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PRESIDENT'S REPORT

It is a mark of the high standards we have set ourselves in the University of New South Wales Cricket Club that to a man we consider the past season as only a moderately successful one. All this despite the fact that we finished the season in 6th position in the Club Championship, with the Third Grade side making the semi-finals and the Fourth Grade side not far short of the finals. This attitude of not being content with anything but the top position is the strength of the club, which marks us off from many clubs in Sydney. But new players need to be made aware, and old players constantly reminded, that this determination was not always present in the club and must be carefully nurtured by us all if we wish to continue succeeding in the future.

The season was one of rebuilding after the loss of a number of players from our First Grade side, none of whom we missed more than John Rogers. We owe a deep debt to John, not only for his leadership in First Grade which netted us a Premiership - good as that was - but equally importantly for convincing all our sides that they could win and showing us how to go about it. We cannot expect to replace John Rogers but his lasting impact will be seen in our continuing success in the coming seasons. It probably requires more of our senior players to take over many of the tasks that he seemed to handle so easily and so competently. The Executive and the Management Committee have given some thought to this and will need to continue seeking ways of extracting maximum value from our resources in the coming season.

Without doubt the highlight of the Club's year was the selection of Geoff Lawson to represent Australia. Geoff's selection is a significant step in the creation of that tradition of excellence which is so important for any sporting club. We are not only proud of Geoff's personal achievement but also of his continued involvement in the club at many levels. The Annual Dinner would be considerably the poorer without the Cold Gold awards. We look forward to seeing Geoff Lawson placing his name firmly into the book of Wisden in the coming years.

All Club Presidents have used their annual report to thank the many people who have contributed to the club during the past season, and like them I want to extend the club's gratitude to them all. But this year I want especially to mention a number of people without whose work the club could not function or would function much less happily. Firstly, our warm thanks to those ladies who selflessly contributed many hours to preparing afternoon teas at the Village Green and David Phillips ground. Many clubs have an established following of ladies who prepare teas and men who act as scorers.

We are moving in that direction with our regular preparers of afternoon teas and with David Lemon's fine contribution as scorer for First Grade. Secondly, we owe a great deal to Andrew McMaster who has maintained the tradition of a largely non-playing Secretary and has done the job superbly. Finally, the club has been organised from Saturday to Saturday for four years by John MacFarlane as Teams' Secretary. He has done a difficult and at times onerous job with good humour (mostly) and efficiency. The tea ladies, the scorer, the Secretary, and the Teams' Secretary are all 'backroom' people whose work on our behalf has been essential for the smooth functioning of the club. Thank you to them all.

The season was a good one for social cricket, as later reports will demonstrate. The highlight was the Oxford/Cambridge tour and the Combined Universities game against England in Adelaide, for which Geoff Kirkwood and Jim Robson were selected, the latter as captain. Before the game I thought that the highlight would be the battle of the two tactical geni, Messrs Brearley and Robson. But Geoff Kirkwood stole the limelight. Those sports page reports were vintage Kirkwood. Apart from this game, we also had, so I am told, a highly successful interstate tour to the Barossa Valley and points en route, which included an occasional game of cricket.

The past season was a rebuilding one, the fruits of which should be evident in the coming season. We have in the club, I believe, more talented cricketers at all levels than any other club in Sydney. The only barriers to continued success will be self-imposed. We must avoid the trap into which so many University cricket clubs have fallen, with a sudden blooming followed by an equally sudden decline. We are going to have problems in First Grade in the next few years as sponsors move into many grade clubs offering incentives to their players and probably paying for imports. The projected abolition of district boundaries will make it even more possible for three or four wealthier clubs to emerge, offering incentives to attract players from other clubs. It is doubtful if we will ever be able to match this, though the Management Committee is looking at possible forms of sponsorship. What we have to do is to develop our own talent to the full and retain it by ensuring that we have the best facilities, the best social cricket, and the best management of any grade clubs. We wimply have to be determined to stay on top, in all grades, and have to demand total effort from all players in all grades. I look forward with confidence to the coming season.

GEOFF "HENRY" LAWSON

When chosen to fly to India in October, 1979 as a replacement player for the touring Australian cricket team, Geoff Lawson became the first member of the University of New South Wales Cricket Club to represent Australia. This is an achievement of which the club is very proud.

Geoff came to the University as a strapping young quick from the Lake Albert Club in the Wagga Wagga District Cricket Association. As a lad he was tutored and guided by the late Derek Rogers. Before the untimely death of the mentor, the shared ambition of both was achieved when Geoff wore the baggy green cap with distinction.

At the University, Geoff was rushed straight into First Grade at the commencement of the 1976-77 season and into the hands of one John Rogers, the Captain of the young University side. Under J.R., Geoff continued to develop and was an integral member of the Premiership winning side of that year.

Towards the end of the 1977-78 season, Geoff was first chosen in the NSW Sheffield Shield Team and became the opening bowling partner for UNSWCC team-mate Greg Watson. Geoff rapidly gained a reputation as a genuinely quick fast bowler who wasn't afraid to mix bowling with raw hostility and attack.

The 1978-79 season saw Geoff as a regular member of the NSW team and also the subject of much publicity in the face of bad performances by a depleted Australian side. This exposure did not have a beneficial effect on Geoff, relatively young at age 21, and unfortunately he did not enjoy his best of seasons.

A season in England playing Lancashire League as the Club Professional for Heywood in 1979 appeared to result in an overall more mature Geoff Lawson, and definitely in a more professional approach to cricket. He started the 79-80 grade season with an 8 wicket haul against Cumberland and shortly after was added to the Australian team touring in India. After this tour, Geoff completed a magnificent season for N.S.W. which saw him rewarded with the "Bowler of the Year" award from Tooheys and a tour to Pakistan under Greg Chappell.

To date, and some would say amazingly, Geoff has not played for Australia in a test match. It appeared likely that this honour would be achieved during the prestigious tour to England later this year for the Centenary Test Match at Lords. It is now history that Geoff was overlooked for a bigger "name" player in a selection bungle that smacked of "promotion before players", a trend that is becoming somewhat evident in international cricket of late. Despite the contents of some adverse publicity, Geoff has taken this major set-back in his stride and will make a determined bid to gain a test spot, a spot currently occupied by persons unavailable for the less favourable tour of Pakistan.

Even though he is now a regular 1st class cricketer, Geoff is still committed to the University of New South Wales when available. His approach to practice, matches and social activities is evidence of his loyalty to the Club and the belief that Club and District cricket form the basis of all higher levels of the sport.

In conclusion, we can only say that as a Club we feel that Geoff will go on and become a truly great Australian fast bowler. Given his youth and tremendous desire, I feel this is a matter of course. Once again, "Henry", congratulations on your achievement not only for the Cricket Club but University sport as a whole. It is a privilege to be associated with you as a fine cricketer and friend.

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FIRST GRADE

For a team notorious for starting the season slowly, 1979/80 came as no surprise. In fact, at one stage when after 12 rounds we had but 2 wins on the board and were running equal last, it promised to be a season in which we failed to start at all. By way of total contrast we then amassed 26 points in the last three games to top last season's points tally. Indeed, with one more win we would have finished sixth. Our early season performances were marred by several factors. First, playing at the Village Green before Christmas was a hazardous exercise for batsmen and we continually had the worst of conditions. Second, what rain there was (and the season was remarkably free of it) seemingly affected our games more so than others, particularly those at Bankstown, Northern Districts, Sutherland, and Sydney. Third, our catching, particularly close to the wicket, was deplorable - particularly by players renowned for their fielding ability.

Nevertheless, there were some very encouraging aspects of the season's performances. Our two new players, Jim Dixon and Chris Hanger, had outstanding "rookie" seasons. "Disco" took 35 wickets, including two returns of 5 wickets in the last two games, and when the wickets had more pace in them he looked a bowler of genuine class. He also fielded brilliantly and has more than considerable ability with the bat. "Cliff" Hanger is an outstanding wicket-keeping prospect - as his record wicket-keeping performance of 20 catches and 10 stumpings indicates. He has the ability to play representative cricket. Several other players had easily their best first grade seasons. Greg Livingstone topped the aggregate with 484 runs at 30.25 in his first full season of opener. He batted with great application and rarely failed to get a start. Peter Tout also topped the 400 mark at an average of over 30 (456 at 30.40). He batted magnificently at times but with the exception of that gem of an innings at Sutherland, did not go on to produce big scores. Steve Campbell, no longer in the shadow of Paddy Grattan-Smith, bowled extremely well to take 33 wickets at 18.61 managing to take 5 wickets in an innings three times. He also batted very attractively. Mark Ray took out the bowling aggregate by capturing 40 wickets at 18.8 despite a late start to the season. He had a miserable time with the bat but the last round half-century proved to everyone that he was emerging from the slump. Jim Robson was in great early season form and topped the batting averages, but later in the season he far too frequently was dismissed after scoring 20.

Special congratulations should be extended to Geoff Lawson, our first Australian tourist. Hopefully he will earn selection in the test side this coming season. In retrospect, a season featuring some fine performances, individual and team-wise. That barn-storming finish should stand us in good stead for next season but we must arrest the trend of recent years and develop the capacity to win early season games. Pre-season matches may do the trick as may the introduction of a team member to the Village Green ground staff (it reaped end-of-season dividends).

My personal thanks to the ladies who produced the afternoon teas at home yet again; to Andrew McMaster and John MacFarlane for all their assistance; and to all first grade players who played the game in such fine spirit this season.

MATCH REPORTSRound 1UNSW 7/173 (d) Drew with Bankstown 3/110

The season started in miserable style with the first day's play washed out and the round (for the two teams at Bankstown Oval at least) reduced to a single afternoon. We batted quite well with Livingstone (45) and Robson (56 n.o) handling the pace and aggression of Len Pascoe with apparent ease. Bankstown never looked for the necessary runs after Jim Dixon took his first grade wicket by removing Ian Davis.

Round 2UNSW 3/126(d) Beat Cumberland 124 & 3/147 on First Innings

Geoff Lawson set a club record when he took a magnificent 8/38 off 17 consecutive overs of sustained pace and control to earn himself selection in the Australian team touring India as a late replacement for the injured Alan Hurst. Peter Tout (38 n.o) and Jim Robson (22 n.o.) put on 61 for the fourth wicket in good style but Cumberland showed no interest in a second innings result.

Round 3UNSW 119 Lost to Penrith 155 & 1/97 on First Innings

Excellent spin bowling by Steve Campbell (5/37) and Mark Ray (2/36) enabled us to dismiss the premiers cheaply. Our reply was miserable on a sub-standard wicket which spun prodigiously. Only Terry Buddin (28) and Greg Livingstone (26) displayed any application to the task at hand.

Round 4.UNSW 186 Lost to Northern District 7/265(d) on First Innings

Our bowlers did well to restrict the powerful Northern Districts batting line-up on a hot afternoon and on a flat wicket. To confirm the theory that grade matches are often won on the flick of a coin, we batted the following week on a wet wicket which gave every encouragement to the bowlers. Jim Robson (84) batted magnificently and Peter Tout (45) gave him splendid support, but there was little else by way of resistance.

Round 5UNSW 5/314(d) Drew with Sutherland

Bad weather dogged us further for after reaching a good total on the first day, rain washed out play on the second day. Peter Tout hit the highest first grade score by a UNSW player by plundering 140 n.o. in four hours with 15 fours and 2 sixes. He and Terry Buddin, who scored 93 n.o. in 104 minutes, set a record partnership for any wicket in first grade when they put on 173 for the sixth wicket.

Round 6UNSW 146 Lost to Gordon 210 & 0/22 on the First Innings

Steve Campbell took 5/12 as we fielded in the first of the Saturday/Sunday games. We batted the next day on a wicket which had been watered overnight (presumably in an effort to ensure that it lasted for two days). The result was that we were at one stage 7-48. Terry Buddin (37) and Steve Campbell (31) put on 61 for the eighth wicket to restore a measure of respectability to our final score.

Round 7UNSW 146 Lost to St. George 7/180(d) on the First Innings

Yet again we batted second on an uneven wicket which never looked like lasting for two consecutive days. Mark Ray bowled very well to snare 3/53 but the batting again failed miserably, adverse conditions notwithstanding. Jim Robson (40) and Chris Chapman (34) put on 58 for the fifth wicket and the way Steve Campbell (25 n.o.) and Chris Hangar (17) batted, it looked as though we may hold out for a draw until there was a reckless run-out with only one over of the match remaining.

Round 8UNSW 6/137(d) & 8/105 Beat Sydney University 135 & 135 on the First Innings

FOURTH GRADE

The team began poorly with two first innings defeats. But after that we recorded 3 outright wins, 4 first innings wins, 3 draws and only 2 further defeats. So it could be said we were unlucky to miss the semis by one place.

However, our bowling and fielding often let us down. It certainly is not easy to bowl on David Phillips but our bowlers particularly with the new ball lacked both length and direction on many occasions. Crucial chances were missed in the air and overall the above ground fielding was poor. The ground fielding was reasonable but at times slow!

Our strength was in our batting. Five players exceeded 300 runs while Mick Burden with only 4 innings late in the season gathered 228. Ian Kellaway (346 from 8 innings) had an outstanding season with the bat including his performance in third grade (273 from 9 innings) while Alex Taylor's 123 against Macquarie University was his personal best and the best of the season. (He is now 2 runs short of 7,000 runs for the club).

I would like to see Brad Wells more often in his best form as he demonstrated in the first (5/17) and last (4/18) games. Pat Thompson had a reasonable season and bowled without luck on several occasions. Geoff Garland also had occasional good performances but both he and Darrell Williamson at times contributed to the opposition scoring rate.

A brief review of the matches may help recall the season for those who wish to remember:

Round 1 - Randwick 117 and 5/107 defeated UNSW 63 and 168 on first innings.

Very poor batting and catching performances. Wells bowled very accurately (5/57 off 21) in the first innings. Randwick just failed to secure an outright win at 6-20 pm due in part to Garland (3/23).

Round 2 - Mosman 4/256 defeated UNSW 183.

Minimal batting performance on a perfect wicket except for Garland (54) and Barford (32). Bowling, as was so often in the season, lacked both length and direction and provided an easy win to Mosman by tea on the second day.

Round 3 - UNSW 6/68 dec. and 6/78 defeated Manly 65 and 78 outright. This match was played on a dirt patch off the main wicket area at David Phillips and it was amazing that no batsman was injured. Overall, Hurley secured the incredible figures of 8/12 off 16 ably supported by Wells 6/34 and Limon 5/54.

Round 4 - UNSW 8/281 defeated Northern Districts 270.

ND batted first on a very good track and were in trouble at 6/80 but recovered to 9/176 to reach 270. However, a superb team batting performance on the second day saw us pass their total with 30 wins to spare after having lost 30 wins at the start due to rain. Jacobs played a fine innings for a chanceless 38. Kellaway scored an aggressive 104 in spite of sore feet and was supported by Williamson (69).

Fourth Grade (cont)

Round 5 - UNSW 1/27 drew with Sydney 163.

Rain prevented play on the second day at David Phillips after a good fielding effort and reasonable bowling (Williamson 4/68, Wells 2/20, Thompson 2/32). A win seemed assured after the fine batting of the previous week.

Round 6 - Petersham 4/176 defeated UNSW 172.

After being sent into bat at Petersham Oval on a damp wicket, lack of application saw five batsmen fail to get out of the 20's. On the second day Hurley was lost due to illness while the other bowlers all lacked line and length.

Round 7 - UNSW 1/10 drew with Sutherland 4/200.

A one day match at David Phillips saw Sutherland win the toss and bat until tea - very king cricket! Rain prevented play after 4pm.

Round 8 - UNSW 5/112 dec. and 3/163 defeated Southern Districts 98 and 9/175 outright.

A good bowling performance in first innings by Thompson (3/24), Millet (3/24) and Williamson (4/30) was well supported in the field (5 catches). Some quick scoring secured an innings win by the end of the first day. SD's also went for quick runs in the second innings contained in part by Garland (3/34) and declared leaving us 110 wins to score 162. Superb batting by Carmichael (84 no) supported by Williamson (38) gave us an outright win with 20 minutes to spare. A sour note was that \$100 and a new bat were stolen from Kev Connor by some local youths.

Round 9 - UNSW 8/185 drew with Penrith 7/226.

A one day match was played at David Phillips with a much weakened side due to the New Year exodus. Penrith made a fair declaration and at 0/76 (Taylor 38, Williamson 38) we were in with a chance. However, we then lost 5/30 and we were lucky to avoid defeat.

Round 10 - UNSW 9/237 defeated Sydney University 175.

Good batting performances by Taylor 34, Molesworth 43, Kellaway 45 and an unconquered last wicket stand of 66 (a 4th Grade record) saw us reach 237. This unusual last wicket stand by Thompson/Clark (28/21) and Wells (23) was due to Jeff Lawson's selection in a shield match mid-way through a grade round. The best fielding performance (9 catches and 1 run out) plus tight bowling from Molesworth (4/34 off 21) gave us the win with 15 runs to spare.

Round 11 - Macquarie University 4/287 defeated UNSW 8/285.

A good track at David Phillips saw Taylor reach the year best of 123 with Kellaway 60. Absolutely dreadful fielding in which 15 catches were dropped, resulting in our defeat.

Round 12 - UNSW 6/250 defeated Gordon 5/244.

The extra short boundary at Killara Oval (played on edge of wicket area because of rain) led to high scoring. Gordon declared at 1-00pm on the second day. A fine stabilising innings by Garland (68) supported by Williamson (51) and Kellaway (42) gave us a win.

Round 13 - UNSW 276 and 0/45 defeated North Sydney 7/150 and 88 outright.

After being sent into bat at David Phillips, Taylor (42) and Roper (41) provided a good start. Burden then batted aggressively (10 fours and 2 sixes) to reach 99 before running himself out (on 100 as he thought). An engineered declaration by North Sydney after Garland secured 3/8 followed by some quick scoring by UNSW opened up the possibility of an outright win. This eventuated due to a fine bowling performance by Connor 6/40.

Round 14 - UNSW 9/271 defeated Cumberland 173.

This final match was well contested as the winner was to secure 5th position in the competition. UNSW batted first on an easy wicket at David Phillips. Chris Deegan (30) and Williamson (64) provided a good recovery after a bad start. However, again it was Burden to provide the fireworks with a quick 88. The following week witnessed the best fast bowling performance of the season with Wells (4/18) and Thompson (2/23)

As a new member to the club I must say I had a most enjoyable season. The comradeship and the absence of "clicky groups" stands the club in great esteem for all new members who join.

As to the 4th Grade team we always had good spirit in win and defeat. Effort was always there and so enjoyment was always received - otherwise why play? I wish to thank in particular my vice captain John Barford, Alex Taylor, Geoff Garland and club captain Terry Buddin whose good advice I sometimes needed.

FIFTH GRADE A

The summary of matches played shows six first innings victories and a similar number of losses with two draws. The thirty six points obtained are just not enough for a team that believed it was worthy of a semi-final place. Nevertheless, we can produce the hard-luck story of two consecutive losses by margins of 5 and 1 runs and no game at all against one of the weakest sides when the NSWCA failed to arrange a ground. The eighteen points here, all before Christmas, were absolutely vital and so ruined our prospects.

My summary of the team's performance over the season is:

Batting: generally good apart from two disastrous innings, one against Waverley (77 chasing 109) and then against Balmain 'B' (72). In the latter match, though, we were struggling to field a side and fought back well in the second innings. Rick Roper had two fine innings but failed to produce consistent results whilst Kevin Connor was magnificent throughout his limited appearances with us. Dave Goldsmith was very consistent and formed a very useful opening partnership with Tony Epstein who had one of his best seasons.

Bowling: never seemed to get on top of teams, particularly in the area of medium pace. We rarely obtained quick wickets and were forced to contain batsmen. This we did satisfactorily and usually dismissed teams for reasonable totals, but it took time. Seeing we bowled first so often it is surprising we did not improve more in this facet of our game. Merrell bought his wickets as usual, Tinyow after a hesitant start showed great promise and Connor gave variety to our strong spin attack. The pace-men were the problem and MacFarlane had to remove the keeper's pads at mid-season to open our attack. Mac. had a great season for us as bowler, keeper, fieldsman and top-order batsman. Simon Millett was the best of our pace-men but going boating mid-season did not help our cause.

Fielding: was never brilliant, but usually adequate. We always looked as if we knew what we were doing but were sometimes slow in getting around to doing it. Tinyow and MacFarlane followed by "oops the back" Goldsmith led the way in this department and Popovich junior was very promising in his couple of matches.

Team-work: pretty slack early in the season and our frequent team changes exacerbated the situation. After New Year things started to happen and probably batting the whole 11 at the El-Rancho was responsible for the improvement. Once we showed Goldsmith how to get to the nearest watering-hole after a match everything came together. The apres-match exhibitions at Parramatta were outstanding and Epstein and MacFarlane all received honourable mentions though Tinyow sleeps through the action.

All in all it was a season that slipped away from us but anyone who played the last few matches must have enjoyed themselves. Probably our best match was the final one of the season when we demolished Gordon, which is always a sensual experience, through sheer team-work and ability.

My thanks to John MacFarlane for his continuing advice, support and regular shouts as Vice-Captain. In fact all the old-guard (eg Merrell, Epstein and even Stan Livingstone for one match) contributed greatly in knocking the youngsters (Goldstein, Tinyow, etc.) into shape. An enjoyable season.

FIFTH GRADE B

The 5B's in 1979-80 do not have the results to show for the talent there was in the players who turned out for the team. There was good batting, good bowling and consistent fielders but rarely in periods sustained enough to alter the course of games. All players should learn patience and concentration, the lack of these two factors being the downfall in the 5B's this last season. Batsmen should strive to occupy the crease, bowlers to maintain line and length (wicket will come from this attitude) and fielders should realise that twenty runs saved in the field are worth forty scored from the bat. The existence of a pool of keen, young cricketers which occurs in a university cricket club must be tapped and used effectively by blending such talent and energy with a core of experienced players willing to remain in a 5B team.

So much for the sermon - the first personal thanks must go to Bill Richardson, the captain for the major part of the season, who wore the three-cornered hat of captain, wicket-keeper and opening bat so perserveringly. Jimmy Tsolakis proved an opener of class whose technique was a good example for others to follow (except for the last match!). Graeme Spender, after a word in the ear of the new captain from an unnamed Jim McLachlan, was promoted to opener and assumed the role famously but was disappointed when asked to leave his shovel behind when batting.

Jim McLachlan performed well in all three areas of the game and was a mainstay of the team, playing good balls with the straightest pad I've ever seen. His brother 'Sandy' who joined the team at the final part of the season, chimed in with some good scores and is a player to watch. The two Muralis (the two Ronnies?), Nagarajan and Varatharajan, always played the game with great enthusiasm and their telepathic calling whilst batting together was a sight to amaze. When bowling, they were known to opposition scorers as No. 7 and No. 8.

The bowlers were keen all year, with John Sciberras showing flashes of the aggression and hostility needed from an opening bowler. He bowled 125 overs for 14 wickets and Wally Reynolds had a similar wicket haul as well as scoring almost 200 runs, a good double. Mark "Random" Sample dished out a similar concoction to opposing batsmen and he's already working on his left-arm chinaman for next year.

Murali Varatharajan (No.8) shows good promise and with guidance should show better returns from his bowling. Jim McLachlan, always steady with his off-spin, bowled long stints and returned the most wicket for the season. Other bowlers who met with success were G. Price, G. Powell and No.7 (Nagarajan). Mention also of Sam Issa, who played in the second part of the season and, although, rarely bowling and batting down the list, always contributed to every game he played.

Some highlights of the season were:

- (i) the opening match against the 5A's, a game full of drama and action with umpiring and barracking as only two teams so fraternally related can provide.
- (ii) John Sciberras, after being asked by this writer to bowl late in the day and spin out the time so we wouldn't have to bat again, proceeded to whip out 4 for 4 in 3.3 overs.

- (iii) the 1979-80 5B batting debut of the (Hon. Sec.) A. McMaster.
- (iv) this writer's final triumph in mastering the writing down of the batting list of such a cosmopolitan team.

After all, it was only  $\frac{1}{2}$  a day of your time on three occasions.

Eleven cricketers on a Sunday morning at 9 o'clock in Maitland after a Dave Pratt party. Quite an achievement for a Wales team. However, this was the limit of our accomplishments. Not even Nostradamus could have envisaged our demise from the competition as identical to that of the previous year.

The initial match in our group saw the strong Belmont team (Gary Gilmour and ten others) defeated by Singleton in a low scoring match.

The Wales now entered their first game against a local XI with added confidence. After the "early" dismissal of Jacky Jourdain, the team managed to reach a total of 107, thanks to a fine innings by Dave Meagher, who was ably supported by Cliff Hangar. Tight bowling and aggressive fielding allowed us to dismiss the locals for 50. A highlight of this match was the crowd's amazement at Steve Price's run up. A simple explanation was offered, that he had to bowl round a rose bush, as a boy in his backyard, brought expressions such as "fair dinkum", "honest Anzac" and "I'll be shafted".

A birth in the quarter finals now hinged on our next game (or so we thought). Singleton was never in the hunt, enthusiastic bowling and fielding enabled us to dismiss them for 61. UNSW replied with 81 largely due to a swashbuckling innings from Wayne Masters.

At this stage, it must be pointed out that progression from the first round was by highest aggregate runs. Thus, Belmont required 127 runs against the local XI, in their final match to advance into the quarter finals ahead of the Wales. Highly unlikely after their earlier loss to Singleton. However, the unbelievable occurred. While not taking anything from Belmont's slogging ability, it does not take an adept mind to realise that the local XI with no possible hope of proceeding any further in the competition would be unable to maintain their interest and perform to the best of their ability. Therefore, a comfortable victory for Belmont and exit UNSW.

Once again, UNSW had been undefeated and were eliminated from the competition. Surely, the criteria for advancement into the quarter finals should be games won; with runs scored being only a secondary measure if teams have an equal number of wins.

Wishing Belmont's opponents good luck for the quarter final we departed. Happy to hear later that Belmont had been knocked out and a Sydney club, Bankstown, had won the competition.

It would be amiss, not to mention a Balmain cricketer who joined the ranks for the day and performed admirably. However, his name eludes me, somebody's brother I think.

TWILIGHT COMPETITION REPORT

A scribbled note in the depths of my 'Twilight Competition' folder is cryptically reflective of the past season's inaugural experiment:

- (1) Ball or balls (white or o/wise)
- (2) Scorebook:
- (3) A.A.P. contact.
- (4) Start ? tomorrow (time)
- (5) Before 4.00 (ring Ross Emerson)

At the season's end, which ran from the first round on 7 November to the fourteenth round on 27 February, a score of combinations had been used with respect to the balls used. Notwithstanding the competition's rule that a good quality 4-piece ball be used, and occasionally they were, white balls were used, hockey balls were used and, even, Jim Dixon tried to use a two-piece ball!

The Scorebook - well, we had a few scraps of paper from time to time, the remnants of which are neither worth relating nor preserving. Suffice to say that in the first round against Waverley, UNSW were probably 'specials'. Unfortunately, rain washed out play. The UNSW beat Penrith in one of the early matches and narrowly went down to Randwick. However, our successes from there on in, especially in the Randwick Cricket Club round-robin competition played between 16 January and 13 February, were infrequent. The competition incorporated six clubs, each playing the other club once. Randwick themselves were eventually winners of the competition and recipients of the prize-money kindly donated by Boyded of Randwick.

The A.A.P. contact was, in hindsight, understatedly ambitious.

Starting times were sometimes 4.30, sometimes 4 o'clock, and generally when the traffic permitted.

The fifth note underscores the problems encountered in organising umpires for the competition. I met with great difficulty in enticing some of Sydney's first-grade umpires to stand, and understandably so. I can understand any umpire being reluctant to stand at square leg with Jackie Jourdain sending full tosses down the leg side! But my difficulties were resolved in the main by the very generous and very innovative umpiring of Austin Chapman. He stood in the great majority of matches, often alone, and without his singular assistance the competition would not have progressed at all. In this respect, the Club is also much indebted to Ross Emerson who filled the vacancy on the occasions of Austin's unavailability.

Needless to say from the above remarks, the competition did not, to my mind, go as well as one would have expected. Certainly the assertion in the 'lead' in the 'Daily Telegraph' on Saturday, 10 November 1979, was not realised: 'Mid-Week Cricket is Set to Take Off'. This concept, borne out of exposure to similar exercises in the English summer, is an attractive one in that it replaces the tedious and often boring practice sessions one tolerates. It provides, or at least should provide, extra competitive involvement for some of the cricketers in the Sydney cricket structure who are so desperately starved of quality cricket.

I conclude by reiterating the opening remarks I made to this Club's committee when it first mooted the concept at committee level: "It is my belief that the Sydney cricket appetite is still not adequately catered for". Perhaps next season the competition might again eventuate. Perhaps, also, with the excellent assistance rendered by the Randwick Cricket Club, the competition might gain further acceptability. Only time will tell and only with sufficient encouragement by the respective cricket associations and clubs will the competition become viable.

MATCH AGAINST OXFORD/CAMBRIDGE - Sun/Mon  
23/24 December

Perhaps the writer may be allowed a short indulgence by way of a preliminary, but necessary, digression. UNSW opening bowler, Jim "Disco" Dixon, arrogated to himself the right to engage in his inaugural coaching session the night before the game commenced. The venue was the verandah outside the bar surrounding the Sydney University No.1 Oval where "Disco" was celebrating his side's triumph over the "alternative campus" team. He insisted upon a course of instruction about successful tossing for the skipper for the next day, which promised to be extremely warm. It would be fairly accurate to say that the skipper had been a trifle unlucky up until that stage with the toss having narrowly lost about four crucial ones in a row. "Disco" fortified with the knowledge that his instructions had been taken to heart, namely a quick-silver flick of the wrist and a generous follow-through, proceeded to familiarise himself with the amber fluid. He did so in the company of that institutionalised renegade, Geoff Kirkwood, with inevitable results.

The action switches to the next morning. The by-word was "high" - the temperature, the clouds and Kirky. The pitch was evenly grassed and for the first time in the season had been rolled out flat. The skipper faced the moment of truth with some trepidation, being ever mindful of the likely admonition from "Disco" that would greet any error of judgment. The moment of anguish was over and we elected to bat, but not before the young colt was lulled into believing that yet another bowling stint lay ahead of him. He gurgled out a complaint from his position of paralysis. When confronted with the real position he managed a wink, there was a flicker of triumph in his expression as he remembered that herein lay his first coaching triumph, and he promptly passed into a state of alcoholic slumber wherein he remained until stumps that evening. Greig Robinson, a seasoned tourist it must be said, was a trifle disappointed for he ardently subscribes to the theory that the cure for the young colt's condition was a lively spell of 20 overs at the crease.

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Mark Ray and Greg Livingstone held out a lively Oxbridge attack for 90 minutes by which time we had 56 on the board. The introduction of off-spin into the attack not only reduced the scoring rate but resulted in a middle-order collapse as we advanced from a position of comparative luxury at 0/56 to a precipitous one of 4/99 following the quick demise of Jansson, Robson, and Tout. Chris Chapman joined Livingstone and the score advanced to 161 before Chapman fell for 26. Terry Buddin scored 24 and added 40 with Livingstone for the sixth wicket. Greg Livingstone finally fell for 111, his maiden century for the club. He batted in all for just under 5½ hours and it was an innings of high merit. At no stage was he on top of the bowling (and a highly accomplished attack it was) but he showed great application and this was undoubtedly the innings when he cast off the 'promising' tag and 'came of age'. A breezy 37 run partnership by the Campbells, Richard and Steve, enabled us to declare at 8/251, soon after the start of the second day's play.

We were rewarded with an early success when Greig Robinson broke through, but the second wicket did not fall until their innings had been in progress for 3 hours and the score stood at 166. Our slip catching was nothing short of abominable and their opening batsman took full advantage of our errors, prompting the ageing "quick" Robbo to remark that he displayed "more edges than a tetrahedron". Wickets fell thereafter at fairly regular intervals, including the invaluable wicket of Paul Parker. He was in Australia as stand-by for the touring English team and on this performance alone can not be far away from forcing his way into the side. He scored a magnificent 110 in only 4 hours with 11 fours and 2 sixes. Shortly after his dismissal Oxbridge were 8/226. The 9th wicket fell at 250 and could have fallen earlier had a controversial run-out decision involving the No.10 batsman gone our way. No.10 eventually struck the winning runs for Oxbridge after we missed running out their No.11 batsman in incredible circumstances. Nonetheless, a most exciting game with a great deal of good cricket. Special mention to our spinners who almost achieved victory for us when all appeared lost. Mark May took 4/65 off 31 overs, whilst Steve Campbell managed 4/73 off 25 overs.

The two days of play were punctuated by a most pleasant buffet dinner on the Sunday evening, hosted jointly by the University, the Sports Association, and the Cricket Club. The organisers of that occasion should be thanked as should Dave Bolton from Warrane College, David Lemon, and John MacFarlane for their efforts "behind the scenes" during the game. It was their work along with the hospitality extended by club members who provided billets, which made not only this particular game, but also the entire Sydney sector of the Oxbridge tour such a success.
