### THE PRESIDENT'S REPORT

entlemen:

The Fourteenth Annual Report and Financial Statement of the Unitersity of New South Wales Cricket Club are presented herewith for your approval.

During the 1963/64 season the Club participated in the Municipal and Shires Competition in the A and B Divisions and also fielded two teams which played one-day matches organized by the City and Suburban Cricket Association.

Last season was the most successful in the Club's history. gained fourth place in the Municipal and Shires Club Championship. 1st XI reached the semi-finals for the second successive year and gained fourth place. The 2nd XI recorded the first premiership win for This team's victory over Epping by an innings and 53 runs in the final was all the more remarkable since Epping had a lead of 28 points over University at the completion of the semi-finals. final game the Epping Captain, Ray Rowell, our opponent of many years and one of the many true gentlemen who have played against us in the Municipal and Shires Competition, described our team in this match as the strongest combination he had seen in the B division. I should like to take this opportunity of congratulating my old friend Ray on passing his Club's record aggregate of almost 5000 runs during the match against us in the fourth round.

The success of the 2nd XI was in no small measure due to the leadership of Harold Bundy who moulded his team into a really fine combination by the end of the season. It is fitting that the first team to win a premiership was led by Harold who was one of the foundation members of the Club, which began by fielding a team in the City and Suburban Competition in 1951-2. In scaring 592 runs with innings of 133, 144, 92, 63 and 48 (in the final) Harold set an example of concentration and purposeful aggression. No mean factor in Harold's own and his team's success was his insistence on regular attendance at practice. I cannot overemphasise the importance of practice to individuals and teams desirous of doing their best. I hope that, with the excellent facilities we now have available for practice, all Club members will do their utmost to practise regularly.

During the season two Intervarsity matches were played. The match against Queensland at Brisbane was lost by one wicket and the match against New England at Kensington was drawn. An unofficial match against the Australian National University at Canberra was won on the first innings. The annual match against Newcastle University College at Newcastle was drawn due to rain.

The Third Annual Dinner was held in the University Union on 9th April. The speakers were Mr. S.G. Webb, Q.C. of the New South Wales Cricket Association, Mr. David de Carvalho of Paddington District Cricket Club,

Mr. George Borwick, a Vice-President of the Club and former Test umpire, and Mr. Barry Andrews of our Club.

The Executive Committee of the Club has made a formal application to the New South Wales Cricket Association for admission to the District Grade Competition. The Executive Committee initiated a move for the formation of a C (i.e. a third) division in the Municipal and Shires competition. This move met with the unanimous approval of the other Shire Clubs and at a meeting of all Clubs at Brian's Clubrooms, Burwood, a committee was formed to pursue this matter with the New South Wales Cricket Association. At this stage it seems likely that the Competition will embrace a third division in 1964-65.

During the coming season the Club will have the use of the University Oval, Kensington and two grounds at the David Phillips Fields, Daceyville. Prince Henry Oval will not be available in the early part of the season at least, as new wickets are to be laid there.

On behalf of the Executive Committee, I wish to thank the Amenities Officer, Mr. Cracknell and his staff, particularly Mrs. Stevens, for their help and co-operation at all times. I should like to make special mention of Mr. Frank Gaskell, the groundsman at Kensington and record our thanks to him for all his hard work and to congratulate him on producing some really good wickets during the season. I wish to thank also Randwick and Paddington District Clubs for their continued interest in our Club.

I feel that the lean years of the Club are behind us and we can look forward to increased membership and to an even stronger Club and to many more pleasant days in the sun playing the game which Lord Harris described as "more free from anything sordid, anything dishonourable, than any game in the world."

#### FIRST XI REPORT

For the second season in succession the 1st XI won its way to the Municipal and Shires Semi-Finals, only to meet defeat this year at the hands of the ultimate premiers, Auburn-Lidcombe. Prior to the semi-final, the team showed an ability to rise to the occasion by winning games in which a win was essential for a semi-final berth, and this helped to instil confidence in the side as to its winning chances in the semi-final and final. But even though our bowlers, especially Peter Ward and John Middleton did a magnificent job in dismissing Auburn-Lidcombe for 138 and 199, our batsmen failed to capitalise on their efforts and the match was lost.

Whilst not lamenting any further on the sem-final defeat, the team showed on performances during the season that it definitely possesses players with the ability to win the Competition and should make a reality in the coming seasons of that long-awaited Premiership win. Certainly it was an encouraging season for the team as, of the 14 matches played, 7 were won (1 outright), 3 drawn and 4 were lost. The First XI this season included six players who were members of last year's semi-finalist first grade side, but it was extremely unfortunate for the team to lose one of those players, Professor Salmon early in the season and his inspiring leadership and experience were immediately missed.

After experiencing a rather indifferent beginning to the season with a win, a draw and two first innings losses to Auburn and Epping in the first four matches, the team rallied to win six of the next nine matches, two of which were drawn. The match which was lost was against Roseville, the Competition runners—up. Some fine individual performances were recorded during the season and I feel sure that these performances were inspired to a certain extent by the exceptional team spirit and improved fielding.

Three players in their first season with the Club, Kevin Daly, Max Gosling and Bob Ballantyne performed particularly well, especially Daly, who topped the run-scoring for the 1st XI and Gosling, whose plucky knock against Burwood was instrumental in placing the side in a winning position in that match. John Pigott scored a fine, hard-hitting century against Lane Cove, the only century scored for the team in the season. But it was frequently the bowlers upon whom the onus was thrown to dismiss the opposition for a moderate score, and this job was performed so well that no team was able to score over 200 runs in an innings against them in the last ten matches.

I would like to thank Professor Kemp, our Vice-Captain, for his invaluable assistance during the season, as well as the members of the team for their co-operation at all times - the two contributing factors to an enjoyable and successful season.

### SECOND XI REPORT

The "B" Shire team won the 1963/64 Premiership when it defeated Epping by an innings and 51 runs in the Final played at Epping Oval. This was the first Final in which a side from this University had played and each man in the side had good reason for feeling proud as we walked from the field at the end of the game. This match brought good performances from all eleven players, with really outstanding work being done by Ian Lowe, Ian Potter and Ray Bayfield with the ball and by Graham Sylvester, Bob Smith, Don Clark, Bob Ballantyne and Jim Hollington, in putting together the most formidable total of 333.

The semi-final played against Burwood at Rothwell Park also brought out the best in every man in the team with Graham Sylvester, Tim Creer, Don Clark and Bruce Dockrill batting their way to a total which was too good for any side that had to deal with bowlers of the calibre of Ian Potter, Ian Lowe, Ray Bayfield, Frank Martin, Bruce Dockrill and Don Clark.

Since we reached the semi-finals by a margin of only one point, it is easy to see just how important was the contribution made by each player who played with the side. In particular the team owes a debt of gratitude to Stan Livingstone whose bowling helped beat Lane Cove in the second round; and whose determined batting saved us from defeat against both Sutherland and Roseville. Also to Harris Boulton for a fighting innings against Lindfield that saved us from what appeared to be certain defeat and to Dennis Lane for his last wicket stand against Roseville, and his bowling (particularly against Ryde) which was at times unplayable.

Our batting throughout the season was held together by three players, Graham Sylvester, Tim Creer and Don Clark. Graham played his first innings of importance when he rescued us from possible defeat at the hands of Sutherland with a solid 60 not out. Later, against Ryde, he made his first (it will not be the last) century for the Club with 126 not out. His innings of 59 against Lindfield helped avert defeat and with an immaculate 85 in the final, he virtually killed any chance that Epping had of getting back into the game. During the season his fielding has been brilliant and his exhibition of wicket-keeping in the final, after practically no experience, was remarkable.

The need for a new 'keeper arose when Clem Barrington was injured during the course of the semi-final. Since this was the fourth match in which Clem did not play, his effort in obtaining a record number of dismissals for a season in the Second XI is most commendable.

Tim Creer started the season under a cloud, and the way in which he fought to establish himself in the side was typical of the way in which he fought the opposition's bowlers throughout the season. Not only did his determination save the side on quite a few occasions, it netted him nearly 300 runs at an average of 36. These results showed other players that they too could benefit from "T.C's" nose to the grindstone method, with the result that our batting no longer appeared to have a tail. As well as being one of our best batsmen Tim, together with Stan Livingstone and Clem Barrington, did nearly all of the "off the field" work necessary for the running of the side. Our chances of success were most certainly enhanced by this kind of support and to each of these men I say "Thank You".

### SECOND XI REPORT (continued)

The outstanding all-rounder of the season was Don Clark who had probably his best season to date with the bat and certainly his best season as a bowler. With 297 runs at an average of 29.7 and 24 wickets at an average of 14.9 Don would have won a place in the side as either batsman or bowler. Don repeatedly bowled the opposition's better batsmen, often with unplayable balls, and if he can rid his bowling of its occasional looseness, his ability to penetrate will make him a match winner in any class of cricket.

The team's most successful bowler was Ian Lowe with 28 wickets at an average of 13.4. His better performances include 5 for 19 in the Final and 6 for 32 against Sutherland. Apart from his natural ability as a bowler, Ian has a fighting spirit which enables him to bowl all day if required and, in doing just that against Lindfield, he gave the best exhibition of sustained fast bowling (21 overs) that I have seen in Shire cricket.

Another of our more successful bowlers was Ray Bayfield who took 16 wickets at an average of 10.4. His whirlwind innings of 72 runs in 45 minutes against Lane Cove showed what a great all-rounder he is.

We were most fortunate in securing the services of Ian Potter towards the end of the season. In three matches he secured 15 wickets at an average of 12.9 and showed himself to be the best bowler we have seen in B shires. I doubt if there is any truth in the rumour that he was sentenced to transportation to N.S.W. for the serious offence of bursting umpires ear drums.

A team spirit stronger than any that I have experienced before was undoubtedly the greatest single factor in our success and I am sure that it was a determination on the part of each man to not let the team down that accounts for the unusually high batting averages for this season. It was this same determination that gave us the tail end fighting knocks (notably by Barrington, Bayfield, Lane and Livingstone) that more than once saved the side. While the winning of the Premiership was a wonderful way in which to end the season, I feel that our greatest reward has come from being able to play cricket together. To each man who helped build this team spirit and who, in so doing, made my task as captain both simple and enjoyable, I wish to express my sincere thanks.

In closing this report, I feel that I should comment on the attitude of our rivals in the semi-final and in the final. Their gracious acceptance of defeat taught us something of sportsmanship which I am sure we will not quickly forget.

### CAPTAIN'S REPORT

### INTERVARSITY

### UNIVERSITY OF NEW SOUTH WALES VS UNIVERSITY OF NEW ENGLAND

New England won the toss and elected to bat on the newly prepared strip. Overnight rain had made the wicket greasy and it was imperative that New South Wales bowlers make the best of any early life in the wicket before it dried out into its usual docility. New South Wales also had the possibility of having last use of a wicket which was not expected to last the full three days.

Honours were shared evenly between bat and ball during New England's first innings. Barlow, Dudley, Cook and Long had all batted extremely well but fortunately their innings were terminated by persistent, but often inaccurate bowling by the New South Wales attack. Had New England bats concentrated a little more after reaching scores when batsmen start to annihilate an attack the final score may have been considerably greater. The most successful bowlers for New South Wales were Martin 3-51 and Garland 4-59.

The wicket on the second day had dried out considerably but New South Wales found difficulty in scoring runs quickly to consolidate a winning position. Two factors contributed to this, MacDonald's accurate fast medium swing bowling and the slowness of the pitch which made frontfoot play somewhat innocuous. Sylvester put together a solid 51, Rodgers played many delightful shots before a lapse in concentration cost him his wicket after he had made 37. Farraday broke a long drought when he made 55 with some tremendous shots off the back foot. The New South Wales innings folded after Vagg and Garland had made the tail waggle, for 255.

New England slumped to 4-28 early in its second innings to make the lead of 60 on the first innings by New South Wales a little more formidable. At 4-28 the New England bats decided to take control of the match. After rain had delayed the start of play on the third day until after lunch New England bats continued to look supremely confident. Hussey declared at 7-232 after Cook had belted the attack between cover and third man before being dismissed for 99 - this was a wonderful fighting knock by him to put New England back into the match after their very shaky start. Cook was ably supported by Long and Hussey. Martin broke through quickly with the second new ball and finished with 4-83. Lowe had bowled with fire but luck was not with him to finish with 2-54.

The declaration gave New South Wales a fighting chance provided the early batsmen settled in quickly. The recognised batsmen appeared to have left all semblance of technique in the pavilion and were soon facing the possibility of defeat. Fortunately a face-savings innings of 8 not out by Garland in 83 minutes saw New South Wales save the game. MacDonald again bowled well for his 3-19 along with Hussey, who used the wicket well to finish with 3-21.

Both teams extend their thanks to the ladies for providing such appetising lunches.

### INTER/VARSITY CRICKET REPORT

### U.N.S.W. vs Q.U.C.C. - played at Brisbane 14-16th December 1963.

Queensland University entertained the University of N.S.W. in Brisbane on the occasion of the annual intervarsity match. Fortunately the sun shone for the duration of what proved to be one of the most exciting matches ever played on the St. Lucia Oval.

After an uneventful first night, N.S.W. won the toss on the opening morning and decided to bat. We ought to have scored more runs in the first innings, even allowing for the fact that the openers were dismissed cheaply. Ballantyne, batting at an elevated position in the order, Levi, Andrews and Pigott all "got a start" and quite a substantial one at that, but all managed to get themselves/in the thirties. Still, the first day closed not unsatisfactorily for the visitors who, having been dismissed for 191 captured four cheap Queensland wickets before the end of play for only 20 runs.

After an evening of solid planning led by March, Pigott and Chegwyn, our diligence was rewarded on the following morning when Queensland were all out just before <u>lunch</u> (magnificent affairs, by the way, on all three days, thanks to Brendan Moore). Only Doug Broadfoot (54) made any contribution to the Queensland total of 106. For N.S.W. Lowe and Gilbert (3) headed an inspired attack which shared the wickets.

N.S.W. began their second innings 85 in front and this must have played on our minds because we batted extremely badly. Pigott completed a good double by scoring 23, but it was left to Gosling 33 and Garland (16 n.o. in 145 minutes) to lead N.S.W. from 7-69 to a final second innings tally of 129.

This left Queensland 215 to get and plenty of time in which to get them. The opposing skipper, Don McNee made up for a first innings failure by scoring 65, but N.S.W. were still well in it at tea. Popular 'keeper, Ian Macquire (55) and Allan Jones then were associated in a long sixth wicket partnership, which swung the balance and only 15 runs were needed with five wickets remaining. Then the unbelievable happened — March came on to bowl and he bowled Jones and Macquire in the one over. Garland was rewarded for a long and accurate spell and took two more in three balls, so that Queensland still wanted 3 runs to win in the second—last over of the match, when the last batsmen came in. Much to the delight of the Queensland team, this Khan managed to do, and a most enjoyable and enthralling game was over.

## AUSTRALIAN NATIONAL UNIVERSITY VS UNIVERSITY OF NEW SOUTH WALES R E P O R T

For this match, the inaugural clash between these two Universities, the University of New South Wales team travelled to Canberra on the Anniversary Day weekend in January and played the two-day game at the Australian National University Oval.

The team was a particularly strong one, as it included ten members from the 1st and 2nd XI's and a "guest" player, Tony O'Loan, from the University of Queensland. Tony topscored for the Combined Australian Universities against the South African cricketers and he proved his form only too well in Canberra.

On winning the toss the University of New South Wales batted first and after an opening partnership of 82 by Bob Smith and John Chegwyn and a magnificent fourth wicket stand between O'Loan and Kevin Daly, was in a strong position at tea with 3 wickets down for 211. Daly, with strong pulling to the leg boundary and O'Loan's powerful off driving left an impression on the Canberra players in more ways than one. Intelligent and entertaining batting later on by Geoff Garland and Harris Boulton left University of N.S.W. at the end of the day 7-317, made on a wicket which was certainly in favour of the batsmen and was to remain so for the remainder of the game.

A.N.U. made a bright start the following morning before Dennis Lane finally began to peg the batsmen down and bowled splendidly for 12 continuous overs in the heat to finish with 2 for 45. Geoff Garland and Bob Ballantyne capitalised on Lane's breakthrough to have the Canberra team 6-118 at lunch and their innings was finally terminated an hour short of the tea adjournment when Geoff Garland bowled Bob Alexander, their most impressive batsman in this innings for 34. Ballantyne bowled intelligently and was instrumental in tying the batsmen down to making a score of 165.

A.N.U. followed on and fully demonstrated their batting capabilities for the remainder of play, making 3-194 in a little over two hours. Geoff Garland capped a fine match by capturing two wickets and proved the most penetrating bowler in this innings. Neil Tuckwell, however, set about our bowlers in no uncertain manner and made a hard-hitting 64 (8 fours and 1 six) before finally being run out after batting for 35 minutes.

Both teams are to be congratulated on the truly sportsmanlike and enjoyable manner in which this game was played and we look forward to perhaps returning Canberra's hospitality next season.
