

PRESIDENT'S REPORT

Ladies and Gentlemen: 1000

The Twenty-Seventh Annual Report and Financial Statement of the University of N.S.W. Cricket Club is hereby presented for your approval and adoption:-

The 1976/77 season was a great success both for the Club and the University - certainly justifying the decision made in 1973 by the N.S.W. Cricket Association to elevate the Club to the Grade Competition. In this, the Club's Silver Jubilee Year, we achieved as well as the 1st Grade Premiership a win in the Poidevin-Gray Shield, truely a remarkable double.

The success of the Club in the Senior District Competition will have great benefits for the Club, University and cricket itself. The results achieved are a tribute to the players and particularly our 1st Grade captain, John Rogers. With an enthusiastic young, relatively unknown, side (7 players under 22 years of age) John has moulded a fine team where all the more noteable considering that of the 14 players, only one had previous premiership finals experience. This spirit and success has permeated through the whole Club and has been reflected both on and off the field.

University teams by their very nature give an earlier opportunity for young players to attain the higher grades than would be the case elsewhere.

Our Poidevin-Gray Shield team lead by Jim Robson, emulated the success of the 1st Eleven by convincingly winning the Shield after being so close in past years. With this win the Club now has youth, experience and depth, giving great promise for the future.

To Jim and all the team - congratulations on a fine win!

Special mention should be made of the fine assistance and encouragement given the Club by the University through our Patron, the Vice Chancellor Prof. R. Myers; Sports Association, Student Amenities and the ground staff for all their help - much gratitude.

Secong and Third Grades finished 6th and 9th respectively, and with some luck both could have made the semi-finals, however, they provided the necessary Captain, has had a remarkable record in only loosing two matches in one and a half seasons as captain. Our guest of honour was Mr. Fred Daly, retired Federal Cabinet Minister, and 32 years member of the House of Representatives. I would like to thank the management of the High Club and Cricket Club members who assisted in making this event such a success and enjoyable evening for all who attended. Socially, the Club had by Far the best season with many more functions and greater attendance. Obviously, the results obtained on the field where carried through to officeld functions.

The Club's management committee functioned smoothly and effectively, being one of the best committees that I have been associated with.

The modified financial arrangement of the Club has greatly improved the running and planning of the club's activities. The acquisition of the heavy roller during the season was a great benefit to both the Club and University. We are indebted to our Patron, Vice Chancellor Prof. R. Myers, for his assistance in obtaining the roller. It is believed that the Cricket Club's contribution to the purchase of the Heavy Roller is the largest such contribution to it's own sport within the University.

Many people gave of their time and energy to make this year a milestone (kilometre stone) in the history of the Club - truly a Jubilee year. To all many thanks: I would like to acknowledge the efforts of Jill Rateliffe, Andrew McMaster and Allan Goodwin for their particular help and support throughout the whole year.

We now look forward to the 1977-78 season with confidence, knowing that what once seemed the impossible, is possible. The achievements of the past year are but a small forerunner of things to come.

FIRST GRADE 1976-77

Capturing the First Grade Premiership in only the club's fourth year in the top division of Sydney Grade Cricket has been widely acknowledged as a marvellous achievement.

The team's extreme youth (9 players aged 22 or younger), its fighting qualities, its promotion of the old art of spin bowling, its unparalleled climb to the top, and its victory in the toughest and most exciting final on record have brought enormous credit to the whole club.

State of the State

To many, the team's sixth placing last year was a fluke after two years as eighteenth and seventeenth (out of eighteen). There was still surprise that we should make the semi finals, victory there was regarded as "the upset of the year", but there was no mistaking the wide admiration for our win in the final.

The team's cricket all year demonstrated that such a result was indeed no fluke. The standard of play was remarkably consistent and this year the team won four out of the six away games where a result was possible. Whilst it lost three games, in all of them it held the upper hand for a period and was never at any time outplayed.

Although Mark Ray's outstanding all-round performances led the way, it was anything but a none-man team. Teamwork and individual contributions from every team member, were the keynotes to success as reflected in the fact that almost every member of the team made a substantial contribution in the semi or final.

Apart from the first four games the weather was much kinder this season and with the acquisition of the heavy roller (courtesy of Professor Myers) our pitches were far better and more consistent.

Yet the team's progress throughout the season was anything but even.

We played particularly well in the first five games but through wet weather, light and loss of a certain victory, found ourselves floundering in twelfth place with only six points, some sixteen behind the leader.

Three successive victories had us back in contention at Christmas but a loss, two wins and another loss, had us see-sawing crazily up and down the ladder and needing wins in our last two games to make the semi-finals.

This was done and second place earned by two desperately close victories, the first with the last batsmen in, and in the second by a mere 14 runs in gathering gloom.

The semi-final brought a decisive victory over a Bankstown team inspired by the inclusion of Pascoe in the Australian side for England. The gaily decorated Village Green looked superb, and our cricket matched it, the batting full of determination in making 214 and the fielding and spin bowling scaling great heights in cutting a confident Bankstown back from 0 for 66 to 156 all out.

The final against Minor Premiers Petersham at Petersham Oval in front of a 1500 strong crowd each day, is widely considered one of the best finals for many years. To many it was the Wales youngsters going to the slaughter at the hands of the experienced, battle-hardened Petersham, and this appeared likely when Wales slumped to 6 for 107 after being 0 for 43. A great fightback through O'Brien, Livingstone and Lawson saw a good total of 284.

Petersham, for most of the second day, seemed set to win, being 0 for 60, 2 for 132, 3 for 195 but another great fightback by Wales had Petersham reeling at 9 for 229.

Petersham's last pair, to their great credit, threw their bats at everything and in remarkably quick time had reached 9 for 275. Amidst nail-biting tension, Chris Chapman, looking into the sun at deep square leg, beautifully caught the last batsman to win the premiership.

The excitement, the congratulations, the celebrations - wow !!

And what of the players?

Mark Ray's development with the bat was the mainspring of the team's great leap forward. Although scoring 500 runs in the two previous seasons, the improvement in his maturity, confidence and stroke play has put him in the forefront of Sheffield Shield candidates. He showed exceptional skill on wet wickets and proved himself a real competitor as his 21 against Andy Roberts, 73 against Barry Knight on a damp wicket, and 66 against Pascoe in the semi-final, so amply proved.

As if his batting wasn't enough, his left arm spin bowling was remarkably consistent, and twice quite devastating, in capturing 43 wickets. He also managed to equal the highest number of catches (10) outside the wicket keeper.

In all, he averaged over the season close to 40 runs, 3 wickets and one catch per game, a quite extraordinary performance.

Mark's spin twin Paddy Grattan-Smith went from strength to strength and with figures in the final three matches of 76 overs, 20 maidens, 13 wickets for 161 runs, not only had much to do with the team's success, but placed his name in the forefront of the state's spinners. The spin, bounce and penetration of his offspinners is quite rare and he consistently tied down and dismissed batsmen well set for a big score. A legslip specialist, he several times picked up catches few would have got a hand to, whilst his dedication to practise was a great example to all.

Greg Watson assumed the mantle of number one pace bowler and was a resounding success particularly early in the season. The bigger the challenge the better he bowled, and his sustained pace and hostility against top batsmen Doug Walters, Geoff Boycott, John Benaud and Brian Booth plus his outstanding effort in the final were some of the high notes of the season. Greg's fielding has improved enormously in two seasons, his throwing and catching amongst the best in his side.

Geoff Lawson arrived as an 18 year old paceman from Wagga Wagga at the end of the previous season and the glimpse we caught of his talents then was sufficient for him to go straight into the Firsts this season where he performed most impressively. The signes are there for an exciting future, the tall, willowy fast bowler's build, the classical high action, pronounced outswinger, capacity for genuine pace and confident, aggressive outlook. His batting is extremely sensible, his brave hitting in the final being of enormous value. His fielding also improved tremendously, highlighted by his memorable running catch at long off in the semi-final, and it is hoped he can overcome his recurring muscular problems.

Director of PERC (University's Physical Education and Research Centre) Jim O'Brien had his first season with the club and his enthusiasm and wide experience combined with his undoubted wicket keeping ability had a considerable impact. "Man of the Match" in the final, with his game saving 75 runs and errorless keeping, was a just reward. Whilst securing 25 dismissals, he missed three matches, and in those Paul Deegan performed in good style, showing promise with both bat and gloves.

Opening batsman Mick Watt also joined this season ans solved our long term problem of a reliable opening partner for Mark Ray. The straightness of "Fiery's" bat, his dedication and courage were unmatched, and his 35 in the final was a first-class effort. His fielding also improved greatly and his stretching midwicket catch in the semi-final was a vital turning point.

Jim Robson had another good year and is on the verge of much greater things. His 97 against Gordon on a suspect pitch was something at which to marvel, and if he can reproduce this more frequently next season, representative cricket won't be far away. As a slipfieldsman he remains in the top bracket in the competition.

Chris Chapman had a resounding start and encouraging finish to the season, but a slump in the middle prevented him scoring a lot more than his quite impressive tally of 428 runs. The signs are there that his batting is becoming more free-flowing and adaptable, and he too could soon be in the higher representative sphere. Two of his slip/gully catches were amongst the best seen all year whilst in the deep, his running, ground fielding and catching were of the highest standard. That final, far from easy, premiership winning catch could not have gone to a safer person, and even amidst the quite extraordinary tension, not a player in the side doubted he would swallow it.

Jock Martel and Dick Pym both played all season apart from the last few games. Burdened with the pressures of a first year out doctor, Jock was unable to strike the form that has earned him the reputation of one of the most dangerous batsmen in Sydney. Dick Pym started in great style, uprooting test opener McCocker's off stump with his first ball of the season, but from there on failed to get much bowling with the success of the other four bowlers and the unresponsive nature of the pitches. On several occasions however, he batted extremely well in critical situations, his top score against St. George being an object lesson (and one well learned) for the higher order batsmen.

In their places came two youngsters who immediately established themselves as players of the future.

Steve Campbell's considerable legspinning skills have been developing so well over the past two seasons that his promotion was inevitable. His debut performance of 4 for 30, and that in a semi-final, was a splendid result, and with his very competent close-in fielding and solid batting, much is hoped for him next season.

Greg Livingstone's 61 in the first grade final after starting the season as an 18 year old in 5th grade is a fantasy story on its own. Apart from confirming the stylish lefthander's considerable promise, his innings added a great deal of lustre and prestige to the side's achievement.

Still in fourths at the commencement of University vacation at the start of December, Greg elected to return to his home in Albury until March, apart from the Poidevin Gray series. In these games he played so well that the

gamble was made to play him in the top grade in his first game back. He immediately scored 42 not out when the side was 4 for 60, followed this with 25 in the semi-final, and his 61 in the final helped rescue the side from 6 for 107 whilst being subject to intense pressure from the opposition. His unruffled composure, willingness to play straight, add undoubted skill on the legside backed up by quickness and certainty in the field could well lead him to greater things.

THIRD GRADE REPORT

Well what can one say about a season that promised so much yet produced so little! A good start gave us the necessary initial momentum but gradually things began to come apart at the seams. Our new ball bowling became more and more innocuous after an initial two games from John Ingleson while our spinners, though generally accurate and economical, had little real penetration. The fielding, especially on the ground was quite good but we always seemed to menage to drop a couple of crucial catches in most matches. The batting was incredibly uneven. On the excellent D.P. wicket (in fact we played on few wickets that were not very good), the batting should have been the cornerstone of the team and while the talent was certainly there, consistency and application frequently were not.

Unfortunately this report is starting to sound like something of a dirge and as such would not reflect the seasons' performance. A number of players introduced themselves to the club in the team (at one stage the team looked like an expatriate outpost) and their performances augur well for the future. The team showed an ability to fight back when all appeared lost (Manly, Bankstown, Sydney Uni, Nepean, Gordon, Balmain and Norths) and although a number of these games were not won, the fight went right down to the wire. It is easy to excuse poor performance by claiming bad luck but no one who played in the side would claim we were favoured by the bounce of the ball.

Looking at the players who formed the nucleus of the team one must initially mention Tan Smith our opening bat, expert slip field and sometime keeper. With 389 runs at 28, Tan's concentration and dedication was a lesson to all and apart from a tendency to overwork his favourite shot his batting is solid and straight enough to consolidate a position in 2nd grade next season.

His partner, the enigmatic Charlie Kiefel who started, left and finally returned carries the heavy burden of having great potential. For a player with so many shots Charlie is too often dismissed to an unworthy one but the season did see an immense improvement in the field and a mature performance against Gordon which augurs well for the future.

Bush-boy Peter Jourdain wandered the batting order form 1 to 6 and certainly copped more "advice" than most. 67's against Nepean and St. George showed what he could do but too often an indiscreet shot brought about his downfall. A top field, Peter chipped in with some good medium pace at the end of the season.

Graeme McBarron got so many confident starts and looked so good at the crease it is impossible to believe that he did not reach 50 once (49 Vs Mosman, 40 Vs Sydney Uni). Our most versatile field and steady leggie, sacrificed on the D.P. graveyard, has the experience, ability and temperament to devastate this competition with his bat if he becomes mean enough.

Dave Meagher, deservedly won the Captain J. Morris Fielding Trophy for the club (by the proverbial street) but his batting was also a disappointment. Dave is incredibly enthusiastic and too intelligent not to overcome his one basic batting weakness. His ability to snatch the initiative at the crease (42 Vs Bankstown, 49 Vs Petersham) is invaluable if only he can learn to go on with it.

Steve Howard did his usual good job with the gloves. Following his thrashing 105 Vs Mosman he gained promotion for 4 games and by his return he had lost his touch. Why didn't the captain let him open all the time?

THIRD GRADE REPORT (Cont)

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John Sands took only 17 wickets but his bowling was very accurate and his performance against Bankstown brilliant. John's performance undoubtedly suffered by his inability to play regularly and that we had no real strike bowler at the other end.

Mick Bryce was our only regular opening bowler and suffered from this. He is still to fully appreciate the virtues of line and length, and while be bowled many good balls the batsmen could, too often, be content to wait for the loose one. Mick, did again in maturity however and bowled with guts especially in his 5-54 Vs Sydney Uni.

Chris Burgess, Pete Besgrove or Barry Cox was the other opening bowler and though his figures are the worst I feel Chris shows potential as a strike bowler. He has the persistence to succeed and should do well if he can straighten out his action. Both Barry and Pete had some success but they are both basically medium pacers who rely on helpful conditions to be really dangerous.

Neville Janssen passed briefly through the team as did a number of others. His century against Petersham was a gem but really no better than his initial effort against Bankstown in which he needed to be straight and tight to survive. Neville will score a lot of runs in grades higher than this.

The only other regulars were Steve Lockhart and Alex Taylor who both experienced very poor seasons with the bat and frankly I am at a loss to explain why. They both tried hard and Steve fielded excellently. They have scored runs in higher grades in the past so....?

A number of others made guest appearances, frequently with distinction, and the team thanks them for their efforts. Our congratulations to the 1st XI any my thanks to all for their co-operation and assistance throughout the season.

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- 1. Uni 3-81 (dec) defeated Sydney. 79 and 140 (Apromising start with Ingleson and Bryce routing Sydney to 8-30 before they had a lucky dip. Smith (35x) and Meagher (17x) made it look easy with the bat but the opposition were not interested in anything but slow batting practice.)

- 6. Uni. 193 Tost to Bankstown 7-198 (Janssen (33) and Meagher (42) added 80 after we were 2-0 but though 7 players reached 15 no one went on with it. Helped by a 78 opening partnership, Bankstown struggled home though continually enmeshed in the web of Sands 4-34 off 25.)
- 7. Uni. 5-285 (c1.) and 1-23 (c1.) defeated Mosman 113 and 8-163. (A really top effort. Howard blazed 105 before tea and everyone carried on. McBarron (3-6) and Bryce (5-20) took the last 8 wickets for 14, but we did not have the firepower to clinch an outright.)

FOURTH GRADE REPORT

Time fades the memories of last seasons 4th grade campaign - the organised self destruction of Saturday night at the pavilion ensured that much of Saturday night characterised the team - high in spirit, eratic in performance.

And it is difficult to characterise a team that could break so many club records (highest club score, five new partnership records, highest aggregate bowling and batting, highest average bowling and batting, most wicketkeeping dismissals) and still only manage 3 wins, 5 losses and 6 draws. Clearly there were too many draws. Wet weather played a major part in the first three draws (unfortunately the first three games of the season). This was a pity since not only were the first two games in our favour when the weather intervened but these draws had the effect of "taking the wind out of the sails."

The other three draws were the result of the inability to dismiss the opposition but this is not to say that our bowling was the limiting factor since often indecisive batting had left us too short a time to dismiss the opposition or too few runs to be able to "work" a batsman out. One might be led to the conclusion that neither the batting nor bowling was good enough but both proved their worth at different times (9-304-v- Gordon, 4-198-v-St George, 200-v- Northern District; Waverley 97, Mosman 98, Sydney 7-109, St. George 9-136) It was how the overall processes were put together that led to such a disappointing season. Both captains Roger March and John Barford experienced the frustration of seeing a side capable of performing so well in all compartments of the game separately, raiely turn in a consistent performance in all of them together. The times when the team performed to its overall ability resulted in extremely convincing wins (and usually against the better teams). It was significant that the lower team seemed to win by sheer application to the job rather than any superior natural ability.

To me two factors auger well for a much better performance next season. A tremendous team spirit was developed even though many disappointments were experienced. The players also developed more confidence in their ability. Only twice during the season was the team comprehensively beaten with only a handful of runs or a couple of wickets determining the outcome of the remaining games. To turn these into wins each player must realise that defeat in overall terms is not the rash shot loose delivery or missed catch in particular but rather the inability to sustain a consistent and purposeful effort during the whole game. If this approach is taken a batting failure or dropped catch will not lead to the side falling apart at the seams (pardon the pun) when the pressure is on.

Finally may I thank all the members of the team for their support during the season and making it such an enjoyable one for me personally.

The following pen portraits are of the players who regularly played during the season:

Roger March: A top all-rounder and fierce competitor. His 32 wickets in just over half the season was a reflection of his attacking approach to the batsmen as well as the umpires. He was badly missed when he deservedly was promoted to 2nd Grade. One got the impression that too many players relied too heavily on Roger for both a constant supply of wickets and runs as well as an aggressive approach to the game.

Tom Grattan-Smith: After a nervous start turned into a batting sensation shattering the 4th Grade batting record in only eight matches. Scored a great ton against Gordon and several other big scores. Easily the best fieldsman in the team and could be relied upon to give 100% all the time. Tom is a useful off-spin bowler who, with more variation, could develop into a handy all-rounder. Still trying to drink all the beer he won during the season.

Tony McKendry: The original mad medic - pioneered those famous menthoids. Found the middle order batting and medium-pace bowling more to his liking than opening. Like Tom G-S he could develop into an extremely useful all-rounder. His innings against Mosman showed his true ability. Tony's fielding needs more concentration and work. Another team man - good to have one on any side.

John Finlay: Definitely not a 4th Grade batsman. In form, John can demolish an attack with power and grace. It was good to see him begin to build an innings this season where in previous years an early rash shot terminated many promising innings. With application, 2nd Grade is not beyond him next season.

Barry Cox: Barry was not at his best with the bat this season but turned in many invaluable performances with the ball. His contributions as Vice-Captain were particularly helpful.

John Carmichael: John is also a promising batsman but must turn his consistent twenties into higher scores. Technically sound, this season should be a big one for him with the right approach. An authority on alpine music.

Ross Le Quesne: Again proved his worth as a leg spin bowler towards the end of the season, although he did not bat with the promise he showed last season. Ross will score many more runs when he becomes determined to occupy the crease for a reasonably period of time.

Rod Zabell: A model of sheer application to the job. He was missed when he left for a teaching job in the country. A 100% team player, he will run in the field all day and often did.

Chris Burgess: A very promising opening bowler. Achieved greater accuracy and control towards the end of the season as his run up became smoother. Has all the potential to be a fine bowler.

Steward Cumming: An honest medium pacer. Steward will need to tighten up his line and length. Can move the ball disconcertingly and will be much more effective with increased accuracy. More work needed on his fielding although this improved as the season progressed.

Peter Besgrove: Another 100% team man. Peter started the season well but seemed to lose form after being promoted. Peter needs a lot of bowling to get his rhythm and then is an extremely steady and nagging bowler. Only wish he could bat longer - that way he could steal more cigarettes.

Thanks also to the many players who played a number of games in the team - especially to Nev Jansson and Greg Livingstone who seemed to save their rare batting failures for 4th Grade, Steve Lockhart who brought a new dimension to fielding at short leg and Glen Clark who brought a new dimension to eyes. To Peter Jourdain, yes there is a Tom Brooks.

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FIVE 'A' REPORT 1976-77

The Five A's lost their final to Bankstown and thus finished second in the competition - this is essentially the report for this season.

The manner in which we lost the Final is still a source of some pain and I must indulge in a little masochism by describing our 'final style'.

At 10.50 am on the Saturday, Bankstown invited us to bat first on an easy paced pitch. Our goal was to bat for the next 14 hours (i.e. 6pm Sunday) and so claim the premiership.

For the first 47 minutes all went to plan but then the first wicket fell. Then:-

Further salt was added two balls later when the umpire decided that a half volley was close enough for a catch and all resistance was gone.

The bowlers bowled well and tightly but Bankstown batted carefully to pass our total with 6 wickets in hand and then bat through until after lunch on the Sunday. Bankstown's batting was clearly superior to ours and this carried the match as I am sure our bowling and fielding was just in front of theirs. Nevertheless our congratulations must go to Bankstown who are worthy premiers and proved this in our two matches against them.

The problems of the final are a fair resume of the team's problems throughout the season. Unpredictable batting, coupled with more than competent bowling and above average fielding is a true description of the team. Batsmen scored runs, but rarely did more than two do so during the one match. A prime example of this was during the semi final when we were 2 for 0 after the first nine balls of the match, yet recovered to score 225.

If these comments appear critical of our batting so it was intended, but the batsmen are justified in claiming that we did reach the final and this was our most successful runscoring season. Three batsmen (Cutler, Richardson and James) scored in excess of 350 runs and five people averaged better than 20 runs per innings... by far the best figures we have produced in this grade so far.

Jeff Cutler topped the batting despite an indifferent start to the season and capped his year with a match winning 53 in the semi and an unbeaten 101 in the season. He is an outstanding fieldsman and with some attention to his offside 'flash' will be an outstanding member of the club in higher grades. Bill Richardson legside shots. Again this can be overcome and the club will get the full benefit of his talent. Chris Kelly, whilst scoring his share of runs,

did not dominate the wicket in the manner expected. A more positive approach (like being on time) will see him at the top again next year.

The bowlers all had good seasons. Phil McManis belongs in a higher grade and if he can free himself from work next season will not be in fifths. Phil worked for 24 hours before the final to be available. Glen Clark improved over the season in all departments. If he maintains the dedication he will be a very handy all rounder. Mick Burden showed as a person who can bat when he puts his mind to it and it was his batting (against ST. George) that assured us of a place in the semi. Mick was selected as a bowler and will be better in this sphere when he adopts a stock ball rather than 8 variations per over. Rouse and Edey both did their work efficiently and if they are available for the whole season next year will be assets to the Club. Special mention must be made of Gary Knespal who performed so well in the middle of the season but was displaced for the semi and final. Despite this, Gary came to the nets before the final and offered his services as a workhorse. I am sure that he will solve his run up problems at the pre season nets and be a force in the future.

My disappointment in losing the final shows through this report, however all the players would confirm that we had a most enjoyable and exciting season. Premierships really do not equate with teamwork and friendship. The spirit that was developed was due in no small part to two senior members of the team Derek Haradasa, my vice captain who played cricket superbly and supporte me both on and off the field in times of stress equally as well as in times of celebration. Tony Epstein similarly gave this support as a team member and club administrator. I am pleased to report that Tony had a magnificent season behind the stumps.

I must thank the club selectors for their support throughout the season but in particular John Rogers for the assistance he gave the Fifths at practice. At the same time the Five A's congratulate the Firsts for their incredible achievements. My final comment must be directed to the Five B's. Any successes of our team were largely the result of the continuous and unrelentipressure kept on us by Mullins § Co. Their effort was truly outstanding and as a result UNSW must be certainties to take out the Fifths in 77/78.

The initial season for the 5 'B' grade team can be reported a usccessful one. Of all who tried, none tried harder or longer than Steve "Knees" Gonski, Steve set an example for all to follow - he bowled well, batted well and fielded in a manner that suggested no game was lost until the final ball. I recommend this player to the club and its selectors in future seasons.

If heart were the measure of orictieting ability and guts the measure of run-scoring ability, Doug Baird would have played in the Centenary Test. He was an inspiration to the team and his knowledge of the game and constant encouragement and unselfishness were also of assistance to me.

The spearhead of our attack was Ralph "cuddles" Merrell, top wicket-taker and notable personality on and off the field. He was always on hand to offer assistance, would never apologise when it was wrong and would always remind me when it was right. Ralph is a competitor in the true sense of the word and I thank him for his contribution during the season.

Several players of potential arose in our batting ranks. Phil Williams, wit the help of added application will rapidly rise in the grades, and I recommend him to the club and its selectors. Similarly Steve Jackson has a style far beyond the average 5th grade player, and with added confidence will advance much further. Richard Campbell also showed the signs of a top grade batsman (and wicket-keeper) but again his application let him down at crucial moments. In the following season I would also recommend to selectors the undoubted talents of Ian Anderson and Bill Heatherington both country boys who played but a handful of games between them.

Our bowling was the teams strength with good efforts from Paul Edey, Bill Heatherington, Steve Hamilton, Nigel Perger (hat-trick), Phil McManus, Tim Haymet, Peter Watkins and Ren Schofield. None of these players had sufficient matches with the team to really make the mark they should have, although Nigel Perger and Phil McManus went on to better things.

My final words are reserved for my Vice-Captain and friend John "Maca" MacFarlane. A quick glance at the statistics will show the immense important of Maca to the side. He opened the batting (topping the averages), was an efficient and effective change bowler, kept wicket in exceptional style when needed, was the teams best fieldsman and his aid and advice to me were of an unsurpassable value. Thank you.

To the Club I say thank you, to the Committee and to the selectors (for bear with me) I say thank you, and to my players, I say well done.

POIDEVIN GRAY REPORT

As the team assembled at Sydney University Oval on December 27 for our first game, I was pleasantly surprised to see us have the full quota of players there ready for action. After all, we had players coming from all over the state including A.Livingstone and N.Perger from Albury, P.Jourdain and A.Lawson from Wagga, J.Carmichael from Crookwell, myself from Goulburn, and G.Kirkwood from Bankstown. Therefore, to play each of these Poidevin-Gray games over the festive season required a great deal of travelling, and complete dedication from a number of players.

The dedication and application shown this season probably accounted for our success in winning the competition, and contributed to the great team spirit that prevailed throughout the competition. The atmosphere and team spirit throughout the club was much higher than that seen in opposition clubs. This was the case even though we had controversial and fiery characters such as G.Lawson, M.Watt, G.Watson, and P.G. Smith through the Uni ranks. These players added much colour and glamour on the field, and much amusement off it. (Just ask the Manager of Gordon Rugby Club). Team spirit was also probably increased because of heavy instructions of no 'sledging'.

Although in previous seasons the P.G. team may have suffered because of nerves and inexperience, the team this year took on a solid, more experienced look with far greater depth. To obtain a place in the semi-finals of P.G. we had to play three games, against Sydney University, Sydney, and Wests. To perform so well against Sydney University only two days after Christmas was an excellent team effort. We batted first on a very bright morning and rattled up a quick 230 before declaring, with Watt (24), Howard (46) and Robson (89) turning in good efforts. Sydney University then proceeded to bat like a bunch of "Mike Nelsons" and were routed for round 100 in the first innings, and then were 7-25 in the second. Geoff Lawson put in a very impressive spell to capture 5 for 40, and 4 for 5, on an unresponsive wicket. in a Country-City game played in the Sam Cracknell Pavilion. Incidentally, for all those interested, the composition of the country team was limited to those who have spent more than 15 years in the country although a four import rule applied. Despite much 'sledging' and glass throwing, country completely dominated the game and proved worthy winners.

After a few days rest, and after complete analysis of other games, we realised that a draw against Wests would probably enable us to reach the semi-finals. However, we were never in trouble throughout the game and even when rain did eventually halt play we were in no trouble. Excellent batting by all the top order in which no-one failed, Watt (56), Livingstone (68), and ansson (76) enabled us to declare at 3 for 250. Wests had battled to 3 for 110 before the rain came down, and Wales left the field confident of success in the semis.

The well established St George were our opponents in the semis, and with the match being played over two full days a great battle was expected to evolve. And this it did, for this match had the tension and feeling of a Rugby League Grand Final. St George batted very well in perfect conditions on the first day to total 275, and although this was a large total it was pleasing the way the team stuck to its task. Mick Bryce turned in one of his best ever performances and took 4 wickets in a marathon spell. The Uni fightback was dramatically shown on the second day, and after an initial slump fine defensive batting by the Uni team enabled us to bat it out for a draw and thus go into the final. St George didn't have the necessary ability to get us out in the full day's play, and thus with our better performances in previous games we fully deserved our final spot. Despite much sledging and controversy throughout the game it was "thanks for coming" St George.

The Final was played at SCG No.2 and we were fertunate in having probably the two best umpires in Sydney officiate in this game, namely 'Rocky' Harris and Tom Brooks. On a perfect cricket wicket we totalled 249, which was highlighted by an excellent start, mainly due to Greg Livingstone's stroke-making 55. His work was carried on by very useful 20's by'Jacky' Jourdain, Dave Meaghers, and Geoff Lawson, and a 78 from Robson. This total proved to be more than adequate as the fiery pace bowling trio of Lawson, Bryce and Perger never allowed Cumberland into the game. "Henry" Lawson's bowling in this game, whilst very controversial, was top class and enabled him to win the Richie Benaud Award for the Poidevin Gray Competition.

A feature of this match was the magnificent fielding of the Uni team, with both Steve Howard and Mick Watt being really outstanding. It was a fine team performance by the Uni eleven, and the celebrations which followed were thoroughly earned. After we D.I.O (drank it out) at SCG many club patrons, players, and officials, including Messrs Jansson, Jourdain, Clark, Carmichael, and McMaster, progressed to the Coogee Bay Hotel where they turned on useful performances for the volatile crowd which had gathered there.

The success of this team would not have been possible without the aid of Roger March. "Grouche" was always there to organise everything, and his bright and imaginative tactical discussions often proved the turning point in vital games. Also thanks to our other great supporters such as John Barford, Al Goodwin, "Splinter", Jill, "Gulgong" and "Chappo". A very successful and enjoyable season was experienced by the Uni Club this year, and with a similar approach to our cricket next year, and with a man such as John Rogers at the top, the future success of this Club looks assured.




