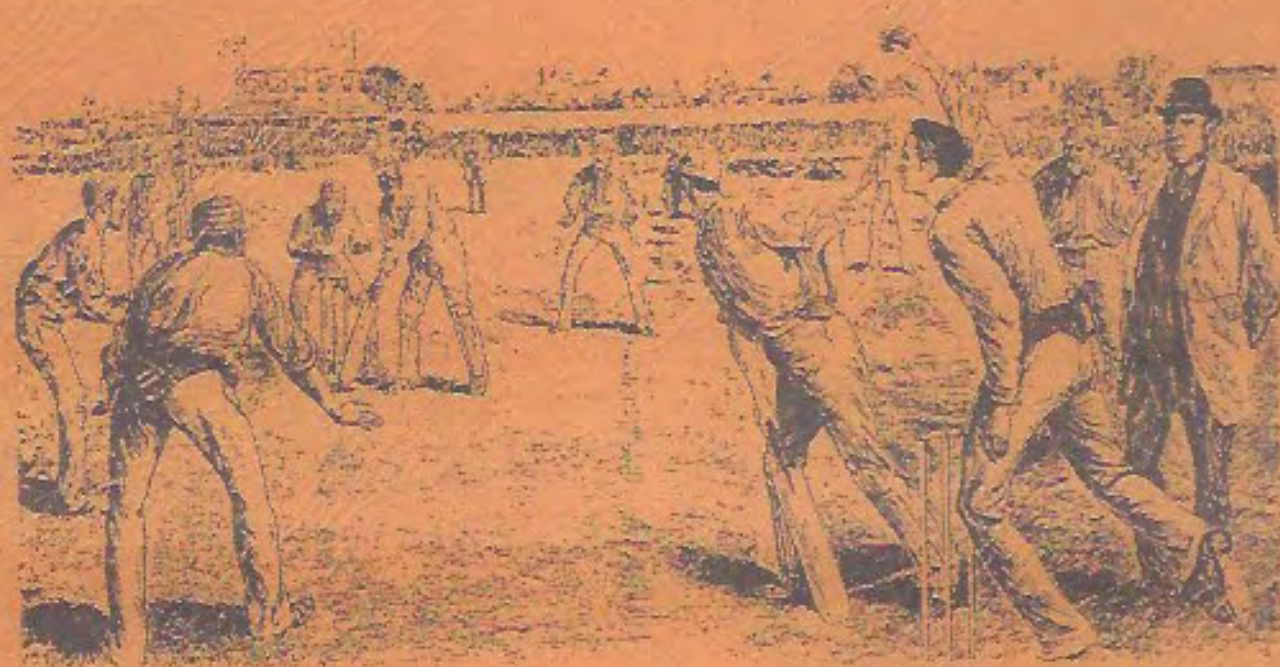

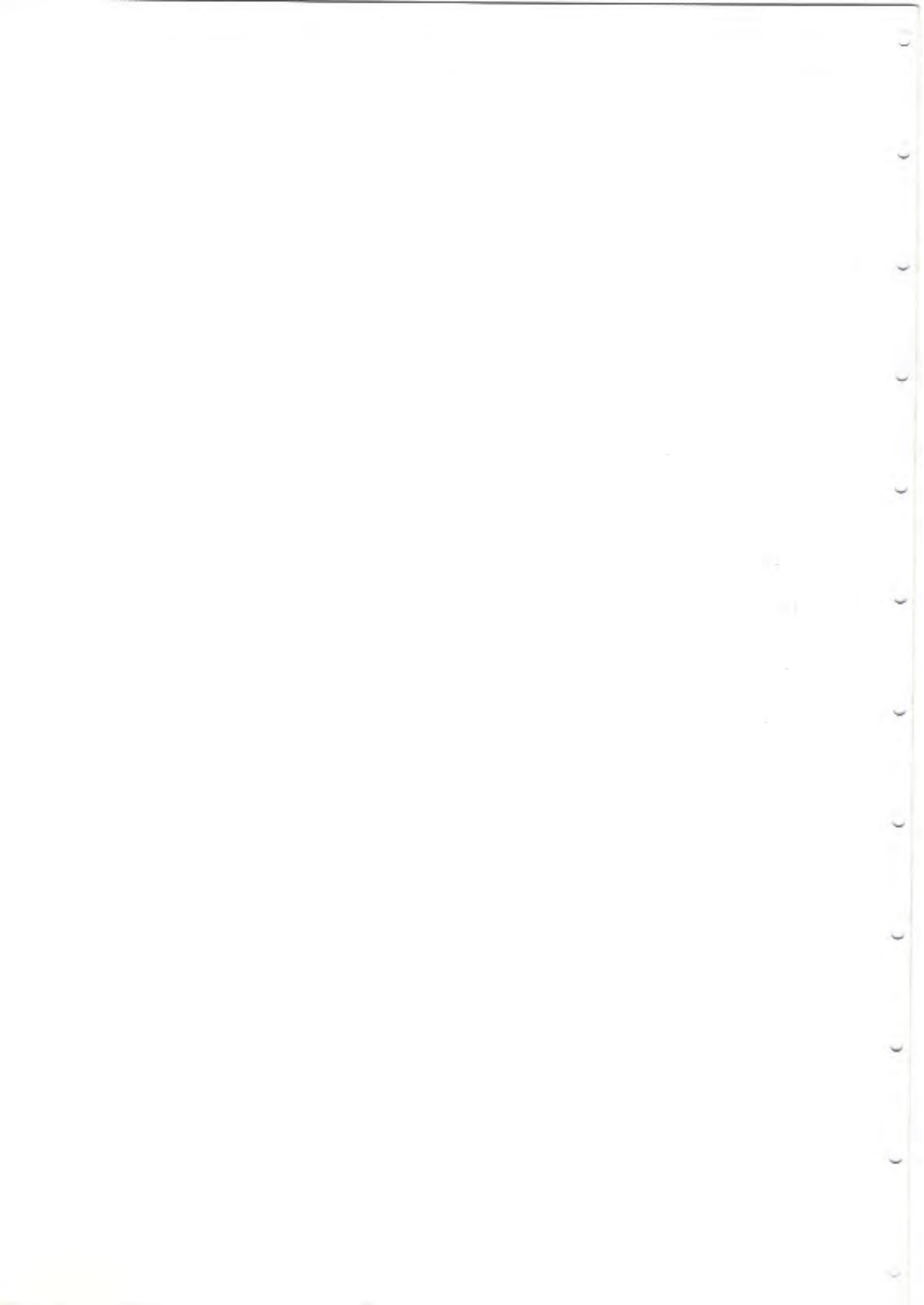

## *PRESIDENT'S REPORT*

All in all it was a much improved performance by the Club over the past few years and consistent with the thrust of our Club objectives for the season, namely:

3. three (3) teams in the semi-finals.

In the Club Championship we progressed from 11th to 7th to 4th in the last three seasons. Arithmetic progression suggests we'll finish 2nd next season.

7th Grade were Premiers. Congratulations to Antony Sachs and his team in maintaining the fine tradition of our lower grades.

2nd Grade were again a revelation finishing Minor Premiers although, to our collective anguish, letting themselves down in the semi-final. Peter Trimble led superbly and each member contributed in a way that reinforced the notion of 'team'. Peter and bride, Kerrie, are off to Cincinnati for a couple of years and they will be greatly missed.

4th Grade finished second in the competition proper and that's very encouraging for the Club's prospects.

1st, 3rd and 5th Grades and the Women's team languished comparatively but 1st Grade came home with a wet sail - they're on the verge of the big breakthrough.

There were a number of outstanding individual performances throughout the Grades, with David Gallop's 37 wickets and some invaluable batting contributions earning him Player of the Year.

The undoubted high point was the extraordinary season that Michael Slater had in his rookie 1st class season - over 1,000 1st class runs culminating in his selection for the Ashes Tour. Michael joins Geoff Lawson as the Club's Australian representatives and he has the talent and temperament to make the same run-scoring contribution that Henry has made in the bowling arena.

Recently Life Memberships were conferred upon Greg Livingstone and Jim Robson and a tribute to them is set out elsewhere in this

Report. Both were again outstanding contributors to the Club and 1st Grade.

Our heartfelt thanks to those invaluable 'members' of the Club; David Lemon, Tom Boyce, Anne and Bob Cotts and Reg Bresuch. In a Club which has lacked the traditional opportunities for significant off-field support, they are integral to the performances of 1st and 2nd Grades. We trust that they have enjoyed their continuing association and expect that when the exciting addition of the Sam Cracknell comes on stream next season and the Vice-President's scheme expands further, they will have some much-needed infrastructure and support!

Finally, my thanks to the Club's Committee and in particular, Len Godber, Rob Anderson, Geoff Lawson, Jack Carmichael and Dave Downing for their special contributions.

## UNIVERSITY OF NEW SOUTH WALES CRICKET CLUB

### JIM ROBSON AND GREG LIVINGSTONE - LIFE MEMBERSHIPS

The UNSW Cricket Club has a long and illustrious history stretching back into the late 1940's when the site we are located upon now was still a primordial swamp from which Paddy Grattan-Smith was emerging. The Village Green was a long way from the superbly prepared batting strip and immaculate outfield we have today when the ground staff put down their cards for an hour or two each day. Only Greg Robinson can recall playing serious matches on the library lawn and seeing Grace bat at the Domain against the Twenty Two of the Colony. The game has progressed and so have the players, but we have among us tonight two club members who give the impression that they have always been at the Cracknell, always in first grade, always amongst the runs and invariably always first to the bar.

Jim Robson began his academic life on this campus in 1974 at a time when the Vietnam conflict was dying a political death and John Watkins, the Newcastle wrist-spinner, almost died of embarrassment. In fact, John Watkins and James George Robson had much in common - both wore pyjamas on their first international air flights and both bowled part-time legspin when quick runs were given away in the hope of a declaration. Subsequently, Watkins was on his way to the West Indies and Jungle was off on a cricket crusade of another type, to the famed home of Basil D'Oliveira, Glen Turner and Greg Watson at the Worcestershire County Cricket Club, to learn more about the game he loved. Jungle at various times inhabited the Colleges and dormitories of the lower campus so that he could be close to his dearly beloved Village Green and as far from the library as possible. It was significant that during his term on the groundstaff in 1983, as the Assistant Pitch Preparer, a dramatic improvement in the standard of batting surface was produced for the upper order. But the worm has well and truly turned ... he has spent the last four years whinging about the lack of deviation in the pitch and how tough it is to bowl on. How times change - and yet how much they remain the same. James George Robson has played 275 grade games for the club, 274 of those have been in first grade. He has amassed 7950 runs in 294 innings in the top team at 31.30. Along the way he collected 43 half centuries and 6 tons with a highest score of 124. He has been renowned as a slip catcher of exceptional talent and, in the recently released autobiography of Geoff Lawson (\$21.95 at most bookstores or available from Henry's boot at a mere \$20), was named in the top three slip fieldsmen Henry has played with or against and that includes the likes of Greg Chappell, Allan Border, Clive Lloyd, Rick McCosker, Greg Matthews, Mark Taylor and Duncan Coots - salubrious company indeed.

I understand that in recent years he has moved himself from the slips cordon but occasionally wanders back to show the youth of the club that the legend has some basis. Team-mates well remember one catch he took at 2nd slip at Chatswood Oval to dismiss Mick Falk - horizontal, fully-stretched, low to his right. He has taken 158 catches. Many captains did not realise the all-round ability that Jim possessed so his bowling statistics lag behind that marvellous batting effort. His deceptive off-spin has claimed many an unwary bat in the autumn of Jungle's career so much so that he has 158 victims

off 1842 overs at the highly creditable average of 25.40. Wayne Seabrook, the maker of a century on debut for NSW, will never forget the seer that removed his middle stump first ball at the VG on the fastest of pitches - he played just slightly inside of the line allowing for a modicum of spin, but the angle coming around the wicket, as was his usual preference, completely fooled him. The ball did not deviate a millimetre.

John Parker said of Monty Noble in 1926 "He was, of course, an off-spinner, had all the virtues of length and control, but added to them some curious features which made his bowling different". Perhaps Jungle took personal coaching off the great M A Noble. He is feared among opposition players for his unplayable straight ball, his 27 yarder and delivering while the batsman is not looking. He has bowled many balls while neither the keeper or slip have been looking and, as extraordinary as this sounds, was once officially timed at an over in 57 seconds. He was the chief architect behind the team's win in the Roy Turner Trophy for the fastest over rate in grade cricket back in 1989. Defying belief, three times he has taken 5 wickets in an innings. There is the possibility that if he maintains form and (more unlikely) fitness, that he could become the only player ever in Sydney grade cricket to score 10,000 runs and take 250 wickets. If only JR and Mark Ray had bowled him more back in the late '70s and early '80s.

But Jungle's contribution to the Club goes far beyond the on-field feats. He has been mentor and confidant to every player from 7th grade to 1st and has helped enormously with relations with the groundstaff and academic community so long was his close association with them. To see the young members of the club gather 'round Jungle at the bar after a particularly humid Saturday afternoon in the field passing on the folklore of the black and gold is to see history perpetuated. These days they have to be quick to see him though as he has the first half dozen down inside 7pm before rushing home to oversee the training of the next generation of Robson athletes.

As the amber liquid flows, the Robson volume increases and those under his influence marvel at the remembrances of years gone by, particularly those of an off-field nature. We still recall seeing him face Lenny Pascoe back in the great summer of '76-'77 when the semi-final victory was all but in the bag and the fiery Mick Watt was assisted from the VG with the aid of a stretcher having been struck by a short delivery from the temperamental Croatian from the Bankstown Club. In those times Jungle came in at number three, a spot he has since vacated for the safer depths of five or six depending on how, as he explains it, Sam and Gus slept the night before. Robson, without helmet, for that was a time when raw courage and fortitude of character carried you through, rather than technology or tensile strength, strode to the middle before a bulging Kensington crowd and calmly ducked the first Pascoe thunderbolt as big Len was only halfway down his run. The ball was of good length but such was the youthful Robson's reactions that he managed to duck even lower and the ball passed harmlessly an inch above the balls. This action fortified his 'varsity team mates to such an extent that we went on to record an easy victory and subsequently won the title. Mick Watt was permanently affected.

Alas, the Robson hamstrings are not what they used to be and his innings are now restricted to something less than three and a half hours. He is universally like by team



mates and opposition and has been in the placings in the Herald Awards regularly. Around the Sydney grade scene, Jungle's name translates immediately to UNSW cricket and the game played for the game's sake. When other players pick up the Sunday paper and sift through the scores, they invariably find J. Robson with runs or wickets in the adjacent column. Henry has said that the Sheffield Shield players frequently comment that Jungle is "a vcrly good player" and that understated compliment means a lot from those at the top for it is genuine and respectful. If he had been born on the banks of the Severn at Kidderminster or Stowbridge, then he may have made all those runs wearing green and black instead of gold and black and one never knows just how far he could have progressed up the representative cricket tree. Certainly the NSW selectors have ignored his consistency and achievements when those more stylish but unperformed have been given the opportunities. He has never been pretty to watch but his style is immediately recognisable as his own and certainly effective. They should have known that the late cut is even more effective on the faster pitches and outfield of the first class grounds.

Jungle holds the unique position of being the skipper of the team that won the Club's first ever championship, that of the Poidevin-Gray trophy some 16 seasons ago, and his stirring half-time speech to the young and inexperienced proved the turning point ... he looked deeply into the eyes of each individual and intoned "If we move up in a straight line of defence and don't miss a tackle they can't beat us!!" And neither did they. A club member for what seems like all of his life will now truly be a life member.

A man to arrive at the Kensington campus not long after J G Robson was Gregory Robert Livingstone. The rookie left-hander from the Border district began his career at the Club as a bowler in 5th grade after being demoralised in O'Farrell Cup clashes against Wagga. That initial selection goes to prove that the selectors at this Club can always identify talent when they see it. Livo went from 5ths to 1sts in the same season and played a starring role in our 1st grade premiership win in the '76-'77 season after being "discovered" by Jungle in the P-G series as an opening batsman. Livo's stoush with the already infamous Brian Riley in that final is a well entrenched part of the Club's folklore. We won the game against a much more experienced playing and sledging side because of that 60 odd when the cause was lost. Greg hurt his pinkie when fielding the next day and called for a substitute, a practice he apparently continues today when the weather is a bit hot or the outfield a fraction bumpy.

Livo went on to represent NSW Colts and had some success opening the innings at the WACA under Dirk Wellham's leadership (when he was still in the State and had most of his faculties). He has now played 252 games for the Club of which 240 of those have been in first grade. His brief forays into 2nd grade have proven a nightmare for opposition attacks. Livo has averaged 117 when dropped! He has made 7185 first grade runs at 30.67 with 41 50s and 5 100s, with the highest Club 1st grade score of 201\* (on the shortest boundary in Sydney cricket at Trumper Oval). Despite his hands, he has

taken 102 catches but has lagged well behind Jungle at the bowling crease having delivered only 31 overs for three wickets which, given the predisposition of captain/bowlers, is also an indication that he hasn't captained the side a great deal. In a season where 1st grade was on the wrong end of the toss more times than not, Greg topped the run scorers with 577 at 41.21 and played two innings, one against Sydney University and the other against Balmain on an extremely difficult wicket, that would have done a Test player proud.

He has the determination and concentration that would go well spread among some other batsmen in the Club in large doses. Like Jungle, the State selectors have not been kind when quite clearly he had, still has, the ability technique and temperament of a first class player. Before his excursion onto the baseball mound he was as good in the outfield as Jungle was in the slips. This may be a bit hard for younger club members to comprehend having seen him throw handbags in from the fence in recent years but nevertheless it is true and they will have to accept the apocryphal evidence from those with memories long enough to go back that far.

Greg's repeated irritation of "Silent" John Sands goes back many years when he batted the whole day against Penrith in the '80-'81 semi-final for the even hundred. He did a magnificent job for his team that day but "Silent" insisted on bagging Livo for his slow play which succeeded in bringing the Final to the Village Green and then resulted in another premiership.

Sir Leonard Hutton's words on Trevor Bailey are equally applicable to Greg Livingstone .. "he always showed an infinite capacity for rising to an occasion and he was never perturbed by spectators who might sometimes not appreciate his worth when he took a long time over his runs".

Greg's answer to criticism has always been demonstrable rather than verbal and his record and respect around the grade scene is full testimony to that. Greg works with all club members on physical and mental aspects and he has been instrumental in the development of Michael Slater's skills that have had to be fine-tuned in the tough stream of Sydney grade cricket. All those who have spent time at the crease with Livo will know what a calming and reassuring figure he is out in the middle and under pressure.

It is not just the higher grade players that have benefited from his experience. He does not play favourites; he simply talks to those who will listen and he has plenty of valuable stuff to pass on no matter how much you know or think you know. Greg has been involved in the Club administration for almost 15 years and has been tireless in his contribution behind the scenes doing jobs from social committee to recruitment officer.

His work on Henry's testimonial function at the Roundhouse was monumental and once again proved his unselfishness and willingness to contribute on a Club level as well as an individual level. Livo's academic record would be the envy of many students recording a number of High Distinctions at the same time as devoting time to playing, training and club administration. He did most of this while living with Jackie Jourdain and Henry which truly puts into perspective the sacrifices Livo has made.

Even his great thirst for Victorian beer was put aside as he battled for scholastic and sporting excellence. The story abounds that on one occasion he was dragged physically from his room and deposited at the Royal Hotel still clutching his chair and slide rule. If a couple of the younger current players could restrain themselves from the demon alcohol they may find similar prosperity on and off the field as Livo. His contribution to the Club on and off the field has been of the highest denomination and, like Jungle, the Committee spent all of about three seconds in approving his elevation to life membership although a veto from the Treasurer was ruled out of order. Livo is just 765 runs behind Jungle so we know he will play again next season in an attempt to pass the scialic all-rounder. When a player and person sets such a fine example to the rest of the Club we can only hope he will play on indefinitely.

Livo and Jungle become the 18th and 19th members of the University of New South Wales Cricket Club to have bestowed on them the ultimate accolade. Fittingly, they follow hot on the heels of a similar accolade having been bestowed on their great friend and cricketing partner, Geoff Lawson.

From our own personal viewpoints, they have been the quintessential team-mates and friends. They represent everything that one could ever hope to bottle as the appropriate formula for Life Member. We would ask you to join us in congratulating Jim Robson and Greg Livingstone.

## FIRST GRADE REPORT

All those in possession of a 1989-90 Annual report read no further, just substitute the correct year and change a couple of names.

In a season marred by wet weather and corresponding wet pitches there were not many runs scored. Livo was the highest run scorer with 577 at 91.21 and the old boy continues to set the example for those with younger bodies (and much younger minds) around him. His 122 v Sydney Uni was the innings of a Test player and the 73 on the dodgiest of tracks v Balmain likewise. I have never seen the aging left-hander play better than in 92-93, perhaps all that handyman work has made him fitter. He was an example to the whole club and I hope the young batsman were seeking his advice on every occasion. His fielding while not of the lofty standards of the early '80's was characterised by constant effort and utmost determination. He took a brilliant low one-hander going away to his right at mid-wicket to virtually win us the Hawkesbury game and that was in no small way due to his exertions at Friday night fielding practice. His off-field duties in administration were almost as noteworthy and certainly commensurate with the highest recognition. His bowling needs work.

It would be fair to say that losing the first three tosses and getting the worst of the wicket in the fourth game did not help our usual somnolent start to the season but there were occasions when our application and preservation of our wickets would have turned games around instead of resignation of defeat. It is not good enough to practice on the artificial wickets on Tuesday, Thursday and Friday then complain when the match conditions are totally different. The hard work that is done at training will reap its rewards on Saturday. If the practice wickets are poor then all the more reason to get in and have a hit not storm off in a whingeing fit. Those who do it easy at practice rarely do it easy on Saturdays.

Training itself was reasonably attended but not intense enough for those aspiring to first grade cricket. Unfortunately my presence at training was sporadic and in between times there were reports of much malingering. The disappointing aspect of the whole season is that there is so much talent available but not many are reaching their potential. As the super coach was fond of saying "potential never won nothing". Amen.

After six rounds we were dead last. Zero points and looking for a largish hole to dive in especially as Seconds were continually winning close and even hopeless games. We should have been setting the example for them but thankfully they were setting it for us. Finally we got the better of a toss and soundly whipped the Sydney Uni boys then went on to win four of the next five to (unbelievably) have a chance of making the semi-finals. Once again the weather did us no favours at Drummoyne and the season fizzled. The highlight of the play-off charge was the 'all but' outright against Sutherland when we really played like a top four team, with true belief in ourselves and just a touch of arrogance. Keep that game in your minds boys for that is how to win at cricket.

The West's and Randwick debacles were salutary lessons in grasping the opportunities when they came along, for if those two games had been turned into victories then the season would have gone at least a week later. The victory over North's proved we could handle the tough situations and win the close ones. In a competition of 13 rounds of which at least three will be shortened by the elements, every game must be considered with care, every inning played with diligence, every ball fielded or caught with urgency and desire and every bowl delivered with thought and concentration. In short, every ball of the season is important. The most important ball in the game is the next one you face or the next one you deliver or the next one that you field. Too often our minds were ahead or behind the match and not on the current situation.

There was much despair through the summer and yet even more promise and hope. Our eventual 10th place finish was smack bang in the middle but all the players know they are much more capable of going higher. Greater attention to practice, and that means quality and not just quantity, will be a good start.

Apart from Livo's excellent performance in a wet year Slates made one century and three half tons in nine innings. Even he would admit that a player of his calibre must still concentrate at grade level and he must set his goals very high. He is a class batsman as his selection for the Ashes tour demonstrates and I hope that by the time this is published he will have played his first Test match. Cybil has all the shots and is a joy to watch as he carves up the opposition attack with ferocious cutting and hooking. I doubt that we will see much of him at the crease from now on as his representative duties increase but he will always be at the pub for a beer. His bowling needs work.

Jason Young began well against Gordon, then faded for a time always looking to be on the way to a big score but falling often to one loose shot or mental lapse. Towards the end he really clicked technically and mentally, finishing with 54, 63\* and 138 in consecutive innings. Youngy was only the second batsman to make 500(509) after Livo. He took perhaps the best outfield catch I have ever seen against Sutherland and I hope his confidence, technique and experience are at a similar level in the coming season for I feel he too can make representative teams if he continues in the same vein that he finished 92-93. His bowling needs work.

The other veteran had his poorest year for some time 299 at 21.35 and only 10 wickets. Jungle would put it down to the added numbers in his family and the burdens of teaching at a prestigious city school. I would put it down to lack of fitness and the avoidance of any strenuous exercise while at cricket training. Typically he would fade physically and mentally toward the end of a session and his poor fitness level had a telling effect on his occupation of the crease. Contrary to Jungle's thoughts, the older you get the harder you have to train...not vice versa! He did set several records for the shortest period between close of play and the downing of the first schooner at the Racecourse Hotel.

Some may say that his thirst for the game has not diminished over 275 games for the club. I predict a bigger and brighter season next year for the former Village Green assistant groundsman.

Young Matthew Phelps was given first opportunity at making the middle order his own but couldn't quite come to terms with the higher standard of the city play. In 10 innings he made 148 at 21.14 and showed glimpses of what we can expect in terms of shot making but a little more discipline and perhaps respect for the bowlers is called for. His stint in 2nds proved valuable and I'm sure he will become a regular in the higher grade in the years to come. His bowling needs work.

Matt Hayward and Duncan Coots both played six innings for around 100 runs. Cootsey looks the goods but insists on giving the keeper and slips regular practice. His century against Campbelltown in the 50 over game was truly that of a top first grade player but he must repeat that sort of effort more regularly if he is to maintain a first grade sport. I didn't see him once at fielding practice and there is not a member of the club who needs it more. His fielding will always count against him if it remains at such a low priority in his cricketing scheme. Hayers played well against Sutherland in difficult circumstances to see us safely through to the win and he has marvellous enthusiasm for the game, I wish others would take his example as their own. If he continues to improve I see a long 1st grade future. His bowling needs work.

Matt Boyer benefited for the drop to 2nds and he nearly won the semi for Serves troops with well thought out 50. If he can transfer that type of play to first grade he will realise some of that immense potential. His bowling needs work.

David Trafford was the top wicket taker with 30 at 27.60. The average may not seem special but bowling at the Village Green is akin to first class tracks and accordingly the team average is higher than other sides. Both Traff and Jack Horley had a tendency to spray the new ball particularly early in the season and the early breakthroughs so necessary at the VG didn't come. The improved fortunes of the team were reflected in the second half of the year by the improved showing of our opening bowling. Jack took 23 at 28.78 but deserved much better. His 'none for' in the last game against Balmain was of Shield standard and the batsman were just not good enough to get a nick. The line, length and general control of both was measurably better at seasons close than at the start. A rapid commencement to next year could see them in the selectors eyes not to mention providing wins for their team. At times Jack's batting looked competent but he needs to spend more time in the nets to develop. He was the top catch taker with 10 and has found an unexpected niche in the slip cordon which is a bit of a pity as he is needed to chase and throw in the mid and outfield. Jack's 6-37 in the one-dayer against Campbelltown was outstanding, his last six overs yielding 6-12 and contributing largely to that win.

The enigmatic Adrian White took 25 at 24.24 which included '5 fors' against Wests and SU. To say that he took a catch that categorically won a match may have seemed fanciful to many throughout the Sydney Grade Competition but his snare at fine-leg v North Sydney did just that. A memorial obelisk will be constructed in recognition of that achievement as soon as the new Cracknell is completed. Whitey's biggest problem was lack of consistency. Amid a good spell along would come a couple of bad deliveries but he did bowl very well at times and the average indicates that indeed some quality stuff was sent down. With Jungle losing penetration Whitey was called on far more to get the vital wickets. If he can overcome the erratic balls then he will become a very useful bowler. His dedication to training could not be faulted. His batting needs some work.

Disco only got through 59 overs for 17 at 27.57 but a break from football will do him good so he can assume the genuine allrounders spot next season. I took 13 at 19.84 in 125 overs of the gentlest medium pace. The game is so much easier off the very short run. Capital Gainsford, Mergs and Dave Carroll made appearances with the ball. Youngy took a wicket and was not called on again for the rest of the season.

Michael Back and Michael Kovacs kept the wickets. Stan, 3/1 was not at his best and gave way to Kurly who kept very well 12/1. Both these guys like a throw at the stumps and an argument with their captain which I'm sure doesn't help their concentration a great deal. Kurly showed some batting skill when coming in as the nightwatchman and may find himself permanently with the job.

Our effort in the 50 over competition was creditable winning 2 from 3 and having a chance to make the play-offs with a win over Penrith in the last game. Rain effected two games but the extra matches helped our fielding, which was very good, and our confidence.

Pre-season training and practice will start earlier and be much tougher in 93-94 as it must be if we are rid ourselves of the pre-Christmas malaise. It is not good enough to repeatedly say that you are unlucky or that the team is capable of making the semi's, each individual must go out and play their part. And that starts well before the season does.

Thanks to Livo and Disco for skippering the side with aplomb in my many absences. Thanks also to Dave Lemon and Slogger Boyce who carried out the scoring duties in their inimitable efficient manners and to Bob Coote who helped on match days and ran training smoothly. The vice-presidents on duty was a very good innovation which I hope will continue and grow. Finally but not lastly a big thank you to the ladies who either organised afternoon tea or organised their other halves (usually both), without your support Saturdays do not run smoothly especially with the Cracknell being demolished halfway through the season. With our new Pavilion things can only go forward for the club in the future.

## SECOND GRADE REPORT

Continuing from where we left off in each of the 2 previous seasons, seconds powered through the 1992/93 season to finish Minor Premiers by 8 points and in great shape for the finals. Our record of 1 outright win, 1 outright tie (first innings win), 8 first innings wins, one rain affected draw and 2 first innings losses was a great stepping stone to the finals and it is with more than a little sadness to report that we failed for the first time when it mattered most, losing our first close game in 3 seasons in the semi-final against Gordon.

As those who were watching will probably testify, it was a great game of cricket, one I will remember for a long time and one I was proud to be a part of. After a very disappointing batting performance on the first day, being bowled out for 154 on a reasonable Village Green wicket, it was typical of seconds to bowl and field our way back into the game with the odds against us and a 9/150 a loss just didn't seem an option. Anyway history will show it wasn't meant to be, although to get as close as we did in the circumstances says all that can be said about the talent, team spirit and invincible attitude of this team.

The season's highlights were many and to mention just a few:

- \* our tail hung in to pull the game out of the fire against Wests. After Pratty held the innings together early with 43, Morgs and Disco got us close before Disco and Kurly got the last 6 runs with one wicket in hand on a difficult pitch.
- \* centuries by both Matty Hayward and Breuschy in reaching 2/310 against Waverley's 174.
- \* the outright tie against Sydney Uni with Capital 6/45 in the first innings and Pratty 63 n.o. in our second innings.
- \* a second grade club record opening partnership of 113 by Cootsy and Pratty setting up a win against Mosman.
- \* 5 catches by Stan (2 of which were gems), giving him 200 for the club, in a convincing first innings win against North Sydney at a critical time of the season.
- \* centuries by both Pratty (his first ever for the club) and Phelps (also his first but arguably not as significant as Pratty's!!) and a second grade club record second wicket undefeated partnership of 240 in compiling 1/266 in reply to Sutherland's 263.
- \* the outright win against Balmain in the last round with Clem taking 6/20 on a dampish wicket in their second innings.

Led by great performances behind the stumps all season, first by Kurly and then Stan, with a couple of appearances by Dave Little, our fielding and catching was always right up there. We dropped very few catches with Breuschy sharp in slips, Lollers sensational in close and Pratty as consistent as ever in the covers and outfield.

Early in the season Matty Hayward, and Morgs lower in the order, led the way with the bat with Hays thoroughly deserving his mid-season promotion to first grade.

Breuschy had a consistently good year with the bat and after not being able to capitalise on starts in the previous season he scored 2 hundreds this year with his 129 against Hawkesbury being as good an innings as you could wish to see. Breuschy still has a lot to offer in first grade and I hope we see him right up there next season.

After a disappointing start, Pratty came home strongly showing the sort of form which should see him pressing strongly for a first grade spot next season. It was more than a pleasure, an honour, to watch Pratty score his first hundred for the club against Sutherland and to celebrate in the dressing room afterwards.

Phelps made a big impact in his limited appearances in seconds towards the end of the season. He dominated throughout his innings of 130 n.o. against Sutherland and had the ability to perform at much higher levels if he applies himself.

Both Cootsy and Matty Boyer played below their ability during their time in seconds although they played well in the semi-final before a lapse in concentration let Cootsy down and Matty ran out of partners. Both have the ability to secure regular first grade spots. I hope we see Matty approach his batting throughout next season like he did in the last hour and a half of the semi-final.

Lollers had a disappointing season but with limited opportunities. However he played a critical innings of 60 to help set up a win against North Sydney and his close-in fielding was always sensational.

Paul Urquhart also had 3 games in seconds and got starts on 2 occasions but did not go on with it. Hopefully we'll see a lot more of Paul in the higher grades next season.

On to bowling and I think it is fair to say we had the strongest (or at least one of the strongest) attacks in the competition with Morgs, Capital and Clem leading the way. They each finished within the top 14 in the second grade statistics for the association.

Morgs led the way with 37 wickets, bagging 4 or more in an innings on 5 occasions and together with a batting average of just over 25 for the season was a deserved winner of the Club's Player of the Season Award.

Dave Gainsford also had a big year, bowling generally with more consistency than the previous season and he thoroughly deserved the opportunity in firsts when it was their mid season. Capital bowled fast, with real penetration and constantly made things happen. Hopefully we will see him make things more than a little uncomfortable for a few first grade batsmen next season.

Big Clem continued as he has done for several seasons and formed the perfect attack with Morgs and Capital. Clem's statistics say it all - 31 wickets at 15 and 104 maidens out of 259 overs. LA pleasure and almost an honour to have the big fella in the team and notwithstanding the odd nagging injury, I'm sure we'll see him back for another crack at a premiership next season.

Dave Carroll looked threatening at times but unfortunately his control let him down from time to time. Christmas really worked hard all season and hopefully he'll be able to turn it around next year.

In limited opportunities, Dave Downing did his job with the ball. He turned the game against Northern Districts our way with 4 wickets including a superb caught and bowled. Unfortunately, after a reasonable start to the season with the bat, D squared struggled to find the form he is capable of.

Disco did well with both bat and ball in the couple of games he had in seconds prior to being recalled to firsts.

Pratty and Lollers also generally bowled well when called on as did both Whitey and Tim Buckett in their only games in seconds.

Off the field we continued to receive great support from Bob and Anne Coots and Reg Breusch throughout the year. The scorebook was maintained immaculately by Anne as in the past and her, Bob's and Reg's enthusiasm and encouragement were always greatly appreciated by the players as was their assistance with the scoreboard, drinks and afternoon tea.

On behalf of the team I would like to thank everyone for their support and encouragement over the course of the season and in the semi-final. The improvement in the club's overall performance this season was great to see and hopefully we can build on that next year in both Club Championship and by picking up a premiership or 2. But we must all put the work in first!!

Finally, it is with more than a tinge of sadness that I write this report. My direct involvement with the club comes to an end at least for now after 6 seasons (including the last nearly 4 as second grade skipper) with my work transfer to Cincinnati in the US. The last 6 seasons of cricket have been very enjoyable and personally satisfying for me, both on and off the field, and I will miss it very much.

A huge thank you to all the players who have made the last few seasons so successful in second grade. Thank you for your support and for the memories, and best of luck to all club members in the coming season.

### THIRD GRADE REPORT

#### 4TH GRADE REPORT

A season which appeared set to be ruined by rain before it had hardly started ended being a most enjoyable and successful season. Losing our first game of the year and having 4 of the first seven games drawn after being rain affected the side then went on to record 4 wins, a tie and a draw to finish the competition rounds in second place. Despite losing the semi-final to Randwick (eventual premiers) I believe the team may justifiably look back at the season with considerable pride.

The side's ability to make the semi-finals was largely achieved on the back of a number of resolute performances where the team refused to quit when the odds were clearly against us. Three performances in particular stand out in this regard being:

- \* Against North Sydney on a greenish wicket with the ball seaming considerably the side found itself 6-72 chasing 243 when Mark Mullen and Warren Saunders came together in a partnership of 138 which enabled us to pass them 7 wickets down.
- \* At Hawkesbury on a very good batting wicket we managed a paltry 213, which at the time appeared nowhere near enough. However by bowling an extremely tight line and length and with great support in the field we were able to exert considerable pressure under which they eventually collapsed for 135.
- \* In the final round against Balmain with the side needing at least a point to make the semi-finals Balmain won the toss and batted on a traditional David Phillips wicket and at no time attempted to push for victory. After batting well into the second day Balmain were finally dismissed for 264 leaving us 63 overs to get the required runs. After being 6 for 165 in pursuit of the runs Steve Norbury came to the rescue with a great innings of 60 and was ably supported in cameo performances by Warren Saunders (33) and Matt Sanders (20) which enabled us to tie the match on the last ball with one wicket in hand.

Whilst making the semi-finals was a great performance by the side considerable satisfaction was also gained from the achievements of several individuals in the team. The development of Mark Mullen into a quality all rounder during the season was great to witness. Finally giving show to some of the talents that I always believed he had. With a little more dedication and application I believe Mark should become a regular higher grade player.

Steve Norbury also gave notice with a number of stylish performances that cricket at a higher level is not beyond him. Whilst Mark and Steve were displaying their undoubted talents it was equally pleasing to see the development of Warren Saunders during the season. Warren is the type of cricketer every successful side needs, showing considerable guts and determination both with bat and ball and his attitude became infectious throughout the side.

Mention should also be made of the younger players such as Mark Leahy, Gary Hill and Andrew Johns on who at different times displayed enough talent to suggest that should have considerable success in grade cricket with the right application.

It would also be remiss of me not to mention the contribution of the "old-stagers" Lenny "the Dasher" Godber, Andrew "the hat" Shaw and Rattler Lupton who contributed significantly to the team spirit and showed the younger players the way.

The only negative matter to arise and consistently show itself throughout the season was what can only be described as our abysmal catching. In the end it was this aspect of our game which most contributed to our loss in the semi-final and hopefully will result in greater emphasis being placed on this aspect of our game next season.

Finally, I would like to thank all the players who contributed to what for me was a thoroughly enjoyable and rewarding season. Special thanks should also be given to Ray for again preparing what can only be described as the best 4th grade wickets in the competition.
