left to Atticus Fleming and a sweeping John Abbott to see us to an important and satisfying win over our newly-crowned chief P-G rivals.

ROUND 7 - UNSW 155 lost (on run-rate) to Bankstown 4/88

In perfect conditions Uni elect to bat on a flat Village Green track, but are immediately in trouble losing two early wickets. Duncan Coots (28) and Michael Kovacs (runout for 30 - threa times in six P-G knocks!) consolidate the innings. Good knocks by Damien Cummings (24), John Abbott (36) and Atticus Fleming (15) but we are unable to bat out the overs. Uni are unable to avoid defeat as another hurricane and Dean Waugh move in on the Village Green. Rain delays mean that Bankstown require just 98 runs off 27 overs, Uni sportingly stay on the field in conditions similar to those encountered against ND's until the runs are scored (live by the sword ...). Pete Sinclair handles the conditions to take 3/36 and Atticus has Waugh stumped off a shoulder high full toss as he dances down the track.

ROUND 8 - Hawkesbury 6/155 lost (on run rate) UNSW 6/138

Another rain-affected match (50 and 44 overs) - this time at Benson Lane leaves everyones fingernails a little worse for wear. The weather finally clears up on the Wednesday and a decision is made to hold a 20 over competition and we are drawn to play Armidale in round 1. We reach the target with an over to spare with Tim Grosser (27) and Atticus (22) leading the way.

We pass the home side's total with five overs to spare, mainly due to a good knock of 29 n.o. by Atticus Fleming.

UK TOUR 1988

The club undertook and successfully completed a comphrehensive tour of the United Kingdom and Ireland between 13 June and 15 July 1988. The Club was represented by 31 players from all grades.

The tour encompassed twenty one matches, of which only three were rain affected, and saw the Club in competition with Cambridge University; Oxford University, Trinity College (Dublin), London University and a host of League clubs, including Hythe Cricket Club which over the years has been close to the hearts of a number of members of the Club; it was four weeks of ultimate cricket touring, travelling the English Countryside in three mini "Zaheer Abuses".

The results were important, and to that end we won ten matches and lost nine, but probably more significant was the experience gained by so many members of the Club in playing in England, learning about the game from its country of origin, touring in a closely knit squad, and meeting such a great range of personalities on the way. I think that the way we conducted ourselves was a credit to the University and this conduct was a catalyst for a close comradery between ourselves and our hosts which was exceptional.

Noteworthy highlights of the tour are abundant and indeed many of the on and off-field stories have been recited already at Club functions. It was a proud day when we defeated Cambridge University and were hosted to such a splendid function in the grounds of Downing College. Our fixture with Oxford University ended in defeat , but the game could easily have swung our way with a few favourable decisions. The social "Test Match" played between eleven tourists representing the "Australian Lobsters XI" against the "English Lobsters XI" (under the management of one Dick Apps and comprising celebrated social and sporting figures from Kent) , will never be forgotten. The unique hospitality that the tourists received in Kent , Wales and Ireland exceeded all expectations. We knew that we may be well received in Kent through our Club contacts , but the Welsh and Irish responded to an Australian touring team in a way that touched us all. In the hospitality stakes , I think we owe special thanks to Mr. Tom Carnell of Sturry in Kent , Mr. J.B.Bunworth of Clontarf CC in Dublin , Mr. Roger Davis , Captain of the Cardiff CC , Mr. J.Davis of Cambridge , our Michael Kilborn of Oxford and , of course , Dick Apps and Hythe CC.

The full text of the results of the tour will hopefully be published shortly, as soon as I get my act together and prepare a separate booklet - the tour's personalities and events deserve preservation in a larger publication. For the moment I think the Club owes much to Martin Palin, Nick Prattent, Greg Holt and Co. for dreaming up the idea, Glen Clark for his captaincy and enthusiasm in the tour organisation Michael Ryan for his almost sole handed effort in producing a tour booklet which was so successfully received, David Bell for his time and effort in videoing most of the event and reproducing copies of the tour video, Clayton Jones for establishing our Dublin contacts and all those whose reorganised a small part of their lives to be there.

As a Club we have thanked Touche Ross for their significant support, the Cricketers Club of N.S.W. for theirs, the Prime Minister of Australia for his patronage, and of course the Chancellor and Vice Chancellor of the University who lent their own personal support.

Touring takes cricket to another level. One doesn't feel the pain of giving up weekends in the sun or turning out after a hard week's work. Instead, you get time to enjoy all the good thingsabout the sport - slogging it out all day in the field, drinking pints all night and doing it all again the next day. Let's hope the success of this tour acts as the catalyst for more similar ventures. Next on the touring agenda - South America.
