PRESIDENT'S REPORT

It was a long and hard season, both on and off the field.

The Club did not produce the results we had hoped and fell away in the Club Championship. Having progressed from 11th to 7th to 4th in the three previous seasons, we could only hold down about 11th place again.

This was principally due to the Second Grade side being unable to achieve what had become the norm from recent previous seasons - finish at or near the top. They struggled for the most part and failed to capitalise early in the season on some excellent bowling efforts but the positive is that, under the new captaincy of Mark Charmicael, a younger side was well-blooded and some very encouraging performances emerged in the second half of the season.

Third Grade also struggled with both bat and ball, their low quotient (average runs/average wickets) of 0.7966 suggesting as much.

Fourth Grade finished just one game outside the four and should be congratulated on a very steady, consistent year.

Similarly, Fifth Grade was very competitive and again some encouraging performances (and performers) emerged.

First Grade once again came home with the proverbial wet sail winning 4 of their last 5 games. In a quite extraordinary sequence, the University batsmen scored 435 runs for the loss of just the solitary wicket in the last 2 games.

The First Grade side (and a number of the more regular Second Grade members) acquitted themselves very well in the limited-over competition where we won 3 of our 4 games only to be beaten in the Semi-Finals by Randwick.

It would be remiss not to single out the wonderful performance of Jason Young who, in scoring 680 runs in First Grade, achieved a record average of 61.81. Jason consolidated this season and gave full play to his undoubted talents. We look forward to him joining the ranks of those from the Club who have gained State representative honours. Jason was selected on three occasions for the NSW 2nd XI side scoring 182 vs NSW Country when finally given a chance to bat at the top of the order.

Off the field we did it tough. Plagued by poor weather early in the season which was exacerbated by captains whose tossing and calling ability was negligible, we started very slowly. The Club was distracted also by the altogether too slow transition into the new Sam Cracknell extensions - which seemed to impact negatively from the psychological viewpoint on our preparedness to deliver of a weekend.

A big highlight was the Inaugural Vice-President's Dinner upstairs in the new Sam Cracknell extension. The speeches of Messrs Samuels, Ray, Lawson, Robson and Pym (John!) were as impressive as they were varied. Hopefully, a nice tradition has been kicked off.

Michael Slater's continuing international success was a real tonic to all Club members. It seems that the television will become more and more the only real opportunity to witness his prodigious talents.

Penultimately, a special tribute to the Honourable Gordon Samuels, A.C., Q.C. who retired last week as Chancellor of the University after having discharged the responsibility so impressively for 18 years and having endured an estimated 70,000 graduation handshakes. The Club was proud to have had Gordon as its Patron since the middle 1980's and bestowed on him at the recent Annual Dinner the Honour of Life Patron - a rare occurrence. Our sincerest thanks to both Gordon and Jackie for their real interest in the Club which we know will be on-going. Also, a special thanks to Kathy Ford who has left the Club (temporarily we hope), having moved to Perth to pursue academia. Kathy has been the backbone of the Women's team over recent seasons, an important contributor to the Club generally and has been a delight to work with.

Finally, I would like to extend the Club's thanks to David Lemon, Tom Boyce, Anne and Bob Coots (our Practice Co-ordinator) and Reg Breusch for their fabulous commitment and support throughout the season; to the groundstaff of the University (and to Ray Galway at David Phillips, we very much appreciate your excellent work and co-operative approach); and to the Club's Committee (and, in particular, Jack Carmichael) for their contribution to the sometimes efficient running of the Club!

This all too familiar performance from the 1st Grade outfit is disappointing in the context of the proud tradition of the 1st Grade side in its relatively short time in the competition.

One could sit back and say that we were a very competitive club, performed outstandingly on a number of occasions, made the semi-finals of the one-day competition, and finished in the top-half of the points table. However, what we must adopt is a mentality that nothing less than the semi-finals in both competitions should represent our goals. We have a very good side that, basically, rarely plays to its ability; and I guess that is the biggest concern from my perspective.

The season boiled down to:

- a failure of our "impressive" fast bowling line-up to perform in the first half of the season;
- a failure of our batsman to contribute with a requisite level of consistency (obviously with the exception of Youngy);
- soaring home with a wet sail to prove we are capable of beating <u>all</u> teams in the competition;
- an outstanding performance by a young, enthusiastic one-day side; and most significantly,
- the end of the first grade careers of two of the best cricketers, "not-to-have-played-Shield-cricket", that have graced (well, perhaps not "graced") the Sydney Grade competition.

The retirement from 1st Grade of Jungle and Livo is a difficult concept to come to terms with, particularly for those who have been fortunate enough to spend many years joining them in battle on the playing field (not to mention countless hours of drinking and (often) fruitless theorising). They are not only club legends but cricket legends also. More of them later.

The performances:

Phelpsy and Legend provided an opening combination, by season-end, that augers well for 1994/95. Phelpsy, in particular, displayed his ability to dominate all bowlers, and Leg may have found his ideal spot in the order (although he should not lose sight of his ability to also dominate attacks). Phelpsy's innings vs Petersham on a green, fast deck was, I

believe, his best performance and perhaps his coming-of-age. His 54 against Syd Uni in the one-dayer was also class and absolute dominance of the game during his time at the crease; the kind of batting that will ensure we win games. Leg's innings, also vs Syd Uni, was in the same vein. His innings against Sutherland ultimately turned a game with little chance of result, into a match that we could easily have one.

Youngy had an outstanding year as his stats clearly indicate. He was the sixth highest run-getter in Sydney 1st Grade cricket and carried our batting for the major part of the season. Congratulations on your performances also for the State 2nd XI and on your inclusion in an elite NSW State Squad for the start of the 1994/95 Season. Youngy had many fine innings, none better than his 89 vs Campbelltown on the greenest wicket I have ever seen. His ability to come through with the goods on difficult wickets and situations were also clearly evidenced against Fairfield, North Sydney and Parramatta.

Breuschy played a superb innings against Wests in the one-dayers where he failed to be upstaged by a rampant Michael Slater on a very ordinary wicket at Pratten Park. Breuschy's form otherwise was not great but he always proves to be an invaluable team player with the added potential to win you a game.

Matt Hayward proved to be a bit of an enigma in 1993/94. His batting, bowling and fielding skills are at a first grade level without producing 1st Grade performances (except for a gem of an innings against Waverley). I mustn't forget, however, that Matt's performances in the one-dayers were extremely impressive and contributed significantly to our success. I sincerely hope that Matt takes any of the opportunities that may become available to him in 1994/95 and establishes himself in his rightful position in 1st Grade.

Texas had a wonderful season in the sense that he worked hard on his game, put performances on the board in 2nd Grade, <u>earned</u> his place in 1st Grade, and performed creditably while there. Tex sets a wonderful example for other young and aspiring players in his whole hearted attitude and commitment to his cricket. He will become an important part of our club's future successes.

Pratty proved to be an important link in the 1st Grade side, although not as the opener he once wanted to be. His batting was good without being at the level he knows he can attain. Particularly, his innings vs Waverly and Manly were significant efforts that ultimately led to two important wins. A great spell of spin bowling at Parramatta showed signs of a budding Mark Ray. More hard work and dedication (of which Pratty always shows plenty) could see him develop into a front-line spin bowler. Congratulations again on the fielding award which was thoroughly deserved. Pratty's efforts in the field should convince others that fielding can and does win matches.

Jack Horley has the ability to play for NSW in the very near future. However, as he knows, it will require much more consistency in his bowling (and batting - don't ever forget your batting). Jack had a very slow start to the season but picked up 25 wickets almost entirely in the second half of the season. Jack is good enough to win us a lot more games, particularly when we are up against the wall (e.g. North Sydney and Gordon). Fitness and the ability to bowl exactly where he wants to are the keys.

Backy and Kurly shared the keeping duties during the year. Backy says that a one-year break in 3rd Grade is on the cards due to study/work commitments which did effect his game this year. Kurly's keeping once back from "holidays" was outstanding (bar one incident).

Big Morg's only had a couple of opportunities before being the victim of a desire for a numerous young quickies to dominate for 1st Grade. Morg's is a well-above average first-grade bowler who has made way for "kids" with potential. Those "kids" will have to perform much better to keep Morg's at bay any longer.

Capital was the man performing in 2nd Grade who took Morg's place. Again, Capital has a stack of potential and bowled well in many situations. However, the key to our success in 1st Grade is that our bowlers bowl well all of the time. Pressure is the answer and our young guns need to provide that as well as the ability to blast players out.

Traff came off 3 outstanding seasons as our number 1 bowler but, due to various reasons, was disappointing in 1993/94. He has the ability to play at a higher level as well and hopefully will be back on track in 1994/95.

Slates only played 1½ games, plus one one-dayer: Unfortunately we didn't get our "value" out of him except for his great innings vs West. Congratulations on your outstanding achievements for Australia and NSW. We unfortunately won't see much of you in Grade cricket but have enjoyed experiencing your development, and watching your achievements at the top level.

JAMES GEORGE ROBSON AND GREGORY ("THE BLOCKER") LIVINGSTONE

Without going into the comprehensive speil that could be made when analysing these careers, I would like to take this opportunity to thank Jungle and Livo for their contributions to cricket and, in particular, the UNSWCC.

We have had such illuminaries as Henry, Mark Ray, Gulgong and Slates (and Chappo as a token 12th man) who have attained higher representative honours from our club. However, it would be impossible to say that any of these players have performed more outstandingly than Jungle and Livo for the Uni 1st Grade side.

They have both had long and distinguished 1st Grade careers and their statistics speak for themselves. In reading those statistics one should bear in mind that:

- the runs scored by this pair were scored on the largest 1st Grade ground in Sydney and, during a large part of their careers, on a very difficult batting wicket; and
- Jungle only took up his "off-spin" bowling half-way through his career and after the
 V.G. wicket had transformed from a "Bunsen Burner" to the "road" we know today.

Their assistance to me during my developing years and while captain of the side have been invaluable as has been their willingness to go out of their way to encourage and develop club players generally, particularly the younger ones.

Without spending pages and pages of adulation (and both players should know how I, and I am sure all others at the club, feel about them and their cricket) what can be succinctly stated is that, due to their 1st Grade retirements, the club is now at the cross-roads. We are going from an era of dominance by two players who have carried enormous, often unappreciated responsibilities, to an era without them. Hopefully we can adjust, but that will only happen where the young players filling their positions and roles, appreciate that they need to display or develop the qualities that have been displayed by Jungle and Livo in order to maintain their proud tradition.

And that is the challenge that faces us.

All the best Jungle and Livo in 1st Grade retirement.

The year for second grade was one of transition. With the loss of a number of players many were given the opportunity to play at the higher grade. While this presented some early season difficulties as players adjusted the benefits were obvious by seasons end.

Our overall performance of 6 wins 4 draws and 5 losses placed us 7th one win away from what would have been to some a surprise semi final berth. Ironically three of our draws were against eventual semi final teams with us in English League parlance claiming a "winning draw" on each occasion.

Second grade should always be viewed as preparation for first grade and the encouraging aspect of season 93/94 was the positive development in that direction of previously untried players. Steve Norbury is one who deserves special mention. After a slow start Norbs, through a lot of hard work at training and a willingness to listen to senior players, became the backbone of our batting and finally won a well deserved first grade spot. His match winning half century against St George after the loss of early wickets was a great reflection of his determination to succeed. Another of the new men who revelled in the higher grade was Andrew "AJ" Johnson. Coming into the side mid season "AJ" began with a wonderful 117 not out against eventual semi finalists Waverley and never looked back finishing the year with 364 runs at the impressive average of 45.5.

Both AJ and Tex showed what can happen when you aren't afraid to work at making yourself a better player. Two others who only had limited opportunities but showed themselves as potential higher graders were Ben Nott and Warren Saunders. These two added significantly to the team late in the season and will hopefully continue to improve.

For the most part though our batting lacked the consistency necessary to really destroy opposition teams. Cootsy's 426 for the year was our highest aggregate with an effortless 97 against Waverley being his best. Along the way everyone produced a good innings without making a habit of it. Tim Grosser's magnificent 89 against Saints, Glen Breusch's match winning 82* in the dark at Fairfield and Hayers' 77* in our one run outright win over Penrith were shining examples of the ability that resides in the team.

This lack of consistency did put a lot of pressure on our bowlers who never let us down. Dave "Capital" Gainsford was dynamic in the early rounds capturing 12 wickets at 17.5 and fully deserving of his first grade promotion. Adrian White 28 wickets at 27.7 and Dave Gallop 28 at 20.2 carried most of the load and always kept us in the games. It is worth noting that both of these players were absent in the "winning draw" against Waverley where victory may have placed us in the semi's. "Clemmie" who finished the year with 23 wickets from 248 overs was again the uncomplaining worker of the team. One statistic associated with Clem's season was that he did not bowl one no-ball a point others may like to note!

As captain it certainly was valuable to have the above three players who while all competing for first grade selection gave everything in their efforts for second grade. Their advice suggestions and overall enthusiasm was greatly appreciated.

Like the batting some fine cameos were also returned with the ball. Traffs 7 / 57 against Gordon and Hayers 8/58 against Mosman being outstanding. Hopefully both these two will be permanent first graders next year, as that is where their ability should place them. The steady improvement of Tim Grosser 11 wickets at 28.3 confirmed his real talent. It was encouraging to see him displaying the excellent all round skills he does have.

During the season we had three keepers Dave Little, Michael Kovacs and Ben Nott. All three contributed at different stages and the club is fortunate to have such depth in this most critical of positions.

I would like to thank all who were part of 2nd grade this season as it was above everything else an enjoyable experience. A special thank you to Mr and Mrs Bob Coots. For five seasons now Ann has been our team scorer and from a captains point of view I must say it is a great help. On a broader scale to have two such loyal supporters is indeed a bonus and I hope their association with the Club will continue for many more years.

ard GRADE REPORT 1993/94

The 1993/94 season commenced as one of great expectation for the 3rd Grade side that was essentially composed of players who had played in the 4th Grade semi-final the previous season. Unfortunately the season was not to measure up with those earlier expectations with the side struggling to find the consistency in performance that is necessary to feature in the race for semi-final positions.

From the attached statistics it can be clearly seen that the side consistently struggled to score the runs necessary to win games particularly when it is considered that half our games are played at David Phillips. What the statistics do not show is the fact that our fielding constantly let the side down with at least five catches being dropped a game on average and this is obviously an aspect of our game that requires improving if we are to improve our performance next year.

The side's results should be viewed in light of the fact that for the last 4 games of the season its playing strength was considerably weakened due to having to call on a number of players from 6th Grade as both the 4th and 5th Grade sides vied for semi-final positions. Whilst the efforts of those players were commendable the rise in standard was initially difficult for them to meet, although I am sure the experience will hold all those players called upon late in the season in good stead for the future.

Whilst consistency in performance is an essential ingredient in any team's success I believe it is equally important for there to be continuity in the leadership of the team. It is this aspect that I am sure contributed significantly to the disappointing performances of the team, with there being no less than 4 different captains of the team during the course of the season.

However the season should not be viewed as one of total gloom for there were many positive aspects to emerge from the season. Firstly it should be noted that in the true tradition of University cricket it was always enjoyable to be part of the team if only for the banter and sledging that went on amongst team mates and post game yarns which are always a feature of any Uni season.

On the playing front it was pleasing to see that a number of players received the opportunity to play at a higher level during the season including Warren Saunders, Mark Mullen and Darren Sue whom all made their 2nd Grade debuts during the season. The aforementioned players exhibited sufficient evidence during the season to suggest that playing at a higher level on a permanent basis is not beyond them with continued dedication to the development of their games.

Warren Saunders continues to be amongst the unluckiest bowlers in lower grade cricket with his outstanding efforts often going unrewarded through either dropped catches or being simply to good for the batsmen. From a captain's viewpoint Warren is the perfect team man always willing to put in that extra effort no matter how grim the circumstances he is confronted with. The injustices that often come his way can no better be demonstrated than the game against Penrith in which in the middle of a long spell he bowled an over to a batsman on 80 odd and beat the bat in all 6 deliveries without getting a wicket.

Darren Sue would gain the award as the most improved player in the team, scoring the only century of the season against Manly, and if he can continue this development then I am sure he can succeed in the higher grades. Mark Mullen again showed glimpses of his undoubted talent, which would suggest that he has the ability to play consistently at a higher level.

Michael Morson performed well with both the bat and the gloves with one memorable match winning performance against Gordon when he rescued the batting to set up a total that eventually leads to our victory. His performances are all the more noteworthy when it is considered that this was only his third season of cricket. At various times during the season Paul Urquhart and Mark Leahy also gave glimpses of their talents.

No report of the third grade season would be complete without mentioning the efforts of the two elder statesmen of the side David Jebb and Rattler (the umpires best mate) Lupton whom both provided consistent performances throughout the season to finish as the leading run scorer and wicket taker respectively. 5Th GRADE REPORT

The 5ths developed from a collection of players, some of whom were experienced enough to help the younger players win, and others who were those younger players who were not sure if they were really good enough to play Sydney Grade cricket, into a very competitive team who knew they could beat anyone. This change was built on some fine individual performances and a very good spirit which meant everyone did there bit to ensure wins were achieved when games were in doubt.

After an initial draw,v N.D's, the team lost to Fairfield despite the return to the glory days for "Kanga" Pym with a dramatic (what else)105; then to Petersham when the ubiquitous "Julius" (yes we know it's really John) Marlow took 5-81.

Campbelltown provided the first win and both bat and ball performed. The batsmen setting a solid target of 222 and the bowlers, inspired by the skipper "Miguel" Gregg's devastating 6-34 off 24 overs, emphatic ally finished the job. Dave "Jonty" Templeman's second innings 56 (5/108) was promising. Wash outs against Sutherland and Parramatta were followed by a win over Hawkesbury. Two notable performances came from new boy Glenn Sheppard (18.1 overs to take 5-44) and George Sendall (the sheet anchor for 83, robbed of the ton when he tried to slog as the rain came). Ruch and Warren Campion scored more breezily for 41 and 53 and Matt Sanders decided he would christen the new pavilion and set a challenge to big hitters of the future (it hit level with the 1st floof verandah).

Waverley was a disaster. Rolled for only 167 by quite good bowling but on a good pitch. Waverley replied with a slow 7/254 which left no chance to play for an outright-a wasted second week. Obviously "Julius" had the good oil as he failed to materialise (for the rest of the season). The only performances worthy of note were a fine double by Craig "Scratcher" Neal who scored 64 and 92 while Matt Sanders scored 52 in the first innings and Dan Culhane surprised even himself with 28 n.o.in the 2nd. St George was a continuation of the trough. Wales skittled for just 132, they replied with 7/249. A 50 by Mike Paine in the second innings (1/89) was of note.

Week 1 of the Nth Sydney game was washed out. Week 2 saw both captains prepared to play for a win and this turned into a game to be remembered. They declared after 59 overs at 5/207. Wales chased well but wickets fell just a little too regularly for comfort. 5/119 became 6/194 thanks to Ruch (32) and Shane Chapman (48), but wickets fell to see us go to 8/201. A slog over cover and a delicate late cut from the skipper saw the scores level. Disaster, another wicket Andy Graham to face the music with 4 balls left. Dot ball, swot - 4 over the bowler's head! A great win.

Unbelievably the Manly game was perhaps even more remarkable. Wales scored an unspectacular 217 (D. Templeman 59, Robbo & Andy Graham, still with the taste for batting, scored 33 a piece to add 46 for the last wicket) on "The Road" and Manly were 0-50 odd overnight. Week two Wales got into gear when the game seemed lost at 1/144 to have Manly 9 out with just under 10 to win. Manly crawled to 216 when Brett Davis claimed his second wicket and we won by one run! "Daintree" Robson a fiery 6/35.

Confidence soared and a fiery game against Gordon was finally easily won 160 (George Sendall 51) to their 132 (Daintree Robson 4-38, Andy Graham 3-41). Randwick was another wash out after we rolled them for 148 (Brett Davis 4/12) and were 3/60 in reply. Penrith was a loss outright after an easy first innings win as we gave them 2nd innings runs to have the chance to chase points. Mike Nelson performed brill-iantly to take 7/41 off12.2 + a run out as Penrith totalled 78. Chasing 170 in 37 overs we fell 10 short. Mosman was

another outright chance but an easy first innings win 9/301 v 101 & 0/12 was foiled by slow Mosman batting and yet more rain.

Was the season a success? The team missed the semis so in that sense no. Player turn over was, as always high (42), but if this grade is meant to unearth talent and build spirit then the season was very worthwhite. New boys Jason Rudd, Warren Campion, Mike Paine all moved on to show they are capable of runs in higher grades and Dave Templeman, Shane Chapman, Zac Zavos, Peter Cranmer, showed they can bat at this level and will go further if they are willing to work on their games. Dave also took some fine catches (pity about "the arm"), while Zac is an outstanding field. All seem to have survived "Kanga's" coaching.

Craig Neal will, hopefully, realise how much more talent he has than many who are two or three grades higher, (no-one hits a ball harder) and stop surrendering to sucker tactics.

Of the batsmen none deserved his good figures more than George Sendall. He was always willing to put his head down and work. He remained calm as oppositions often tried to disturb his concentration and was rewarded with a ton after unselfishly throwing away an earlier chance. Daintree had an eventful season and would have been in higher grades only 5's were pushing for the semis. He scored over 20 six times (top score only 45!) and took 21 wickets at 14.1 (3 or better four times) and was cited.

Skipper Gregg was promoted after 4 rounds having taken 10 wickets at 11.3, while Mike Nelson bowled quickly and with stamina to finish with 14 wickets at 11.1 from 4 games. Andrew Muller had a season which did not produce the figures he would have liked. However, none toiled harder, and with his good attitude to practice he gives himself every chance to get results in the future.

Brett Davis is a batsman but his bowling and catching held him his place in the team. He will really move up the grades next year if he uses his ability, gets off to a good start, and gets his confidence up.

UNSWCC 7th Grade 1993-94

As in previous years the Uni 7th Grade side competed in the summer forum of forathe NSW Catholic Cricket Association competition, better known as "Moore Park". (To say "Moore Park Cricket" may be tautologous - Moore Park is cricket!) Within this structure there are as many as five divisions; we played second grade. This represented a step up from 1992-93, our promotion a result of premiership success, that in turn following our 1991-92 victory; thus "7th Grade" has meant 4th Grade, 3rd Grade and 2nd Grade in successive seasons. All this is to say that the standard was a bit better and our success in a points-table sense a little less. Nonetheless season 1993-94 cannot be considered a failure.

The 1992-93 side achieved glory thanks largely to a core of some eight or so players who played both regularly and consistently. Only three of these were regulars again this season - the late-starting Anthony Wunsch and Minh Nguyen, and the captain, installed as such by default. (He fled to Asia for four games mid-season believing the extra pressure to be affecting his batting!) This meant that a team had to be forged almost from scratch, which, given a lengthy list of players of varying degrees of commitment, was always going to be sub-facile. For players at this level are often desperate to move out of it, whether that be higher, faster, stronger or merely to the beach on a weekend afternoon. Flexibility can translate to transience. It was gratifying, then, to find a body of keen and competitive players ready to play rain, hail, exam or holiday shine. 'Keeper Glen Radford, medium-pacer-cum-lower-order-cum-openingbatsman Ross Predic, leggie Thomas Torpie and all-rounder Kris Overduin led in this respect, and a Thursdsay-night-and-desperate-for-a-team thanks goes to them. Their various talents were also appreciated, particularly the three overs when the skipper was able to offset Thomas's leggies against some George Sendall chinamen! (George, a '92-'93 veteran, also backed up again, but ended up in Fourth Grade! Taught him everything he knew!) Under-appreciated offie David Abraham and David "the Don" King were other valued contributors amongst the England-like total of 37 who played various fixtures.

Fortunately our results were not as unfavourable as those of the last-mentioned. Granted, three wins, eight losses and two draws don't put us in West Indies class, but given the problems of continuity, this was a fair return, and the third victory was enough to keep us away from the timber utensil. Individual performances of outstanding merit included Warren Campion's 101 against Glebe in an early-season pre-higher things cameo. The ton included 20 fours and was scored in approximately five minutes. George made 57 in the same match, whilst Jacob Boyle made 52 two rounds later. Mark Wall made a fine 72 in the second Glebe match to stave off defeat and bring us near victory. From the other end, Ross Predic claimed haul-of-the year with 6-58, also against Glebe, whilst Torpie, King and Overduin all performed strongly more often than not. Outstanding, however, was Anthony Wunsch, who once again missed both the outside edge and a stint in Grade with bewildering regularity. Genuine outswing is difficult to play at most levels; park cricketers rarely get a touch. Wunschy

also scored 255 runs at 32 and was probably the outstanding fielder in the side. A pleasure to have him playing for us it was, but a Grade guernsey might have fitted equally well. Such reservations aside, the season was an extremely enjoyable one played in a competitive but generous spirit. I can only hope that those who played and learned this year will return and help the lower - and higher - grades to a post amongst the honours.

POIDEVIN GRAY REPORT 1993/4

The Poidevin Gray season of 1993/4 may in terms of sheer results appear to be one of little joy. What could possibly be said of a side with a ratio of six losses against the one win? One could not suggest that we were unlucky nor could it be said that umpiring, freak storms or ball tampering played any part in our downfall. Perhaps the only conclusion is that in the main we were outclassed.

The most dissatisfying thought from the preceding statement however is that we may have predetermined that we would be outclassed without forcing the opposition into exhibiting their supposed class. This is not to say that the side was in any way lacking in spirit. In fact I am pleased to say that this was a distinguishing feature of this years side. It approached the competition with commitment and enthusiasm and responsibly curtailed Saturday night activities before a match. Friday practises were also instituted with reasonable success and helped contribute to a healthy team spirit. This team spirit of the side was evidenced by the great turn out at the club dinner where two tables were reserved by the PG's squad which saw many of the younger players come along (who were not at the time affiliated with any grade other than PG's).

What is obvious from the season is that when the side was able to overcome perceptions of the supposed class of the opposition we were able to succeed. In the game against Waverley we all considered ourselves a chance and hence we were able to both perform to our potential and also force the opposition into exhibiting the class they were meant to possess. In the end this was enough to record an exceptional win against a side with far more supposed stars then ourselves, and almost turned a close loss into a win against the eventual winners of the competition - Fairfield.

Admittedly we were faced with a most difficult draw which saw us playing Petersham in the first round. Petersham were packed with first and second graders and had four N.S.W. under 21's representatives in their side (opening batsmen, bowler, wicket keeper and all-rounder). It is interesting to note however that despite this balance of talent and a side which on paper would be on par with any district under 21's side in the country it was still unable to figure in the top four sides at the completion of the season. Such a surprising result illustrates the point that in PG's (perhaps more so than in grade) there are many factors which contribute to a teams success. Hence it is wrong to predetermine your fate on the basis of the grade your opposition plays on Saturdays.

A major factor in the success of a P.G's side is the ability of lower grade players to rise to the occasion and play at a standard they may not have consistently been accustomed to. The match against Petersham provides a perfect example of this where Andrew Johnson who last year batted at nine (in a side not renowned for its batting), and at the time

of the match was playing fourth grade, was provided with the responsibility of batting at number three. Andrew responded with a magnificent 109 and held the side together to reach a most respectful total of 202. Andrew was able to use the opportunity as a stepping stone to second grade and further success. His example shows what performances in PG's can lead to.

Throughout the season a number of exceptional achievement were record. From a team point of view the win against Waverly was the highlight. Our performance on the day was phenomenal with an opening partnership of 155 starting the day off in style and a sensational fielding display in the afternoon sealing the victory. This game saw contributions from two players who I feel were the major performers throughout the season. Firstly Micheal Morson had an exceptional season behind the stumps (against Waverley making four dismissals and no Byes) and his sharpness was able to lift the entire side. He also contribited with a number of handy performances with the bat.

The other player who was easily the most outstanding performer of the side was Michael Payne who deservedly recieved the P.G's player of the year at the club dinner. Michael was the leading batter and bowler despite missing two games. He was able to display maturity beyond his years and is sure to be a vital contributor to the side over the next three years. The innings against Fairfield was an example of Michael lifting himself up to the higher level where he batted most patiently throughout the innings to carry his bat and score 92 n.o. where all else was falling around him.

Two other performers were Andrew Johnson and Glenn Sheppard who each had one game where they were superb. Andrew's was against Petersham (109 runs), and Glenn's was against Fairfield (3-14 off 12). The remainder of the games saw them always turn in consistent performances but unfortunately not at the level of these superb performances. The same could be said of myself where my game was against Waverley (100 runs), but once again no more exceptional performances were forth coming. Significantly it was in these three games that the side performed the best. It was also the case that in the four games where none of the above performed. The side was at its worst.

The other members of the PG's Squad often had their moments but were even less consistent then the above. With the ball Dan Culhane, Andrew Grahme and Craig Neal never gave up. With the bat however the middle order of Mark Leahy, David Templeman, Warren Campion and Ross Hunt would probably be disappointed with their seasons, they however are in the fortunate position of still being eligible for next season and are sure to have gained from this years experience. Four recent school leavers also played in a couple of PG's games throughout the season, Oliver Corlette, Jacob Gibbons, Adam Trainor and Schail Mohadin all were impressive and we look forward to seeing them playing both grade and PG's next season. Greg Gerring and Hugh Williams also represented PG's

in 1993/4.

The most reassuring aspect of the season is that of the 16 players who represented the club this year only three will be unavailable next season. Unlike this year where we faced with the prospect of entering our first game with only five players having even participated in a grade game (let alone a PG's match), next year will involve almost the entire squad having been involved in a complete PG's season.

The P.G's season of 1993/4 must not be written off as a failure, it has provided a number of players with their first opportunity to play PG'S and in some cases the first chance to represent the Uni. These players must now take this experience with them into the season of 1994/5 as it will only be if these foundations are not capitalized upon that the season of 1993/4 could be classed a failure.

TREASURER'S REPORT

The attached accounts show a loss of \$2643 for the year.
