REPORT OF THE MANAGEMENT COMMITTEE

Gentlemen,

The Twenty-Third Annual Report and Financial Report of the University of New South Wales Cricket Club is presented for your consideration and adoption.

The 1972-73 season, which promised so much following a good turnout and influx of new players at preseason practises, really amounted to very much less than could have been hoped for and indeed what the previous seasons' performances might have indicated possible. The Club Championship, held for the last two years and seven out of the last eight years was comprehensively lost and the "A" and "C1" Shires teams, after making the Semi-Finals, secured only fourth place. The "B" Shires team were perhaps unlucky to finish fifth, hindered more by the elements than by lack of talent - however a less laboured beginning to the season would have seen a Semi-Final position easily secured. The remaining two Club teams, The "C2" Shires and City and Suburban sides, competed with enthusiasm rather than success. However, if the objects of these teams is to provide competitive cricket for the enthusiastic as well as experience to those who have the potential to play higher grades in the future, these teams were perhaps the most successful.

Due to player shortages in the previous season, the Club fielded one less team this season. The teams were filled satisfactorily this year - although, as usual, a considerable amount of reshuffling was required on occasions. The late reshuffling of teams is something which should not happen - but always seems to, mostly the result of particularly selfish late minute withdrawal of players. The right attitude of the individual to the Club is perhaps the only remedy to this problem short of some disciplinary action.

During the season Intervarsity contests were played against Newcastle University, and Flinders, Western Australia and Monash Universities at the Adelaide Intervarsity Carnival. Although the team was only successful in the Western Australian encounter, the closeness of scores indicates not only the enthusiasm of the side but also the quality of performance. The Newcastle and Monash University games were particularly close and could well have been won. It is unfortunate that more Club members do not compete in these games since they are always enjoyable events in the Club's calendar.

The social matches during the season were affected to some degree by the weather. Both the Wollongong and World XI matches were washed out - the former game being one which was at an interesting stage and could have gone either way, whilst the latter, with due apologies to Dave de Carvarlho, was seemingly under control. The traditional preseason matches against Randwick and Burwood provided good match practise for those who availed themselves of the opportunity and were enjoyable days. The double wicket competition was a dismal failure due to indifference and lack of enthusiasm by the members.

The Annual Dinner, on May 30th, was a pleasing success. Much of this success could be attributed to the speaking guests. The Club was well represented by members and again this function was the highlight of the year. Mr Dick Guy proposed the "Toast to Cricket" whilst the response was given by Mr Barry Knight. The "Toast to the Club" was delivered by Mr Pat Fitzgerald and responded to by Mr Geoff Garland. Mr Knight and Mr Guy both rearranged business commitments to be present with us. The Ted Davis trophy for the Club's best all-rounder was again won by Geoff Garland whilst Jock Martel received, for the second successive time, the Captain John Morris fielding trophy for the Club's best fieldsman. Peter Larkin presented the Barr-Turn trophy to Phil Dobell-Brown, who bypassed a major portion of the season, it was alleged, with some feigned illness or another.

On the financial side, the Club was particularly healthy and due thanks should be extended to the very proficient Honorary Treasurer Hugh Hopkins. The many donations received from various sources during the year are herewith acknowledged with gratitude.

The Committee Meetings were generally well attended - however the presence of many new, inexperienced members necessitated some "teething problems". However experience here can well be substituted with enthusiasm and this was generally present. The importance of the selection of a Committee should not be overlooked by the members in general. A Club cannot function effectively unless a liaison exists between the members and their Committee. Perhaps a more thoughtful choice by members would ensure an approachable, efficient Committee.

The many people who deserve thanks for their efforts during the season are, of course, too numerous to mention individually. They include such people as Wilf Ewens, Yorke Marshall and the like whose interests in the Club have always been evidenced off the field, to the ladies who provide afternoon tea, the Student Amenities Office and staff and countless others. To anyone who has helped the Club in any way at all - our thanks.

The Club has now gained District Cricket status. So what does the future hold as a Grade cricket Club? The past probably holds the answer, at least partially. The Club started "A" Shires in 1953-54 and for five years could do no better than tenth out of twelve. The period from 1962-73 saw the Club no lower than fourth out of twelve in the "A" Shires and Club Championship. Make no mistake, the Club can succeed in Grade cricket, after the initial adjustment period. The length of this period or whether we reach any heights as a Grade Club depends on:

- (1) Efficient organisation and Administration
- (2) Enthusiasm and participation, both on and off the field, by the Club members.

The Club must attract enthusiastic players who are willing to practise regularly and play regularly. Apart from this though, members must be willing to contribute to the Club, off the field, both socially and in an organisational sense.

FIRST ELEVEN REPORT

And so the time comes to review another season. No Premiership victory this time - only 4th place in the final run down. Disappointing for a team that has not been out of a Final for 5 years and was trying for its 3rd win on the trot. The reason? "It was the wet weather. We didn't even get a shot at Wenty (or Ryde)." "We just didn't bat in the Semi." "We had no quickies." "We got too used to winning." "We didn't want it badly enough." "We couldn't bat all season." There is probably some truth to all these comments but it would be unfair to dismiss the season with a single generalisation.

Once again we started with a loss, Epping recovered from 5-47 to pass our 7-175(dec) with 9 wickets down. The lesson was learned well. The next seven games were won.

Burwood, defending for a draw in the last hour, lost 6-37. (Cole 5-44)

Auburn 7-214(dec), saw us grind for 5 hours to reach 269.

Virtually 3-0, 156 was scrambled at tiny Bland, and, at 6-142, Canterbury looked safe. Four for 2 and we had every reason to feel lucky.

9-59 against Lane Cove, Cox and Howard kicked us to 99. Losing the last 6 wickets for 24, Lane Cove finished at 98. Did I say lucky?

An easy outright against Roseville and we returned to form against Bexley, scraping past their meagre 112 with 9 wickets down.

An outstanding performance in the field, in above century heat, dismissed Pennant Hills for 133 after 4½ hours toil and laid the foundation for an easy win.

216 against Lindfield looked good, but they remembered last year's final and battled their way to 8-232.

Washouts against Ryde and Wentworthville robbed us of any chance in the Club Championship, and a loss in the play-off fiasco against Lane Cove (players in the game understood the significance to the word) saw us reach the semis in 2nd place. A detailed description of the match follows but I believe the reason for our failure lies in the story of the season. We "got out of jail" too frequently and our batsmen were not attuned to going on and on after a successful start.

The people involved:-

For a start there were 23 and that's too many. Alec Dietsch, one of the hardheads, was badly missed when he went overseas after Pennant Hills. Really he had a poor season with only 2 scores, 71 & 65, (There were only 4 scores over 50 in the season) but it's great to have Alec at the semis. His application and technique are fine models for younger players.

Peter Whalen consolidated his position in the team with a series of gutsy performances. If the Duck can eradicate the "sudden rush of blood" when apparently well set, he could become a prolific run scorer. An outstanding fieldsman, Jock Martel, once again winner of the Club fielding trophy, does everything in the field but his batting was disappointing. Perhaps Jock enjoys his cricket too much to ever become a really heavy scorer. Last year's comments still apply.

Phil Heaney had the kind of season that shouldn't happen to anyone. Every edge was grabbed from his bat and his lack of success was reflected in the team batting, as Phil, once set, is very hard to dislodge and can really punish an attack. Perhaps more use could have been made of his bowling, as when this occurred later in the season, his batting also improved. I hope Phil doesn't let this season depress him too much, he is too a cricketer for this to happen.

Rodger Robertson, again Vice-Captain, took over ' keeping duties, and did both jobs excellently. Business caused Rodger to miss several matches including the semi and though his run scoring was not as prolific as in past seasons, he still managed to annex the batting average. A fine batsman, without any real weakness, Rodger gained recognition with the award of a University BLUE.

Graham Cole was one of the successes of the season. Fine innings against Burwood (82), Auburn (45) and Pennant Hills (44x) were supplemented by consistently mature bowling performances commencing with an excellent 5-44 against Burwood. Graham had to battle slow wickets all season and his ability to adapt to conditions and work in partnership with Geoff Garland gave University the outstanding spin attack in the competition. Some of the slip catches (12) were excellent but most were just routine to Graham.

Barry Cox again "did his bit". One comment sums up Barry: "He's playing cricket every moment he's on the field." Though, not as successful with the bat this year, Barry had only limited opportunities as often happens in a team chasing points. Barry's bowling gained in subtlety and his fielding, as always, was impeccable.

Carol Samarasekera, whose graceful batting promised so much last year, also had a poor season. Early, he consistently reached 30 but could not keep going then later he could not get a start. To fulfil his potential, Carol will have to work hard to overcome his one fault, a fault exploited mercilessly by pace bowlers this season.

Paul Emery and someone (Rick Edwards, Rob Howard, Frank Lord, Greig Robinson, Phil Hoaney, Vadim Shev, Peter Street) used the new ball and Paul certainly suffered from this. Though securing valuable breaks against Epping and Bexley, Paul was unable to take wickets as consistently as in the past. Despite this he was always accurate and economical, a real greyhound in the field. Of the others - well - Greig Robinson, in his 2 guest appearances, showed us how badly we missed him; Rob Howard has real potential but was too often inaccurate; Vadim Shev could do everything but is his own worst enemy, while Rick and Frank were not true opening bowlers.

Geoff Garland, in his second season as Captain, was more relaxed in his bowling and success came more frequently than the previous season. One feels the team relied too much on his bowling but this is a moot point. Though playing one long innings against Auburn, he did not have the batting ability to maintain a grafting role when it was needed at season's end.

Clem Barrington deputised for Rodger several times and gave his all, while Dick Burgess and Mark Ray showed batting potential. Mark, in particular, looks a very correct and solid bat and if he can develop more subtlety in his bowling, he should blossom into an excellent all-rounder. Don Clark and Hugh Hopkins returned for the semis and did not let the team down. Thanks to everyone for their efforts.

I hope this does not sound like too much of a dirge as the season was most enjoyable. Many games were very close and the team effort in the field was something to be proud of. The guys showed pride and confidence and never quitted. Finally, thanks to everyone for all the off the field assistance, especially to Rodger for his assistance as Vice Captain, to Robin and Ileana for the teas and to Mr and Mrs Robertson, our greatest supporters.

The Semi-Final:-

Sent in to bat, Whalen and Ray weathered a hostile attack with impressive expertise, but at 42 three wickets fell - 2 indiscretions. Martel and Clark added 56 in fine style then another three wickets and finally Garland and Heaney scraped 40 before the innings closed at a most disappointing 159. Six batsmen got a start but Martel with 31 was top scorer. At least 4 of these contributed directly to their demise.

Shev struck early but at tea Lane Cove recovered to 2-63. At 4-30p.m. with the score at 3-95, Uni. looked to be in real strife. But once again the game turned as the batsmen allowed themselves to be tied down and the score slumped to 7-131 at stumps (Garland 4-39) - A week's meditation - Martel magnificently snapped up a half chance 8-139. Cox sprawled across the pitch for a horizontal caught and bowled, 9-159, but 3 balls later Garland's pleading appeal fell on deaf ears and Lane Cove finally reached 167.

The rest was an anti-climax. Chasing runs, Cole (34), Ray (28), Martel (23) did well to reach 3-97 in even time but the crash came. Total 117. Lane Cove weathered the early storm with some luck and went on to record a comfortable win. They had great desire and applied themselves and so every congratulation to Pat Fitzgerald and his team

SECOND ELEVEN REPORT

The Second Eleven had what could be called a mediocre season, finishing 5th in the preliminary rounds, and then winning 2 of the 4 encouragement award games.

The teams started badly and after 4 games had managed to win only one game, having lost to Burwood and Canterbury, and then drawing with Epping. The team then had a complete reversal and won 5 games straight, then Mother Nature took over and 2 rounds were washed out. The rain definitely did us out of a semi spot.

Batting was presumably our strong point, with the team failing to score 150 on only one occasion during the competition rounds. However, if one looks carefully at our performances, it is noticeable that most of our runs were scored by the middle and lower order batsmen. Some outstanding performances were recorded by these batsmen : Henry Enahoro scoring 66 against Canterbury and then a magnificent 104 n.o. against Roseville, Mark Ray's 59 vs Lane Cove and 61 vs Bexley, Alex Taylor's 79 vs Epping and, of course, Don Clark's 71 against Pennant Hills. (One might add it was Don's first bat for about 6 years.)

Bowling again was always enthusiastic but, alas, on many occasions, lacking in direction - although, possibly our two most resounding victories, were due to the bowlers. The first was against Roseville, we managed a good 6-217, Roseville were 0-0 overnight. However, during the week, Vadim Shev had a tangle on his bike and was unable to play. So we took the field with only 2 recognised bowlers. Frank Lord had to bowl himself to the point of exhaustion to take a magnificent 5-48 and he was well supported by Mark Ray, who bowled 15 overs and took 3-43 - A truly good win. The second great win was against Pennant Hills. We made 9-220 and Pennant Hills were 0-63 overnight. Then, due to some very hostile bowling by Vadim Shev (2-27), Peter Street (3-40), and Brian Pink (2-30), supported by Mark Ray (2-34), we made Pennant Hills follow on, having dismissed them for 136.

These performances were backed up by some other good performances : Mark Ray 6-41 (Lane Cove), Frank Lord 5-34 (Lane Cove), Peter Street 4-38 (Lindfield) and Don Clark 4-55 (Canterbury).

The team had a good new ball attack : Vadim Shev, Rob Howard, Brian Pink, Greg Black, Peter Street, Steve Hamilton and Frank Lord, all responsible quick to fast bowlers, all with a degree of experience. Why couldn't they get the early break through ? Simply a lack of direction. All tried hard and I'm extremely grateful for this, but a little more concentration is required.

The fielding was a definite "hot and cold" thing, with some excellent performances and some disgraceful displays. Jeff Cutler always tried and stood out because of his safe hands and good arm. Hugh Hopkins, who kept all season, secured 16 catches and 4 stumpings. Alex Taylor and Jeff Cutler both took 8 catches.

A number of points must be made if the Club is going to make an impact on Grade cricket. Firstly, players must arrive 30 minutes before the game , not 5 minutes after time. Teams must be stabilised - during this year 34 players played Second Grade. A firm basis of a team must be built during the year and players must be persuaded to play over the long Christmas Vacation. Finally, let's stop being weekend cricketers and play fair-dinkum cricket - a little purpose and concentration go a long way to winning games.

Congratulations to Burwood on their win in "B" Shires but remember 1974, it's our turn in 2nd Grade First Division.

Thanks to all the players who supported me through the year.

THIRD ELEVEN REPORT

Yet another quest for the elusive "C" Shires Premiership proved unsuccessful. For the second year in a row, we comfortably made the semi-finals only to be comprehensively beaten and relocated to 4th place after the play off.

Whilst our standard in all departments dropped from last year, this was also evident in the other teams except Macquarie University. Both their teams equalled their 1971-72 Premiership team, whilst the ability gap between them and the remaining teams widened significantly.

On behalf of the 3rd Eleven, I would like to offer my congratulations to their success in the Premiership. Further, and not hoping to detract from their success, I would like to suggest that they have outgrown "C" Shires and like Wentworthville some years back, would perform very creditably in "A" & "B" Shires.

In analysing and suggesting future remedies for the 3rd Eleven performance, much of what has been said over the years, are herein echoed. Once again the overlying problem is our turn over in players making almost impossible to build, lead and maintain a NUCLEUS of players let alone a team. To win any Premiership, a well balanced, regular team with ability apart is required. When one realises the 3rd's this year could have fielded almost 4 completely separate teams in twelve rounds, the problem may be readily understood. Under these circumstances, to have made the semi's speaks highly of the talent available. Yet, in my opinion, until this one problem is solved the "C" Shires Premiership will continue to elude us.

To look at the season, one cannot go beyond the all round effort of Ross Fitzgerald with 25 wickets and over 300 runs, undoubtedly a fine performance. With more knowledge, understanding and control, Ross could truly excel in both or either facets of his play.

The bowling was the strength of the 3rd Eleven with Brian Pink outstanding. He averaged 3 wickets per innings when opening the attack. A fine fieldsman, Brian bowled menacingly, tight, and always with purpose. A fine foil to Brian was Bob Turner, the ever tight, thinking and experienced bowler. It is hoped that Bob will be persuaded to play with Uni. next season, a loss the Club can ill afford in both the slow bowling attack and the wealth of knowledge and experience to be gained for younger members of the Club.

The bowling strength for the 3rd Eleven, as with the Club, is in our variety and numbers of slow bowlers; we are in a drought for fast and medium pace bowlers.

The batting was weak and disappointing. Too often the tail was required to score the necessary runs. The fact that only two players scored more than 200 runs for the season, shows the true extent of our weakness. Our large turn over of players did not help to consolidate a batting order or stability. Our problems began at the openers and proceeded down the line. The only players to bat at a regular number scored over 200 runs.

John Sheens, Brett Stevenson and Tony Bailey, all showed promise of solid batting talent. However, for this to eventuate, a full season is required.

When one looks back on the season and appreciates the closeness of 2 or 3 wins, perhaps to have got as far as we did, some comfort may be obtained. Team spirit and the actual enjoyment of the season could not have been better. I thank all the players for a most enjoyable season and apologise for bowling changes, batting order and field placings, which in retrospect proved unwise, however right at the time.

It is impossible to mention all outstanding performances, suffice to say it was a very enjoyable season and I look forward to next season, hopefully with more success for the third eleven and the Club as a whole.

FOURTH ELEVEN REPORT

The Fourth Eleven won 3 matches and lost 10. As in previous years, a large number of players (39) played in the team during the season. Unfortunately, as soon as a player made one reasonable score, he was immediately promoted to a higher team, quite often before he was ready for promotion. Such a situation always makes things difficult for a team to function well. Nevertheless, in the last five games, with a nucleus of five or six regular players, the team did develop a real team spirit with a will to win.

The standard of fielding was generally better than in previous seasons. The outstanding fieldsman was Angus Fisher who, unfortunately, did not play after the end of November. Jim Noad kept wickets well - at times extremely well - but he played only seven games.

The batting was just not good enough; it lacked experience. How often do we see an inexperienced batsman play a good shot and then play across the line at the next delivery and pay the penalty. Dave Abbey began well, scoring 160 runs in his first five innings, but then his form fell away. Peter Larkin played the best innings of the season - 60 against the strong Macquarie 1 side. With thin batting resources, we missed Phil Dobell-Brown, who had a bad car accident in December; this put him out for the remainder of the season. Alan Goodwin so improved his batting in the middle of the season to be promoted from number 10 to opening bat, although he was occasionally heckled by his team mates for his lack of dash in the 35 over matches at the close of the season. Derek Norquay showed that he can play shots and attack the bowling but he must learn to use more discretion.

Our bowling was much better than our batting. The greater part of the bowling was done by only four bowlers : Abbey, Schofield, Livingstone and Carr. Ken Schofield, with a heart as big as his number 13 boots, deservedly won his first Club bowling trophy. He bowled very well in the last match to take 5-17 and was delighted to learn that he can now bowl an outswinger in addition to his stock inswinger.

However, there is some doubt as to whether that one outswinger was not a fluke! Newcomer Robert Carr bowled with great enthusiasm and often with penetration as evidenced by the figures : 3-5, 6-27, and 3-14. Dave Abbey bowled better than his figures indicate, getting considerable lift off a good length. And he did have some bad luck, especially against Macquarie 1 when he had both openers dropped early off easy catches.

The future looks exciting, since the Club now has the opportunity it has been seeking for years. We must attract keen players who are prepared to play and practise regularly. Perhaps the principal function of the lower grades is to give keen players experience to enable them to gain promotion to the higher grades. I look forward to next season with great enthusiasm.

FIFTH ELEVEN REPORT

Once again the Fifths did not have a successful season as far as figures go. But a good time was had by all and everyone tried hard. The main purpose of the Fifths is not to win but to provide a game of cricket for the enthusiastic, if not gifted, player, as well as those reserves who must be kept in practise for duty in the higher grades later. Many Fifth graders are required in the higher grades during December and January when the great "exodus" occurs.

The two high points of the season were the matches against Government Transport and Lane Cove (2nd match). For most of the season, the team composition was constantly changing and consequently wins were hard to come by.

The captaincy was always in good hands. Phil Dobell-Brown led the team for the first four matches before being promoted to the Fourths. Then Alan Goodwin took over until the mid-season break and finally Bruce Norton in February.

The faults of the team were definitely in batting, bowling and fielding. The highest batting aggregate was achieved by Jack Howe with 121. A late find was Jim Grey, who annihilated the bowling, with a swashbuckling 82 in the tense win against Lane Cove. Ross Peters played two fine innings (51 against Government Transport and 35 against Scots), but spent most of his time, during the season, in the higher grades. Ron Levot (48 n.o.) partnered Ross during a record 4th wicket partnership of 101 against Government Transport.

Almost everyone seemed to have a bowl, but no-one stayed in the team long enough to bowl more than twenty overs. Rob Carr, in his only appearance, almost took out the bowling aggregate. This honour was left to my good self with 8 wickets in 6 matches, in which I trundled down a marathon 21 overs. Rob Carr's 6-57 was the only outstanding bowling performance of the season. Of course, few maidens were bowled over, since we were too often retrieving (cricket) balls hit over the square leg fence for six!!

Observant statisticians may wonder why so few catches seemed to be taken by the Fifths. The obvious reason is that we dropped all the others. Wrong! It was the lack of detail in the score-book which doomed so many catches to anonymity. As far as the scanty figures show, the leading fieldsman was Jack Howe with five catches.

Next season the Fifths are likely to be competing in the Fifth Grade Competition and I wish them greater success than the ill-fated 1971-72 Fifths, who ventured into the Municipal and Shire C Competition for one disastrous season. Hopefully they will be transformed from the 'Fumbling Fifths' to the 'Fighting Fifths'.

INTERVARSITY

UNIVERSITY OF NEW SOUTH WALES vs UNIVERSITY OF NEWCASTLE
(at Newcastle University Oval, December 3-4, 1972)

Having won the toss, N.S.W. batted on what could be described as a perfect wicket although the weather did not quite match this excellence - rain continuously fell all day.

Mark Ray and John Barford opened the innings solidly, with Mark looking particularly safe and in a confident mood. Bob Wilkinson, a Colts representative, soon found to his frustration, that it was not sufficient to beat the bat but an edge was also required. The partnership was ended at 44 when Mark played his first false stroke to have this snapped up in the gully. The innings proceeded slowly, at times laboriously, with the valuable wickets of Martel and Polhill falling to bad strokes by the batsmen.

When Alan Menton finally arrived, he was immediately added and during the afternoon session, played a very entertaining and valuable innings. The remainder of the batting was tantamount to a collapse with the highlights being an enormous 6 by Craig Brown and John Barford finally getting out (needless to say, he dares never to return to Newcastle).

With about an hour and a half to bowl at the Newcastle team, Craig Brown had immediate success, and, after a neat run out, N.S.W. were on top. A bad decision for a catch behind off Irwin, some fine batting by Rob Wilkinson, and some more rain saw the day out with N.S.W. needing quick wickets in the morning to take a first innings lead.

The morning session of the second day, despite an early break, belonged to Rob Wilkinson and "Operator" Baker who steered the Newcastle side to a first innings lead, aided by an aggressive 31 by ex-Club player George Preston. Mark Ray bowled particularly well having all batsmen in trouble at some stage and finally securing the wicket of Rob Wilkinson.

The ball was now in the court of N.S.W., who through good innings by Alan Menton, Mark Ray and Jock Martel, supported by Greg Black were able to declare, leaving Newcastle 95 minutes to score 130 runs.

The performance of N.S.W. in the second innings was very pleasing. Rob Wilkinson opened and proceeded to thrash the bowling to all quarters of the field; and with support from Irwin and Baker put the game well under their control - until some fine fielding by N.S.W. had them not so sure. Wilkinson was thrown out from the boundary by Mark Ray, Irwin went for one cut too many, Clements went the big hit and Newcastle had slumped to 6-105. With this they settled for a first innings win with N.S.W. pressing for the outright win.

So what was the difference between the two sides? Clearly Rob Wilkinson had a large influence on the performance of the Newcastle team but the lack of fight by the middle order batsmen on the first day which robbed the side of a win. For N.S.W. Mark Ray made an impressive debut as well as finding a new relative (Rob Wilkinson) for his trouble. Alan Menton played 2 fine innings. However, if it is recalled that N.S.W. had 7 players who had not played Intervarsity previously, the side performed creditably.

May I thank the Newcastle side, who provided both accommodation and first class food during the game as well as enjoyable opposition. We look forward to further encounters with them.

INTERVARSITY CARNIVAL

As the memory fades, only random recollections remain. Adelaide was wet, as was the water in the pool for the water polo match. The welcoming beers were warm. So much for the initial social highlights.

Vs Western Australia :

Always a strong side, W.A. elected to bat first. Losing 2-11, Jarvis, their most dangerous batsman, and Gregson added 42 in only 7 overs, before Jarvis ran himself out. Sparked by 2 run outs, 3 fine slips catches by Alan Wright and great support in the field, N.S.W. bowlers demolished W.A. for 104. Phil Watkins (3-24) was the most successful, but all bowlers kept the batsmen under pressure on the excellent wicket at Bedford Park Teachers College Oval. Although N.S.W. was 2-5 at lunch, we were always going to win but made heavy weather of it until Jock Martel came in and at 4-39, pounded a quick 23. Al Wright capped a fine match with a purposeful and cultured 56 n.o. An excellent win, but only Ledwidge scored on the social scene that night. (Dallaway was disqualified for returning to scales overweight.)

Vs Monash :

Unimpressed by Monash's performances against Sydney, N.S.W. approached this match confidently. The wicket at the Graduates Oval appeared to be a spring mat of dead grass and we again were asked to field in above century heat. Brian Pink again took a wicket in his first over but Monash consolidated to 2-101, aided by some dreadful attempts at catching and stumping. When Kilpatrick (54), an excellent bat, was dismissed N.S.W. fought back to 5-128 at lunch, and with only 6 overs to go, Monash looked to have wasted their early advantage. Paul Ledwidge, who batted so correctly in the other match, went in the second over, but, with Dallaway (22) as the sheet anchor, Wright (36), Martel (35) and later Menton (38) all batted well. Any one of

these batsmen might have won the match for us, but each was out to a bad shot brought on by exhaustion, after fielding and batting for so long in the extreme heat. Brian Pink and Rob Carr added 12, but we finished 7 short at 176. Later, at the now famous Adelaide watering hole, Rob Carr thought of the team, much to the chagrin of John Barford and co. Ledwidge was again top night scorer.

Vs Flinders :

Disappointed at the loss to Monash in a game that should have been won, N.S.W. did not play well against the unbeaten Flinders. Given a great start of 40 by an elegant Ian Bray (21) and a dour Peter Dallaway (12), we then lost 5-4 and never recovered to be out for 87. Ledwidge (17) was very correct for a long time but never attempted to wrest the initiative, while Phil Watkins (16 n.o.) blasted briefly. Though Ledwidge and Grattan-Smith bowled well, Flinders were never troubled to win by 8 wickets.

The dinner that night saw many miss breakfast next morning, "Killer" Stone, Rob Carr, B.P. and Phil Watkins all disgraced themselves, while a nude "blow-fly" attempted to score with the maid. Ledwidge 3 out of 3. Although Dallaway took a midnight dip, everything else paled beside the antics of Monash. On the morrow, fortified by a special delivery of 15 dozen cans, the team watched A.N.U. squash the Carnival darlings Flinders, dismissing them for 39. The spectators were, however, treated to a truly virtuoso performance by "the flasher" finishing on a high note.

As no-one from N.S.W. was caught doing anything illegal, immoral, fattening or vandalistic, one is forced to conclude the conduct of the team was exemplary and a credit to the University.
