

PRESIDENT'S REPORT

Ladies & Gentlemen:

The Twenty Ninth Annual Report and Financial Statement of the University of New South Wales Cricket Club is hereby presented for your approval and adoption.

The 1978/79 season was probably the most successful season the club has had in the Sydney Grade Cricket Competition. This success both for the club and the University is a further consolidation of our achievements of past seasons.

Whilst not achieving the ultimate premiership in any grade, the winning of the Club Championship, based on all four grades was a tremendous club effort. Three teams reached semi-finals from which two reached the finals without success.

The Club Championship from a total club view, is the ultimate trophy and compares most favourably with past premiership victories, congratulations to all club members and supporters. The strength shown in the lower grades, which was a significant factor in our victory, gives the club great depth and prospects for future seasons; a strength upon which to build for years to come.

The success of the past season is a reflection of the support and facilities provided by the University, for all the help and support of the University and Staff, our thanks. Special mention should be made to the assistance and encouragement given the club by our Patron, the Vice Chancellor, Prof. R. Myers; Sports Association and Ian Moutray, Student Amenities - for all their help - many thanks.

First Grade did not achieve the success of past seasons, finishing eighth. Whilst being a strong side, the availability of regular members of the side fluctuated during the season and some players did not achieve the potential shown in earlier seasons. The strength shown in lower grades will be reflected in First Grade next season following a limited rebuilding due to availability of players.

Congratulations to Jock Martel and his Second Grade side, in following last seasons premiership with a berth in the final and finishing 2nd. To back up as premiers and finish 2nd is a fine result and credit to the players. The team was a good blending of youth and experience, a fine basis for future development and club strength.

Congratulations to John Ingleson and his Third Grade side, in reaching the final and finishing 2nd. This is the best Third Grade result achieved by the club and as stated earlier a fine basis for the future. Special mention should be made of the fine judgement shown by the lower order batsman in agreeing to a light appeal when 9 wickets down in the Semi Final. This decission clinched the Club Championship and to some extent compensated for the lack of a premiership.

Congratulations to the Fourth Grade side again as with Third Grade, the best ever result achieved by the club in this grade. Fourth Grade reached the Semi-Final from 2nd position and ultimately losing the Semi and finishing 3rd. The Semi-Final

was one of the finest games of cricket played at David Phillips and I would like to thank all players of the 4th Grade for a fine effort and season - certainly one of the best teams that I have been connected with.

Fifth Grade did not achieve the success of past seasons, however the results obtained in the higher grades are a complement to both Peter James and Tony McKendry. Being at the end of the selection process is always difficult, but the support, encouragement and bringing through of players were a significant factor in the results obtained by the club.

It is proposed to rearrange the C & S programme from last year by:

- A. Playing more games
- B. Playing on Saturday

This programme will give more cricket to more players and bring C & S into line with the rest of the club, also further games may be arranged on Sundays for both C & S team and others.

The Poidevin-Gray Shield team did not emulate the success of past seasons, but at times did play well. The Committee feels this competition requires some re-planning and extended to an under 23 years of age competition.

Socially the club enjoyed a good season with numerous functions thoroughly enjoyed by those attending. Culmination of the social part of the season was the Annual Dinner again the highlight of the season with 70 people attending; our guest of honour was Mr. Ross Edwards, Australian Test Cricketer who helped to make this a most enjoyable function. I would like to thank the management of the Union and club members for all their assistance in making this event such a success. The club was further honoured to have for the second time, the Chancellor, Mr. Justice Samuels and continuing the tradition established in 1978.

1978-79 saw the number of Blues Winners increase to 23 with the awarding of a Blue in Cricket to Georf Lawson, to Geoff congratulations.

The continued representative honours attained by Geoff Lawson and Greg Watson in the N.S.W. Sheffield Shield Team is a credit to both players and a comment on the strength of the club - to both players congratulations.

A highlight of the season was the hosting by the club of the resurected Cricket Inter-varsity, however the weather was not cooperative and seriously interrupted the scheduled matches. Socially the Carnival proved a great success and it is hoped that having taken this step the annual carnival may be maintained and offer the competition and social contact such an event fosters. Many thanks to all who helped and spent numerous hours organising this carnival.

Financially, the club had a sound year, again the volume of monies handled increased to past years and from the balance sheet (enclosed) the position of the club is good, however more effort must be made to collect money when due. The club again thanks Ralph Merrell, for all his work in keeping the enterprise afloat and progressing.

Many people gave of their time and exercy to make this year the success that it was both on and off the field. To all mamy thanks.

I would like to acknowledge the efforts of my fellow members of the committee for a most productive year and all their help in making the club and system function so well and smoothly.

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We look forward to 1979-80 season with confidence, knowing we have consolidated past achievements, reached new levels of success, but ready to progress to higher achievements and further consolidate the position of the club in the Sydney Grade Cricket Competition.

FIRST GRADE REPORT 1978 - 79

Another year of super cricket, at times the best we've played, even given the usual appalling start.

From Round 6 we played like premiers, but the price of being the most feared side was that this time the breaks didn't come, and Premiers we were not to be.

After five games we had a solitary win, but within 3 games (and the New Year) we were incredibly third.

Three times in the next four games, despite high quality cricket, victory eluded us. Sutherland took advantage of our halftime 2 for 200 closure to pass us eight wickets down; Northern Districts gave us 13 overs less to bat in a one day game and we finished 4 runs short; whilst Premiers Penrith were delighted with their draw, 26 runs and 2 wickets behind, despite receiving 13 more overs.

But why do we start so badly? Perhaps we're too cocky, perhaps it's exams, but whatever, it continually takes half a dozen games and a couple of months, before the competitive edge of the previous year returns. Till then the batting is spineless, sloppy and reckless - afterwards its tough, sensible resolute, and near the end, radiating polish and class. C'mon Wales, C'mon!C'mon!

Yet has any team won the competition with its opening bowlers half the time playing for the state instead of us? - Which makes the Club Championship win all that much better, and the season a beauty.

Indeed there were highlights aplenty.

Watson and Lawson opening the bowling for N.S.W. was a wonderful sight. Neither made the test team, but Watson looked a chance after a great first up match, but then faded through overwork. Three years non-stop cricket has blunted the Gulgong "edge", and even if he doesn't return next year, he has given this club great service.

Lawson was magnificently fast early on, but in the blaze of publicity lost his length and direction and his chance for the green cap. Hopefully his stint in England will cool the temper and add wisdom to the head, for only then will that Lillee-like potential emerge.

Chris Chapman at last shook off that "ever-promising" label and became a batsman of rare skill and consistency. How or why is a mystery, but with relegation fast approaching, he reeled off 100 not out, 93 and 94 in consecutive innings, inspiring the whole team. Of his 577 runs at 38 (club record), 385 were scored away from the Village Green at an average of 64, an appropriate comment on the slow, anti-batting, Village Green wickets.

Mark Pay's bowling was a joy to watch, full of variety and guile, inspiring respect on the flattest of wickets. Tony Greig's comment: "Why isn't Mark Ray in the State Team?" said it all, and even then he didn't know of Mark's batting record which this year from the Southern Tour on, boasted an average of just under 50 from 5 innings.

Surely he must have been dyanamite on those turning S.C.G. wickets if only the State Selectors had given him the opportunity; and if four straightforward chances off him had been accepted (Cumberland's Walters, Randwick's Marston, Penrith's Small and Waverley's Richardson) how the season might have been different.

- * Neville Jansson and Peter Tout's superb later-season efforts gave our batting a new solidity and class. Jansson's consistency at number 3 was an unexpected bonus, and with Tout's aggressive shot-making were great support for Chapman and Ray.
- * For the third consecutive season Jim Robson failed to convert a good year into a great one. After a fine start, his performances fell away, apart from occasional flashes of that class the State Selectors long ago noted.
- * Greg Livingstone, Geoff Kirkwood and the skipper all suffered from the welter of runs coming from the top order. Livingstone had another quiet year after his memorable 1977 debut, but there's no questioning his class. Twice Kirkwood batted superbly in difficult situations and is undoubtedly a first grade batsman, whilst his bowling continued its steady improvement in accuracy and variety. But the hit-out or get-out nature of so many of their innings drastically affected their batting figures.
- * Batting, bowling or fielding, Nigel Perger produced something extraordinary in every game he played, but the return of Watson, Lawson and Grattan-Smith, led to both he and Kirkwood having reduced opportunities.
- * Steve Campbell also missed out as the club's bowling talent became available, but as a legspinner, the years are on his side.
- * Paddy Grattan-Smith returned from Adelaide for the last five games to capture 20 wickets and add a great deal of substance to the side.
- * After a slow start, Paul Deegan kept wickets in fine style and batted with typical exhuberance before handing the gloves over to Jim O'Brien, who just back from the U.K., quickly reproduced his old form.
- * Greig Robinson, back in firsts after six years, Jock Martel, Dick Pym, Michael Watt and John Sands all made fleeting appearances, and were a pleasure to have in the team.

And what of the fielding? Again we failed to reach the heights of 76/77, but the standard was again good with Greg Livingstone outstanding. As the England under 19 team will remember, his explosive pace and marvellous hands are in world class whether in the covers or the outfield. The skipper topped the catches with 11 (a record for him!) with Ray and Robson close behind, but surprisingly Chapman had a poor year, which should be rectified by that fielding cure-all - practice. Perger, Tout, Jansson, Kirkwood, Campbell and Lawson all turned in high quality performances which are essential to team success.

And next year?

The likely departure of Watson, Grattan-Smith and Ray will give Perger, Campbell and Kirkwood the opportunity to build on this year's experience. The batting should remain strong and if the fielding is up to standard, the team should remain successful.

The team's thanks go to David Lemon as scorer, Shirley and Betty Chapman, Nell Twohill and Jill Ratcliffe for afternoon teas, John MacFarlane, Tony Epstein, John Ingleson and Geoff Garland for help at vital times.

The Games :

Match 1 against Cumberland was simply dismal. Sent in on a damp wicket, a miserable 102 with Robson 45 not out was nearly good enough but dreadful catching enabled Walters (4 chances) to reach 44 and his side pass us 6 wickets down.

Lawson again bowled beautifully against St. George but after being 2 for 7, they closed at 173 for 7, to which we replied with 149, Robson scoring 63 not out (and two runouts!)

A paltry 153 (Ray 63) was 52 too many for Sydney Uni. as Lawson and Watson ensured State selection with superb hostile bowling to give us our only victory in the first five games.

Six batsmen got 28 or more against wooden-spooners Petersham in our first day 236, but a washout next week cost us the six points.

Randwick's Alan Turner with 107 and his team with 9 for 304 carved up our attack minus Lawson and Watson and Kirkwood (ill for the first session, and 4 for 81 after tea!). At 5 for 18 next week, disaster seemed likely, but Chris Chapman's 100 not out almost got us a draw.

Gordon's 338 next week looked like another disaster, but incredibly we managed 7 for 340, Chapman 93, Robson 83 and Rogers 49 laying the groundwork for Perger to finish with a sizzling 29 in 5 overs.

Chapman's great run continued with 94 against Sydney on a damp pitch which enabled us to declare at 238 for 8. Perger, 15 not out, then had the first batsman caught behind, ran out the other opener, dived full length at shortish midwicket to catch No. 8 batsman off a full blooded sweep, and plucked the last catch off the pitch 2 yards from the bat, for a 58 run, last over victory.

Manly managed 157, Ray 5 for 51, and, as in the previous year, Watson hit out to get us home with an over to spare, Jansson again batting impressively for 44.

Ray 80, Chapman 59 and Robson 32 not out, showed the benefits of a week's cricket on the Southern Tour to enable us to close at halfway with 2 wickets for 200, but fine batting by Sutherland (and two dropped catches) saw them scramble home with 8 wickets down.

A marvellous first up 69 by Tout on a perfect seamer's pitch, with great support from Kirkwood, saw us to 160 but in poor shape overnight as Mosman reached 2 for 43. Superlative bowling the next week by Grattan-Smith and Ray (19 overs each unchanged) routed Mosman for 116.

So, in 3rd position with 4 games to go we looked certainties for the semis, but the two big matches against Northern Districts and Penrith were to be critical.

On a perfect wicket at Waitara, Northern Districts batted till 25 minutes to 3, half and hour past halftime and leaving us 13 overs less in which to reach 193.

Chapman, Jansson, Livingstone and Tout (again superb) gave us a chance, but four desperation run-outs saw us 5 runs short with a wicket in hand.

Our first day 239 against clear competition leaders Penrith off only 62 overs (Ray 80, Jansson 41) was 26 more than Penrith who were delighted to scramble a draw (8 wickets down) although receiving 13 more overs.

Our hopes were completely dashed with a washout against lowly Balmain, and in the final game chasing Waverley's first day 214 on a perfect pitch, an hour's lost play the next week, a wet pitch plus desperation batting saw us finish with 166.

The re-draw was a taste of what might have been, as our 4 for 201 closure off only 42 overs, and Lawson's 5 for 33 and Grattan-Smith's 4 for 16 gave us a 107 run victory over Wests and enough points to give us that vital Club Championship victory.

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SECOND GRADE REPORT

The Club Championship and 3 out of 4 of the first 4 grades in the semi finals is a good effort for any club to achieve. Congratulations must be extended to the whole club for this. Many have said that it's a good effort to make the final after winning the competition the previous year, however, 2nd grade must be disappointed with the final result. With probably the strongest side in the competition we should have won the minor premiership and the final. There's no doubt that if we had have been minor premiers then the final would have been ours. Fourteen minor premiership games for 8 first innings wins, 3 losses and 3 draws were not good enough. With consistent play and a little luck, 3 more Ist innings wins should have been achieved. A draw with Manly, a washout against Petersham and poor displays with the bat against Randwick and Waverley were our downfall.

How much of the blame can be placed on the players themselves, unfortunately not all. Again it must be shown that 26 players were selected to play 2nd grade this year, only 2 players participated in every game, only a total of 5 played in 2/3 of matches. Also the structure of the competition we play in must take alot of the blame. Fourteen games a year is just not sufficient to produce consistent batting and bowling. In Jan/Feb three complete weekends were missed because of first class matches; England V's Australia at the S.C.G. Fortunately in this period the weather was kind and no matches were lost until the Balmain game in the first week of March. Therefore in 1979 five Saturdays in the first nine saw effective cricket played. Lets hope that in the future a better structured competition can be handed down by the detached people from above.

Now for a quick resume of the season.

The opposition laboured to score runs. John Sands having well deserved figures of 3-78 off 29.5 overs and Bill Hetherington bowling 4 victims for 54 runs. A poor display of batting let us down. Mick Watt 55, Clayton Jones 32, Bruce Handley 28 and a gutsy 41 n.o. from Chris Hangar nearly got us there. However, no points from the last three games has put us back with the field.

Round 6. Vs Gordon

Gordon 245 lost to UNSW 4 dcl 315 UNSW won on 1st innings

Gordon won the toss and dismissed for 245 on Chatswood, what a great start. Bill Hetherington 4-44 and John Sands 3-74. Ian Smiths 66 pilotted us to a reasonable total on a very slow batting wicket. Slow batting by Penrith saw them get into alot of trouble and they eventually were all out for 98. John Sands took 3-12 and Steve Campbell 4-23 both off 12 overs.

Round 13 Vs. Balmain

UNSW 4-155 Match drawn.

Now joint competition leaders with Balmain the game was to be an important one. Clayton Jones 29 Dave Meagher 46 n.o. and Mick Watt 33 n.o. had put us in a strong position. However, rain stopped play and no result was obtained.

MATCH REPORTS

The grassless, lifeless pitch proved responsive to spin - with McBarron (18 overs 3/20) and John Sands (13 overs 2/14) taking the honours. Still it was the last over before we won - and only after an hour and a half of boring defensive cricket broken by the side's 'come-and-get-me-and-they-tried-but-failed' bowler, Bill Pulver (2/8). Oh yes - David Pratt thumped the umpire on the back of his head with a fast flat throw we are assured it was aimed at the wicket (but then he had given him out Lbw).

ROUND 3 UNSW 8/237 Sydney Uni. 112

Thanks to the Sydney Uni captain who was convinced of the difficulties of batting first on David Philips we were sent in and at last our batsmen fired. Wijeratne 56 (run out - yet again), Meagher 58 (run out by - Asoka), Pulver 38, Jourdain 31. Bill Hetherington claimed two wickets before stumps with well controlled swing bowling and on a wettish second day we went through them - Hetherington 5/26, McBarron 2/9, Ingleson 2/46.

ROUND 4 Petersham 121 UNSW 5/147

We had this won on the first day and only a washout on the second Saturday prevented us gaining the outright. We bowled and fielded well (Ingleson 4/37, Wells 2/20, Price 2/33) but their batting was indifferent. Our batsmen showed how easy it was to get runs on David Philips this year, taking just over 2 hours to score the 147 - a lovely innings from Richard Campbell (39) the begining of the run feast for David Pratt (26) and a fine knock from David Meagher (42).

ROUND 5 UNSW 269 Randwick 9/193

We batted superbly on a hard grassless wicket at Kensington Oval. The runs were scored by 5pm on the first day - a superb aggressive opening innings from Richard Campbell (82), highlighted by magnificent straight driving; aided by useful innings from almost everybody else - Chris Deegan (29), Meagher (35) (Dear Dave...you must not try to cut off your stumps to an off spinner - repeat a thousand times) Pulver (29) and Jourdain (31). Then the dirge began - from 5pm day I until after 6pm. on day 2 and through 81 overs Randwick simply occupied the crease and refused to play cricket. John Bolton bowled himself to a standstill (3/38); Geoff Garland bowled with intent on grievous assault by the batsmen on our fieldsmen (2/38) - but we dropped at least 5 catches. A game to forget. Comment from Pete Jourdain "...wouldn't it be nice to meet Randwick in a semi-final and make them field all day while we bat it out..." prophetic words.

ROUND 6 UNSW 7/226 Gordon 6/178

Thanks to the gardeners' strike this was an all day fixture. We batted well - Pratt 89, Jourdain a superb 32 when the track was difficult and, believe it or not, Ingleson a punishing 23 not out. But we were not good enough to bowl them out in the allotted 3 and a half hours despite some fine bowling from John Bolton (2/64 and one TKO) supported by Glen Clark 2/19.

ROUND 7 Sydney 179 UNSW 303 (R)

A resounding victory according to the scorebook, but in fact we had to struggle, not helped by bad batting and an opposing captain who won the galah of the year award hands down (and mouth open). Steve Price took the bowling honours (5/38) but was to bowl better latter in the season without producing the same figures. Apart from Bill Pulver (73) and David Pratt (30) we fell apart to be 7/148 just before tea. We were rescued by Richard Campbell and myself who took the score safely past Sydney's total with Richard going on to make 99 (last man out - caught to a magnificent catch inches from the ground). Together with Pat Thompson (33n.o.) he put on 88 for the last wicket - a third grade record. 'Froggy' is a much better bat than he is usually given credit for. In the end a fine win but the batting was too undisciplined for comfort.

ROUND 8 UNSW 6/210 Manly 162

David Pratt captained in the absence of myself and celebrated not only by winning the toss (and batting) but also by scoring what I'm told was a fine 95n.o. In writing to tell me of the result he added that if I had declared when was 5 short of his century he would not have spoken to me for the rest of the season. Bill Hetherington took another 5 wickets (for 52) and again showed what a vastly improved bowler he is this season.

ROUND 9 Sutherland 192 UNSW 5/240

Ingleson back - we won the toss - and sent them in. But good bowling and fielding on a small ground restricted them to 192. I took 4/40 and Bill Hetherington 4/71 - both of us given a chance by batsmen who went for their shots. We then proceeded to put together our best batting display of the season - Burnett (29), Campbell (30), started it off, followed by a stylish 50 from Pulver (apart from a terrible first quarter of an hour) and crowned by an incredible 100 by David Pratt. He went from 73 to 100 in one over, including 4 big drives over the fence. All told he notched up 7 boundaries and 7 over the top in that century.

ROUND 10 Mosman 202 and 6/124 UNSW 132 and 5/38

From the heights to the depths - we played dreadfully in this game. We were taken apart by an unorthodox opening batsman whose favourite shot was somewhere over the top of fly slip. We also paid the penalty for dropping him twice. Only Asoka Wijeratne (4/44) and Pat Thompson (3/49) bowled well. The batting was even worse - Pratt (36 superb runs until he tried to cut an innocuous spinner and got the only one that turned all day), Wijeratne (29) and McDonald (20) were the only scores worth mentioning as one after another we threw our wickets away on a perfect batting strip. The second innings was even worse as we showed once again the undisciplined side to our sometimes brilliant batting. A game to forget.

An all day fixture in which we batted extremely well on a difficult pitch and then bowled and fielded superbly to win a game that had to be won if we were to stay in the top four. Clayton Jones, playing his first game for us, scored an excellent 17 - thus demonstrating that it is not necessarily how many runs a batsman scores but the conditions under which he scores them that matters. Asoka Wijeratne (43), Peter Burnett (28) and David Pratt (22) took the total to 158 - a very good score on a wicket that seamed around sharply. We had them 3/8, thanks to a good opening spell by Greg Robinson and myself and although they recovered a fine spell by Wijeratne and Hetherington kept their middle order in check and unable to get on top. Robo and myself then finished them off - Ingleson 5/54, Robinson 4/30. A fine allround performance, particularly after the previous game.

ROUND 12 Penrith 129 and 7/198 UNSW 4/146 and 9/96

We almost blew this to one of the weaker clubs in the competition Hetherington (4/33), Ingleson (3/20) and McBarron (2/32) cleaned them up cheaply, aided by some good fielding and catching. By the end of the first day we had won on the first innings thanks to Burnett (37), Pratt (33), Wijeratne (24n.o.), Jones (26) and Jourdain (18n.o.) The second day, going for an outright, we could not bowl well enough - only Graeme McBarron (3/76) and Steve Price (3/56) bowled up to scratch. Then, chasing 190 in 100 minutes, we collapsed - only Burnett (30) and Jourdain (25) scored anything at all. Clayton Jones didn't do very well either in the second innings - despite attentiveness to the (lady) umpire in the preceeding week.

ROUND 13 UNSW 8/150 Vs Balmain - RAIN

Rain washed out this all day fixture with the side that started off the day 2 points ahead of us. We felt confident we would have won if the rain had not intervened - and didn't hesitate to tell Balmain so. On a wet and very hasty track Peter Burnett batted superbly (32 - including the only 6 I have ever seen him hit; the first in his grade career I think), as did Graeme McBarron (34), Chris Hanger (25n.o.) and Asoka Wijeratne (21). Bill Pulver scored as sweet a 20 as one could wish to watch but, as so often happened this year got himself out just as he was looking set for a big score. David Pratt's pugnent comments on the wicket, the state of the game, the opposition and life generally after he stormed back to the pavilion (caught for 1) even embarrassed Steve Price - and caused the rest of the side to move a good 5 yards away from him for the next hour or so, trying hard to pretend that he wasn't with us.

ROUND 14 UNEW 96 and 4/122 Waverley 77

We nearly blew it again. But we were unfortunate to meet a fine fast bowler who swung the ball both ways more than I have seen any grade bowler before. Clayton Jones scored a courageous 43 - he was last man out and the only person to reach double figures, scoring his last few runs with a broken thumb. A determined effort which included a superb cover drive straight to the boundary, a shot nobody knew he had. Fortunately, we bowled well enough and took some excellent catches to bundle them out for less than our miniscule score - Ingleson 6/34 and Hetherington 4/31. The highlight was a catch by Chris Deegan, substituting for Clayton Jones, at silly mid on from a full blooded drive - his eyes were closed, his head ducking out of the way and cursing the bowler (me) but in going for cover he left his left hand outstretched in the air.

SEMI FINAL Randwick 9/292 UNSW 9/236

A great game of cricket in the end, only marred by the umpiring. We bowled well to have Randwick 6/140, but as happened a number of times this season we could not polish off the innings. We did get a very bad umpiring decision but nevertheless let them off the hook. Still, chasing 292 on the second day with Randwick having to win in order to go through to the final we only needed to bat out the day on a superb batting track. Only Bill Pulver among the top order batsmen really got going, scoring a lovely 69. We were rescued in the final two and a half hours by a fine 53 not out from Chris Hanger, ably supported by Steve Price, Bill Hetherington and myself. Chris showed both class and temperament as he held out for a draw. With 7Lbw's, 1 mankad and 1 stumping making up the 9 wickets we lost there were no tears shed by us for Randwick at two minutes to 6 when we took the light appeal. The draw put us through to the Final and wrapped up the Club Championship.

FINAL Bankstown 284 UNSW 3/23

A disappointing end to the season as rain washed out the second day. We muffed our chances of bowling Bankstown out cheaply on a wicket that was a slow popping track for the first 2 hours. We also dropped a couple of crucial catches which did nothing to improve our chances. Nevertheless we bowled tightly and on the whole fielded well - with a fine display of spin bowling from Steve Price (5/86) ably supported by Bill Hetherington (3/51) and Asoka Wijeratne (2/48). It was a pity the game ended the way it did - which made us all regret the couple of games which we might just have won earlier in the season. If we had then we, rather than Bankstown, would have ended as Minor Premiers and gained the benefit of the

FIVE A - REPORT 1978/79

The first year the Club entered the Fifth Grade competition, the side failed to make the semi-finals. I suppose it had to happen again but it is very disappointing to report that neither of our two fifth grade teams reached the final four. Doubly disappointing of course in view of the fact that one of our teams had contested each of the past two finals. As the Fifth A's were first selected and allegedly the stronger team, they of course shoulder the responsibility and need explain their performance. I could attempt such an explanation by looking for individuals as scapegoats or placing blame on particular occurrences.

For example, I could start with the vice-captain, John MacFarlane, who as wicket-keeper ended up two dismissals short of a new record for the grade; or Alex Taylor who set a new batting average record; or Andrew Ipkendanz who set a new record best performance for a bowler; or the batsmen involved in four new record partnerships; or that we defeated the finalists when we met them in the competition (also defeated our own 4ths in the usual grudge match); or the fact that match by match this was the strongest Fifths we have ever fielded. Trying to point the finger at individuals obviously does not provide a satisfactory answer. The number of top performances as mentioned supports my contention that this was the best side in the competition and also indicates team spirit and all those other good things needed for cricket.

I can offer only three reasons for our problem -

- We were too good a team a) We knew it and
 b) all opponents knew it.
- 2. The 4ths and 3rds both performed too well.
- 3. The weakest excuse but it's true, we had some bad luck.

With regard to the first reason, I simply mean that we were overconfident. We were absolutely stunned on those occasions when we lost a match, and whenever we were in trouble during a match the calm assurance that someone would get us out of it was amazing. What is even more amazing, on most occasions someone produced the necessary miracle. I feel that it was this air of confident superiority that prevented us from taking a match by the scruff of the neck and shaking an outright victory from it. Opposition teams also seemed to expect us to produce these miracles and took absolutely no risks. Some teams by their slow approach to matches gave the impression of playing for a draw even before a ball was bowled. Whether I am right about this or not, it is a fact that we did not receive outright points throughout the season and in the few cases the opportunity seemed to be developing our opposition would close up the game and laugh at the offers we presented.

The second reason concerns the overall strength of the Club and is rather a pleasant excuse to be forced to use. For the first time ever the grades above the Fifths performed so well that we were forced to play a supporting role. In the past, as the season drew to a close, we were able to maintain a stable team as those above us dropped out of the semi-final race. This year we kept providing top quality material to ensure the 3rds and 4ths maintained their places in the final four right to the last round. Whilst we were never short of good players there were times when the team was unbalanced or contained players that were new to our team. This lack of continuity of key players made it impossible to build up a regular batting order or bowling attack. However as this was caused by us doing our bit towards the Club Championship we are certainly not complaining.

Finally, the bad luck which is meant to cover three matters which were beyond our control. Firstly, the draw saw us playing the weaker teams in one day fixtures and time prevented us forcing outright victory. Also the first round was cancelled because of ground problems with other clubs and rain. The system used to 'compensate' us for this unplayed match did not yield the points that we almost certainly would have received had it been played. Also the fact that we were never sure who exactly was being 'compensated' made it difficult to know just where we were coming in the competition at any time. Secondly, the weather washed out the second half of the two matches we drew and each time we were in a commanding position. Thirdly, the actions of some University staff prevented a full match being played on one occasion. It is sad to see the Cricket Club being used as an innocent victim in an industrial dispute. The scheduled two day match was eventually played over about five hours and then only through the work of certain club members. Even in this limited time we gained a victory by some 60 runs and 4 wickets - another outright opportunity lost.

It should be clear from these comments that I think the team really did quite well and it was generally a team effort. However I wish to mention a few individuals. Alex Taylor was always reliable with the bat and his dedication and style serves as a lesson to many young players. John Carmichael and Phil Williams were always consistent but never put together the really big score of which they are obviously capable. Darryl Williamson was our find of the season producing a number of fine innings and some wholehearted efforts in the field and will certainly be seen in higher grades next season.

Whilst most of the middle and lower order batsmen had at least one moment of glory, some of our bowlers did not fare so well. Ipkendanz was the exception as he consistently took wickets and bowled no-balls (ie. 9 overs, 7/31, 16 n.o. halls). If he works in the nets to correct his over-stepping problem and can then bowl confidently from a full run he will be a great asset to the Club. Brad Wells joined us for the last few rounds and bowled extremely well most of the time but never took a wicket. His pace, lift and general aggression were superb but the ball missed the stumps or slips so often that things can only get better. Brad is a far better bowler than his figures with us suggest. Orca made a few guest appearances at the end of the season and after demonstrating his unique style between the wickets went on to score some valuable runs. His bowling was always tight and successful. Surely this coming season will see him produce the good form, of which he is capable, in higher grades. Tony Stark bowled superbly for us in four matches but was unfortunately displaced by people returning in higher grades. Both Tony and Kev Radley showed considerable ability in swinging the new ball and genuine swing is something we always need. Gary Powell at times looked as if he was going to develop into a useful spinner/all-rounder. A shoulder injury handicapped him at the end of the season. Finally I must mention that Fifth's own heavy roller, Ralph Merrell, who imparted his own style to each match and still claims that on one occasion this year he did turn the ball. Most of us do remember it being turned halfway up a mountain at Balmoral where it still remains.

My particular thanks go to John Mac who was a tower of strength throughout the season both with his performances on the field and advice and encouragement off it. The selectors also assisted us at all times and despite what you may think were sober at all times. Our congratulations and commiserations to the 2nds, 3rds and 4ths for their great efforts and special mention to the 5B's who played remarkable cricket all season and kept the pressure on us. Thanks also to all the people who played with us this year & provided such good cricket played in a fine spirit.

FIVE 'B' REPORT 1978-79

This was a season of great disappointment in comparison with the two previous seasons for the B's. On paper, this, at least was true, for we finished with 36 points. However, the side lost only 2 games all season, had 4 crippling draws (in 3 of these, we were in an unbeatable position) and 2 washouts. This proved to be too great a hurdle to overcome in the end.

To win a 5th grade Premiership, a team needs to win most of its games, have as few draws as possible and beat the weaker sides outright. Of the weak sides this year, we played only 3 and of these 2 were washed out totally and the other was washed out 2nd day. This may seem like whingeing, but there is no doubt that the 5'Bs were one of the best sides in the competition, beating semi-finalists Sutherland and Randwick, easily, having other semi-finalists Balmain "A" 9-165 chasing 89 (dec) 200 and having finalists Bankstown (the ultimate premiers) 8-229 chasing 8 (dec) 252.

Nevertheless it was a satisfying season both on and off the field with a team who played the game hard and fair, whilst never giving up. Despite being the last cab off the rank at selections and having a total of 35 players migrating through the team, the B's had an amazing team spirit which pulled us out of the mire several times. An example was the game against Gordon, where we triumphed with 8 men and a boy; the game against Cumberland "A" we were sent in on a pitch reminiscent of a swamp, hit up only 60 (plus many bruises) yet won the match convincingly:

The side shone neither in batting nor bowling nor fielding but in all three, there were no real stars (they went up a grade in any case!) but rather every player did his best in every match, and usually that was enough to win! Our bowling was always consistent, with tight medium-paced bowling enabling us to attack wherever bossible, and a mainly off-spin backup; invariably they had a reasonable total to bowl with. Fielding was sometimes brilliant, sometimes terrible, but generally safe and sure.

My great thanks go to Keith Madden for his constant help and enthusiasm throughout the season. Madd's suffers from chronic Resch's Disease, but when sober and a terrific season with the bat and behind the stumps (breaking the wicketkeeping record) he is definitely a better player than 5th grade.

Many other personalities come to mind: - Chris Burgess finally worked out his run-up and his confidence (especially after bowling over a few "cherries" on his cruise). No batsman was comfortable against his pace and he fully deserved to be top wicket-taker for the season. Chris should progress to further success, provided he learns not to give his future skipper out LBW, 10 yards down the track when the 'Keeper coughs!

Phil Begg was undoubtedly the find of the season, but from where nobody is quite sure. A great team man who does go to a university, Beggy never gave up and won the games against Gordon and Cumberland for us. 19 medium paced wickets at 12 apiece and a batting average of 19 speaks for itself.

Bill Richardson played only five games and had great success early in the season. Bill is a great punisher of the bad ball, but needs to tighten up his defence and play down the line to consistently score runs.

Ian Lincolne (the man with the Australian sweater) had a disappointing season because his promise wasn't fulfilled till later in the season with good scores (42 against the Waverley Wankers when he was trying to get out and go to a wedding!). He was constantly one of the team's best fieldsmen.

"Chemical" played one great innings whilst drunk and managed to find a way to be run out by 24 yards. T.F.C.

Grant O'Donnell had undoubted potential, but absolutely no application. A magic 39 against Sutherland won the game and an amazing, involuntary, reflex Aussie Rules catch at deep square leg versus the A's were highlights.

Pat "Froggy" Thompson bowled like a gem in the only two matches he played, and deservedly progressed to 3rd Grade with his new found rhythm.

Andy Woodman was the geriatric of the side. Rumoured to have sired at least seven grandchildren and a Sydney Cup winner, Woody always gained the breakthrough needed when he came into the attack, although wickets were hard to come by after, he always bowled tightly. He took the catch of the year in slips versus Waverley when he wasn't quick enough to get his left hand out of the way.

Simon Cotton had the horrors and wretched luck which ran out with a match-winning 50 against Cumberland. Simon has the technique, but sometimes lacks the killer instinct to do well.

Jim McLachlan only played two games but showed the goods with 6-91 against the A's. Jim is an aggressive off-spinner a la Grattan-Smith (thankfully more introspective than the latter) and deserved his promotion. Because he is an attacking bowler, he tries something different and may get hit around a bit; I think Jim will have a terrific season this year (he also has one of the most cultured edges ever seen batting at David Phillips).

Steve Gonski scored a chanceless 73 (should have been a ton) against Bankstown. Ian Kellaway showed himself to be an ideal grafter versus the A's with 54 and 36. Phil Williams and Darryl Williamson were lost to higher grades after albiet too brief appearances. Don Lequesne showed great determination and a bit of luck in the middle of the season. Tony Stark became the fittest man in the world (not the happiest) after bowling into the wind, without any luck, for most of the season. Despite this, Starky still has a beautiful body and is a close confidant of Alvin Purple, who incidentally, like Starky knocks off, sorry, knocks around with many barmaids. Kevin Radley bowled well against the A's but had injury problems in the middle of the season. The Vlastaras brothers played with great guts during the season and are also the type of team men this club needs. Val Popovich had a patchy season and, hopefully, will be able to put more time into the game next year. Gary Powell kept the P.T.C. in profit with his travels to and from cricket, and also bowled unselfishly to bag 5-78 against Bankstown. Many more can be mentioned and I would like to thank them all for making this such an enjoyable season for me.

My thanks also go to John Macfarlane for his sleepless nights on Fridays trying to get 11 men, no matter how crippled, for a 5B team, and to all the committee members for all their work. Here's to no draws and the premiership in 79/80.
