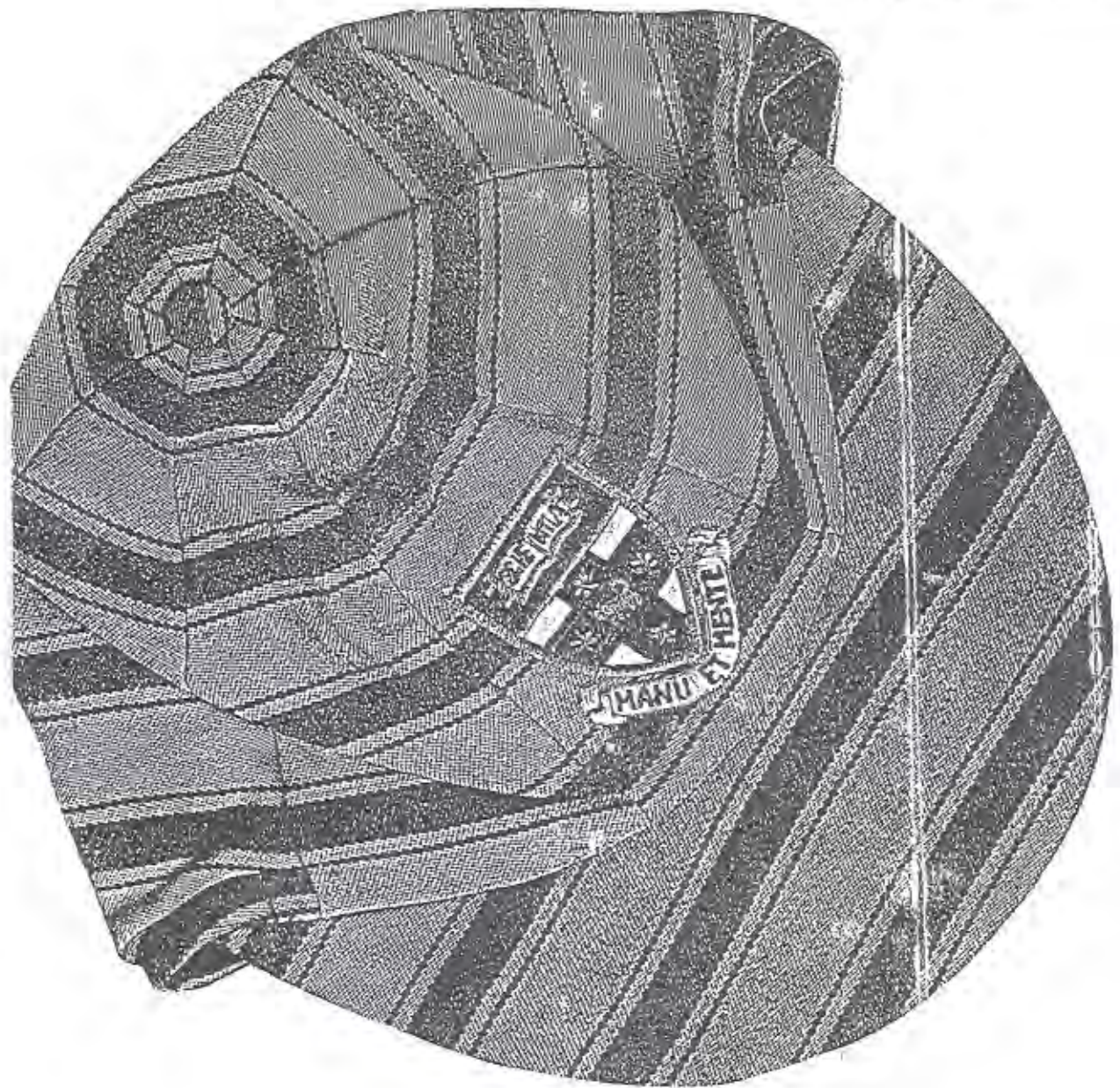

PRESIDENTS REPORT

Well this season we hopefully turned the corner after a period of relatively poor performance. Although at first glance at the Club Championship table this does not seem the case, with UNSWCC raising only 3 places from last years depths of 17th to 14th club in the SCA in 1990/91. If one reviews the closeness of the Club Championship we were only 72 points from 6th spot (which equates to only 2 1st grade wins). So although we did not achieve our objective to finish in the first 6 clubs we were not that far away, especially given 2 or 3 unlucky draws experienced by our 1st grade side.

We easily achieved our other objective and that was to qualify 3 sides for the semifinals, with 2nds, 6ths, 7ths and our ladies side achieving this target, with 4's missing out at the death on a semifinal berth.

Congratulations to all the Captains and players of the sides, but especially the seconds who were languishing after Round 4, but with some great individual and team performances, & led magnificently by Peter Trimble, who installed pride and great team and club spirit. Their charge into the final, only to be robbed of the possible fairy tale ending to the season by a combination of poor covers and rain at Hurstville. Obviously the highlight of the season was the 2nds performance against the minor premiers Balmain in the victorious semis.

The other highlights of the season was continuing the tradition of the UNSWCC as a touring club, with a very successful tour of South America, winning 2 "tests". Congratulations to Clayton Jones for organising and captaining a very successful, interesting and by all reports enormously enjoyable tour. (See S.A. Tour Report later in this volume). Also our students (both male and female teams) travelled to Adelaide for a 2nd place in a full Intervarsity, thanks to Whitey and Shaws for the organisation and getting all the troops to bed before 10.00 while on Intervarsity.

The Management Committee performed well again this year, but with reduced numbers. Special thanks to Peter Godber, Greg Livingstone and Peter Jourdain. To Matt Sanders in his first year as Team Secretary many thanks for an onerous job in this and other areas, a great effort for the club. Also to Mick F Phillips our other successful Captain for his great job with the sixes and 7's, a "f_ _ _ _" great effort Mick. Also thanks to Peter Sinclair for his efforts in Captaining the P.G. side and not for his BARRTURN performances.

Congratulations to our hard working ground staff who supply the best grounds in Sydney, week in week out. The Village Green was again awarded the 4th best ground in the competition and again hosted various representative games.

Special thanks to our "non playing Club members" : Mrs Coots, Trims valuable statistician and scorer, Mr Coots our practice co-ordinator (not missing one practice! Great Effort Bob!),

also our old friends Dave Lemon and Tom Boyce, plus a new face at the 1st grade Reg Bruesch. Many thanks for your timeless efforts and support not only for your respective teams, but the club as a whole.

On a personal note Henry was again honoured with a Honorary Life Membership of the Sports Association for his undying efforts for the club and the University and Adrian White securing a well earned Blue. Congratulations to Jim Dixon on 3400 first grade wickets and Jungle Jim Robion on 7,000 first grade runs. It also farewell to James Baker, a great player for UNSW over the years and possibly deserves to go one step higher, I wish him well in that quest and hope South Australia brings him all he is looking for.

So again to all those who supported me in my initial term as President I thank you, I will be seeking even more assistance next season, as we must achieve ALL our targets both on and off the field.

1990/91 1ST GRADE REPORT

The 1990/91 Season was another that was full of promise and "what might have been". Yet again the 1st Grade side recorded only 5 wins from 15 games and finished well towards the bottom of the table.

Our lowly position belies our obvious abilities and the respect our opposition show us during the competition. We are a good team and accordingly I believe we need to focus on elements that will turn our draws and unexpected losses into wins and vying for finals position.

The one element which seems to undermine our performances is our inability to apply ourselves to the job at hand for the entire days play that faces us each weekend. This should not be difficult to overcome, however it substantially contributed to us failing to win 4 games which should have been ours. Another 24 points and we are looking at being very close to the semis, and that is ignoring the momentum those wins would provide us which may have enabled us to win other tougher games which were drawn or lost.

Although our strength on paper was our potentially awesome batting, it was in this area that we stumbled too often. Only twice (Bankstown and Campbelltown) and maybe a third time (St George) did our batting fire. This was because the quality of these attacks had forced us to apply ourselves both during the game and in preparing for the game. Other sides have the ability to so apply themselves regardless of the standard of the opposition. We, however, go to sleep as evidenced by games such as Petersham, Northern Districts, Sydney Uni and Waverly. We must approach every game in the same manner, with a killer instinct, so that we beat the teams we should beat and make the semis next year.

ON TO THE INDIVIDUAL PERFORMANCES

Jamie Baker

- Jamie's contribution to the side this year was again outstanding and he has displayed over the last few years that he is capable of playing 1st Class Cricket. Jamie scored 677 runs at 52 and took 32 wickets at 20. These stats speak for themselves and indicate his value to the 1st Grade side. I think that what players can learn most from Jamie is tough mental approach to his batting, particularly at training but also in the middle 99% of the time. Unfortunately Jamie is off to Adelaide and his shoes will be hard to fill. Good luck Bakes and thanks for your effort both on and off the field.

Jim Robson

- 652 runs at 46 and Jungle has not let us down yet again. Although his bowling was not utilised as much as in prior years (probably due to Whitey's improvement) his 17 wickets at 28 was also better than average. Jungle is a living cricket and social legend and it will be a sad day if he ever retires or leaves. His innings against Bankstown and North Sydney, particularly the latter which was played on a green top, showed Jungle is still one of the top players in Sydney and worthy of playing at a higher level.

Adrian White

- Whitey's 31 wickets at 23 brought him a Blue and was just reward for his impressive bowling most of the year. It could have been better though except for the occasional poor showing. 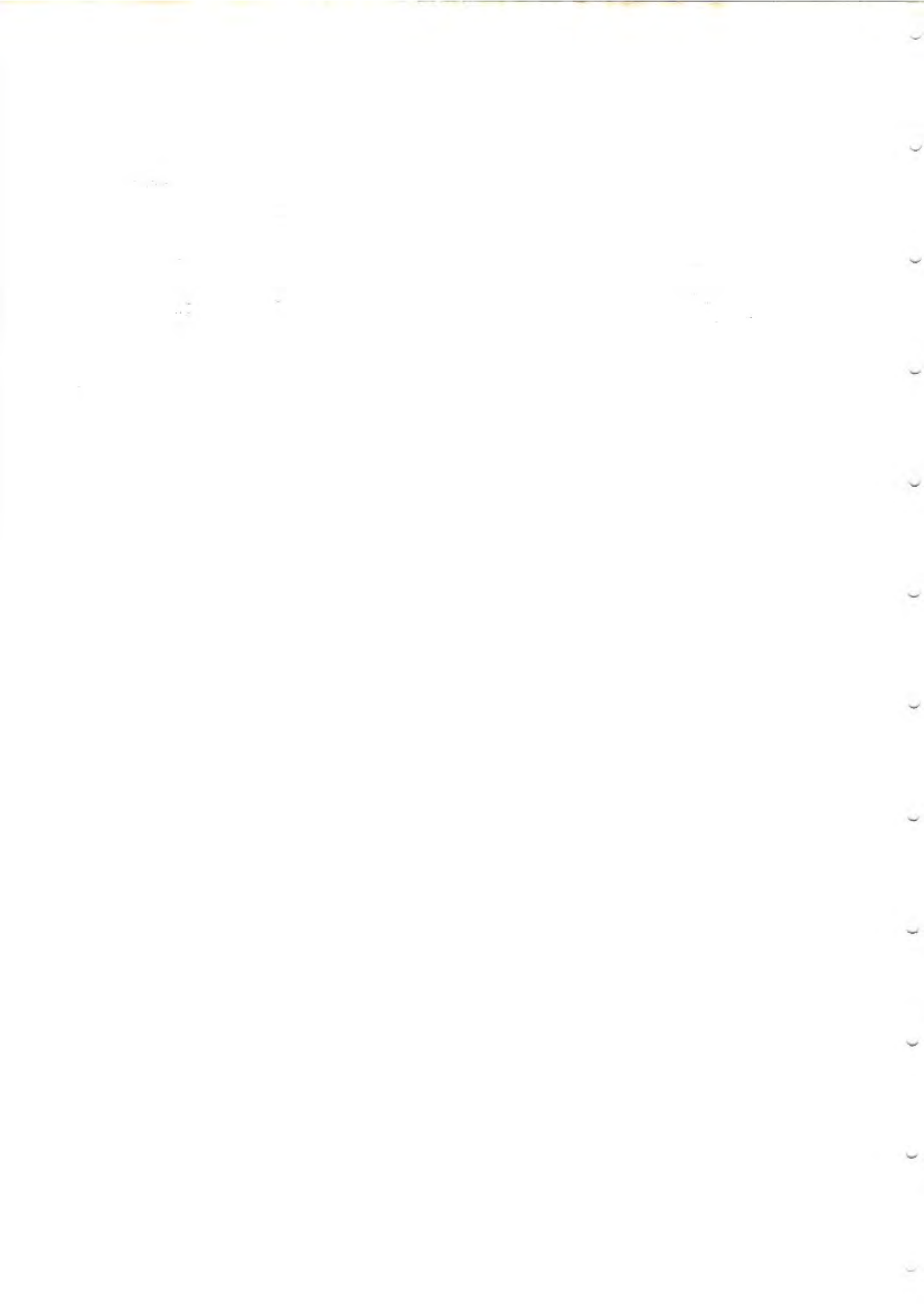

SECOND GRADE REPORT - 1990/91 SEASON

It is with memories still fresh of Easter Sunday night with Sinkers being removed from the stage of the Grand Hotel, Bondi Junction, and eventually from the hotel itself until Mat Sanders intervened, and Springer accepting an invitation, with a little encouragement from his teammates, to join the "Cockroaches" band and do an impressive Elvis impersonation that I have enormous pleasure in writing the second grade report for what was a very successful 1990/91 season. Our record of 1 outright win, 8 first innings wins, 2 draws and 4 losses in regular competition to finish in fourth position on the table, followed by a convincing win against minor premiers Balmain in the semi-final and a rain affected draw in the final to leave us runners up for the season was particularly satisfying for all players involved.

There were many highlights to the season marred only by a rain affected final (not to mention the ineffective covers) which robbed us of a chance to show we were good enough to go "all the way".

As I reflect on the season's highlights (and briefly review last year's second grade report when we were wooden spooners by 2 games) it is pleasing to note that this season we did "make our own luck" and more importantly the players produced some outstanding individual performances to put us on the winning list and generate the team spirit required at the "business end" of the season. After a slow start and only one win in our first six games, we turned the tables to win 9, lose 1 and draw the final of our last 11 games.

There were plenty of memorable team performances on our march to the semi when we really couldn't afford to drop a game. To mention just a few:

- * we made our highest score of the season in the first game after Christmas, 7/339 declared against Campbelltown. Maiden club centuries and a record partnership to Sinkers and Trim set up a comfortable win,
- * in a rain interrupted game we were set 202 in 50 overs against St George and got them 5 down and an over to spare. Matty Boyer could only manage 2 off the last ball to finish 96 not out!
- * we passed Sutherland 2 wickets down (with another big partnership between Sinkers and Trim) after Traf had wreaked havoc with a great spell of bowling on day 1,
- * with the pressure on, we beat Waverly outright in the final round, thanks to great fielding by the whole team and superb bowling in each innings by the twin hormones Traf and "Jock" Horley.

Then it all came together in the semi-final against Balmain. The bowlers, led by Clem set up the win with a near faultless performance, and with excellent support in the field Balmain struggled to 171 on a good deck. At stumps, 0/25 and Cootsy and Sinkers had consolidated an excellent day in the 55 minutes before stumps. Quietly confident overnight, our top order continued its form since Christmas and leg by Cootsy with 87 (he deserved a hundred), we reached Balmain's score at tea on the second day for the loss of 2 wickets. Another great effort, particularly in a semi and the Uni dressing room was a great place to be at 5 o'clock when stumps were drawn at 3/329.

The season also saw 4 second grade records broken:

- * Duncan Coots with a batting aggregate of 700
- * Andrew Shaw with a batting average of 65.5
- * Peter Sinclair (102) and Peter Trimble (129) with a fourth wicket partnership of 202 runs in 198 minutes.
- * Peter Trimble with 19 catches,

and many performances worthy of "bat turn" nomination. By the time this report goes to press we will know how the performances of Sinkers, Springer, Cootsy etc rated among others in the club.

Back to cricket, our ground fielding was excellent throughout the year with Brad Schirmer and then Springer leading the way and apart from a couple of disappointing sessions very few catches went to ground all year.

Paul Thomas had an excellent season, taking over the wicket-keeping responsibilities from Kurly after round 3 and it was a real pleasure to have him in the side. One of the few non-psycho keepers at the club and a pleasantly stabilising influence on the field. Mat Sanders also did the job with the gloves for one game earlier on.

There were many excellent performances with the bat led impressively by Duncan Coots with a record breaking aggregate of 706 runs.

After scoring a superb 73 in the first round of the season, Cootsy was disappointing not scoring above 25 until round 10. From then on he was at his best, scoring 503 at an average of 63 in his last 8 bats including 2 centuries (124 and 148) and a superb 87 in the semi final against Balmain.

Sinkers also had a great year after a disappointing start saw him spend a game in thirds. He scored his maiden century of 102 for the club against Campbelltown, was involved in a couple of very large partnerships and averaged nearly 50 in the period following his brief stint in thirds.

The "Legend", Mat Boyer, had an impressive season scoring nearly 500 runs in seconds and over 700 taking into account a couple of games in thirds. His 96 not out against St George to win the game was as good an innings as one could wish to see and with Cootsy and Sinkers will be real contenders for first grade spots in 1991-1992 particularly if they improve their running between wickets and learn to work the ball in

tight situations.

Because of the exceptional performances of the above players other notable performances with the bat were a little more obscure although still important:

* Before leaving us for South America, Harold scored regular thirties and laid the foundation for larger team scores but just couldn't get that big one himself.

* Shawy got back into form with 4 games in seconds before deservedly going back to firsts for the remainder of the season. He scored a superb 129 against Paramatta and 73 against Petersham.

* Scotty Barclay came to the club as a bowler but also made a couple of major contributions with the bat, including 55 against Sydney University and 31 against Penrith.

* Dave Downing and Brad Schirmer put on a match winning partnership of 75 against Bankstown scoring 41 and 29 respectively. Their other opportunities were limited and both are much better players than their statistics for the season indicate.

* Springer capably filled the key No 3 spot for the latter part of the season although also with limited opportunities.

Turning to bowling, Clem was the real star with the ball over the season bowling 366 overs and taking 44 wickets at an average of 16.93. Clem's 6/20 off 22 overs against Bankstown was as good a performance as you would see anywhere and bouncing back from injury (although not missing a game) to take 4/32 off 23 in the semi-final against Balmain was superb. Its unfortunate that Clem's injury limited his bowling for a few rounds and probably cost him the second grade bowling aggregate record.

Dave Downing with 26 wickets at 23.9 off 299 overs lent great support to Clem throughout the season. A highlight was his 39 overs straight against Campbelltown when our bowling was a bit light on to take 4/77 (should have been "5 for") and help win us the game. D2 and Clem played every game and the experience they brought to the team was invaluable and I thank them for it.

Scotty Barclay bowled well in patches during the season taking 18 wickets at 29.61. Barker's bowls a genuine "get out" ball, none better than the one to break a threatening partnership in the semi-final.

Unfortunately he too often strayed in line and length at critical times and will need to tighten up to succeed as a strike bowler at this level or higher.

After a disappointing start in seconds early in the season, Dave Trafford came back to take 18 wickets in the last 6 games. Traff bowled fast and troubled all batsman with some genuine pace. A highlight was against Sutherland when he destroyed their top and middle order, taking 5/61 off 25 excellent overs to set up an important win.

Traff's near twin, Jack Horley, also bowled fast and impressively when he eventually got his opportunity in our last 3 games. They were both welcomed additions to the team and have the ability to go a long way in the game.

Chris "Highway" Hume also bowled well to take 6 wickets at 17.5 off 54 overs in 3 games before an unfortunate injury in pre-game warm-up finished his season prematurely.

Disco, Morgs, Sinkers and Big Al (before injury) also bowled well with limited appearances at the bowling crease.

Off the field, to Mr and Mrs Coots, go the sincere thanks of the whole team - to Mrs Coots for scoring all season, keeping our stats up to date and being our most enthusiastic supporter; and to Bob for his ongoing support, doing the score board and helping to co-ordinate afternoon teas and drinks at home games. Also thanks to Bob for his assistance at practice every Tuesday and Thursday during the year. Much appreciated and a big improvement on practices in previous seasons.

On behalf of the team, I would like to thank everyone for their encouragement and support leading up to and in the finals. The success of the seconds in 1990-91 will hopefully assist in continuing to improve the performance and spirit within the club in the coming season. But it won't just happen - it requires plenty of commitment and 100 percent effort from everyone.

In conclusion it has been a very satisfying season for me personally and one I will remember for a long time. Thanks to all players who played in second grade during the season, who gave me their support and many of whom I have no doubt will go on to bigger and better things.

Best of luck to all club members in the coming season.

3RD GRADE REPORT

Many of these blokes had their early instruction under the Vince Lombardi of Moore Park cricket (Michael F Phillips) and their performances in that tough school saw them ably equipped for fives. Mick's ability to procure players remains a mystery but another crop like this year's would be greatly appreciated by any fifth grade skipper.

I would like to thank all of those who played or supported the team for their efforts and look forward to more successful cricket in the coming season.

SIXTH GRADE REPORT 1990/91

1990/91 saw the UNSW field its inaugural Seventh Grade team, well that had been the plan of Mick F. As such we had to recruit well and retain as many of the fine players that had turned out for us in the last few years.

After the initial fears the recruit/retain drive had been a great success and this season promised to be the turnaround many in the club had been hoping for.

Sixths started well winning their first round convincingly, we just lost our second in close limited overs tussle but were back on the winner's list for their next two rounds. Round five saw us up against Regent Rebels, a team which contained a few ex UNSW players, this went down to wire but their 10th wicket stand won them the game.

We are in the third place and as the club settles down to the fact the tourists are abroad, we win our next four games and are robbed of a sixth by bad rain to register our first draw. This was enough to secure us the leadership in the race for the semis. The next three games are all wins and we finish with a draw played on the V.G. ensuring us the minor premiership.

We played 15 games for 10 wins, 2 draws and 3 losses (no outright results). We were always in the top three, from the half way point we were never toppled from leading the competition.

We lost our semi final as four quick wickets fell for nought, the excellent stand of 134 by Ruchira and Mark Simms brought us back in to the hunt but more wickets fell and 50 run stand at the end by Anthony Wunch and Mick F. turned into a game of "What If's". Randwick scored 5/310 UNSW all out for 260.

Randwick win their next game 3/350 and go into the final firing.

Needing to win the Final to win the premiership we started off in excellent style setting a partnership and individual record for Moore Park. Mark Mullen (231 N.O. and Scott Schirmer 88) put on 269 for the fourth wicket, we declared 4/401. This proved to be too many as we only managed to get 8 wickets, Randwick 8/252 result in a draw, we came second.

Regardless of the result, this season saw Sixths and Sevenths achieve ALL their primary goals as well as most of their secondary goals.

Both Teams:

Brought pride and showed the spirit of the club at all times, in fact we were singularly honoured as being the club with the best sportmanship and best interests of the game at heart.

A nursery from which new players were given a start and older players chance to play the game and represent their Uni.

Both teams achieved what had been asked them of the President who had set us the goal of at least one of the teams make the semis, in fact both did.

Sixth grade were Minor Premiers and finalist whilst Sevenths came third.

Mark Mullen's 231 not out set a ground record as a number four batsman and is the second highest score in all grades over the association's 90 year history. This pushed into third place a 222 set in 1936/37.

Mark and Scott's partnership of 269 is an association record for both our grade and for the fourth wicket. It stands in the top five partnerships for the association in all grades.

UNSW also fielded two "Seven A Side" teams. This is a tournament held over two weekends and contains 24 teams. After the preliminaries both our teams were in the final four. The team lead by Andrew Burgess was defeated by a powerful Randwick combination, where as Mick F.'s team was also humbled in the final to take out second place, still we did pick a \$50.00 consolation medical refreshment voucher.

We came second in NSWCCA Club Championship, narrowly pipped, once again by Randwick, who have won it for the last 13 years. Although with 3 rounds to go we were just in front.

As can be seen from statistics the sixth grade team did the club proud. The experience gained by these players as well as the pleasing reports that most if not all attended training regularly and with enthusiasm all goes well for our grade teams next season. The players who went up did the club well and were a privilege to have played with.

All players in both Sixths and Sevenths will play at home as often as possible next season, but when circumstances force us to the rough grounds in the shadow of the S.C.G. they will show the determination this club needs if we hope to go higher up the order next season in the grade standings and throw off the monkey of amalgamation or relegation for good.

For non-tourists, that means "Two more bottles of rough red and three more beers please mate".

Our first Saturday was a leisure day and we had our first look at the leather gear which is quite cheap. Non tourists will soon be sick of the sight of tourists showing off their new leathers and ugly t-shirts. An unnamed tour member searched everywhere for leather jocks but as far as I know was unsuccessful.

That day, we also decided to see a local soccer match - River Plate versus Velez Sarsfield. We travelled to the River Plate stadium by taxi and it was like being part of a live video game. When Sarsfield scored a second goal, the scorer ran down in front of the Sarsfield crowd to kiss his own shirt and he congratulated by 7 or 8 teammates and his fans (including us, we were cheering so they wouldn't kill us).

Meanwhile, the opposition did a quick kick off and very nearly scored at the other end. The game finished and we were the first out, hoping to avoid any unhappy River Plate fans.

A great match and spectacle. We headed off for a steak and muchos vino at "II Mundo" - the perfect preparation for our first match next day. As Bill O'Reilly says; "A couple of drinks is good for your cricket". Hear, hear, Bill.

The eve of our first match and nerves began to show. Different tourists displayed different symptoms:

- * Keith Taylor talked a lot
- * Doctor Liz started to display an amazing tendency to spill food and drinks.
- * John Pym skipped dinner preferring to ponder his tactics.
