

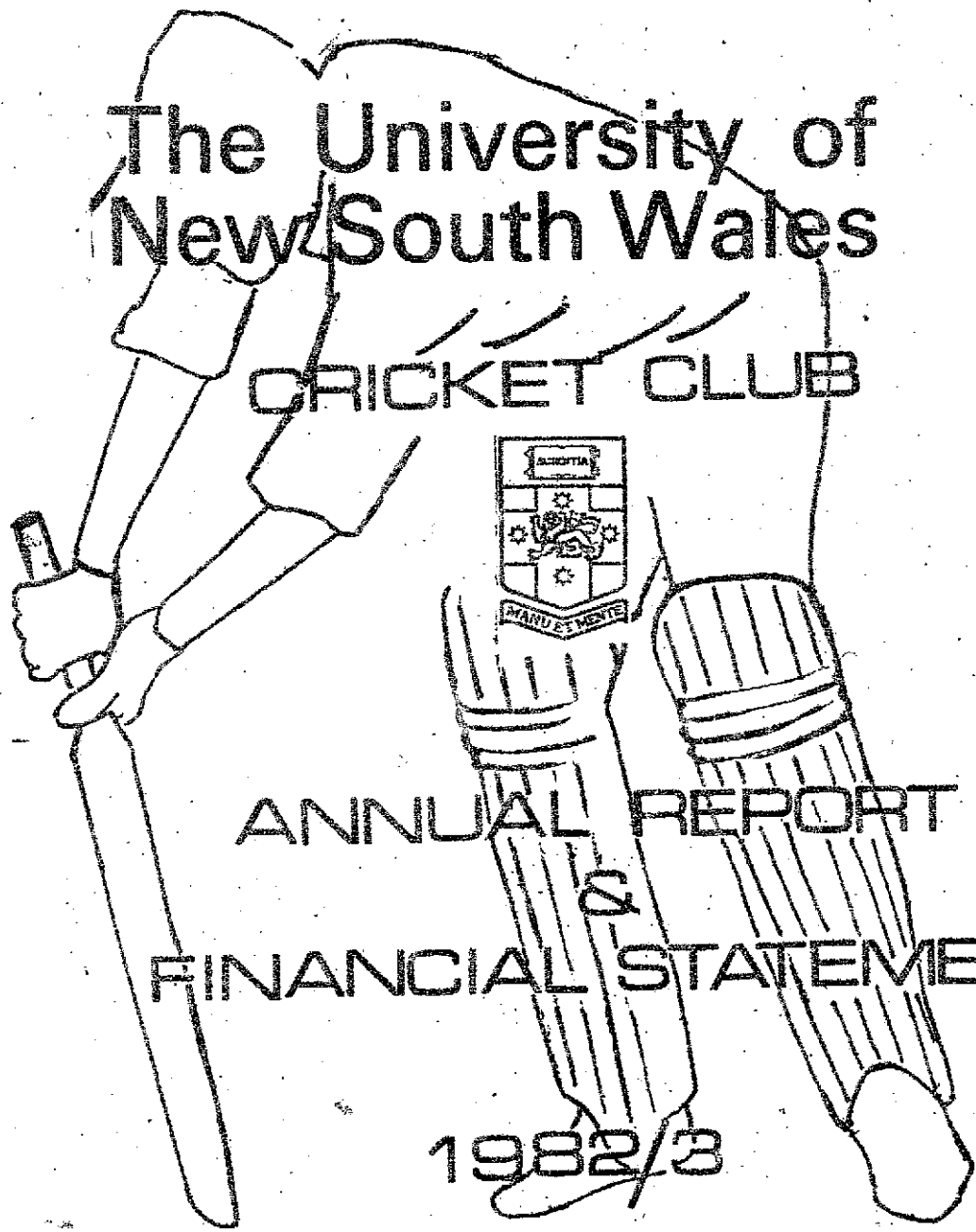

PRESIDENT'S REPORT

On the field this was not a good season for the Club. Notorious for our slow starts to a season, this past year we excelled ourselves in the mediocrity of our performances right up until the Christmas break. It was pleasing, though, that the First Grade side made a strong recovery in the second half of the season and in the end narrowly missed a berth in the Finals. The Second Grade side also improved considerably after Christmas, but lower grade sides continued to perform at a weaker level than we are accustomed.

All Clubs go through cycles, and after such a splendid start to our career in Grade Cricket we were bound to have a bad season eventually. The true test of our management and our character will be whether we can bounce back again in the coming season. I believe that we have the talent, both on and off the field, to do so provided all members put a major effort into the task. It will need commitment from all players in all grades - and perhaps we need to be far less patient with those players who do not show a real commitment to playing cricket at a high standard. Certainly, we need to tighten our collective and individual discipline at practices and insist that players at least once each week.

The highlight of the year was undoubtedly the special dinner to celebrate A Decade in Grade Cricket. A number of people put a great deal of effort into making this evening a success. It was marvellous to have with us John Rogers from Perth, Mark Ray from Hobart and Jim Robson from Launceston, not to mention dozens of former players and supporters of the Club. The Decade in Grade Cricket booklet turned out to be a splendid production - thanks to all who contributed to it and to the Publications Division of the University for its skilled and enthusiastic assistance. I doubt if any other Club in Sydney could have equalled that evening for its organisation, the quality of its speeches and the genuine warmth and friendship expressed by all who attended. We have achieved much to be proud of in our first ten years, but with hard work and pride in the University we can more than equal these achievements in the decades to come.

I will conclude by once more stressing the importance of our being a University Club. We receive magnificent support from many sections of the University. We have excellent facilities, improved last year by the addition of sightscreens to the David Phillips ground and, more importantly, because we share common interests other than our love of the game of cricket we gain so much from our involvement with the Club. We must be content, though, with nothing but the best on and off the field; and that means dominating the competition again next season.

FIRST GRADE REPORT 1982/83

All Club members realized that the loss of Mark Ray would cause serious problems for the whole club, not merely first grade. The fact that he was the Player Of The Year five years out of the last ten speaks for itself. His departure resulted in an alteration in the structure of the side. With Mark opening the batting we were able to have six specialist batsman. Now, with a full six hours of play every Saturday, five bowlers are needed and this restricted us to five batsmen.

The side struggled in the first few games for a number of reasons. Firstly, of our five bowlers, two did not have any real first grade experience and another was only half fit. Secondly, with only five specialist batsmen, at least two had to score over fifty if a respectable score was to be attained. In the first six games only three fifties were scored. Thirdly, the side was inexperienced. There were four changes to the side which played in the final of the previous year. It took half a season for the side to start playing as a side, for the new players to "fit in". Fourthly, the sides which we played in the first half of the season were by and large stronger than those which we played in the latter half. We played four state batsmen in the first two games and three of them scored 319 runs between them.

The promising feature of the season was that after such a poor start we finished only 2 points from fourth spot. As the side gained experience and confidence together with a little luck, points started to come our way.

Special thanks to David Lemon for scoring so often and as capably throughout the season. Thanks also to Tom Boyce for taking over when David was unable to attend. To those who prepared the afternoon tea, and especially to those who did so on extremely short notice, thank you.

Greg Livingstone had one of his best seasons scoring 570 runs at an average of 29.2. Five scores over fifty and excluding those five scores, a further six scores over twenty is a tribute to his consistency. All of these runs were scored when it mattered. As he pointed out on numerous occasions, his aggregate was not unlike some others, aided by "mickey mouse" second innings runs.

Jamie Baker did not start the season well but to his credit forced his way back into the side. His 66 Vs Sydney Uni. laid the foundations for an easy victory. That he finished the season better than he started in promising for next year.

Jim Robson's batting will be badly missed, about as much as we will not miss his jokes. One can only hope that "Jungle" follows Mark Ray into the Tasmanian state side. After his club record breaking 787 runs at 52.5 he deserves a chance at representative level.

Bruce Handley had one of his better seasons. So often he really looks as if he will carry on and get a big score only to play a really careless shot. His 71 against Cumberland on a seaming track was the best innings I have seen him play. Perhaps his year will be 83/84.

Asoka Wijeratne was promoted to firsts after four games and never looked like losing his place. Against Waverly his 84 without doubt won us the match. When he came in we were 4/101 and the match could have gone either way. Batting at 6 meant he didn't get the same opportunity to build on innings every week and so his averages did not reflect his value to the side with the bat.

Steve Campbell took over the "all-rounder" role. With two fifties he showed everyone that he has the ability to bat and that he simply needs the opportunity to bat in the middle. Hopefully his back injury will clear up before the start of next season as his leg spinners are an essential key to our attack.

Nigel Perger had his best season yet. He is now only the third bowler to take more than fifty wickets. In March Ray's absence, Nigel bowled far more overs than he has in past seasons and revelled in the extra work load. Ten wickets in the last "real" match of the season was outstanding. He must overcome his problem with no-balls. A sentence from the 1977-78 report is applicable. "Once Lawson's no-batting problem was solved - he simply put his foot 12 inches behind the line, his improvement was prodigious."

Jim Dixon started the season with a knee injury and was not able to recapture his old form apart from two unbelievably gutsy performances; one against Bankstown and the other against St. George. Hopefully both his batting and bowling will improve next year.

Mark Hamwood had a mixed season. He started poorly but improved dramatically. By the end of the season he was bowling a good line and length as well as batting well at number 8.

Mick Kilborn came into the side for the last six games. He will, if he puts his mind to it, score a lot of runs next season.

Chris Hanger once again proved that he is one of the best wicket keepers in Sydney.

Mark Hoy contributed to the teams success with steady accurate bowling. He will start next year a far better bowler than he started this one because he is now able to bowl accurately and move the ball in the air and off the pitch.

Andrew Dillon filled in admirably for Chris Hanger behind the stumps. His batting displays confirmed that his spot is No. 11. Experience will teach him not to sledge the skipper!

SECOND GRADE TEAM REPORT 82/83

The Seconds this year enjoyed a mixed bag of success. We started the season quite well but from the third round we played very poorly to achieve only 1 win out of 9. Thankfully, we picked up our form in the later part of the season, winning 5 out of the last 7 matches. This meant for the season we had a tally of 2 draws, 6 wins and 8 losses. While this is only a mediocre result we can take comfort in our dramatic improvement in the later part of the season.

While we should not blame misfortune on our early losses, the toss of the coin does have an effect on some matches, in the first 9 games we could only manage one win of the toss. This meant that we were mostly put in a position of chasing runs which puts a lot more pressure on the batting. I also feel the team was not balanced in the early part of the season due in part to the selection of 4 pace bowlers in the 1st XI and our lack of a recognised opening batsman.

Looking at the statistics one can easily see that our biggest problem all season was our batting. Jock Martell finished the season as our highest run scorer yet it was Jock's own worst season ever. The average partnerships show this weakness all the way down the order. To win matches we must occupy the crease far far longer even at the expense of a slower run rate.

Our bowling attack this year was basically sound, though lacking variety. It was unfortunate that Steve Price could not produce his top form and we suffered all year from a lack of penetrative slow bowling.

There were many highlights in the season both by the team as a whole and by individual members. In general the team can be congratulated for keeping the pressure on in the field in tight situations. The fielding on most occasions was very good and enthusiastic. Our win over Balmain by 2 runs was a real cliff hanger and a superb team effort.

It is my pleasure to report some of the best fielding I have seen in grade cricket, particularly by Bruce Everett, whose all round fielding ability is fantastic. Bruce took brilliant catches in the slips and gully, fielded like a terrier in the covers and also filled in as keeper most admirably, he took a record 17 catches and easily won the Club's fielding award for the season. With Bruce in the team it was hard for others to have a chance in the fielding awards, however Bill Hetherington also fielded brilliantly, taking spectacular catches in the slips especially, and kept neck and neck with Bruce throughout the year in the fielding points. As well as these two, we had Mike Kilborn who makes fielding look easy and Andy Dillon who took 8 catches behind the wicket in only 2 games, and gave a superb keeping display which earned him a well deserved 1st XI position. Apart from these players I would like to thank all players for a generally enthusiastic effort on the field.

The imbalance at the start of the season was rectified when we promoted Clayton Jones to open the innings and we received first Mark Hamwood and then Mark Ho from the first XI to give us more penetration in attack. Clayton gave us much needed solidity at the start of the innings which helped our winning chances immensely. Both Mark Hamwood and Mark Hoy bowled well and gave us a winning edge after their inclusion in the side. Mark Hamwood also batted very well before his promotion back to the first XI.

The real highlight of the year as far as the team is concerned, I suppose, was our win over Balmain by 2 runs. Balmain had selected a very strong team and were probable semi-finalists before Glenn Clark sent them packing with a

fine spell of medium-fast bowling, taking 4-16 off 15.3 overs. The team fielded very well and kept the pressure on right till the finish. Apart from Balmain we had easy wins over Mosman, Sutherland and Cumberland and tight wins over Wests and Waverley.

In all, 29 players played in the seconds, which is too many for a concerted, cohesive team effort, however I feel we have enough good players to form a stronger combination next year and we should definitely improve on this years performance. At this point I would like to voice what I feel is a team opinion that the official watering hole be transferred "back to the Cracknell" as a matter of urgency and I feel this would help retrieve the feeling of comraderie which has slipped slightly since our move away from the Cracknell - a move which virtually eliminated those players with wives, Children and girlfriends from staying back after the game. I would also like to thank all those wives, mothers and friends who helped at afternoon tea, without their great support our Saturday afternoons would not have been quite so enjoyable.

THIRD GRADE REPORT 1982/83

Again it is the task of the author of this report to utter those immortal words, "a season that promised so much and produced so little." Only four wins were forthcoming in what amounted to the worst performed third grade side for at least the last six years. The team at season's start seemed to be brimful of talent and confidence and yet at season's end our lowly position denied this.

This can be explained by firstly the number of personnel used, 38 players represented the club in 3rd Grade, a number far too high to maintain stability and consistent performance. Also the criteria for elevation to the next grade was not high enough and many players represented in higher grades whose performance did not warrant selection. This was brought about by many players not making a full season's commitment to the club; hopefully this will be overcome next season.

Finally the team lacked consistency in all facets of the game; batting, bowling and fielding. Few times throughout the season did we come close to reaching our potential in all 3 areas in the one game, the 2 exceptions being the games against Cumberland and Wests, where wins resulted with good all-round performances.

In order to win matches on David Phillips field teams must bat very well and "accumulate" runs with a responsible approach, then bowl with consistency on a thankless wicket, but at all times maintain pressure, no matter what the score, with tight and enthusiastic fielding. This formula was not adhered to, with batting at times brilliant, yet lacking consistency and at times very brittle under pressure, especially in the lower order. While our bowling was tradesman like on a difficult wicket, we lacked a spearhead. Also the catching & ground fielding let us down at important times.

Unfortunately this report is beginning to sound like something of a dirge and this would not reflect the season's performances. Considering the team has lost so many experienced players and with a required influx of new players, whose performances augers well for next year. In the final analysis the captain and players in next season's team, must regain that "hunger" for 6 points and not let winning positions slip by, as 6 games were lost by the smallest of margins.

Looking at the players who formed the nucleus of the team one must initially mention Rob Stark, our fiery quick, whose "psycho" proportions even surpassed that of last season. Rob is an extremely talented cricketer, whose aggression and enthusiasm shines through. But if he can temper his approach somewhat, a first grade spot is not too far away.

Ian Kellaway started the season slowly but recorded centuries in Rounds 10 & 11 to show his old touch in setting a UNSW 3rd grade record with an average of 48.38. Kell has been a fine player and a valued servant of the club and I hope he will be persuaded to return in 1983-84.

Mick Ryan whose season was mixed. Success on the one hand, capturing the 3rd grade bowling trophy; failure on the other, in not succeeding in 2nd grade. Hopefully Mick will treat this season as a banning process and come back more determined next year to become an entrenched 2nd grade bowler. Also his batting, which has had more snags than Wally Lewis, was disappointing this year.

Clayton Jones is always consistent and whose season in 3rd grade ended with a faultless innings, against a Cumberland attack who kept insisting he had a weakness on leg stump and found it 159 runs later. Also he has been known to bowl the odd tidy over.

Ian Calcraft defies description after a superb debut innings of 96. He needs to be more determined and concentrate harder in the early part of his innings, but an amazing player when in full flight. Calcraft stories abound, giving an insight into his character, but "Who was that Geoff Henry fellow" must top the lot.

John Ingleson a sterling club man, who always gives 110 per cent. Many younger players could do no wrong by following John's determined approach, when on a cricket field.

Leon Darmody for a player with his capabilities, he did not enjoy a profitable season and should have scored many more runs, this will only occur with greater application in the practice wickets.

Mick Clarke; the only thing Mwck scored this season was a wife. Congratulations and hopefully some Robson magic will rub-off and he will again become a more than a useful campaigner for the club.

Geoff Garland & Greig Robinson who have given the club many years of valiant service and will continue to do so based on this year's performances. I have been proud to have played with and learnt from these gentlemen of the game (note: Greig, I apologise for grouping you with G2 your'e not that old).

Phil Day & Peter Scolari both showed touches of brilliant batting, but must learn to turn starts into large scores. Also both turned in some marvellous fielding performances.

Appearances were also made by Martin Polin - 3 games for three 50's, an excellent competition; Ian 'Kyogle' Smith - had limited opportunities to impress, should establish himself in higher grades in the coming season; Peter 'Jackie' Jourdan, who made a welcome return to the club, he is always determined whether battling in fielding and is an excellent team player. Also Greg Holt, John Walker & David Thew where appearances were brief but whose bovious talent and enthusiasm shone out.

Thank you to all players appearing in the following lists and a special note of thanks to Ian Kellaway for his timeless efforts as Teams Secretary.

A final word about the state of the David Phillips wickets, which were nothing short of superb for the whole season, providing some of the best cricket wickets I have played on. This surely must be the best 3rd & 4th grade ground in Sydney, my thanks go to the groundsmen for their successful efforts and interest throughout the year in providing such wickets.

FIFTH GRADE A - 1982-83 SEASON

This years 5As did not emulate the record of the previous season finishing about half way. This result was a reflection of the Club as a whole, and certainly a result of losing numerous fine players from all grades without the necessary gains.

Again, as in recent years the 5th Grade competition has grown in strength and standard. The closeness of most teams has resulted in a fine competition worthy of far greater support, encouragement and extension from the N.S.W.C.A.

Whilst finishing halfway, 3-4 games could have easily gone the other way and a semi final berth, but luck and ability were not present at the crunch.

A pleasing aspect was the number of young players who progressed through 5th grade to higher grades, and this progression will enable us to build and strengthen in future seasons. Of the 36 players who represented 5As, 18 finished the season in higher grades (2nds - 2, 3rds - 5, 4ths - 11) and 9 players were available only for a few games.

As in past seasons and typical of uni cricket young players are encouraged and promoted more rapidly than more traditional grade clubs. This indeed is good and must be fostered provided results are obtained because in the final analysis its results, not the promise of them that count.

The state of 5th Grade Cricket is such that the N.S.W.C.A. should consider dividing the existing 20 team competition into a 5th and 6th grade competition of 10 teams each. This would enable home and away games without requiring additional grounds or expenditure merely on exercise and administration.

Of the nearly 40 players that represented the club in the 5As, some deserve special mention and thanks. With the Captain, A. Taylor, P. James and R. Merrell we may have lacked speed in the field but fielded the most experienced side in grade cricket. My thanks to the old brigade and as can be seen from the statistics all performed well, also the experience and guidance for younger players will benefit the club in future seasons.

Kris Gale bowled well and deserved the trophy and perhaps as the pressure of 21st birthday parties recede, should find a permanent place in higher grades.

Others that bowled well and should progress are Martin Dyball, Geoff Silk, Mark Woodley and Michael Wymer.

The batting was thin, lacking in consistency and suffered by the number of players only playing a few games.

Whilst the achievement of the 5As could have been better, an important function of the 5th grade - to bring on new talent for higher grades - was successful and of great benefit to the club.

As in past years the important point for new players and more experienced players is to be available for the whole season so that performances can be maintained and built on.

To all who played in the 5As my thanks for an enjoyable season, both on and off the field.

Day Four - Narooma, New Years Day

Day Five - Cricket! - Narooma

Day Six - return to Sydney

We left Narooma with regrets and hangovers. Our last sight of the local folk was E.T.'s double bed, which contained, shall we say, more than it was designed to accommodate. The tour was aborted for a day to recuperate for the campbelltown game.

FINALE - Campbelltown

The only full game of cricket on tour was played against strong opposition on a good wicket at Campbelltown. Guest appearances were made by JR, Starky and Chook Ryan, Wales batting first once again, made 203 of the allotted overs, with Dave Meagher starring with a dashing 80 odd (not before calling for the helmet against the local hormone quickie). Jungle showed glimpses of form with 40, and Kyogle "gutsed" it out in the opening spot for 26. Campbelltown looked for all the world like winners at 2-170, but Jungle, inspired by the presence of JR, applied the pressure and the opposition buckled to a 3 run defeat. Jungle bowled tightly, as did Kyogle and Chook, and Disco put in a piery display of quick bowling. A competitive end to a tour that had everything except cricket.


