The President's Report.

Gentlemen,

The Tenth Annual Report and Financial Statement of the Cricket Club for the season 1959-60 are presented herewith for your approval.

In last year's report the hope was expressed that the Club would field four teams during the 1959-60 season; this was done. Two teams played in the City and Suburban Association matches in addition to the First and Second Elevens which played in the Municipal and Shires A and B competitions, respectively. Unfortunately, on a number of occasions not enough players were available and the Fourth Eleven had to field a team of less than eleven men. It is to be hoped that in the forthcoming season the Club will have sufficient support to prevent this position occurring again during the long vacation.

It was heartening to see the Club field a really strong team which performed quite well in the A Shires competition. We extend our congratulations to the Premiers Canterbury and to Pennant Hills, the B grade Premiers.

The University played its sixth annual intervarsity game against the University of Queensland in Brisbane. The team, as in previous years, was composed of players from Sydney and from Newcastle University College. New South Wales won the match on the first innings. The match against Newcastle University College, played at Kensington, resulted in a win for the Club. A Sunday social match against Sydney University was also won.

Another game was played against a team from the three British Navy ships which visited Sydney last Christmas. The University team had an easy win, but what was more important, the game was played in a very friendly spirit. We hope to have many more such social games in the future. Early in March a Freshers' match was played on a Sunday because of the Saturday competition rounds. Seventeen freshers played in the match; the remainder were regular Club players. We should like to see all the Freshers who played maintain their interest and turn out for the University in the coming season.

At the end of the season the First XI played the Second XI. Although the Seconds were able to dismiss the Firsts for the moderate total of 139, their batsmen were completely outclassed by the First XI bowlers, giving the Firsts a comfortable win. A match between the Third XI and the Fourth XI resulted in a win for the Fourths.

On the evening after the last competition round a supper-dance was held at Ultimo. Although the attendance was a little lower than expected, all who came agreed that it was a great success and many of us feel that it was one of the best social events the Club has ever held.

Unfortunately the sight-boards, practice net fixtures, and improvements to the practice wickets, which were promised by the University administration, were not forthcoming during the season. The University

Oval still lacks dressing facilities and shelter of any kind. The Club Committee had endeavoured to obtain these improvements and also to have the oval fenced. It is hoped that the sight-boards and some form of change rooms will be erected prior to the commencement of the next season. If these improvements are effected, mid-week practices, which had to be abandoned last season because of very poor attendances, should be able to be held regularly and be well attended by Club members in proper cricket attire.

We look forward to next season with the hope of increased support and interest particularly from the younger undergraduates.

Finally I wish to take this opportunity to welcome back to the Club our President, Professor Smyth, who has been overseas for some months.

CAPTAIN'S REPORT FIRST XI 1959-60.

The first team can look back on last season with a certain degree of satisfaction. It was not until the second-last match that we <u>denied</u> <u>ourselves</u> participation in the semi-finals, ultimately finishing fifth in the overall points score.

This element of success stems from a number of factors that may well establish our Club as one of the leaders in the Shire Competition. Firstly we have a Club administration that is enthusiastic and efficient, secondly we have a band of young players who are keen to succeed and thirdly there was an evident team spirit that I have not seen in University cricket since we were semi-finalists in the B competition some years ago (1952-3). If this trend continues the team will, I am sure, be even a force to contend with.

Our playing strength was, unfortunately, a little unbalanced for it was the bowling that really carried the team. Only twice were 200 runs scored against us, 207 v's Canterbury and 212 v's Auburn. In this regard I must hasten to offer my congratulations to John Middleton. John's bowling at times reached a standard compatible with first-grade district cricket; on two occasions he was nigh unplayable. John was very ably supported by David Evans whose figures would have been even better had the pitches not, on most times, favoured the batsmen in no uncertain way. Duncan Marshall bowled well but he too had to contend with unresponsive pitches.

The story is sadly different when it comes to batting. It became evident early in the season that we would have to look to only two or three batsmen to carry this department and when they failed the team failed. The teams batting performance against Sutherland and against Auburn was pathetic - to say the least. Indeed there are few team performances in batting that were at all encouraging. But, here again, there were some outstanding performances. We will remember, for a long time, the innings of 49 by Mike Reidy against Burwood. Mike virtually won this match when, on a treacherously wet wicket against hostile bowling, he batted without fault to pass the 100 runs we were set after the early disaster of 4 down for 6! Mike was ably supported by Ron Warrener. Harold Bundy turned in some good performances and his partnership with Mike Reidy against Lane Cove was noteworthy. Don Clark was pleasing and we look to him next season to bolster the middle of our batting. John Middleton and David Evans contributed some "heavy wood" quite often and other batsmen would do well to draw on their philosophy - cricket is to enjoy and the ball is there to be hit! I am confident that such top-line batsmen as Mike Reidy and Harold Bundy will have a better season this year.

The fielding was by no means good but (to strike a new tune) this aspect of our play does not concern me as much as our batting.

The Club can look forward to the coming season with the justifiable confidence that the first team <u>can and will</u> do even better!

Finally, I would offer my sincere thanks to each player of the team for the willing support and co-operation afforded me during the season, both on and off the field.

ITEMS OF INTEREST.

- 1. J. Middleton in taking 9-11 (from 11.2 overs, 4 maidens,) v's Lane Cove bowled 7 batsmen, c & b one and dismissed the other batsman L.B.W.
- 2. In the initial match of the season Pennant Hills lost 3-63 in 140 mins. during which time 30 overs were bowled including 8 maidens.
- 3. In the second match of the season, University lost 5-94 then the score proceeded to 9-105 and finally were dismissed for 127, two runs short of Ryde's total of Cl.4-129.
- 4. In the highly topical third match of season, V's Lane Cove, M. Reidy 42 n.o. and H. Bundy 58 n.o. adding 99 runs in approximately 50 minutes in the 2nd innings.
- 5. Also in the match V's Lane Cove, only one Lane Cove Batsman reached double figures in the match. G. Samuelson, 30, out of a total of 78 in the 2nd innings.
- 6. In the fifth match of the season, V's Bexley, J. Middleton bowled three Bexley batsmen each for a "duck" before rain interrupted play. John's figures were -

- 7. In the sixth round, V's Epping, D. Evans had fifteen runs hit off his first over and then settled down to capture 6-53. J. Turner batted through Epping's innings for a match winning 70 n.o. Three University batsmen, Taylor, Middleton and the author failed to contribute to University's total of 105.
- 8. D. Evans had another fine match, V's Burwood 7th Round, where his bozies accounted for six batsmen for 39 runs. Burwood after being dismissed for 100 had University 4-13 then R. Warrener, M. Reidy took the score to 84 before R. Warrener was bowled, the partnership of 71 allowing University to just win the match.
- 9. In the match V's Burwood, J. Middleton's figures were 15 3 4 25 i.e. Average of 1.67 runs of each over.
- 10. In the 8th Round V's Lindfield, D. Clarke and J. Middleton scored a single off every ball of J. Gilmore's fifteenth over. D. Clarke, J. Middleton added 72 runs in approximately 45 mins.
- 11. University set Sutherland 102 runs, in 65 mins. to win the match outright. Sutherland scored 21 runs and lost one wicket from 17 overs, 13 of which were maidens. University in their 2nd inns., scored 136 runs for 7 wickets declared in 65 mins. University lost the match on the first innings and thus the opportunity to enter the Uni-finals. D.Marshall captured 7-32 off 12 overs, 3 maidens.

- 12. In a tense match, Dave Evans and Clem (renamed Ken) Barrington added 9 runs for the last wicket to enable University to tie with Canterbury (207 runs each). Canterbury later won the competition.
- 13. Col. Hemsworth, Canterbury's Captain, bowled 28 overs, 4 maidens to take 3 wickets for 80 runs, a marathon performance. M. Bell captured 6-62 off 20.6 overs in support of his captain.
- 14. University scored their 207 runs off 64.6 overs while Canterbury managed to score 207 runs off 43.2 overs.
- 15. University registered their lowest total for the season in scoring only 65 runs against Auburn-Lidcombe.
- 16. Dave Evans returned to form with the fine figures of 7-62 off 18 overs against Pennant Hills. J. Middleton bowled 17 overs 5 maidens for 2-48.
- 17. University after defeating Roseville lost the last match of the season to Bexley in an exciting match. Bexley chasing University's score of 153 were 3-140, 8-150 and dismissed for a total of 157 runs.
- 18. Laurie Lawrence turned in many remarkable bowling performances during the season although his bowling figures were not outstanding.

- 19. Laurie also gave the most outstanding batting performance of season, against Canterbury, in scoring a technically correct 39 runs.
- 20. John Middleton, while substituting as a fieldsman for Bexley, took a remarkable catch in the slips to dismiss his captain, L. Lawrence.
- 21. University lost to Ryde by 2 runs and Bexley by 4 runs on the 1st innings.
- 22. J. Middleton bowled 28 batsmen in capturing 39 wickets for the season; he had 9 dismissed L.B.W., had one caught by the wicket-keeper and caught and bowled the other victim. A truly remarkable performance. D. Marshall also bowled eleven of his fourteen victims.
- 23. University batsmen failed to score on 28 occasions out of a total of 174 innings i.e., one batsman in every 6.21 innings (approximately 3 per 2 matches).

- 24. Also, two batsmen M. Reidy, H. Bundy were the only batsmen to score more than 50 runs. M. Reidy passed 50 twice, H. Bundy once, i.e. 3 scores of 50 or more out of 174 innings.
- 25. Finally, University registered a first innings win over the finalists, Burwood, and a tie with the premiers Canterbury, in what proved to be a satisfactory season of cricket.

CAPTAIN'S REPORT.

MUNICIPAL AND SHIRES "B" TEAM (1959-1960 SEASON).

The team won one match outright, two on the first innings, drew two, and lost nine on the first innings. Although this record is not impressive it is noteworthy that no matches were lost outright.

The team suffered from the loss of its three best batsmen, Tim Creer, Robin Lucas, and Don Clark, all of whom went to A grade in the first half of the season. However, their places were eventually filled by third eleven players Ian Duncan and Darryl Lacey and newcomer Frank Nicholson, each of whom played valuable hands. Barry Andrews, playing his first game with the team in the last round, scored a sound 55 and contributed to a win over Ryde by 71 runs. Hard hitting 3rd XI batsman Malcolm Miner played two forceful innings in his only two games and may well become a regular member of the team. John Hall played a few useful innings, including 25 not out against the Premiers Pennant Hills; on this occasion he made the best shot of the season, a six over mid-wicket off their best bowler, fast-medium Lloyd Parkes.

Phil Rowe was the most successful of the regular bowlers; he was always accurate and kept a perfect length. His best performances were against Roseville, where on a rain-damaged wicket his bowling was particularly hostile and he took 4-20, against Lindfield (5-52), Burwood (4-25), and Auburn-Lidcombe (4-18). Don Orrock did not do as well as in the previous season, but at times - against Lindfield and Ryde - he worked up considerably pace and bowled well. However, he kept his best and fastest bowling spells for the Freshers! match (4 overs, 4 maidens, 1 wicket for none) and the match against the 1st XI. Don also played some forceful innings, scoring 31 in each innings against Canterbury. Sam Soper, who missed a number of matches because of illness and a broken thumb, is one of the best leg-break bowlers playing in the B Shires competition and often captured valuable wickets. Dave Evans began the season with us but after two matches forced his way into the 1st XI. The best bowling performance was by Duncan Marshall, who played only three games with the seconds, against Bexley when he took 6-26. Against Burwood in his fourth over he took four wickets with the first four balls and another wicket with his sixth ball, finishing with 5-3, four of them clean bowled.

It is pleasing to record that the fielding was much better than in previous seasons. It is true that a number of catches were dropped, but many difficult ones were held, while the ground fielding and throwing were of good standard. John Evers, who was available for only eight games, kept wickets well and made some smart stumpings. Gary Stephens and Frank Nicholson were the reserve wicket-keepers and, though they lack John's polish, performed well. Bob Worley and Sam Soper were outstanding in the field. Mention should also be made of Don Clark, Darryl Lacey, Ian Duncan, and Barry Andrews.

Even though the team finished tenth in the Competition Table, the players played well as a team and a number of the games were lost by relatively small margins. We can look forward with confidence to next season after the experience gained by some of the younger players and with a promise of improvement in batting, a department in which the B team has always been weak.

CAPTAIN'S REPORT CITY & SUBURBAN A TEAM (1959-60).

This year we have seen an improvement in the previous year's results, but there is still room for improvement. On a number of occasions we were rather unlucky in that after our bowlers had done a magnificent job, our batsmen failed. We should have and do have the ability to do better.

A summary of the season's results show:-

A total of 44 players took part in these matches, which, though encouraging was still a handicap as we were unable to mould a team with so many players coming and going. A number of these players went on to brighter things in the shires, and as a developing ground the city and suburban provides a useful service for the shires.

An encouraging factor was the marked improvement in fielding ability. In this department Ron Wills and Malcolm Miner excelled. Ron holding 7 catches, plus all round fielding ability proved a greathelp to the side. Malcolm's ground fielding was excellent. At times there were lapses but the team managed to hold the majority of their catches.

The batting was rather a disappointment, the team scoring 9.42 runs per wicket and 81 runs per innings as against their opponents 14.36 runs per wicket and 110 runs per innings. Once again the potential was there but remained dormant except in a few isolated cases. The best individual score of the season was a good knock of 52 by Phil Newman.

The bowling was an improvement on the previous year. Mick Macey must be commended for the amount of hard work he put into his bowling.

The standard of the fields we played on was on the whole good, but I would like to make the suggestion that we should omit the matches in Centennial Park and Resevoir with the exception of Mackay oval. These pitches were a danger to the players and a disgrace to play on.

In all, we had an enjoyable season's cricket, and we hope to be more successful in the coming season.

I would like to thank all players for their support and co-operation throughout the past season.

TEAM CAPTAIN'S REPORT CITY & SUBURBAN "B" TEAM 1959-60.

Very little can be said to enthuse over in reporting the results of this team during the season. A great number of the players were staff members and the same eleven was never fielded for two consecutive matches. Too often, on the eve or day of a match we were desperately endeavouring to find "anyone" capable of using bat or ball to make up the standard number and, despite the good spirit which prevailed throughout, performances suffered.

Add to this the fact that 118 wickets fell in scoring 1,461 runs (average 12.38) against our opponents' 97 wickets for 2,001 runs (average 20.63) and it may be readily seen that we took some fair "drubbings" and did a deal of leather chasing.

Despite this, however, some bright spots shine through (beyond our four wins) the most notable being the combined and individual performances of the "old firm" Wal Burke and Bede Nairn. Not only did they head the batting aggregates and averages (with over 300 runs each) but they consistently gave the side an excellent opening stand which, unfortunately, we never fully capitalized on. Their stand of 73 in the match against Balmain was the best opening of the season (by any of our teams).

Bede Nairn turned in a fine all-round performance, finishing second in the batting aggregates & averages (also notching the highest individual catches (7).

Two "new acquisitions" Harold Oliver and Stuart Lee proved to be towers of strength both on the score of keenness and performance. Brian Richardson was consistent in attendance and batting, besides performing quite satisfactorily behind the stumps (taking 2 catches and 4 stumpings) against the barrage of "chuckers" we paraded. Sam Soper played much too rarely (when "on leave" from the Shires) and always made his presence felt (particularly with his hat-trick in the match against the "A's").

Such "new chums" as Barry Andrews, Ken Densey, Ian Duncan and Malcolm Miner showed too much promise to remain with us more than temporarily, and their successes in the higher grades are pleasing to note.

Overall, I feel the "disjointed" complement of the team was the chief obstacle to its success, with too many matches played one or two men short. Under these circumstances we were always on the defensive against some very good and experienced teams. The batting generally was fair although everyone will agree we need to score much faster in our allotted time if we are to win matches. Bowling was our distinct weakness, and nearly everyone played

was given some chance to "fill the bill" with little success. The resultant loss of precious runs in sundries further emphasises the situation. Fielding, in the main, improved, particularly in the air; some fine catches being taken and very few spilled.

In retrospect, I personally feel that we are not yet ready for further expansion. Future executives might take cognisance of the difficulties associated with fielding this team regularly during the season. Too many "diversions" e.g. examinations, vacation and personal ties call upon the services of "luke-warm" cricketers as alas many of our players are and a borne out by the fact that we had 62 names registered with the Club but were rarely able to field 44 players each week. The influx of "freshers" of creation of a fifth eleven should, in the light of these comments, be seriously considered.

On the question of grounds, particular mention should be made of Centennial Park and Reservoir areas. Everyone who played there will vouch that the wickets were a disgrace with life and limb ever in danger, and facilities (when they existed) almost primitive. I would strongly recommend that, when making application to the City & Suburban Association for inclusion in draws for future seasons, we be excluded from any matches on those wickets.

The keenness and spirit of the team left nothing to be desired and I was proud to be associated with them as a player and captain. My thanks are extended to them for their support and co-operation.

The University of N.S.W. led Queensland University on the picturesque St.Lucia Oval by 63 runs on the first innings. The University team contained eight Newcastle representatives and three Sydney representatives and proved to be too strong for the Queensland side which only contained two of its six State representative players.

University of N.S.W. won the toss and elected to bat on the perfect wicket in delightful weather. University were quickly in trouble after losing Thomson (18), Clifford (11), Lee (0), and were 3-34 before Rogers (51) and Brock (72) came to the rescue in a century partnership. Both batsmen hit the ball hard and were heavy scorers off all the Queensland Bowlers. The partnership was broken at 151 and the remaining University batsmen were only able to add an extra 82 runs before the

Queensland began their innings late on the first day and were one-29 at stumps. The following day the batsmen with the exception of Gray, McNee, McDonnell only showed token resistance to the bowling of Gilbert 6-59, Brock 3-28 and were dismissed 63 runs short of the University's total.

Queenslander McDonnell quickly dismissed Thomson (2) but Lee 46 n.o. and Clifford (21 n.o.) batted out time. Lee hammered the bowling on the Thursday morning and eventually reached 129 in 135 minutes and with Clifford (36) added 118, and Andrews (9 n.o.) added 64 runs. University closed at lunch with 3-186 runs leaving Queensland 225 minutes to score 249 runs to win the match. After losing Grice (0), Queensland did not accept the challenge to win the match and batted out time losing 7 wickets for 150 runs.

REPRESENTATIVE MATCHES.

1. ROYAL NAVY 68 LOST TO U.N.S.W. Cl. 9-209 at University Oval, Kensington.

The outstanding features of the match were a fine batting performance by State Colt, T.Lee 97 and A. Taylor 28 who added over one hundred runs in their partnership. S. Soper's leg spinners proved too difficult for the Navy batsmen who only managed to total 68.

2. NEWCASTLE UNIVERSITY COLLEGE 78, 5-85 LOST TO U.N.S.W. Cl. 5-166. Wist inns. by 88 runs at Kensington University.

University comfortably defeated Newcastle University College on the first inns. by 88 runs. Newcastle won the toss and elected to bat on a drying pitch. D. Marshall 5-16, T.Lee 4-32 routed the Newcastle batsmen for 78, W. Brock being the only batsman to show any resistance in scoring 23. University passed Newcastle's total for the loss of one wicket and due to a fine knock of 70 by Rob.Lucas and solid innings from T. Creer, T. Lee, G. Waghorn, were able to declare the innings closed at 5-166.

Newcastle settled down better in their second innings and were 5-88 at stumps, A. Taylor taking 2-4 from 3 overs.

3. ROSEVILLE 151 DREW WITH UNIVERSITY 4-132 at Roseville Chase.

The match was arranged as a social match on a Sunday afternoon early in February and proved to be a success. The surprising feature of the match was the batting form of the Roseville bowlers A. Young, J. Mahony, each batsman scoring thirty, and the bowling of a certain University (batsman?). University, set 151 runs to win the match in 120 minutes were beaten by a storm but managed to score 132 runs for the loss of 4 wickets in approximately 80 minutes. Rob. Lucas batted well for forty odd retired, T. Lee hammered up a quick thirty and that certain batsman(for once) looked like a batsman, while batting in the dark.

4. SYDNEY UNIVERSITY 167 LOST TO U.N.S.W. 6-189 (dec.) at University Oval, Kensington.

A composite 1st, 2nd and 3rd grade team from Sydney University were defeated by a strong University team. University won the toss and elected to bat on the vastly improved University wicket. Lucas and Creer opened the batting to the bowling of A.Low and W.Eaton. In the fifth over of the morning, Lucas was run out and in the following over bounded Creer, University being 2-17 at this stage. T. Lee joined G. Waghorn, who was missed three times in his first two overs at the wicket and the two took the total to 57 before Lee was caught and University were 4-63. Mick Reidy joined Grahame Waghorn and these two added 103 runs in a fine partnership before Mick was dismissed for 46 off the bowling of Low. University closed the innings

shortly after the dismissal of Reidy as Waghorn had reached his century and remained 101 not out. Grahame batted well for his century and showed fine spirit after a very breezy start. Sydney University were left 189 runs to win the match in near even time.

J. Middleton quickly claimed a wicket in Sydney's innings who were 1-7. McCristal joined Munro and these two added another 27 runs before McCristal lost his wicket to the bowling of Evans for 16. Munro and Low took the score to 76 before Low was bowled by Evans for 23. Munro continued to bat sedately and correctly before he was caught by Barrington off Lee for 48. The remaining Sydney University batsmen with the exception of Dodd (26) only offered token resistance to the bowling of Middleton 4-41, Lee 2-41 and Evans 3-46 and were dismissed for 167. John Middleton earned praise for his fine bowling.

University in winning the match thus maintained their unbeaten record against Sydney University, three matches being played, University winning two on the 1st innings and drawing the other match while in a winning position.

Mick. Reidy and the author were invited by Roseville D.C.C. to be members of the team on a trip to Cowra over Easter. Two matches were played, the first against the premier side of the Cowra District Competition and the second against a strong combined District team.

After an interesting days cricket the visitors defeated Cowra Rovers by thirty runs on the first innings. The University batsmen contributed one to the total of 171, Mick being the scorer. J.Buckland batted well for seventy (70) odd and was helped by G. Swartzkoff, P. Millard. Peter Millard proved to be the outstanding bowler of the day capturing five wickets.

Cowra District avenged the defeat of the Rovers by defeating the Visitors on the Sunday in an evenly contested match. The visitors totalled 157 of which M. Reidy scored thirty nine, J. Buckland forty odd and G. Swartzkoff, P. Millard adding handy scores. Cowra District passed the visitors total of 157 with four wickets in hand.

The outstanding features of the trip proved to be the following:

- i) the fine batting of a former University of N.S.W. Cricketer, R. Dillon of Cowra who scored a seventy in the first match and sixty in the second. For some unknown reason this gifted batsman was discarded by the University after a one match failure. Bob, on his present batting, would prove an asset to any second grade team.
- ii) the enthusiasm of the visitors for a round of golf. The author found himself joining in the ancient game at 5.30 a.m. on the Saturday morning, and proved to himself how easy it is to score a century before

breakfast even if the game is not cricket.

Mick and myself would like to thank the Roseville D.C.C. for the invitation to be members of the team on the trip to Cowra and the pleasant time that we had while we were in the town.
