PRESIDENT'S REPORT

When a Club wins the First Grade Premiership it has had a good season. But it was an excellent season for us for many more reasons than this. We came third in the Club Championship, our third grade side reached the semi-finals and our fourth grade side almost made it. All this is ample evidence of the depth of talent in the Club which, by maintaining pressure on prayers in the higher grades, augers well for the future.

The First Grade side stole the limelight, however, and deservedly so. It was superbly led by Mark Ray - surely the best all-rounder in this State. Mark justifiably won the Sydney Morning Herald Player of the Year Award and the team as a whole won us the Club of the Year Award. Not only was Mark the top player in the competition but also he led the side tremendously well, gradually stamping his personality on it. It is hard for any player in his first year as captain but Mark more than fulfilled our expectations. Congratulations to him and to all 13 players who contributed to winning both the Premiership and the Minor Premiership.

In the long run a Club is only as good as those who are prepared to work for it. I can honestly say that this year we have had the best and hardest working Management Committee in my experience with the Club. is somewhat invidious to single out any individuals, for everyone played a significant role, but Mark Sample, Andrew McMaster, Clayton Jones and, above all, lan Kellaway deserved special mention. A lot of hard work is put into the Club behind the scenes and we owe a great deal to those who have efficiently and unselfishly worked to make us the best Club in Sydney. Congratulations to Terry Buddin for being elected to the Grade Committee. This, together with being a Club Delegate, takes up a lot of time but it is important that our Club provides an input into the Cricket Association. Congratulations also to Chris Chapman for taking the initiative in organising the Inaugural Dinner for First Grade Players at the University in March. The Club gained a great deal of favourable publicity from this endeavour.

In two areas we have broken new ground this year. Firstly, we have transferred our after match socialising to the Racecourse Hotel. This has proved highly successful, avoiding all the problems associated with trying to organise ourselves at the Sam Cracknell and providing a good atmosphere and ready food each week. Our thanks to Terry Cooper for his support and we look forward to a long and mutually beneficial association. Secondly, we fielded a Veterans' side in the City and Suburban Competition for the first time. There will be considerable long-term benefits for the Club in providing a way for former grade cricketers to continue their association with the Club.

We must now set ourselves new goals for the approaching season. Our First Grade side is still a young one, with an average age of only around 24. We should aim to dominate the First Grade competition for the next 5 years, in the way that St George did in the 1960's. I believe that we have the players and the Club structure to win again, and to win well. Our second aim must be to wrest beake the Club Championship. We were on top at Christmas this season but, unusually for us, fell away in January. Given the depth of talent in the Club, the Club Championship should be ours next season. Thirdly, we must win a lower grade premiership - either third or fourth grade (or both, of course). We have been close with the third grade side for three years in a row now but have yet to take off the major prize.

Overall, then, next season we must consolidate our position as the premier Club in Sydney. We still have a few problems with the Village Green wicket table and must pay attention to this from well before the

season starts. With the proposed improvements to the David Philips ground, long everdue as they are, we will have the best tacilities of any cricket club in Sydney by a long way.

I would like to record our thanks to Professor Myers, who retires in July as Vice-Chancellor and who has supported us in so many ways as our Patron. Finally, we congratulate Geoff Lawson on being a member of the Australian touring side to England and trust that he has a successfully toury. MARK RAY

To say that the 1980/81 season was a successful one for Mark Ray would be something of an understatement. Fifty-five wickets at 14.2 and 465 runs at 26 speaks for itself. His performance this year was probably the best in a career that dates back to our inclusion in the First Grade Competition.

In his career with the Club, Mark has scored 3,629 runs and taken 259 wickets, both at better than useful averages. He has scored over 500 runs on four occasions, and come very close again this year. He has taken 40 or more wickets in three seasons including last years 55 wicket haul. Perhaps his best year was in 1976/77 when he scored 608 at 30.4 and took 43 at 15.4 and duly landed Australian Crickets' "Grade Cricketer of the Year" award. Included in the above performances was an 80 against Andy Roberts on a dangerous track and six wickets on the same day. That season was definitely capped by the Club's initial First Grade Premiership, Mark capturing the final wicket fall in a memorable final.

Mark has been the Club's Player of the Year on many occasions, this year by a record margin. He was the Club's first N.S.W. Colts Player, but strangely, the representative honours end there. This selection situation came to a head recently when he was described as the "un-luckiest player in the land" in a national sporting magazine.

Season 1980/81 was clearly Mark Ray's year. As well as the figures quoted in the opening paragraph, have a go at these:

- Sydney Morning-Herald "Player of the Year"

- Australian Cricket "Sydney Grade Cricketer of the Year"

- Captain of the U.N.S.W. 1st Grade team: N.S.W.C.A. Grade Premiers and S.M.-H. Team of the Year.

Mark was an outstanding success in his first year as first grade Captain. His quiet, unassuming but fiercely competitive approach plus his great knowledge of the game were his qualities as leader, and he is held in the highest esteem in the Club. Everyone wishes however, that Mark will not be available all 1st grade games next season. Surely this will be the case.

FIRST GRADE

The dominant landmark in our Club's short history is undoubtedly the premiership win of the first grade team in 1976-77. Our Club Championship success the following season owed a great deal to the impetus the club received from that earlier win. The 76-77 season, had a great deal of drama about it. A dynamic captain leading a team of "unknowns", close matches during the season and a very exciting final all combined to make that victory something of a "fairytale" success. The players didn't see it quite that way as we thought at the outset that we were good enough to win the penant.

This season's success has equal if not greater significance for the club. While 76-77 put us on the cricketing maps, our victory this season showed that we are still one of the leading clubs in N.S.W. cricket. After the loss of several key players, it has only taken us two seasons to rebuild the team to premiership standard. We have shown that our victory four years ago was no fluke. We have also shown that our club is capable of producing new players of a high standard. We now have six relatively young players who have played in two premiership-winning teams - a fact which bodes well for the future.

Where this season differed from previous years was in the comprehensiveness of our victory. We we were not headed on the competition table, lost only one game, won the Minor Premiership for the first time, and won both the semi and the final comfortably. We also picked up both the Club and Player of the Year Awards from the Sydney Morning Herald, (our thanks to the Fairfax organisation for the spending money). However our style of cricket followed the same pattern of earlier years. Teamwork and fielding were important factors in our success.

We were undoubtedly the best fielding team in the competition, and must rate as good as any over the last 10 years. This is an aspect of our game which John Rogers emphasised, and we continued that tradition this season. Our worst effort in the field naturally coincided with our only defeat. The bowlers performed very well all year, but special mention should be made of Jim Dixon. Dixon carried most of the aftack and was able to maintain constant pressure against the best of batsmen.

Our batting strength was questioned in some quarters. Scoring runs on the slow Village Green wicket is never easy. That fact combined with the sheer size of the outfield makes large totals difficult to amass. A score of 200 at home is worth at least 250 on other grounds in Sydney. This should be taken into account when analysing the performance of our batsmen. However the season's statistics show how well the batsmen performed. Of the 19 genuine innings played, we scored 200 or more on 9 occasions (five at home). We were dismissed under 200 five times, resulting in one loss, two wins and two draws. The other five innings under 200 were terminated either with declarations or at stumps. Two of these occurred while chasing outrights, the other three after we had passed opposition totals. At home we averaged 191 per 10 wickets, away 215, the opposition 138 and 153. Given the size of the Village Green it would seem we performed better at home than away. These figures do not include our two large totals in the semi and final. Our average total was 212, the opposition's 145. Except for one occasion, our batsmen always outscored their opposition — and that's what it's all about. Given the characteristics of our home ground, the bowlers' figures give a slightly better impression than perhaps they should. All five main bowlers averaged less than 15 runs per wicket. Whether this figure should be 2 or 3 runs

more does not lessen the quality of their performance. Over the season we bowled one maiden every four overs!

The season's draw proved to be very interesting. We played the easier games early in the year, and then met the other top teams right at the end of the season. Unlike past years, we won all the early games. The question was how would we perform when the pressure increased. Leading the table all the way put pressure on us to keep proving that we deserved that position in the competition. As it turned out we played Randwick, North Sydney (semi-final) and Northern Districts (final) in the last three matches. The winning margins were 60, 99 and 133 respectively. As the pressure increased so our game improved.

There are three other factors which led to our success. The first is the high quality of our club administration. One of the main reasons we have achieved so much on the playing field is that off the field our officials maintain an equally high standard. My special thanks and congratulations go to all the committee, especially John Ingleson and Terry Buddin. Together with Andrew McMaster, these blokes have won respect for themselves and the club at the NSW Cricket Association. In particular the advice and support I received from John and Terry proved invaluable. The club also owes much to Mark Sample and Ian Kellaway for their work during the Semi and Final. I can assure both of them that their efforts were warmly appreciated by both the visiting clubs on those occasions.

The second factor which helped us greatly during the competition was the cricket knowledge we learned from John Rogers during his years with the club. J.R. established traditions of behaviour on and off the field which we have consolidated. The winning attitude that he instilled in us served us well in many tight situations. I do not think we could have done so well without the experience of having played with John. I know he feels grateful! to think that we have done it again, and all the players agree that we still owe him a great deal. His messages of support towards the end of the season were a great encouragement.

The third factor in our success was the support we received from so many people throughout the year. During the last few weeks of the season we received phone calls from New York, Perth and Hobart (Bob Patterson) as well as an inspiring telephone from Paddy Graftan-Smith in London. Closer to home, we received great help from Mrs. Taut, Mr. Chapman, Mrs. Ray, Julie Smith, Sue and Jenny.

Jack Skiller was a faithful supporter and his readily available statistics were always helpful. I would also like to thank David Bolton and the residents of both Warrane and New Colleges for the lunches during the final series as well as the barracking and posters. Also John Gallagher and the Arden St. push. Special thanks also to "Kyogle" Smith for the many overs he bowled at Jungle in the sets. We also have many supporters in country areas, some even wearing Wales caps in their own games. To alan Boyd and the Temora connection, the Robsons, Dixons, Campbells, Hangers, Lawsons and Livingstones who all travelled down to support us - our appreciation. Our thanks also to the Village Green Groundstaff for the fine wickets they prepared for the semi and Final.

This season we gained three new supporters at the Racecourse Hotel. This new partnership worked very well. It gave the club a venue for post-mortens on Saturday nights, and it was an ideal place in which to celebrate after the final. On behalf of the firsts I would

like to offer our gratitude to Terry and Julie Cooper for their hospitality, and to Mark for his excellent service all summer. We look forward to another successful partnership next season.

As I mentioned above, we followed our last first grade cup with the Club Championship the following season: We have the strength to repeat that performance, and that should be our aim in 81-82. MARK, RAY

Greg Livingstone: Consistency was the cornerstone of Livois batting this season. He now looks comfortable in the opening role, and was rarely in genuine trouble against the new ball. His best efforts were 80 Vs Gordon and 53 Vs Manly. Livo took part in 7??? opening partnerships of 50 or more, yet he got out 7 times between 15 & 30. Vs Sydney was a fine knock, mixing long spells of concentration with some intelligent aggression. At no. 6 he gave the side a look of solidity solidify. In that sport he came in at disfor 4 in the semi-final and saw two more * wickets fall: with no addition before he was joined by Chappo. They added 63 in a crucial partnership. Bruce Handley: Bruce batted at no. 7 all season, a difficult spot for a specialist batsman. If the player's above have done their job, no. 7 can only put the icing on the cake. If the team is in trouble he has the responsibility to lead the fightback. This situation brought out all Bruce's fighting qualities. He is highly competitive, and gave our batting line-up great backbone. His top score of 58 in the semi-final was an important innings in that it enabled us to build a large rather than a reasonable total. His close — in fielding was a revelation to those of us who had not played with him much prior to this season. He is the best short-leg fieldsman the team has ever had. His close-in fielding to the spinners showed great courage. I am sure Bruce's long wait for a first grade spot was well worth it.

Terry Buddin: Terry played only $\frac{21}{2}$ games before illness laid him low. He looked in fine touch in his few "healthy" digs. It is to be hoped Terry will be fit enough to play all of next season, and add his on-field ability to the excellent work he does for the club as our club captain and delegate to N.S.W.C.A. Terry gave excellent support to me all season.

Steve Campbell: Steve played well all season. His batting got the team out of trouble several times, notably against North Sydney. In his partnership with Asoka. His intelligent play while batting with Cliff in the final was an indication of his coolness under pressure. Steve's 33 wickets at 14.6 was an excellent performance, making him the best leggie in Sydney cricket. For a leg-splaner to average one maiden every four overs is quite a feat. Steve's fielding was equal to the best in the feam with some memorable catches and several run-outs. If Steve continues to improve in this way he should be rewarded with higher honours in the future.

Jim Dixon: Disco's season had everything. Wickets, catches, media notoriety, romance, glandular fever, and even some runs in the semi. With 46 wickets at 14.5, he now has 81 wickets in two seasons of first grade. He has the ability to do equally well with the bat, although getting enough opportunities might prove difficult. His 52 in the semi-final was elegant to the point of arrogance. Jim's bowling all year was excellent. His control and our fielding were enough to break most batting line-ups. His long spell against Balmain was a match—winning performance. Apart from the slips

fieldsmen, Disco took most catches in the outfield. As it turned out, he played in the final with glandular fever, - and I thought nerves and a touch of flu had put him off colour. With restored health, Jim's cricketing future looks bright.

Geoff Lawson: As team mates we were delighted with Henry's selection for his first Test, and subsequently for the tour to England. We were even more pleased with the way he played for us. His obvious determination to win the premiership gave us all a psychological boost as the big games approached. His 24 wickets at 9.6 from the six games in which he howled needs no comment. His fielding was excellent as usual. His batting was always entertaining and at times controversial, but he has more ability than he showed in 180-181. His competitiveness and experience were always heipful.

Nigel Perger: Nigel suffered the disappointment of being the third pace bowler behind Henry and Disco. On the Village Green wicket there is little need for a third quickie. Nigel worked hard on his game all year, especially after not playing the previous season. He took 15 wickets at 14.6, the best performances being 4/37 Vs Cumberland and 4/23 Vs Sutherland. The latter effort gave us the chance to get back into that game and chase an outright. Nigel's batting was disappointing although his opportunities were limited. More application to his batting would have Nigel pressing strongly for a permanent spot in firsts. His fielding was very good, the highlight being his fine catch at deep square leg during the tense final overs of the Balmain game. His performances during the end of season celebrations, were top class.

Chris Hanger: As the central figure in such a good fielding team, Cliff always had to show us the tead. He did this well all year, showing plenty of courage when Henry's deliveries were reaching him on the second bounce. As the season progressed, Cliff's determination to win grew. His intelligent and balligerent batting: in the final showed his ability to fight for his team under pressure. Cliff is a fine team-man and a gentleman.

Dave Meagher: Dave played in our two limited over games, being 9 n.o. when we passed N.D's total. On behalf of the players I would like to congratulate him on being "The Fastest Man in Grade Cricket." I am sure Dave will be one player putting pressure on the first next season.

Although Dave's only appearances on the playing field Dave Lemon: were at drinks, he was very much part of the team, and did an excellent job all season. The quiet man in a team of chronic statement-makers, Dave nevertheless voiced his opinions when he saw fit. One of his comments precipitated a Robson tirade which lasted two hours, and had the staff of Caesar's Palace Cocktail Bar and Restaurant at Katoomba quaking in incomprehension. With splinter's lack of early season form as manager and his departure for New York, plus the relative inexperience of his replacement, John Gallagher, Dave took on many of those duties as well. Although showing signs of wear and tear towards the end, he saw the season out well, and has already been reappointed for next season.

SECOND GRADE

The Season could best be described as slightly less disappointing than last season. Having just re-read that report, it is worrying that many of the problems highlighted then have recurred again in assessing results, the effort put in must be looked at.

It is here that perhaps the crux of the problem lies. It would seem that those who wish, or expect, to play in the higher grades need to rethink what this entails. Lack of commitment seemed to play a large part in the team's slump this season.

After a promising first half of the season, during which we recorded 5 wins from 7 matches, the team's performance just fell away and we recorded only one more win, and that in the final round. During the early period of the season, only 14 players appeared and the team remained fairly settled. However, from Round 8 (mid-December) on this changed. The team seemed to regularly lose players to "other commitments", - work, holidays and "mystery" disappearances. Another 9 players appeared in Second's during this time, meaning the team was never really settled. This situation was worsened as on several occassions we lost players just as they seemed to reach form eg. 3 batsmen missed games after recording their highest score the previous week. Furthermore, this was not helped by a rather disappointing lack of success by most of those who gained promotion ... from Third Grade. The lack of commitment was further stressed by the practice habits of the team. Again from mid-season, as "otherthings" were happening, the number of second-graders at practice was usually not more than 2 or 3 people. Again, a rather disappointing lack of commitment from a team of experienced players who should not need to be told what to do, and who should be responsible enough to dothe "right thing". + With daylight saving it would seem that most should be able to make it on a reasonably regular basis.

It would seem the very least that should be demanded is that those who wish to play higher grades be available for at least most of the season, and for the full duration of these games. For again, too often players seem to think it is fair enough to leave early to attend "other functions" in highlighting again a lack of commitment. Perhaps it also has become necessary to set some minimum practice requirement for higher grades, although this is obviously difficult in a club encompassing players with such a wide variety of responsibilities and places of work.

As to the team's performances on the field. Overall, the bowlers performed adequately, often it seemed, despite the fielding. The opposition only scored greater than 200 runs on 2 occassions. Our batting, however, particularly the upper order batsmen, performed poorly. We only reached 200 on 4 occassions (only 1 of which was a winning score). In the top six partnerships during the season, only 13-50 partnerships and 3-100 partnerships were recorded (ie, in 99 partnerships).

The two most successful individuals were Bruce Handley and Asoka Wijeratne, both of whom deservedly won, and held, First Grade positions. Bruce, after several seasons on the verge, got his chance after well compiled scores of 76 & 81 in the first few rounds, and remained in 1sts thereafter.

"Wij" made it after a string of very good batting performances, first in 3rd's and then in 2nd's. His success is yet another reason to stress the value of practice, for no-one was more conscientious in this area.

Dave Meagher also had a good season. Stepping up to No. 3, he regularly got into the 20's, but too often failed to go on with it. It should be mentioned however, that he often batted under great pressure as wickets fell around him. He played the innings of the season when he scored 100 runs in 89 minutes against St. George.

Of the bowlers, Nigel Perger, who played most of the season in 1st's, was the most dangerous, although on occassions Dick Pym showed his old fire.

Steve Price perhaps should have got more wickets. Although not helped by the Village Green wicket, he needs to develop a more aggressive approach. FOURTH GRADE

The season in review: A detailed analysis of the game follows but some characteristics of the 4th grade team were most prominent. Over 30 players appeared in the team with only 3 appearing in more than 10 or 15 games. I know it can't be helped but it still makes things that much tougher and that was after the selectors gave preference to players "available" for the "whole" season. We started slowly winning only 2 of the first seven games but came home with a wet sail to suffer our next defeat in the very last game of the season. Part of the reason for this was the large number of new club members in the team, many of whom were feeling their way and perhaps lacking confidence, in the early stages of the season. Their welding together as a successful team, together with the experience gained, augers well for the club next year.

In many games our steady howling and good field support would wear down the top half of the opposition only to see a chance or two go down and allow the initiative to be lost. We lacked the really quick strike bowler or good wrist spinner to ram home our advantage (so did most of our other sides) and mop us on the superb D.P. shirt front. In the limited over games teams could average only $2\frac{1}{2}$ runs per over against us. In these 4 games our bowling played us into an excellent position to win. That we did not win all is an indictment against our batting. Like our bowling it tended to be steady rather than dashing (with one outstanding exception). Too frequently we would lose momentum after a steady start and our later batsmen were forced to battle on to a satisfactory total. This, they generally did very well. Indeed, the batting of the bowlers was a real strength.

A team makes its own luck and will take its opportunities if it's good enough. The line between success and failure is very fine indeed sometimes. A single catch, a decision - Balmain, Bankstown, N.E.'s, Saints - 22 points. What might have been! The player effort was generally excellent and we really deserve a better fate.

The players:

Geoff Garland in a new role opening, finished with 532 runs after a number of steady displays. Perhaps with more aggression the innings would have been away with us taking more of the initiative.

Leon Darmody with an average over 40 in his 1st season showed us technical skill and a fine femperament. A mean batsman who hates to get out, he will do very well next year with a full season in the higher grades.

John Carmichael really had a pretty lousy season. Every time he missed or edged a balk he was out. Against Manly and Saints he showed us how well we could have done with his slashing stroke play.

lan Smith (Kyogle) introduced himself to the club in a devastating manner. Aggressive, super keen (no other player in the club practised harder or more often), lan will develop into a fine off spinning all-rounder. The improvement in his fielding was remarkable.

Glen Clark Orca really epitomised our attack. Accurate, subtle and persistent he just kept going. His 25 overs straight against Manly was one of many highlights. No batsman played him with confidence as he toiled on some excellent wickets with deserved success. His figures speak for themselves. Worse bowlers have been successful in 2nd Grade.

Tim Stubbings: Another 1980 starter, Tim gradually gained confidence and by the season's end had cemented his place in the team with his probing snswingers and leg cutters. Not a great bat, as yet.

Rob Stark. A freshman, Rob burst into the team against Waverly with 5-28 and thereafter conceded only 1.5 runs per over in the last four games. A real discovery.

Paul Monkerud, a classy bat and excellent field did not experience the success his ability deserved, but after one chance in a higher grade we never tooked like getting him back. Ditto for Michael Ryan. Does he very get tired?

Dave Goldsmith, Gordon Black (an excellent slip field) and Mark Kelly all had a go at opening with some success but were generally lacking in consistency except for Dave who missed some key matches.

Pat Thompson and Paul Edey had some success with the new ball but had trouble maintaining a line on the excellent wickets. Froggy really bowled well against Sydney, Macquarie and Gordon but needs to put in the work in the nets if he is to realise his full potential.

Johnny Barford finished as keeper in our successful run and after a horrendous start was back to his best form. His betting average should ensure him a trial with the N.Y. Yankees.

Finally a word about "Chuck" Connor. After his early success we all thought he was on to fame and fortune but after a couple of missed games returned to bowl well only occasionally. Chuck has excellent bowling skills, is a top field and can bat but is too often his own worst enemy. Once he learns to believe in himself and play with the confidence of somebody like Kyogle he'll attain the continued success his effort and ability deserves.

Many others made appearances in the side with varying degrees of success. Joe Scarcella had one excellent game, Johnny Sackett is probably the best field in the club and the list goes on. Sorry about the other omissions, but suffice to say that everyone who played made some contribution, centainly everyone gave me all the help and effort any captain could want and I hope all enjoyed their cricket and that's what it's all about.

FIFTH GRADE A

The 5A's again failed to make the semi-finals, although we were in or just out of the first four right up until the last round. However, even my optomistic outlook will not allow me to claim that we deserved to make the semi-finals. Whilst the team batted well enough our bowling and fielding was probably the poorest of any 5A side since we entered the competition. Despite this we lost only six of the fifteen rounds and our two draws occurred when rain washed out the second day of play in matches that were favouring us. In short the side was not disgraced but this was a far from memorable season.

The causes for the slide, over the past couple of seasons, from being a top 5th grade side to just an average one calls for some soul searching. A steady drop in our standard of bowling and fielding has been a major factor. In particular, the lack of penetrating, successful, medium-pace bowlers has been a problem for a few seasons. This season, Paul Edey, our quickest bowler, commenced full of aggression and run-up problems - he retained both throughout the year. Nevertheless, Paul picked up some useful wickets although this sometimes occurred during his second spell. Tim Stubbings and Tom Raptis bowled well in most of their matches but 'without luck', as their figures indicate. Joe Scarcella, one time wicket keeper and batsman, also opened the bowling and put in some useful performances in this role. It seemed that our mediums would always pick up the odd wicket and contain the occasional batsman, but most opponents seemed fairly comfortable against the 'pop-guns'. Rarely was our new-ball used well and never did we put an opposition to flight as was customary some four or more years ago.

Spinners Ralph Merrell and Dave Tinyow were the most successful bowlers and generally carried the attack even though neither had a particularly good season. Too often they were called upon to subdue batsmen in full flight, and in judging their figures the circumstances under which they bowled must be considered. Of the other bowlers Steve Gibbs during his few appearances showed that a little brain matched with line and length will get fifth grade wickets. Gordon Moncrieff showed great improvement before he left the scene and "Peachy" Dixon was very useful until called to higher things.

From the foregoing it is probably obvious that fielding is something we did a lot of and it was of a satisfactory standard for this grade. However, it was never above average and this may be the result of a lack of confidence in the bowlers coupled with some very ordinary wicket-keeping. Keepers have the ability of lifting fieldsmen but none of the variety of keepers tried this sesson were tidy enough to have this effect. On many occasions it was all too obvious that we had too many old and slow legs and arms in the field and this surfeit of experience also reduced our effectiveness in the field. Despite these criticisms the fielding was never poor for any long period, it was simply just not aggressive enough.

Batting was always our main strength and five of our first six opening partnerships were in excess of 70 runs. Tony Epstein became our most regular opener and had a fine season based on his enterprising approach to the job. Dave Goldsmith, Peter Dixon and Keith Madden in their few matches also scored very well at top order batsmen. Mark Kelly and Gordon Black recorded a number of good scores but both tended to be slow in approach whilst appearing very safe with their defence. More application to shot-making will surely see this pair in higher grades. The middle order was sound with Scarcella and Tinyow showing improvement and Alex Taylor repeatedly demonstrating that technique compensates for an older eye. Even the tail wagged

regularly and Merrell scored more runs in one innings (to win the match) than he took wickets all season.

There were more administrative problems this year than normal. Late changes of venue and of team members caused a great number of last minute phone calls. On too many occasions messages went astray and for the first season ever we went into matches short of players. Whilst this was often the result of causes beyond the club's control, in many instances it was due to late withdrawals from other grades and this is a matter that the club needs to attend to and correct immediately. Many thanks to vice-captain Epstein for his assistance both on-field and with these administrative problems each week. Whilst I have been critical of a number of aspects of the team's performance I must emphasise that we usually had an enjoyable afternoon each Saturday. This was due to the good spirit that the side managed to produce each week, despite the problems and it was a pleasure to be associated with all the players that passed through the 5A's this season.

Our congratulations to the Firsts for their outstanding effort in winning the premiership. Even if the 5ths were not all that successful we can still soak up the reflected glory as was obvious from the vocal lower grade supporters at the final.

POIDEVIN GRAY REPORT

I am writing this report on behalf of Disco following his being struck down by that fearsome disease "Bolton's Revenge". Following on from the outstanding statistical success of the 1979/80 P-G team (lost four games in half-a-day, no batsman scored over 70 runs in aggregate and no bowler captured more than five wickets) it was with mixed feelings that I accepted the post of P-G manager. My concern was heightened by the now legendary chaos at the start of each P-G season concerning which players would be in Sydney during the Christmas period and which would not.

When the dust had finally settled on Christmas Eve following the confirmation of the last three members of the feam, I discovered that I had a quite extraordinary side for the Boxing Day match against Waverley: 3 batsmen?, 3 all rounders (distinctly superior bowlers), 3 bowlers and 2 players who had it seemed displayed no obvious strength in Grade.

Following a miraculous win of the toss by Disco the Waverley batsmen, made heavy weather of the fiery opening attack of Sciberras, Raptis and Stubbings. In fact it wasn't till the last few overs that the sconing rate reached 3 an over! Apart from three disastrous overs Mick Ryan bowled well returning the figures of 3/68 off 18 overs and Disco had his best bowling performance with 2/22 off 16 overs.

Our innings was moving along steadily (0/22 off 20 overs) when following a minor collapse the Dixon boys - Peachie with 47 and Disco with 48 combined in a rousing partnership of 85 in 64 minutes.

Another collapse saw us seven down and 26 runs required to win.

At the wicket were Jim Bakasetas and Tom Raptis and with the most amazing luck the two steered us to a remarkable win.

The next game against Sutherland saw my hopes for the team rise to great heights only to be dashed just as quickly. This was the game that he became aware of the reasons why Kyogle is Kyogle. The game had been underway some 20 minutes when some remarkably dishevelled character slumped into the Sam Cracknell. Kyogle? Yes, and true to form, with no gear. An hour later he returned - not looking much better (when does he you may ask) - and earned the wrath of his indignant manager! Meanwhile, Disco (51) and Leon Darmody (41) had put on 94 for the 2nd wicket in 80 minutes and I could see a big score in the offering. Alas, 20 minutes later we were 5/110 and following a brief raily slumped from 5/133 to 138 all out.

A 4th wicket partnership of 102 put them in the box seat, but Kyogle's 4 late wickets dispelled some of my disappointment. A nasty period before stumps saw another good innings from Disco (35) to ensure a draw.

We were never able to get into the Randwick game. Their two Under 19 Internationals Ledger and Knox rattled up 110 for the first wicket and a whirlwind 66 by their 1st Grade captain Peter Clifford swept them to a total of 246. A controversial decision against Bill Pulver right on tea saw our backs to the wall. However, solid innings by Chris Hanger (27) and Peachie (50 not out) took the total to a reasonable 162. In fact Peachie showed the now famous "Goulburn Cut" to perfection, the shot played so exquisitely by that old 1st grade veteran Jungle in days gone by (reckons its impossible to carry out these days !!!)

The night before the Sydney Uni match saw Peachie making witdly extravagant claims and bets about the outcome of next days match to the Sydney Uni. boys at the Sydney Uni bar. Next day, following a rebuke from a manager more concerned about the implications of the bet than the physical condition of a key player, our innings got away to a disastrous start. My worst fears looked as if they were to be realised when almost as quickly a delightful display of strokemaking from Billy Pulver (43), Leon Darmody (53) and an absolute gem of an innings from the incomparable Disco (65) saw the total to a highly respectable 194. However, finding the anxiety about winning Peachies' bets too much, I relinquished the scoring to Tom Boyce and pretended to show a disinterested air whilst mingling with the unusually large crowd. However, following a superb display of the art of spin bowling from Mick Ryan (6/48 off 20 overs) and Kyogle (3/48 off 23 overs) the Sydney Uni innings collapsed in disarray. Never again would I criticise Peachie!

In the final match we met the undefeated St. George. Dreadful fielding saw their openers put on 90, but a good fightback by Mick Ryan (6/67 off 20 overs) and Kyogle (1/51 off 18 overs) restricted their score to 193. This did not seem an impossibility, but a devastating spell from their highly regarded quickie Pullen saw us floundering at 4/30. The captain (52) had other ideas and in good partnerships of 33 with Bill Pulver (33) and 64 with Gordon Black (22) dragged the total to 5/130. Unfortunately, the tail was unable to go on with it and we folded after reaching 150.

in summary, the season saw the stopping of the slide that had affected P-G teams since Jungle's conquering heros in 1976/77 and certainly a distinct improvement on the previous year. The team was only dismissed for a score under 150 once, whilst 3 batsmen scored over 100 runs in aggregate and 3 bowlers took more than 8 wickets. The batting honours went to Disco (when will he do it in 1st grade?) with 265 runs at 44.2, including three 50's. The leading wicket taker was Mick Ryan with 16 wickets at 16.2, including two hauls of 5 wickets. Congratulations are also due to Peachle, Leon Darmody and Bill Pulver who produced two good innings each, whilst Kyogle should get an award for the most intriguing bowler. Next season should see still further improvements and I am looking forward too it with eager anticipation. I think we may have to rename the side "Canterbury" next season with the prospect of a third Dixon in the team !!

SAYING OF THE TOUR - "That's what touring's all about!"

The Maitland expedition of 1981 was an amazing success considering that 12 hours before the commencement of play Neville was sifting through the drunks at North Sydney hotel, trying to come up with 11 starters. To his credit, we set off at Sparrowfart with a team of 12, including 3 Balmain ring-ins and an enthusiastic grouple.

No time for hangovers as Sandy Mac. gave the Jansson Bros. team a lesson in wet-weather driving. The first captaincy decision of the day was made at Wyong - we would press on despite the conditions.

At Maitland, the rules were simple: each team to face 10 overs, one over from each of the opposition, excluding the 'keeper. This immediately qualified Jungle as 'keeper, (How could we trust him with the ball when he hadn't bowled in a match or in the nets for 3 seasons?)

"SEMI" REPORT

At 10.10am on the first morning of the semi-final, we were 3 for 4, G. Livingstone 4, M. Ray 0, J. Robson 0 (Golden Duck). At that stage, we looked in dire straits (remember"sultans of Swing"?). With due respect to our latter batsmen I feel it was the partnership between N. Jansson and C. Chapman which turned the game Uni's way. Had Nth. Sydney obtained another wicket in the first hour I don't think we could have recovered as successfully as we did: Special mention must therefore go to Messrs. Chapman and Jansson together with those run getters who followed.

I won't dwell too much on the actual facts of this particular game, but by analysing performances on the Village Green in recent seasons you can see what a superlative effort Uni. and in particular Chris Chapman produced to reach 290. But the semi and final are over and we must look to the future. As the charasmatic Kris Kristofferson said "your last game is history, its the next one that counts".

This is not "sour grapes" (sorry, yes it is!) but consider what batsmen on the Village Green have been up against in recent years:

- * Over 300 has been scored only once in 6 seasons of 1st grade played at the Village. At most Sydney grounds 300 plus is often scored 2 or 3 times a season.
- * Not one century was scored in 1st grade cricket played on Village Green last season.
- * Outright results on Village Green are obtained with much greater frequency than at other grounds.
- * The highest batting average for an individual in 1st grade in 1980-81 was only 27. This is extremely low considering the strength of the Uni. team (only 1 loss in past 20 games)
- * Out of the top 15 opposing batsmen in the last 3 games of the season on the Village Green (Randwick, Nth. Sydney, Nth. Districts) the highest score recorded was a paltry 32.
- * Every "recognised" bowler in the Uni team averaged under 15 per wicket. Amazing when its compared to most clubs who usually have only 1 or 2 bowlers averaging under 15.
- * In the last six seasons only 9 of the 49 batsmen Uni have played in 1st grade have a career average over 20. Of these 49 batsmen only 10 have a total aggregate over 500 in 1st grade.
- * In comparison, in the last six seasons, of the 31 bowlers used, 10 of these have a career average under 20, whilst another 15 average between 20 and 30.

With these points in mind what better time than $\underline{\text{NOW}}$, to dig up the Village Green and lay a new square. In my view individuals (with particular reference to Mark Ray) will not get their just rewards (le State Selection) until this is done. Will the "distorted" games and figures of the past six seasons continue for the next six?


