REPORT OF THE MANAGEMENT COMMITTEE

Gentlemen,

The Twentieth Annual Report and Financial Statement of the University of New South Wales Cricket Club is presented for your approval.

There were five teams representing the Club in 1969-70, one in each of the "A" and "B" Municipal and Shires Competition, two in the "C" Shires Competition, and a fifth eleven played in City and Suburban fixtures. The past season marked the end of an era for the Club - the first season since 1963-64 that the Club did not win a Premiership or the Club Championship. We part with the Club Championship Trophy after winning it for five seasons in succession. Congratulations to Lane Cove Club on their victory. As was the case in 1968-69, the "A" Shires team were Minor Premiers only to be beaten in the Final, this time by Wentworthville-Blacktown Club. Congratulations to Wentworthville on their success in their first season in "A" Shires. The "B" Shires team finished in fifth position for the second successive season. The depth of the Club was emphasised by the results of the two "C" Shires teams. The "Cl" Shires team finished third, after missing a place in the Final on percentages, and the "C2" Shires team finished in fourth position in the same competition. Although the fifth eleven did not record many wins in the City and Suburban fixtures the overall standard of play and approach to the game was a credit to the Club.

The highlight of the Intervarsity programme was the Carnival held in Brisbane during February. Only one win in three matches was recorded by the Club, the two losses being to the eventual finalists. Matches were also played against Newcastle Western Australia and Flinders Universities, with the opponent being victorious in each case. Unavailability of several of the eligible higher grade players was probably the major factor contributing to the Club's rather poor showing in Intervarsity. However, players new to Intervarsity competition gained valuable experience and the benefit of this experience should be evident next season.

A game was also played against Combined New Zealand Universities who proved too strong for the "Wales Eleven". Congratulations to Jim Pratley and David Wills on their selection in the Combined Australian Universities side which played a "test" against New Zealand Universities at Newcastle. Jim Pratley captained the Australian side. Social matches were played against Randwick, Burwood, Wollongong University College, Duntroon Military College and the "World XI". A single-wicket competition was held towards the end of the season and was won by David Wills.

The Club was fortunate to have the services of Mr Wilf Ewens, from Cumberland Club, during the season in the capacity of "Honorary Coach". Mr Ewens attended many of the mid-week practice sessions and his advice and comments were greatly appreciated by those Members present on these occasions. The Committee is grateful to Mr Ewens for his interest in the Clu and for the valuable assistance given to the Members.

The Annual Dinner held on 2nd June, was an outstanding success. Members present were entertained by Mr Peter Philpot who proposed the "Toast to Cricket", and Mr David de Carvalho who responded to the toast. Rev. Stan Eldred of Epping Club proposed the "Toast to the Club" to which Mr Tim Creer replie In the absence of our Patron, Mr E.H. Davis, the Bursar's Trophy for the most successful allrounder was presented to Geoff Garland by the Vice-Chancellor, Prof. R.H. Myers. Capt. John Morris presented his personal trophy for fielding to Roger Robertson. The Bar-Turn Trophy, presented by Club Member Clem Barrington and Bob Turner, was this year awarded to Geoff Garland as the Club's actor for 1969-70. In all, fifty-seven people attended the Dinner.

Members should be pleased with the improvement in the financial situation during the season. The untiring efforts of the Committee and the support of the Members were the principal factors in bringing about this improvement. However, it was unfortunate that not all Committee Members shared the same enthusiasm and cooperation shown by others. Attendances at Committee Meetings were often disappointing, and on more than one occasion matters of considerable importance were decided with several Committee Members absent.

Finally, the Management Committee wishes to thank all those who gave both moral and material support to the Club.

SECOND ELEVEN REPORT

The B's finished high up on the premiership table and had the distinction of beating the eventual Premiers, Lane Cove, twice. However, the season was disappointing with more bad cricket played by the team than good. Bad cricket is poor performance due not to lack of ability but lack of dedication, application, concentration, common sense and even, at times, guts. Our failure to perform as well as hoped for could be summarised as being because the team's:-

- * fielding was usually terrible; at times count was lost of the number of catches dropped in one afternoon; the ground fielding gave the impression we were playing on freshly-ploughed rice-growing swamps and the throwing was invariably good from the boundary after a hit for four had been retrieved.
- * batting, until the last few games, lacked any authority or sensibly aggressive intent; under pressure, such as against Wentworthville, despair was complete.
- * slow bowling failed to get wickets or contain opposing batsmen; this was probably the most significant difference in the team's efforts compared with the premiership wins of recent seasons.

Other disquieting features included consistent lateness by a number of players. Even those responsible for bringing the kit were late on more than one occasion. The distressing thing here was the absence of any apologies from latecomers. If a catch goes through the necessarily vacant third slip position in those first few overs the latecomers are letting the team and the Club down. And they are letting the game of cricket down.

There were, however, a number of good team performances. Against Lane Cove early in the season, after Uni. had only made 171 at Longueville, the fieldsmen, for once, supported the bowlers in dismissing them for 136. In an all day game, Epping had beaten us on the first innings. Phil Heaney, taking 8-28, bowled them out in an hour for 72 and then requiring 98 to win off 12 overs we failed by only 7 runs. The second win against Lane Cove was memorable. Chasing 248, we slumped from 2-142 to 9-201. Phil Heaney, with Bob Turner, put on 79 for the last wicket. The batting against Canterbury in the last game of the season was probably the most powerful performance by the B's for years. We made 4-326 and at one stage were 2-294. Hugh Hopkins made a grand century and Jock Martel made 69 not out in half an hour with 9 fours and 3 sixes.

We were very much in the premiership race when we played Wentworthville. Our first innings debacle of 57 could be excused by the wet wicket and good bowling. The second innings effort for the supreme tally of 50 had no such mitigations. Blatant abdication describes most of the batting efforts. The next game was against Ryde and who can remember when they last beat us? They made 213 on the first day. We counted 14 dropped catches up to shortly after tea and then gave up (in more ways than one). In between Saturdays half the team went to Brisbane for Intervarsity. The batting on the second day by most of the IV representatives indicated that a mixture of LSD, heroin and shredded copies of Tharunka had been added to the Brisbane beer.

Phil Heaney was the star performer in the team. In his first season with the Club, he showed the potential of being a very good cricketer. He was the most successful bowler combining fitness and intelligence with a real killer attitude. He also played some fine innings including the 73 at Lane Cove in the game mentioned above where he showed great temperament in the crisis. He will score a lot of runs with a little more discretion.

Hugh Hopkins was the leading batsman. He hit the ball hard and often, and it was noticeable that our most dismal batting efforts came when Hugh was in the A's. His only technical fault was that he played across the line too much but if he holds that cover drive in reserve in the early overs he should score many runs.

Ray Bayfield was pipped for the bowling average by a whisker. As always, he set an example for younger players in everything he did on the field. His 7-52 against Burwood was great bowling. Remember the way he swung one around the legs of Tom Mobbs and then skittled Graham Corderoy next ball with one just as good.

Clem Barrington does not have the physical prowess of some people. Like Ray Bayfield, however, Clem plays cricket to the utmost of his ability all the time. Clem's keeping was especially praiseworthy when it is realised he was carrying a painful injury about which he kept very quiet.

Alan Ridley was a much improved batsman and fieldsman. He is also not as athletic as some but concentrates well and is always trying.

Graeme Cole had, for him, a dismal season. He bowled well at times but more often showed the need for the practice he didn't get. He usually looked good when batting but kept getting out just when he looked set. Even his fielding was well below his usual high standard.

Bob Turner bowled less successfully than in previous seasons. Perhaps more catches than usual were dropped off him but at times one wished for more variety in his bowling.

If Jock Martel and Peter Whalan had played the whole season the team would have gone a lot closer to success. Their batting in the last few games contributed considerably to the wins and rubbed off on the others.

THIRD ELEVEN REPORT

It was an exciting and disappointing season. From whatever aspect it may be viewed, it was a season of contrasts. Whereas by mid-season we were undefeated and were regarded by many of the opposition teams as certain finalists, if not premiers, successive defeats in Rounds 10 and 11 cost us the lead which we did not regain. To maintain our chance of being a finalist, it was necessary to achieve, in the last round, an outright win against Macquarie University, a not inconsiderable task. This outright win was easily obtained before tea on the second day, but gained us only equal second place with Canterbury, 2 points behind ane Cove. On the countback, Canterbury had a better percentage and so, although we had started with probably the best team in the competition, we did not play in the final, a disappointing result. Perhaps the contrast is most clearly seen in the records broken during the season. Of the 9 team records, 4 were broken, but a fifth, the lowest score, was averted by only 2 runs, and yet 3 new partnership records were established.

The season started in a spectacular fashion in the very first round with ony Bailey and Jim Dormon setting a new first wicket record of 148 in 95 minutes. his aggresive and confident approach was to be the key to the successes in the arly rounds, such as the outright win against Auburn in one afternoon in Round 4, im Dormon and John Phipps scoring an undefeated opening partnership of 127 in 80 inutes. However, by mid-season the usual loss of regular players to examinations, acations, higher grades etc., had begun to take its toll, and although the eplacements performed admirably, the momentum of the early season could not be aintained, and the middle order batting often demonstrated a somewhat brittle haracter. Although collectively the batting may have shown this fragility in id-season, every recognised batsmen produced at least one fine performance just hen it was needed - with the very notable exception of the Lindfield match but, ven there, Ian Duncan singlehandedly saved the innings from being an even worse ebacle. Despite there being no centuries scored, there were no less than 12 50's cored: Henry Enahoro (79, 54, 51); Tony Bailey (78); Chris Relton (67, 53); im Dormon (63, 59*); John Phipps (58*); Tim Creer (52); Max Bishop (51); Leigh french (50). Clearly the outstanding performance of the season was Henry Enachoro's 9 against Canterbury, when he and John Owen, beautifully playing the sheet anchor ole, established a new 9th wicket partnership of 111, and came within a hair's readth of saving the match, after the 8th wicket had fallen at 141, 119 runs short f Canterbury's total. Of the other batsmen who did not score a 50, Ian Duncan, loyd Ferreira, Steve Gibbs, John Owen and Alan Thomas all contributed fine innings t various times, often sacrificing their wickets, and averages, in going for quick uns.

The bowling was consistently good throughout the whole season, George Preston, ick Preiss and Phil Schofield each taking more than 30 wickets, with Schofield stablishing a new record of 57 wickets. In the early season, George Preston and lck Preiss provided a formidable opening attack, George swinging the ball further and more accurately than any opposing batsman had ever previously encountered and ck, given the conditions, bowling the occasional rearing bouncer. On George's turn to the country his replacement, John Owen, then obtained, in his first match best performance of the season (7-15) and subsequently showed a fine all-round ility. Always backing up the opening attack was a reassuringly efficient spin io of Gibbs, Relton and Schofield who, collectively, accounted for some 80 odd position wickets.

Although it certainly did not appear so at times, the fielding was resumably no worse than in previous seasons, and if statistics alone are an index, hen it was presumably considerably better. Dick Priess set a new record of 15 atches, and Lloyd Ferreira, called upon early in the season to act as a substitute icketkeeper, grasped the opportunity so competently that he established himself s the permanent wicketkeeper and proceeded to set a new record of 16 catches and stumping.

What then of the past season and the prospects for the coming season? It s patently clear that there will be continued strong opposition from clubs such s Lane Cove and Canterbury who are pursuing a policy of using their third XI to lood their young players under the guidance of several older, very experienced layers. Our own third XI has, overall, continued to increase its stature, but f it is to be successful in the coming seasons, minimally the standard of last eason's team must be maintained, and preferably increased. In terms of team embers, this may mean a rearrangement and rethinking of traditional or current ttidudes, as several of the new, or relatively new, players such as Owen, Enahoro, ibbs and Ffrench, have the potential to play in the higher grades. It may also equire a general reconsideration of team composition with respect to tactical spects; one of the prime reasons for the early season success was an ability to core fast; two of the prime reasons for the subsequent mid-season slumps was an nability of middle order batsmen to maintain concentration and to thus cope ntelligently with accurate off-spin bowling, and the lack of sensible thumpers. t often appears that we lack the particular variety of long-toothed opposition atsman so capable of carving up an inexperienced attack.

All told, it was an exhilerating, albeit ultimately disappointing, season nd one from which I'm sure every member will, in the future, recall at least one ersonal anecdote, be it a catch grapsed unexpectedly while asleep or a morally evastating duck.

FOURTH ELEVEN REPORT

Although the fielding of the team is usually the focus of much merriment at the Regent on Saturdays, and a wailing wall for Tony Epstein, this season was a pleasant surprise, as catches were taken; two occasions that come to mind are, the two catches taken by Stan Livingstone against Pennant Hills, and the breathtaking effort at silly mid-off by Peter James - again against Pennant Hills. With efforts such as these, I can understand why there seems to be a high mortality rate among Fourth XI Captains.

All in all, the season proved very successful, not only from the results achieved, but because of the way everyone enjoyed their cricket and I wish to thank not only every member of the team for their support, but also the players who passed through on their way to better things, the Fifth graders who gave their whole-hearted support, particularly in the match against Auburn, and to Stan Livingstone for his help and steadying influence, without which, who knows what decisions would have been made.

FIFTH ELEVEN REPORT

Time, and sometimes lack of players, often beat us. It was not until the last game of the season that the side collapsed completely to be dismissed for 18 (8 men). The fact that we played next to a licensed bowling club was a good reason to finish early and noone appeared terribly upset at the result. One of the most enjoyable games of the season was against Sydney Judeans who made the game by declaring as soon as they passed our first innings score. Our second attempt showed a marked improvement and we were able to set the opposition a target of 85 runs in 8 overs for outright victory. This they achieved in the last over with the clock showing well after 6.30 p.m..

Overall, the team performed consistently, but it was our batting which let us down most. On occasions, the batting was very good, although a little slow, but there was usually a collapse somewhere along the line from which we could never recover. Apart from Lee Ffrench and Graeme McRae, who quickly found themselves in higher grades, runs were scored mainly by Doug Carlson and Phil Dobell-Brown, with Dick Young sometimes hitting up a score lower down the list. Phil Allen at times looked set for a good score, but usually managed to get out just after reaching double figures.

Bowling was quite a strong point, with Dave Stockley and Ken Schofield the main wicket takers. Phil Allen, Peter Nicholls and Dick Young were sometimes a little unlucky with the ball, while Ian Winter proved a useful bowler from time to time.

The team set a high standard in the field throughout the season. Ground fielding and returns to the wicket were generally good, and according to reports were probably equal to some of the higher grade performances. Although the inevitable catch was dropped, some of the catches taken were truly remarkable efforts. Those that spring to mind are Ian Townsend's "head-protector" at square-leg, Ian Winter's acrobatic efforts against Waverley, and Phil Dobell-Brown's "steal" at backward point.

Despite the usual shortage of players around Christmas time and again towards the end of the season, there was always a solid core who enjoyed their Saturday afternoons in the sunshine and who turned up week after week to face another foe. It was a pleasure to lead these fellows on to the field knowing that it was the way the game was played, not the result, that counted most.

Finally, my thanks to all 44 players who appeared under the Fifths' banner during the season, especially to Vice-Captain Dave Stockley, without whose comments and criticism, who knows when he would have had a bowl!

UNIVERSITY OF NEW SOUTH WALES v NEWCASTLE UNIVERSITY Played 7th-9th December, at Newcastle.

After a quiet, although not uneventful evening, and some well-cooked sausages, we motored to Newcastle on a sunny Sunday morning with the intention of proving that our victory in Sydney the year before could be repeated. Unfortunately this was not to be.

Newcastle won the toss and elected to bat on what turned out to be a beautiful batting wicket. Old rivals Hanley and Tarbox put on 84 before lunch, and then took their partnership to 109 before Robinson had Tarbox caught for 55. Hanley followed soon afterwards for 53, and Newcastle were 2-114. The score mounted steadily in the afternoon session due mainly to a fine innings by Dodd, who hit 13 boundaries in his 77. However, we were still in it with the score at 6-224 just after tea. East and Cornelius then became associated in a seventh wicket stand of 63 and the U.N.S.W. team began to show the effect of a long day in the field. The innings finally closed on the last ball of the day, bowled by a very tired Robinson, after a partnership of 41 for the last wicket by Melville and Craig. Wickets were shared by all the bowlers, Robinson (4-105) and Heaney (2-61) being the most successful.

Following advice from the skipper, the team exercised great restraint at the barbecue held that evening, and all had a fairly sober and early night.

Disaster struck at the end of the first over the next day when Smith, batting in a rare state of sobriety, flashed at a ball outside the off stump and paid the penalty. Hopkins joined McEachran, and this pair added 50 in even time. We were back in the game - so we thought! Mc Eachran, Horwitz and Hopkins left in quick succession, and the score reeled to 4-70. Of the batsmen who followed, only Ridley and Heaney managed to reach double figures, and the innings came to a painful close at 110 after 220 minutes, the last 60 taking just under three hours. All the Newcastle bowlers gained scalps, the best being Davidson (4-44) and Embleton (2-23). Davidson's last 9 overs in the 22 he bowled cost only 5 runs. At one stage, with Embleton operating at the other end, there were 5 consecutive maiden overs bowled.

The early part of our second innings was remarkably similar to the first innings. This time McEachran went cheaply, then Smith and Hopkins added 62 for the second wicket. Fortunately this gloom did not spread into the evening's activities, and after an enjoyable buffet at South Newcastle League's Club, the two teams were entertained by Ridley's now-famous fan-dance. A match race through the streets of Newcastle between Ridley and Thomas followed, and this had to be seen to be believed! "Fidel" won comfortably, and a search party was organised to look for Ridley, who had to be carried home. A blood-curdling scream in the early hours of the morning announced the arrival back at the hotel of a certain opening batsman and a rather tall opening bowler who had been startled by the neighbourhood sheep - or was it a goat?

Back to the cricket! The third day saw a great fight back by U.N.S.W. in an attempt to avoid an innings defeat. Unable to lift his head, Ridley compiled a patient 42 which included 7 fours (running was a little difficult for him) and with Heaney he added 97 runs for the fourth wicket. The lunch score was 4-172. Heaney was dismissed shortly after lunch after a delightful and at times spectacular innings of 62 (10 fours). Horwitz and Thomas each contributed 20, but the innings ended just before tea with the total at 239. Craig, Davidson and Melville each took three wickets.

Dodd faced Ridley in Newcastle's second innings. Three balls were required before the necessary three runs were scored, but in this short space of time Dodd, trying to lose the ball in the pavilion, was dropped twice by a red-headed fieldsman who shall remain nameless.

Congratulations to Newcastle on their well-deserved victory, and our thanks to the hosts for their wonderful and generous hospitality during our short stay.

QUEENSLAND IN CRICKET CARNIVAL.

16th - 19th FEBRUARY 1970, at ST. LUCIA, BRISBANE,

This was the first time such a number of Australian University Cricket Teams had gathered in one city for an official carnival. Eight teams took part from the following universities.

In order to get a decision in one day the cricket was played under the V. & G. 40 overs per innings rules. It was impossible to play every team, however each team played three others.

MONDAY. 16th FEBRUARY. UNIVERSITY OF N.S.W. vs. MELBOURNE UNIVERSITY.

U.N.S.W. won the toss and sent Melbourne into bat on a wicket with "something for the quickies". The N.S.W. bowlers did well to restrict Melbourne to a score of 4-91, but a solid partnership of 76 between Dunne and Jameson consolidated Melbourne's start. Each of these and the remaining Melbourne batsman flung the bat at the ball in a lusty manner and after 40 overs Melbourne were 7-197.

The N.S.W. innings started badly. Both openers were dismissed with the score only 26. However, after a fighting partnership between Harvey and Heaney the score recovered to a sound 3-92. Then disaster struck. Harvey was out and the rest of the team followed in quick succession to be all out for 126.

Of the bowlers McCrist performed best for Melbourne while Emery and Tonkin shared 5 of the 7 wickets for N.S.W. Frank Graham and Greg Robinson bowled steadily. Harvey (37) and Heaney (26) were best of the batsmen for N.S.W. while L'Huillier (35), Dunne (41) and Jameson (38) were Melbourne's best.

17th FEBRUARY. U.N.S.W. vs. SYDNEY UNIVERSITY AT ST. LUCIA No. 1.

Again N.S.W. won the toss and batted in sweltering heat. After a slow but solid opening partnership of 63, the following batsmen failed to consolidate. Apart from Smith (47) and McEachran (20) only Heaney (21) contributed significantly to the final total of 140. Pike was probably the most impressive of the Sydney bowlers who kept well to their task in the conditions.

Sydney then batted and passed the U.N.S.W. score with one wicket down. Lee (79 N.O.), Martin (30), and Rogers (20 N.O.) demoralized the N.S.W. attack.

Phil McEachran again won the toss and batted, and once again N.S.W. collapsed. After a reasonable start (3-83) N.S.W. were all out for 133. Seven of the batsmen reached double figures but none continued to a sizeable score. The wickets were shared evenly among the La Trobe bowlers.
