### PRESIDENT'S REPORT

The past season was a year when the vision splendid faded with the light and rain at Coogee Oval on the last Sunday in March. It was still a fine achievement to reach the First Grade Final yet again and a sobering reminder that not since the St George side of the mid-1960s has any Club won the First Grade Premiership two years in succession. Equally impressive was the performance of the 5A side: Minor Premiers but unfortunately beaten in the Final. It was a good side, probably the best 5th Grade side we have fielded, and a good indicator of the depth of talent in the Club. My congratulations to both sides and especially to their captains, Mark Ray and Keith Madden.

It was a difficult year in so many ways, administratively and on the field. An enormous amount of work was put into the Club off the field, patricularly in the early months of the season. I would like to record my deep appreciation of the work of Terry Buddin, Andrew McMaster, Mark Sample and above all lan Kellaway. Ian deservedly won the Clubman of the Year Award-his untiring and selfless work for the Club is an object lesson for us all.

I believe that we ended the season even stronger than we began it. We have developed a very young Second Grade Side which in the years to come will prove its quality and provide new players for First Grade. One of the great advantages of a University sporting club should be that it provides an opportunity for young players earlier than most Clubs. Intervarsity cricket, country tours and not least higher grade sides with a fair share of "non-greying" players are all doing this.

We have established a formidable reputation in just a few short years in Grade Cricket, a reputation of which we should all be proud and should do everything in our power to develop further. Next year is the tenth anniversary of our entry into Grade Cricket. We intend to hold a special Anniversary Dinner later in the season to which those who have played for the Club in the past 32 years will be invited. It should be an exciting year - on the field we have the talent to continue our past success and off the field we have developed a tradition of fine social functions.

The improvements to the wicket table at the Village Green this year have been most noticeable. A lot of effort has been put into persuading various people to upgrade the area and we are grateful to the work of the groundsmen in improving the overall standard considerably. Next season we hope to have good wickets consistently. I am confident that the work done on the practise wickets in the off season will also bear fruit. Some physical improvements will be noticeable at the David Phillips ground, notably sightscreens and scoreboards, but the wickets there are already second to none in Sydney.

The strengths of this Club are its good management by people who are actively involved in playing the game, its vibrant social life and its development of a pride among players in representing the University of New South Wales, whether in First Grade or in the City and Suburban competition. It is all based on the two points we have in common: our love of the game of cricket and our pride in the University. If we maintain that pride and that striving for excellence which is a hallmark of a University then we will continue for many years to be a major force in Grade Cricket.

#### FIRST GRADE

1981-82 was the season of finishing second. Second in the premiership table, second after the final series, Jim Robson second in Sydney's batting, and Mark Ray second in the Herald Award. If you add to this the 5A's and Poidevin-Gray, it seems we were not meant to make it. While we should not be satisfied with coming second, we should also remember that only one team did better than us. The challenge for the coming season is to maintain our high standard of achievement, and to improve those things which prevented us from winning the premiership.

As you can see from the match report of the final two of our bowlers were lacking in both match fitness and net practice. Geoff Lawson's first class season had finished a few weeks earlier and he had not bowled in a game since then. Bowling off four steps on asphalt runups is not good enough practice for a fast bowler. When you consider how little actual match bowling Henry did during the season, it is no wonder he struggled in the final. Mark's broken toe, sustained in round 12, was slow to heal, and he also could not get proper practice on the hard approaches to the synthetic wickets at the Village Green. These problems were compounded by a lost weekend, due to preference being given to the State cup, between Rd 15 and the semi-final. Rain washed out a centre wicket practice on the Sunday of that weekend, as it did to Synday's play in the semi. This meant that we had not bowled in a game for three weeks up to the Final. Such a disruption to our preparation was costly. While there was marked improvement in the quality of the Village Green wicket, the practice facilities were most often in poor condition. The improvement of these wickets is essential for worthwhile practice to be available for first grade. Our fast bowlers are very restricted at practice, and this will be to our disadvantage in future seasons as the Village Green begins to favour pace bowlers and batsmen more and more.

Another factor which led to our poor performance in the final was a general lack of purpose in our practice sessions. If wickets are not good enough, that time can be used for fielding practice not for socialising or complaining. Admittedly those players in the State squad had tad a lot of training all season, and had perhaps lost some of their edge towards the end of the season. Add to this a general slackness which seems to overcome most premiership teams the following year, and you have a dangerous situation developing. At first grade level, players should be able to motivate themselves sufficiently to make practice worthwhile and set an example to the rest of the club. We have the talent in the team, and back-up talent developing in second grade and P-G to continue our excellent performances of the last few seasons. As long as we realise that winning won't continue to come easily unless we work at it, there is no reason why ear success won't continue.

Chris Chapman will be working overseas for a year or so, and in him we will be losing one of our most talented and experienced players. Chris did not have as many opportunities with the bat as in previous years, yet he still managed to play match-winning innings on at least two occasions. His fielding all year was very good, and he has been one of our most consistent and versatile fieldsmen over many seasons. Chris Hanger is going into semi-retirement. He will be unavailable for first grade but will play as often as he can in the lower grades. "Cliffie" has become such an accepted part of the team that it is only now that we have to replace him that we really appreciate how important he has been to our success. He has been one of the best keepers in Sydney cricket for the last three seasons, and his team

Spirit and co-operation have contributed greatly to the team. While these losses will be difficult to cover in the short term, they offer opportunities for younger players and present the team with a new challenge - both of which could be beneficial in the long run.

The Village Green wicket obviously showed great improvement on past seasons. The new soil had a great effect and with more to be added for next season, it should continue to improve. The only problem we faced was some inconsistency in preparation. A more regularised approach to the preparation of match wickets is needed to ensure consistently good wickets. With the assured co-operation of the ground staff there is no reason why this should not happen. On four or five occasions this post season, the wicket was the best it has been for ten years. Our special thanks go to the groundstaff and to John Ingleson and Ian Kellaway for their patient hard work.

A reading of the match reports and statistics will show that all players contributed to the teams success and my thanks and congratulations to all of them. Some players deserve special mention.

Jim Robson obviously had a marvellous season which should see him in the State squad for 82-83. He was able to score runs on all types of wickets, against all types of bowlers. His consistency and confidence added great substance to our batting line-up. For longtime followers and members of the team his success bought great pleasure, especially his maiden first grade century. Hopefully this is the beginning of many such fine seasons. He has the ability to go far in the game.

<u>Greg Livingstone</u> also scored his maiden first grade century. Livo's experience and ability got us off to many fine starts and his thirties scored at the top of the order were important in laying the groundwork for the later bastmen. His innings against Western Australia was also a top class effort, displaying shots all round the wicket against top opposition. Livo's fielding, as always, was excellent.

Jim Dixon again showed what a fine cricketer he is. He again took over 40 wickets and did a lot of hard work at the bowling crease. His fielding all year was very good, and his catch against Petersham was one of the most memorable pieces of cricket all year. Disco also represented NSW in the Colts carnival in Brisbane.

<u>Dave Meagher</u> came into the team and very quickly made his mark. To score a century in first grade after only a handful of games was outstanding. Dave has shown he has the application and temperament to be successful for many years in the top grade.

Special mention must also go to Jim Robson, Jim Dixon and Steve Campbell for their selection in the Australian Universities team to tour England in June-July. They will be very good representatives of the Club.

On behalf of the team I would like to thank all our supporters especially those who helped out many times during the season. To Mrs. Ray, Jenny, Julie, Genevieve, Christine and Margaret our thanks for the afternoon teas; to Jack Skillen for his ever helpful support; to John Ingleson, Andrew McMaster and Mark Sample for their assistance: and especially to lan Kellaway who did so much of the hard work for us and the whole club. Our very special thanks go to Dave Lemon who continues to do an ever increasing amount of work for first grade and the cricket club as a whole.

Round 1 Vs Penrith: UNSW 151 Vs Penrith 3/160. Typical season's start for a Wales premiership team. We struggled on a wicket where shots were very difficult and the ball seamed all over the place. The following week they batted on a much better wicket and we bowled in very windy conditions. Although we had the worst of the conditions, we played poorly. Robson 42, Ray 30, Dixon 3/48.

Round 2 Vs Sutherland: Henry's first game after his injury in England. UNSW 283 Vs Sutherland 140 and 4/67. We batted on a poor track at Caringbah. Livingstone 50, Robson 42, Ray 39, Lawson 36. Top all round batting display. Sutherland crashed from 0/88 to 10/40, with only 4 batsmen opening their accounts. Ray 6/50, Lawson 3/30.

Round 3 Vs Gordon: UNSW 7/249 Vs Gordon 198. We recovered from 2/2 thanks to Robson's great dig - 124 - his long awaited maiden first grade century. This sort of form continued all season. Livingstone 39, Wijeratne 28. Pym 5/40, Ray 3/55. Intelligent bowling by Pymy, showing us younger players how experience pays dividends.

Round 4 Vs Waverley: Waverley8/187 Vs UNSW 5/188. Dixon 5/59, Ray 3/72. Disco bowled very well including the prize wicket of England's Paul Parker first ball (even if it did hit a rock).) They scored their runs off 88 overs. We had to get them in under 50. This was the first instance of our new-found ability to chase runs under pressure. Led by Jungle with a another 42 n.o., Livo 37, and a brilliant 45 by chappo with a great six off the opening bowler which easily cleared the sightboard at Waverly oval. An excellent win.

Round 5 Vs Sydney: Sydney 72 and 148 Vs UNSW 3/75 and 5/147. Bowled first on a wet wicket. Ray 6/26, Dixon 4/32. Ray 33, Robson 22 n.o. Pym 2/27, Campbell 4/42, Chappo 37 n.o., Handley 30, 2nd innings chase for outright points.

Round 6 Vs Bankstown: Bankstown 8/259 Vs UNSW 218. With nothing going our way, and some fine batting, Bankstown amassed a large score. Our bowlers toiled well with Disco taking 5/53 off 29 overs - a determined effort. Our batting faltered with only Bruce (45) and a rearguard fight by Dick Pym (45 n.o.) bringing our score to respectability.

Round 7 Vs Nth. Districts: UNSW 173 Vs Nth. Dist. 3/177. Recovering from 2/20 to 2/103, and just looking in control, we lost 6/16. Pym again saved us from a very low score, hitting up 35 and with PG-S (19) adding 52 for 9th wicket. Dave scored 52 in his first innings as an opener, and Jungle 37. NS's batting proved too strong.

Round 8 Vs St. George: Limited over game. UNSW 142 Vs St. George 2/28. On a poor V.Green wicket, Jungle and Chappo saved us with 62 and 40 respectively - two very good innings. With Saints 2/28 rain ended the days play game drawn.

Round 9 Vs Mosman: Mosman 204 Vec UNSW 4/206. Perger 3/43, Ray 3/72. Nige! showed good form, bowling straight and with pace. God fielding display with fine catches by Livo on the fence, Bruce at slip, and a top throw by Mark Hamwood for a crucial run-out. Ray 49, Robson 47 n.o. (more red-inks!), Livo, Dave and Bruce all scoring in the twenties. A tight run - chase, the turningpoint coming, according to Jungle, when Bruce on-drove their medium-pacer for a powerful six.

Round 10 Vs Nth. Sydney: N.S. 130 Vs UNSW 4/92. Ray 4/41, Dixon 3/17, Campbell 3/50, Livo 35, Robson 25 n.o. Game drawn because of rain.

Round 11 Vs Manly: Manly 119 and 4/233 Vs UNSW 2/120 and 8/235. Manly crumbled before Dixon 4/46 and Pym 4/31 in first innings. Livo took his first slips catch since East Albury under 12's, and Bruce took a great one-handed catch at silly point of Mark. Our first innings Livo 53 n.o., Jungle 4/n.o. On the second day Manly closed at 4/233 on a beautiful batting wicket. Set 233 in 209 mins, Chappo had to score 2 off the last ball to win outright. He smashed it through the covers for four. An excellent win. Robson 68, Ray 65 and Chapman a better than even time 55 n.o.

Round 12 Vs Sydney University: UNSW 5/237 Vs S.U.C.C. 209. Sent in on a wet-wicket we played very well, led by a determined and gutsy 117 n.o. by Dave Meagher, Dave showed plenty of character in making his first First Grade century in only his eighth (10th?) game. He was well-supported by Robson - 52. Ray got 35 and a broken toe for his troubles. The wicket was even wetter on the second day, and Nigel and Steve taking 3/47 and 3/69. We were one bowler short but these two responded well under pressure, Steve conceding 69 runs off 32 overs - a top performance.

Round 14 Vs Petersham: UNSW 6/237 Vs Petersham 223. At tea, the score of 5/126 did no justice to a top Village Green wicket. We recovered in the last session due to a partnership of 77 by Jungle and Mark. The former scored a fine 92 and the latter 54 n.o. (the day he realised that openings was a mug's game). Jungle deserved another ton as he really dominated once again. Dave Meagher made 30 before his annual bout of midwicket nausea got the better of him. The track on the second day was not up to scratch and left us embarrassed. Nigel 4/49, Disco 2/34 and Steve 1/26 off 22 overs bowled us to a close win. However the real matchwinner on that day was Jim Dixon. This brilliant, diving, one-handed catch in the outfield off Steve to dismiss Greg Hartshorne was one of the very best you could ever see. John Dyson's catch in the Sydney Test was only marginally better. Disco's earlier catch at mid-on when he took his eyes off the ball, ran 15 yards, looked again and then dashed another 10 to hold it, wasn't bad either. The players fielding tipped an important game our way.

Round 15 Vs Wests: Into the last round we are third and need an outright win and Penrith to only manage 6 points for us to take second place. Luck favoured us in the toss and we bowled first on a rain-affected pitch. Wests 56 and 146 UNSW 2/57 and 8/146. Ray 5/21 and 8/46, Perger 3/1 and 1/18 and Pym 2/20, Livo 31 n.c., Meagher and Handley 32 apiece. We had scraped into second place and this proved crucial when rain washed out the semi-final.

Semi-Final: UNSW 7/267 After an easy win in Rd. 15 and a washed-out practice session on the free weekend which followed, we went into the semi a little under prepared. The Village Green was a little too moist at 10am on the Saturday but the skipper gambled on batting anyway. At 2/18 it looked disastrous, but once again someone came to the rescue. Livo and Jungle put on 143 for the 3rd wicket. Livo gave a great example of concentration and determination to score his first grade century. This topped off a fine season for Greg. He batted nearly all day and it was a thoroughly deserved century, made in a big game on a bowler's wicket. Livo had great support from Jungle once again. As happened all season, Jungle played superbly and babansmannin such dominating form makes it easier for those batting with him. fitting that he played such a significant role in this game, as his batting was the major factor in our reaching the final form at all. Livo and Jungle took us from 2/18 to 3/161. Steve Campbell was the only other player to reach double figures, scoring an excellent 29 n.o. This was another example of Steve's coolness under pressure, a quality he showed with the bat several times during the season.

With rain falling on Saturday night we were in the box seat. Play was washed out on Sunday with no further play. While this ensured us of a spot in the semi (how important that we finished second), it robbed us of much and needes match bowling. We came to realise this during the final.

FINAL Randwick 215 Vs UNSW 8/158.

Winning the toss on what was anunexpectedly rain-affected pitch should have been the piece of luck we needed to take the game from Randwick. If we had have bowled well enough that would have happened. With Henry and Mark both showing signs of lack of practice, we were never able to exploit the favourable conditions. This was where the game slipped from us. Jim Dixon rose to the occasion with 5/45 off 26 overs - another fine performance. We had plenty of time to make the runs on Sunday. Mark and Livo were never in much trouble early, though runs came slowly, due to some inaccurate bowling from the Wicks. Looking back, we might have been better off to have "chased" them. On a wicket which made shots difficult, we were never on top, and it was a hard struggle all day. When rain ended play we were 8/158. While hesitating to outrage the not out batsmen (Steve 18, Dick 10), it would have been a minor miracle if we had have scored the runs from there. We did not play well enough to win, and the cup went to the better side on the day.

#### SECOND GRADE

The season started well, went through a disastrous stage and then ended on an extremely promising note. The first 2 games resulted in 2 wins, mainly because of the added strength supplied by players who ultimately played mainly in first grade. Second grade then suffered because of the loss of Geoff Lawson and Mark Ray to representative duties. At the same time there was one retirement from first grade. On a good D.P. track he bowled 23.1 overs to take 7-54, a really great performance! Behind the stumps Chris Deegan took 3 great catches to seal a great win.

A point worth noting: 2 ex-UNSWCC members in David Pratt and Grahame McBarron-both 3rd's members in the past, almost denied us a win. "Pratty" compiled a dangerous 40 whilst Grahame almost carried them to a win until Ingleson managed to land one on a "bottle top", which nearly removed Grahame's head, but did remove him from the crease! Our second innings saw McLachlan (53) and Pulver (33) play out time.

Round 3 v Balmain

Balmain 303 Defeated U.N.S.W. 247

Perhaps the best batting opposition we faced all year; suffice to say that Mark Del Gigante 2-32, Hetherington 2-51 and

Price 3-88 did well to limit them to only 302. Our batting fired - Baker (71), Kilborn (51) were the best of the batsmen, while Steve Price (60) and John Ingleson (40 N.O.) showed the middle-order how to do it from the tail putting on a great 85 run partnership.

"Pricey" then returned to inflict more damage with a devastating 21 over onslaught that saw him take 5 for 58. Behind the stumps Chris Deegan again shone out with 2 great stumpings. All the other bowlers chipped in to take a wicket somewhere.

Round 6 v Petersham

Petersham 9 Dec 292 Defeated U.N.S.W. 165

Everything went against our stand-in skipper Bill Hetherington-we lost the toss, were 1 man short nearly all day and the temperature topped the ton! Needless to say we chased leather all day mainly due to a good century by their opening bat (Mark Carmichael) - Mick Ryan 3-57 off 35 overs and Ian Smith 2-90 off 24 overs were the main wicket-takers.

We never looked like getting the runs on the second day, again in 100 degree plus heat. Only Mich Ryan, with an aggressive 50 put up any resistance, along with opener John MacFarlane 23..

Round 7 v Sydney Uni

U.N.S.W. 8-260 Defeated Sydney Uni 7-151

The first of the limited over games which saw Bill Pulver (84) and "Jacky" Jourdain (87) decimated the attack, and with "Peachy" Dixon (21) saw us reach a mammoth total. From the start they never looked like getting the runs, losing 3-6 at one stage to be 5-50 and after that didn't even try to get them, so much so, that we used 8 bowlers (!?) to try and dislodge their tail-enders. Hetherington (2-30) and Mark Hoy (2-32) were our main wicket-takers.

### FOURTH GRADE

It's getting a bit sad for me to write - 'what might have been' in fact, I think it's about time I retired. For the statistically minded, heaps of numerical information follows this report and intelligent readers can rationalise almost anything from then. A brief match by match report best illustrates the continuing ebb and flow of the season. What then remains? Probably some individual pen pictures plus a few general remarks to make everyone feel good and motivate us for next season.

Frankly I thought our play throughout the season was pretty lousy. We let all kind of mug sides beat us especially early for all kinds of different reasons then we'd come out and hammer sides like Mosman, Sydney Uni, Cumberland and Bankstown, all strong well run sides over past seasons. In finishing with 48 points we never really looked a definite threat but did do much better than 2nd and 3rd grade and here, I feel, lies the problem for the club. 37 players appeared in 4th grade but all too frequently the problem wasn't who to drop but rather who could we get. The 1st grade has become a stable, experienced team of considerable ability but the younger players must be motivated, encouraged and coached to bring their game to its full potential and so bring pressure on all players in the highest grades. This unhappily is not now the case. Looking at some of the more regular players Mick Prattent should be mentioned first.

Nick has kept wickets regularly but this year scored nearly 300 runs at 33 and in almost every case his runs were scored under pressure requiring not only skill but also intelligence and concentration. Nick gained deserved promotion on a couple of occasions but too often missed games and with it the opportunity to fully capitalise on his undoubted ability.

No so, Robert Stark who played every game. Rob plays cricket "all the time he's on the field", his medium pace bowling earned him 35 wickets. (a 4th grade record) with many excellent performances on the D.P. graveyard. His aggression enthusiasm and personality add much to a team of which he is a regular member. He really can bat a bit too.

Scott McCoy introduced himself to the club this year with his unique brand of stroke play. Scott worked hard at his game however, and his improvement was enormous. I'm sure his efforts will be brought to fruition next season.

Phil Day could not be said to have had a successful season despite his 153x in the first game. Far too often he would get a start then be dismissed with the attack beaten. Phil plays spin so well I feel he should not open but bat in the middle order where his stroke play will not be shackled.

Pat Horsley probably set some kind of record with his batting but it was his bowling that was so valuable. Here statistics fail to tell the whole story as Pat toiled away to batsmen on excellent wickets while the "shock" troops were rested. On the seaming wicket at North Sydney his display was masterful.

Greg Holt was yet another "freshman", who joined the team in the 9th round. His steady, accurate leggies added another dimension to our attack culminating in his excellent 5-35 off 18 against Bankstown. Greg has a superb wrong-un and as he gains the experience to use it less often he will become even more dangerous as a wicket-taking bowler.

Past regulars Glen Clark and lan Smith, excellent competitors, really suffered with all the chopping and changing just as they looked ready to bloom. Joe Scarcella started brilliantly but lost momentum and didn't

have the experience and/or mental toughness to get it back together again. The same comments applied to 'Peachy' Dixon but he didn't have the brilliant start. The only place 'success' comes before 'work' is in the dictionary.

Thanks to all the others who appeared in the lists and especially Andy Dillon who dived all over the shop to save those wide deliveries but still remained cheerful and competitive. We have an excellent club and certainly players of ability so let's get back and recapture that club championship too long gone from us now.

### G. GARLAND

Round 1: University 7-229 defeated Waverley 207.

A first wicket stand of 65 and one for the 10th wicket of 72 prolonged the Hoy (6-49) and Smith (3-65) off 33) assault on Waverley. Though losing early wickets Scarcella (68) and Kilborn (43) consolidated while Ctark (31x) and Smith (19x) saw us comfortably home.

Hitherto undefeated Mosman began confidently and were at one stage 1-84 but collapsed to 8-134 at lunch after panicing against our spinners. Given a good start with Garland (52) as sheet anchor we won easily as McCoy (32x) and Robertson (17x) hit the last 43 in 7 overs.

#### FIFTH GRADE A

### The Season In review:

John's form fluctuated from match to match and it was only towards the end of the season that we saw the Sackett of 'old'. John's determination will however ensure that he plays a higher grade next season. As usual, his fielding was top class.

### Jim Payne:

Jim was also a new-commer to the club this season and unfortunately had to leave us in December due to work commitments. During his time with the '5's, Jim proved to be an effective if not so much orthodox middle order batsman. Jim also excelled in the field.

### Keith Madden:

Started the season off fairly slowly and found himself filling the gap in the batting order wherever it was required. He turned in some solid performances in the latter stage of the year, especially that 60 in  $5\frac{1}{2}$  hours in the semi against Balmain.

### Paul Deegan:

Taco showed a lot of guts and club spirit by comming back late in the season after suffering a broken leg during the winter. His experience and aggressive style helped a number of the younger players. His 'bowling' in the final proved an extra bonus.

### Steve Gibbs:

Steve had another one of this 'typical' seasons. It had everything, runs, wickets, drama's. His 34 wickets at 18 showed that he has still 'got'it' as a bowler and his fielding was excellent. One area in which Steve didn't match up to my expectations, except in the semi, was his batting. His aggregate of 195 could, I am sure be improved upon, through a little more 'concentration'.

#### John Barford:

Another "Golden Oldie" who keeps bouncing back. "J.B" had a wonderful season with the bat scoring 114 runs, 54 of which came in one innings. J.B's help and knowledge was a great asset to the team this year, and on behalf of all the team and indeed the club I wish to congratulate him on taking the club record for the wicket-keeper with the greatest number of dismisals. The team really prefers you as a keeper rather than a bowler J.B.

#### Kris Gale:

Kris was another newcommer to the club this year. He proved to be a bowler of good line and length and while not perhaps as quick as Henry proved difficult for a number of opposing batsmen. Kris also has some pretence to batting and while the averages don't quite indicate it, he could be looking at number 10 instead of 11 next year.

### Paul Edey and Tim Stubbings:

These 2 had some success with the new ball but had trouble at times maintaing their line and length. We were fortunate however that usually if one of them had an 'off' day the other would fire. Both could enjoy playing in higher grades next year if they can find a little bit more consistency.

### Greg Bryant and Greg Holt:

These were our main 2 spinners throughout the year. Gret Holt dominated the pre-christmas matches with spin bowling that next year will ensure the guys in 2nd and 3rd grade have to take wickets. Gregs 5-19 against St George meant he had to go to fourth grade and we never looked like getting him back. At this stage we were lucky enough to have a player with the bowling talents and fielding ability of Greg Bryant ready to step in. While not quite as successful as Greg Holt, Greg proved a valuable team player. Both players are in their first year with the club.

Unfortunately one cannot talk in detail about the whole 28 players that passed through the team this year. I know that 28 players over 15 rounds is a lot and that it is hard to keep team continuity with such a change in the team composition from week to week. However, when one casts an eye over the fifth grade record books from prior years and sees that some teams have had as many as 49 players over a season, one considers that we have not done too badly, and for this I believe a great deal of credit should go to our teams secretary lan Kellaway.

In conclusion, I believe that there is a formula by which a team can win a 5th Grade competition and that formula centres around: Batsmen occupying the crease

: a stronger fast bowling base being built-up within

the club

a strong, young fielding side andwinning the toss and umpiring last!

Finally I would like to thank and congratulate all the players and officials that have passed through or been associated with the 5A's this year. I would like to especially thank Alex, J.B. and Gibbsy for their help and support. Our congratulations and commissorations go out to the Firsts, and I sincerely hope that everyone whether winners or losers this year has enjoyed their cricket.

#### FIFTH GRADE B 1981-82

Before commenting on the 1981-82 season for the 5Bs a general comment should be made about the 5th Grade competition. This year saw the 5th Grade competition at probably the highest standard that I have experienced and also the standard between clubs were more even than past years. 22 teams competed with 15 out of 18 grade clubs entering sides and 7 clubs entering 2 teams.

The time has come for the association rather than periodically trying to eliminate 5th Grade to foster and promote this competition and thus cricket. To eliminate some 11 grounds (turf wickets) and cricket for some 300 regular players is wrong and against all that N.S.W.C.A. should be aiming to achieve.

We should be aiming to incorporate 5th Grade into the club championship points competition and creating for the 5B sides a new 6th Grade competition. What better way to promote young players and provide training with the guidance of a few older players in a team competition frame work.

Statistically the 1981-82 5Bs were very similar to the previous season, being beaten outright only by the minor premiers. Whilst only gaining 2 wins for the season, 2 or 3 more games should have been won. It is a measure of the 5Bs that we provide determined opposition to most teams and a good game of cricket was played.

Occassionally, particularly at Xmas fielding 11 players proved very difficult and here special mention should be made of Tom Boyce who no matter how late the request turned out for us and perhaps other players with more ability could take Tom as an example.

The dominant weakness was our bowling, only on 5 occassions did we dismiss the opposition, certainly the fielding contributed to this and the lack of a regular wicket keeper was another problem. No bowler took 5 wickets in an innings. The most successful bowler in number of wickets was Ralph Merrell whilst not the sort of figures we expect from Ralph over the years perhaps with the improvement of his batting he may follow G2 and decide hitting the ball is better then being hit.

As with the bowling the batting suffered but perhaps this is the nature of 5B cricket that when good preformances are registered promotion follows. Only one player scored more than 200 runs for the season, however some notable innings and promising players were evident; John Martin, E'vin Robb, Ian Eldershaw and Chris Birt.

A pleasing aspect this year was the number of slow/spin bowlers in the team and their promotion to higher grades. Certainly on the figures this art of bowling is strong at the club and did not suffer in limited over games. Perhaps with this situation the myth of expensive slow bowlers may be laid to rest and the club maintain its strong position. In this context players such as Greg Bryant, Greg Holt, Ken Crighton and Martin Pallin show much promise.

Martin Dyball and Chris Gale new players to the club showed great promise and should with more regular play reach higher grades.

Peter James, Ben Hunt and Trevor Stegman did not have the sort of season that was expected but as the more senior players contributed to the team in many ways, especially being available when it really mattered-my special thanks.

Special mention should be mades of the excellent wickets prepared at David Philitips; perhaps the bowlers wiltenot agreer but certainly fine cricket wickets. Special thanks to the University and ground staff for a fine job.

Our congratulations to 1st Grade and 5As for reaching the finals, unfortunately premierships did not result. The 5As result, minor premiers without achieving that elusive premiership is the best 5th Grade result for the club and also reflects on the 5Bs being the immediate reserve side.

I would like to thank all who made a contribution to the 5Bs for a most enjoyable season both on and off the field. Special thanks to Ralph Merrell (V.C.) and lan Kellaway who worked very hard to ensure the 5Bs had all the available players possible.

Again thanks to all who passed through the 5Bs and look forward to next season and perhaps finally a 5th Grade premiership.

#### POIDEVIN GRAY REPORT

This was going to be the year we would win back the Shield. Preparations for the P-G season were well under way in November. Disco was re-appointed as Captain, I was re-appointed Manager and Glen Clark was appointed Coach. The key country players were all approached soon after to make sure that they would be available and the "administration" was ecstatic when it quickly became clear that the strongest possible squad would be available. Although we only grabbed six wickets, Randwick were never able to force the pace as all our bowlers were tight with Rob Stark being particularly impressive with 2/26 off 12 overs. If I might digress for one moment, Starky had never really entered into calculations for the P-G team. He was a spare parts player who we only decided to include in the side at the eleventh hour. When I saw him at practice for the first time he used such high powered tehniques to make me include him in the team that he would have made a Used Car Salesman proud. After this game Starky's place was never in doubt and he is already on the campaign trail for P-G Captain the year after next. Back to the game and we only needed 96 to win. Wickets fell fairly steadily but at 5 for 85 with five overs to go and Jamie ("I haven't stopped growing") Baker in full flight it seemed a foregone result. Then came panic stations 9 for 91 with Starky and Mark Hoy at the crease and one over to go. To the astonishment of all of us Starky hit a classic cover drive for four off the first ball (could it have rivalled that famous six at Mosman?). Only two to win. Starky however thought there was one more over and he patted away the next four balls before he realised what all the commotion was in the grandstand. The last ball was bowled and Starky hit it straight to mid-on (a certain run out I thought) but the fieldsman fumbled the ball. The return was still close however and the Randwick fieldsmen were jumping up and down. Meanwhile Mark Hoy had run back to the bowlers end and before the bowler new what had happened Starky had set off for the second run and by some miracle we won the game. A win, but the seeds of failure had been sowed with only Jamie 36 and Disco 16 making double figures.

Round Two - St. George. An absolute disaster - 9/65 before rallying to 96 after a solid 23 from Nick Prattent. Too few runs to do anything about.

Round Three - Sutherland. Now here was an experienced team and I was sure that we would sink further into the quagmire. But it was not to be. In fact it was "Dixon Day". Punk 28 put on 32 with Jamie Baker - the highest opening stand for four seasons - before joining in a delightful partnership of 47 with big brother Disco. Disco's innings of 61 was magnificent and laid the foundation for whirlwind batting by Peachie 39 not out in collaboration with Mick Kilborn 26. Five for 188 was a formidable score on that wicket, but I nearly had a heart attack when Disco persisted bowling Jamie's leg spinners with the score quickly mounting to 4 for 113. But I should never have doubted him as Jamie routed them with 5/47 off 16 overs.

Disco 5/40 returned his best P-G performance since his halycon days with the Sydney P-G team back in 1979 and Kyogle made a welcome return with 3/18 off 17 overs. After being 1 for 0 Jamie 28 and Sandy 28 put on the slowest batting performance I thought I would ever see (bad luck boys Mark and Livo put on 29 in 110 minutes in the 1st Grade Final). But their partnership was the foundation that the side needed to build on and despite a minor scare when Disco made the best "Golden Duck" that any of us had ever seen, Peachie 49 hit us to an easy win.

Round Five - Sydney Uni. This was the big game in our division as the winner would go into the semis. Mark Hamwood took over the captaincy as Disco decided the pressure was too much and took off to Queensland to partake in the Interstate Colts Carmival - Congratulations kid from all of us. What a sight - they brought a 15 man squad and proceeded to run around the oval three times, did a series of callisthenics and strutted around like plumed peacocks. They were convinced they were going to win but another determined performance by Jamie 48 and a forceful 55 from Peachie thwarted them and saw us to 180. But all seemed lost when Sydney Uni reached 1 for 125 with plenty of overs to spare. Then came the dramatic slump that would have done 3rd Grade proud! From 4 for 159 they were all out for 170 with Mark Hamwood returning the stunning figures of 23 overs 5 maidens 6/46. Jubilation and congratulations were handed out all around. I was in a complete daze but we had made the Semis for the first time since Jungle's Conquering Heros.

Semi-final - Mosman. A stinking hot day saw the selectors pick a side with seven bowlers and dangerously thin batting. Luckily once again Disco won the toss and Mark Hamwood put in another stirling performance with 5/24 off 17 overs 9 maidens, admirably supported by the incomparable Disco with 3/32 off 13 overs. Only 146 to win. Disaster struck early with Jamie being given out LBW in the first over off a ball so far down the leg side that it could almost have been a wide and Punk going in a similar manner shortly thereafter. We were up against it and although Mick Kilborn 27 played a gem of an innings (hopefully a sign of things to come) the collapse was on in earnest and only Mick Ryan 17 provided any late resistance. All out 94 TFC.

Congratulations to Peachie for the batting aggregate and average and some really memorable big-hitting. Also to Jamie Baker who put in some superb performances opening the batting. On the bowling side Mark Hamwood stormed home with the aggregate and average after an indifferent start and Mark Hoy was particularly impressive with his tight line and length bowling and should be a trump card next season. Despite what Mick "Veritas" Ryan might think Disco deserves heaps of accolades for his captaincy. His tactical ability has matured out of sight and he will make a superb 1st Grade captain when Mark finally hangs up his boots. Special mention must be made of Glen Clark's efforts as coach and co-manager. He worked hard for "our goal" and made my job a piece of cake. The major disappointments were Punk, Sandy, Mick Ryan and Mick Kilborn. If they had shown the form they showed late in the season the Premiership would have been ours for sure. #### UNIVERSITY OF NEW SOUTH WALES v WESTERN AUSTRALIA - 16/2/82

Thanks to the entrepreneurial skills of former captain John Rogers, the Club was privileged this season to play host to the Western Australian Sheffield Shield team. After a hard game against NSW at the SCG, the team took the opportunity to avoid more net practice and have a workout in the middle. As reigning First Grade premiers and one of the most progressive Clubs in Sydney, it was fitting that the UNSWCC was the first Grade Club to hold such a fixture. What a pity the press didn't give the game more publicity!

According to the Club's traditional 'tour rules', the visitors were given the option of batting first.
