PRESIDENT'S REPORT

The season past was a difficult one for the Club. We had only limited success on the field in all Grades after a start to the season only marginally better than the year before. A good sign, though, was that despite this we enjoyed our cricket most of the time.

The Management Committee has already taken steps to try to restore the Club to its accustomed position at the top of individual Grade Competitions and the Club Championship. In a detailed review of the season we pinpointed major areas of practise and administration that need immediate attention. To this end we hope to appoint a Club Coach next season and intend to streamline the administrative structure of the Club to ensure that all Committee members take responsibility for one aspect of the Club's management and regularly report to the Committee as a whole.

Any sporting club is heavily dependent on the work of a few selfless individuals behind the scenes. Often unnoticed when things go well, these people are essential to any Club. I would like to thank all officeholders, especially Greg Holt (Teams Secretary), for their work in the past year. I hope that others will step forward to contribute to the efficient management of the Club in the future.

FIRST GRADE REPORT

Last year the President in his report stated:

"On the field this was not a good season for the club. Notorious for our slow starts to a season, this past year we excelled ourselves in the mediocrity of performances right up until the Christmas break. It was pleasing, though, that the First Grade side made a strong recovery in the second half of the season and in the end narrowly missed a berth in the Finals."

This year we started with the same side which finished as strongly as the previous year. Unfortunately, mediocrity prevailed. Not only did we have the customary slow start to the season, but the expectant recovery did not eventuate.

We can no longer afford to accept that a slow start to the season is simply one of those things which, as a University club, we must accept. Explanations offered as to why the club in general and first grade in particular started the season so poorly were many and varied. I suggest that these explanations or excuses all stem from the one problem: lack of commitment.

Lack of commitment manifests itself primarily in lack of practice. Attendance at practice was poor as was the effort expended whilst in attendance. If you fail to put in a real effort at practice, especially fielding practice, you tend to lose out in real situations. A couple of loose overs or a missed chance can be taken over. Any pressure that was being built up suddenly dissipates. This happened to us whilst fielding time and time again. In three straight games we missed 15 chances, not including possible run-outs. This can only be the result of lack of practice, and we were unable to withstand the pressure being applied.

As bleak as this report may seem, at one stage after Christmas we won four games in a row. With only two more wins before Christmas we still would have been a chance for a place in the "four". It is up to each and every player in the club to put in some hard work prior to the commencement of the season and in those early weeks to ensure that we come away from the early games with points.

Thanks to Tom Boyce who started the season and to David Lemon who deputised for Tom during his absence. David Lemon continues to do as much behind the scenes as we found out towards the end of the season. A special thank you to all those who helped with the afternoon teas - not always a pleasant task in "cockroach corner".

GREG LIVINGSTONE yet again had one of those seasons during which everyone says he should have scored more runs. Only 3 times out of 15 first innings did he fail to reach double figures. However, he scored one 40 and one 50. For the side to succeed next year, he must score several seventies.

JAMIE BAKER like Greg, was dismissed for under 10 only 3 times. His aggregate also shows that carelessness often dismisses him. One aspect of his game which is improving is not, as he thinks, his bowling, but his ability to keep getting singles. His bowling may improve in England.

JIM ROBSON returned from Tasmania with a few theories he could have left behind. Hopefully these will be forgotten by next season.

STUART KEERS showed a lot of promise in 2 rounds before stricken with glandular fever. Even as he forced his way into the side with several good innings. An average of 15 does not reflect the ability which, on occasions he showed that he obviously possesses.

BRUCE HANDLEY had his best season in first grade. Batting mainly at number 6 he almost scored 500 runs. A good effort especially considering he was usually batting under extreme pressure. His maiden hundred against Balmain was a gem.

STEVE CAMPBELL was obviously affected by his injured back and was unable to play to his usual high standard. Hopefully the off-season will see a recovery. A record eighth wicket stand of 111 with Nigel Perger was a highlight of the season.

PADDY GRATTAN-SMITH made a welcome '?' return to the club. He added some experience and drive to the side and with half a season behind him, he should be back to his best.

PETER BISHELL suffered by continually having to bowl to batsmen who were "set". He should be a far better bowler next year and, if given the opportunity should score more runs.

DICK PYM had his career best figures of 7-77 against Parramatta. With 11 cricketers who put in as much effort as Dick you would walk away with competition - just as Dick now walks to the wicket to bowl.

CHRIS HANGER once again kept well, and did a lot to encourage fielders especially when things were not going our way.

DEREK PRINGLE had a disappointing season with us. He arrived a couple of games later than expected and injury meant he finished the season a little earlier than expected. Currently playing for England.

NIGEL PERGER had a disappointing season. Along with all bowlers he suffered from missed chances as well as the inability to bowl accurately for extended periods. He was never fully fit and this showed at the end of the season when he suffered a couple of injuries. He did show us all that he can bat, averaging 24 with limited opportunities.

JIM DIXON took batting and bowling lessons from Nigel until he decided to go to England to play rugby. A disappointing season with the ball but his maiden century was a fine effort.

GEOFF LAWSON attended, as usual, more practice sessions than he played in matches.

SECOND GRADE REPORT

The seconds in the 1983-84 season had one of the poorest seasons on record. We could only play well for 70% of the time and then our concentration would lapse. Only in mid season did we get into a winning mood. Initially the pendulum never swung in our favour and no luck came our way.

Rarely in the season did we bat at the right time. Not once did we win a toss in the limited over games, meaning we bowled on good wickets and batted on crumbling wickets.

Still our batsmen could only score runs spasmodically, very few 50's and no 100's were registered. Our bowlers kept their line and length however either became erratic when the pressure was on or saw an easy chance missed. Basically our fielding was terrible. Many easy catches were dropped allowing the opposing sides to score many more runs.

At no stage could we settle with a basic team. Team movements were occurring all the time and I'm sure lower grades suffered even more. It's hoped more stability can occur next season. A greater emphasis must be placed on practice and this can only be helped by players feeling part of a team, preferably a winning team, and then the club can only be strengthened.

FOURTH GRADE REPORT 1983/84

FIFTH GRADE A - 1983 - 84 SEASON

1983-84 was not a good season for the club and particularly 5As. It is interesting to note that, with one exception, all clubs that fielded an A & B side in 5th grade, the B sides finished higher than their A side. For the 5As the season can be divided into 2 sections, 1983 - 8 rounds, 1 draw & 7 first innings defeats whilst 1984 produced 7 rounds, 2 draws, 3 first innings wins & 2 first innings defeats. Hopefully the second part of the season is an indication of a future upswing in results.

The scope for improvement in all facets of the game is large, however some additional 33 runs and 2 wickets at critical stages would have resulted in 4 additional wins.

Reasons for the poor showing of the 5As are numerous however the single most important factor I believe is the large turnover of players.

The comments regarding the number of players or turnover is a perennial statement by 5th grade captains. The above table for the past four seasons clearly shows the problem and the results. Whilst the problem is magnified in the lower grades it does permeate throughout the club.

Part of the problem of large turnover of players may be attributed to selection that is premature promotion and availability during the Christmas break. However, the dominant factor is the lack of dedication with the club. How many players can claim to have missed just one or no rounds this season or in fact 5 or less rounds (injury apart) in the last four seasons?

From the past season a few highlights and players should be mentioned. The team performed very well against St. George and Canterbury-Bankstown who finished 1 & 2 respectively in the preliminary rounds.

CRAIG OSBORNE - a good season with bat and ball; should progress to higher grades.

STEVE HOBBS - lots of natural talent, needs to harness this talent and concentrate on the job. 4th grade seem to have found the magic ingredient.

JOHN JOYCE - should develop into a good all rounder.

MAL CAMERON - much promise both bat and ball and will play higher grades

GREG COLEMAN - unlucky season however will progress and should be encouraged

PHIL WILLIAMS &
THEO LAMB - showed promise of better performances next season.

CRAIG McINTOSH - unlucky season but will progress.

Mention in this report should be made of the fine facilities provided by the University and particular thanks to the ground staff at David Phillips. Perhaps the bowlers will not appreciate the quality of the wickets prepared at David Phillips but certainly the batsmen would. We averaged 15 runs per wicket away, yet at home 22 runs per wicket, certainly a compliment to the ground staff at David Phillips.

From the players that passed through 5th grade there is evidence of natural talent that can be developed for future years, with commitment and practise by all, we should overcome our current slump.

A special thank you should be given to Greg Holt, Team Secretary who despite the turnover of players, late withdrawals etc. always ensured we had 11 players every match.

To all who played in the 5As my thanks, whilst not a successful season, an enjoyable season.


