



# PRESIDENT'S REPORT

It is with some disappointment that my direct involvement in the day-to-day activities and running of the Club in Season 1997-98 were reduced due to various commitments in other areas of my life. I might normally say "enormous disappointment" except that my circumstances have allowed me to stand back and observe some much needed changes in the administrative functions within the Club.



I have mentioned on numerous occasions my views that the culture of this great Club can only be maintained if we can continue to bring young, talented people into the Club and provide them with, not only cricket's playing opportunities, but also the personal development opportunities that go along with being part of the running of a successful sporting club. I have long been an active administrator within the Club and have feared that we would suffer in the long term because its running was being left in the hands of a limited number of older heads. It is not that the contributions of we "old heads" was lacking, more the drain that it becomes on those resources and the less vitality that is naturally instilled into this important area. It is that vitality, both on the field and in the meeting rooms, that has typified the UNSWCC culture.

However, the "enormous disappointment" of feeling so distanced from the Club was substantially alleviated by observations of the Club's administration that this distance afforded me. To see the likes of intelligent and talented people such as Andrew Jones (1996-97 Clubman of the year), Matt Sanders and Christoph Vonwiller taking over and driving the extremely efficient running of the Club in this important year was satisfying in the extreme. With other new faces in the person of the (not so young) Jim Plunkett-Cole and our Junior Development team of Sohail Mohideen, Paul Searle and Alex Lamb taking on enormous responsibilities and achieving real successes, I can see nothing but a bright future that this proud and great Club deserves. The job, however, is never done and I look forward to the next "cra" joining the team to keep the Club at the pinnacle of "club-level" sporting achievement.

On the field, our 3rds, 4ths and 5ths narrowly missed the semi-finals. They were expertly led by Messrs Buckett, Stark and Harris and promising young on-field talent was identified and nurtured in these important developmental environments. 1sts and 2nds performed very well in finishing in the middle of the table - an impressive start to the rebuilding of our performances after the recent difficult years. Ian Salisbury (and his lovely wife, Emma) were a fantastic addition to the Club and we hope that they will continue to be involved for a long time to come. Geoff Milliken, another "old head", also made an immediate impact and

provided that much needed playing experience for our eager and talented 1st Grade side when he joined the Club this season.

A special congratulations also to the well deserved life membership bestowed on Greig "Robbo" Robinson. His contributions to the Club have been significant and extend over an incredibly long period of time.

In the difficult times that this Club has been, and continues to be, faced with in maintaining its position in the elite competition, it would be remiss of me to not also mention the support that we have received from the University. In particular, the foresight that has been shown in the Village Green Development will hold the Club in good stead as we forge towards our goal of being the premier cricket club in Sydney.

As I mentioned in last year's report, this is a marvellous club, rich in heritage and tradition notwithstanding its relatively short history in grade. We have shown the dogged fight this year that is required to pursue a bright future for the Club and that vigour within the Club must be maintained by all of us.

Comparison of 1996-97 and 1997-98 Grade Tables shows that we have improved significantly, particularly in the higher Grades and the Club Championship. The table below illustrates this.

I think that there were two main reasons for the improvement.

Firstly the availability of Michael Slater, Ian Salisbury and Geoff Milliken meant we not only had a very competitive and respected team but there was a filter down effect through the Grades.

Secondly the Club as a whole lifted its collective game with more members contributing to the organisation and importantly Café DP's great success.

From the Coaching point of view I was happy with the commitment of most players and think that the "back to basics" skill improvement we concentrated on in pre-season and throughout the year was the right approach and should be pursued.

Practice was conducted under some difficulty because of the redevelopment of the VG but we made the best of it at DP and in fact the early season centre wicket sessions helped everyone. While the undulations of the new practice wickets, losing balls up the hill and putting the nets up and down were annoying the effort of everyone was great.

Unfortunately we did not spend as much time on fielding as I would have liked because of the desire to get everyone a bat or a bowl and the need for fielders at centre wicket.

I was very happy to see that our batting improved markedly this season and the number of centuries scored outstripped previous years. However, it dropped off towards the end of the season and that is why we missed the semis in 3<sup>rd</sup>, 4<sup>th</sup> and 5<sup>th</sup> Grades.

All in all I think we progressed as players and a Club and if we keep concentrating on the skills we will reach the finals in all Grades.

I would like to pass on my thanks to Geoff Lawson for his outstanding contribution to coaching and the success of practice. He was there a lot and it showed in the attitude and performance of the players.

Also Jim Dixon, Ian Salisbury, Dennis Cameron (although work commitments limited him to preseason) and the junior development and Green Shield coaches Zac Zavos, Paul Urqhart, Sohail Mohideen and Alex Lamb.

Thanks to Roger Carr and Ray Galway for their help in providing centre wickets and general support of the Club.

Finally as you may know I will not be coaching next season and thank all Club members for the support and help over the past three seasons.

#### FIRST GRADE REPORT

The 1997/98 season has the hallmarks of the commencement of a new era of success for the first grade team at this proud club.

That may be a "big" call but I feel pretty comfortable with it. Why?:

- the weaknesses I mentioned last year that proved insurmountable have largely been cured in the form of our talented young batsmen substantially proving their worth (along with the addition of Salsy and Spike's experience and talent with the bat), a quality spinner whom we are confident we can retain with the Club, and some young batsmen and lower grade players performing at levels that will (if they haven't already) put pressure on the first grade players. There are still too many crucial catches being dropped but, I guess, not everything can be cured at once;
- this is part of my first point but I believe is worth highlighting separately our batsmen scored 8 centuries and clearly have learnt this special and crucial skill;
- the Club's traditional complacency in its focus on the continued supply of talented young cricketers into the playing ranks has finally disappeared. We have relied for too long on the natural introduction of country and private school students to the fold, not fully appreciating the competitive recruitment issues that are now part and parcel of what is still fundamentally amateur grade cricket. The Club is now making sure that those sources of the typical UNSW cricketer are fully aware of our existence in this elite competition and the benefits this Club is best suited to provide in nurturing their cricket careers as well as other of life's opportunities. Todd Hoare is only the first example of what I believe will be the new batch of Jim Robsons, Greg Livingstones, Jamie Bakers or Michael Slaters. He is one of these formerly more "natural" recruits who will force there way into first grade (and hopefully beyond). This is now a first grade side that is strong and positions will be hard earned. As in former days of glory, those who manage to make it will also drag our other young talented players to performance levels they should be attaining right throughout the grades: and
- having messrs Lawson (off the field) and Slater (on the field) available in much larger doses than usual doesn't hurt either.

Talking about how good we are going to be is, unfortunately, only ever talk (and my wife, who has been reading this over my shoulder, thinks that is all cricketers are really any good at). We can write-up our success stories when they come. For the moment I'll concentrate on the substantial successes within this year's first grade.

Individuals scored a lot more runs this year but, more importantly, many substantial

partnerships shaped our match winning scorecards. Slats and Salsy proved to be the main components of the higher order successes although, by season end, Pratty had taken over. The inclusion of Spike added much needed "real" batting experience in the middle order to assist Hayers in his efforts to ensure lower order partnerships developed. Our batting worked very well for us, a huge improvement on more recent years. Hawkesbury, Gordon and Sutherland the notable exceptions.

If our bowling could have matched the previous season's, things would have looked very bright. DP is certainly a factor that needs to be incorporated in any analysis of their performance. But, rather than relying on this excuse, I believe the bowlers could have performed at higher levels. Arguably that is a little too critical but, what the heck, I get labelled as too critical in any event so I'll just come right out and say it.

Fielding is still an issue and an area of our game that receives only tacit attention, rather than the concerted focus it requires. Not enough first and second graders (at least) are doing the extra bit of fielding practise in the varied, interesting, concentrated and, ultimately, constructive manner that is required. I would dearly love to see that change next year as I believe our semi final prospects hinge on this area of our performance.

Thanks to Manilla for his tireless and helpful efforts as our scorer and manager this year. To Henry and Livo as our coaches and mentors. To the other captains and Robbo for their support during the year in selections/strategies. To Ray Galway for his efforts in producing a quality cricket wicket when it was so important for the "perceptions" of the Club that inevitably arise at the SCA/NSWCA level. To the gorgeous Mrs Emma ("Blurter") Salisbury for being the most pleasant of house guests, for keeping Salsy on the straight and narrow, for afternoon teas, for walking the dogs, for trying to keep Hamish quiet at 3am. for drinking with the boys hours after her "poor-arse" husband has gone home, etc. etc. Thanks to J.P-C for his absolutely enormous and selfless contribution to the Club this year. Cafe DP was one of the big success stories within a club that is quickly getting its act together. What a great bloke and what a fantastic addition to the Club and its culture. My last thankyou to my wife who rarely gets a thankyou in my public commentaries because my thanks to her extend way beyond my cricket season. But even on a cricket note she is always helping me and the team out - entertaining at our place, the best afternoon teas, never complaining about my cricket commitments, and giving me some well-timed words of support to keep this deteriorating body going.

Finally, my congratulations to all of the first grade players on their efforts this year and their performances on the field. It is a great side to be involved in and I hope it continues to always maintain its unmistakable, yet difficult to define, UNSWCC character. I tend to get critical of their "underperforming" but that is me as captain and "wise-old-fart" talking. They are proving that the UNSWCC is a very important part of this amateur club level cricket that will prosper as an elite cricket competition and as a nursery for people who will be valuable members of our society - that is the Club's aim. The first grade players this year are part and parcel of what makes this such a great and enjoyable Club. I

should also note at this final point that Hayers, a classic example of the UNSWCC member (that's scary isn't it), may have disappeared for a while - but hopefully not. In case he doesn't return it is appropriate to thank him now for his "special" contributions to the Club (and to my daily e:mail workload).

#### JIM DIXON

#### The Players

Michael Slater: Topped the batting with limited (although increased) appearances. Has taken over the captaincy reigns when he is available and is proving his skills extend well beyond batting genius. Magnificent centuries at NDs (to kick-start our 1997/98 season), vs Campbelltown, and vs Manly. Hope to continue to see him around for at least a couple of matches next season as he is a wonderful clubman and ambassodor for the Club. Must be Australia's opening batsman for the forsecable future as his latter innings on the subcontinent proved when he is given a chance to settle back into the side.

Just because I'm sick of only having complimentary things to say about Slats I will add that he bowled a couple of, I suppose, tidy overs at Hurstville and dropped a few catches.

<u>Hamish Nott:</u> Continues to show ability and promise but no real first grade performances. Has a lot on his plate but still should be doing more to cement a place in the first grade side. He will probably now need to do a lot more to remain part of the side. His fielding can be brilliant but is too inconsistent. His bowling too has plenty of promise. Average drunk. Needs to keep his clothes on in the captain's backyard/pool after midnight.

Anthony Pratt: Back to the opening role in his season-by-season merry-go-round in the batting order, but this time a big success. His maiden first grade hundred vs Manly was a great knock. Bowled pretty well with some spells into hurricane DP being critical to our sides good showings. The catch of the season vs Randwick showed he still has that white West Indian in him.

Ian Salisbury: Historically, Pommies don't have a good track record in coming into Sydney First Grade cricket and performing well on or off the field. Boy did we strike pay-dirt with Salsy. "Cinderella/Santa/Salsy" was an outstanding success story even if his leg-spinning forte did not often prove the match winner it could have. With some lingering niggling injuries Salsy's "top drawer" bowling efforts were relatively limited, but crucial in our wins vs Randwick and Bankstown. His batting at No 3 was a highlight and showed that this talent should be released at the first-class level as well because he CAN bat. Most of all Salsy and his lovely wife Emma proved to be the perfect visitors to the Club and "longishterm" guests at our house. We will love to have him back for each and every English Winter he may have available to spend down under as he has added a lot in his short stay so far. Trouble is - from the Club's perspective - he's heading strongly towards getting back into the England side and we may therefore see very little of him (we'll make up for it

by taking Emma off his hands for these wonderful Australian summers that she enjoys). If he gets back in to the Test team he'll be the only reason the poms will get any cheers. Hopefully the name Salisbury (not his brother at NDs) will become synonomous with UNSW cricket.

<u>David Carson:</u> In previous years we were just wishing Carso would come good and be a significant part of the First Grade side's prosperous future. After this season, I believe we know he will. It will still need the same levels of effort in training and learning but Carso clearly turned a comer this season and I believe the next few seasons will see the fruits of this. Should keep working on his bowling and his catching is growing in confidence. A very good ground fielder capable of putting pressure on oppostion batsmen.

Ben Nott: Notty's season was arguably a bit of a let down from the previous year in pure batting terms. However, Notty was responding to the responsibility of being our No 1 batsman in 96/97 and trying to see us out of deep batting mires. 97/98 saw Slats, Salsy, Spike and even Pratty and Carso at the end of the year relieving Notty of these responsibilities to a certain extent. I believe Notty adapted pretty well to these changing circumstances and to the slightly different role. He will know next year, in an even stronger and better performing side, that he must take his chances with the bat when they come, as he is a class player capable of going further. Notty's keeping seems to suffer from some hand injuries although he generally takes them when they come. This is an area that will need a lot of work if he wants it to carry him further in the game and Notty has the toughness to work even harder on this part of his game.

Geoff Milliken: With very good reason the Club was a buzz with the news that Spike had decided to play with us in season 1997/98. Spike has been a close friend of the Club throughout his distinguished First Grade and First-Class career. Some of us (particularly Livo) have known Spike a long time and, although jumping at the prospect of him finishing his career with us, were saddened and angered at his treatment by his former club - a club that he served so loyally and proudly for almost 15 years. He now comes to the finest Club in Sydney Grade Cricket and we will benefit enormously from his presence on and off the field. I only hope we do everything we can to allow Spike to finish his cricket playing days with the respect and admiration he deserves. His disrupted season was not his best (understandably) but he played some crucial innings for us, none more so then Gordon and Randwick. Next year, I believe, his experience, combined with the other Club talent that is shining through, will see us into the semi-finals.

Matthew Hayward: A real quality all-rounder's year. Probably didn't bowl quite as well and consistently as he could have, but he genuinely swings the ball and gets higher order batsmen out. Very good catcher but resembles a 90 year old in moving around in the field. His batting was the highlight. Just used early season opportunities to occupy the crease and discovered how easy batting can be (probably one of the real life examples Carso finally learnt from). In fact he turned into our designated "slogger" and showed everyone what a great eye and ability to hit through the line he has. His innings' vs Hawkesbury, Manly, Randwick, and Gordon all stand out. He will do well in WA next year and hopefully return for more seasons with us in the near future.

Jon Horley: Jackster's season was again only fair given his natural talents. A few good

# 2 Day Competition

#### Round 3 vs Wests

Pleasant fielding conditions (not). We battled pretty well, Pratty, Salsy, Hayers and Shaker all doing good jobs into a hurricane that we learnt, during the course of this virgin (DP) season, was a climatic phenomena very peculiar to the DP region. I got 3/47 and proved to the world that:

- anyone can bowl off spin, and
- Jungle has been the biggest bowling "fraud" since Chappo gave himself a bowl in Intervarsity.

Pratty's 2/56 off 22 overs was a major reason we restricted them to 291.

#### Round 4 vs St George

They batted and looked uncomfortable against an attack starting to find its straps. Wazza's first fair spell for the year (after a world beating season last year) and Salsy's first quality performance with the ball were highlights. Shaker got Rummans and then had McNamara block one straight to Carso at short leg (he was about 4 at this stage). Embarrassingly (as McNamara described it later) he was given not out, went on to get 115 out of St George's 289 total, AND shielded his batsmen from Salsy when he looked like going straight through them. Not unrealistically, it is arguable the decision cost us 100-120 runs.

#### Round 5 vs Hawkesbury

Just a quick guess as to who won the toss on a very warm (fly infested) day at Hawkesbury. They decided to bat on what I would have to describe as one of the best cricket wickets I have seen. Good even bounce, a bit in it with the new ball and a bit of spin. Regardless of the location, it was a joy to play cricket on such a deck.

Simons was the only bloke who got any and you would be excused for thinking he was trying to get out - just not very good at it on this day. Everyone bowled pretty well, perhaps our main problem being a few too many loose ones. Anyway, we got them for 252, Hayers getting 5 for. Little did we know of what the umpire had in store for us in the 11 overs we had to endure that night (see above NDs report for an introduction).

First ball of the second over was Spike's first ball for his new club. Left hand bat, rightarm-over-left-ear-hole bowler (AND he almost bowls from outside the return crease), lands half way down, straight, but keeps low, hitting spike in front of leg, maybe just outside, but definitely hitting about middle, maybe middle and off with the angle. Think about the rules and physics....in fact, just think, and this is one decision that just can't be given out. Perhaps Spike's reputation as the nicest bloke in Sydney cricket worked against him. Left arm orthodox, around the wicket, right hand bat, newish ball and getting no turn, bowls arm ball, stretching a long way forward, no suggestion that not playing a shot, hit on the knee roll - out. We're 2/18 without doing anything wrong and the skipper displays all his years of experience and maturity in dealing with these situations, chips a wide one to cover and we finish the day at 3/22 - a good day undone.

We still could have, and should have won. Some poor batting by some young guns, Carso's run-out when he was looking the goods and a partnership with Hayers established, and a pretty fair attack, saw to that. The juggernaught was well and truly torpedoed, mainly by a tired and itchy trigger-finger. Hayers had a classic all-rounders match. His batting, in particular was reaching new heights. #### Round 11 vs Easts

With Slats available for this Sat/Sun game, my stint in 2nds saw me with a winning combination and spared the direct involvement in a 1st Grade debacle,

Slats wins the toss, bats, and we mysteriously get rolled by their seamers on a typical Waverly Oval slow turner. Spike tries to hold us together but we're out in 46 overs for 81.

They proceed to 4 for 121 at stumps and declare at 6 for 209 off 73 overs. We have been provided with a great chance to just bat out the game and deny them extra points that were up for grabs.

2 for 1 after 2 balls was hardly the desired start - including one of the more bizzare run outs (first ball of the innings) you'll ever see. Salsy bats extremely well and Spike is again

somewhat scratchy. 3/86 brings the two promising players (approaching "former" promising players) together for a match winning partnership. Benny and Carso bat so well it is, in hindsight, a little frustrating. They put on a very impressive 142 before Notty goes trying to up the tempo in the last 20 overs. We belt 114 off the last 15 overs due to Carso's awesome batting.

We should dwell on Pygmy No 2's innings for at least a few moments. From 0 to about 65 Carso just played it perfectly. Played himself in, chose his shots carefully and bided is time in accumulating runs on a wicket that (he has finally LEARNED) gets easier and easier the longer the day goes on and you are still out there. He was dropped at 66 and this sent him into his shell as the scare focussed him on that elusive maiden 1st grade ton. It was ugly through to 100 but he toughed it out and experienced what real batting and run scoring is all about. From 100 to 173 was Slateresque (in a mirror). They did not know where to bowl to him and his timing and stroke play were superb. I sense a real turning point in Carso's career and, therefore, the Uni 1st grade side's fortunes. He has always stood out as a talent that just couldn't seem to be converted into scores of substance and consistency. Carso appeared a batsman who had really not soughted out what run scoring (rather than "net-style" batting in the middle) was all about. He now realises that to look and feel "ugly" in the way you may be batting at any particular time means the proverbial fuck all. While you're still out there in the middle runs are available whether they be from the middle of the bat or off the gloves over the keeper's head. While you scratch around and guts it out in a difficult patch the wicket is settling down or you are getting used to it, and the ball is appearing larger and larger. Carso played it perfectly and I don't think he will look back from here because he knows he experienced the most valuable of lessons. Congratulations Carso, it was a great innings, with plenty more to come.

Bankstown started their run chase pretty well, losing their first wicket at 101. Salsy and Jack (in particular) put some breaks on things and produced the breakthroughs that reduced Bankstown's stars to 6/177. Scott Thompson proves a thorn in our side but Shaker grabs him and a mop up is all that is required (Holdsworth got away with a few slogs to push them up to 298).

A really impressive win that should suggest to some that the so-called disparity between the "top" teams and "bottom" teams is at best marginal.

# SECOND GRADE REPORT

Pre-season started that little bit earlier, a groove appeared around the University grounds where the Leahys and the Gainsfords of the club found a new resolution to improve their fitness, sports psychologists appeared with suspicious questionnaires and Second Grade were sitting pretty by Christmas in 4<sup>th</sup> position with 5 wins from 7 games. Team confidence was high and so were expectations with the traditionally strong post Christmas run still to come. Alas, history shows only one victory and one draw were to be recorded from the next 8 outings and a disappointing finish outside the top half of the table once again did not do justice to the talent in the team.

The end result for the Second Grade season was not that much different to that achieved last year but there was considerable improvement in how the results were achieved. The recurring problem of 96/97 was our batting and this year was a step in the right direction towards becoming a top rated batting outfit. Our consistency started to improve as shown by the fact that we did not pad up for the 2<sup>nd</sup> innings at all during the season yet we inserted the opposition a couple of times in an attempt to get outrights where we had the upper hand. This was a stark contrast to the previous year where we were consistently under pressure with failures in our top order which resulted in us getting knocked over for cheap scores too often.

This year, Hamish Nott proved he could play at a higher level and was the backbone of the innings before being promoted. Steve Norbury provided a highlight with his 126\* against Penrith and was the dominant batsman of our side. Many, probably "prettier" batsmen, could learn a lot from Tex's concentration and determination which were the main reasons behind why he topped the aggregate. Pete Carson stood up as a batsman at 2<sup>nd</sup> grade level with his 103\* against Hawkesbury although the grass on the rugby oval has never been the same since!! Traff finally found that elusive 50 and was steady as always, Dougie again played a few valuable cameos with Crewers chipping in a few times as well. Searly made his 2<sup>nd</sup> grade debut and showed enough to indicate his potential to secure a more permanent role and Damon Dermody proved that the gap between lower and higher grades is all about application to the task.

Once again our tail provided stiff resistance for the opposition bowlers with Capital playing some fine "Victor Trumpers" through cover and Micky Mag impersonating a higher order player a few times. Quince deserves a mention for his effort in flying down from his holidays in Queensland to play the second week in 2<sup>nd</sup> grade when we were batting, proceeded to bat out 20 odd overs for a face-saving draw and then fly back to resume his leisure activities. That kind of committment is to be commended. While improvements were definitely made, more are to come if we are to threaten for the coveted premiership.

The lack of century partenerships, especially in the top few wickets, is very disappointing, especially when half our games were played on the excellent DP batting surface which was a credit to Ray and his groundstaff.

Our bowling, while probably not quite of the extremely high standard of last year, was again the strongest aspect of the side. Any 2<sup>nd</sup> grade side would gladly accept 2 quicks of the calibre of Gainsford and Trafford who consistently troubled opposition batting lineups, often with not enough support from the fieldsmen. Pete Carson showed some early season form with his leggies and showed enough to suggest he possesses the talent to bowl consistently at this level. Mick Mag was probably the success story of the season for 2<sup>nd</sup> grade. After the previous season in 5<sup>th</sup> and 6<sup>th</sup> grade and the first few games of this season in 3<sup>rd</sup> grade, it was a big ask for Mick to replace the experienced Quince. To his credit, despite finding it tough initially, he kept improving and was rewarded with the outstanding figures of 6/53 vs Sutherland and was a valuable member of the attack. Disco did his best to beat Jungles' economy rate, Hamish bowled some fine spells of off-spin and Sludge woke up any sleepy umpires with some energetic appeals.

Our fielding was a bit volatile with some magnificent catches taken, notably Sohail and Searly vs Wests, but some inexplicably poor sessions occasionally endured. Maybe a bit more time could be devoted to this aspect of the game through the entire season. Dougie Morson appropriately enters the club's record books with the most wicket keeping dismissals for 2<sup>nd</sup> grade with 32. He has been outstanding with the gloves for the past few seasons. All in all, the effort and dedication of all team members is to be commended and the co-operation of all concerned made the season extremely enjoyable on and off the field (note that 2<sup>nd</sup> grade won the sculling at the Cricket Olympics!!). Finally, I would like to pay tribute to all those involved in the general running of the club this season. Vast improvements have been made, from Cafe DP with JPC to training with Livo and Henry. With the new "state of the art" Village Green back in action next year and a similar work ethic to this season, improvement will undoubtedly turn into success.

#### THIRD GRADE REPORT

A rebuilt third grade side started the season with a 60 over contest at Northern District's Somerville Oval. My first official duty as Captain was to call correctly and choose to bat. A solid performance by the top order guided us to a total of 5/212 after overcoming the effects of the early morning dew.

Paul Searle and Sohail (Damage) Mohideen led the way with 70 and 69\* respectively, with Daniel Bowcock (27) and Alex Williams (18) making a good contribution during the happy hour.

In the 12 overs before tea, Northern Districts reached 1/68 in a loose display form the new ball bowlers. From here, it was always going to be tough. Mick (Porno) Mag, making his debut up from 5th Grade last year, then blowed 23 overs, 6 maidens to take 5/65. He, along with Alex Lamb, 11/3/1/28 bowled us back into the game.

From 3/161, Northern Districts eventually passed us in a dramatic penultimate over, with only their last wicket in hand.

Game two against Penrith allowed us to field a stronger side with Steve Debello & Michael Kovacs coming aboard. With us bowling first, Penrith were soon in trouble as they limped to 6/117 at tea. Greg Dennis (Groggles) bowled superbly, although unluckily and was supported well by the experienced Micky Debello 12/2/2/29. The unlikely Paul Searle cleaned up the tail to finish with 2/6, to stop Penrith at 202. With 25 overs to stumps, our score of 2/51 was an adequate result.

Day two began disastrously with a baffling run out in the first over, soon followed by another wicket, that saw us 4/71. But Damage (27), the man with a stance and shot selection that answers the dreams of all out swing bowlers, gave good support to a match winning innings from Alex Williams (71). A comfortable 5/177 at tea soon became 8/193, with runs hard to come by. A nail biting crawl saw us pass them 8 down and then eventually bowled out for 254. Micky Debello carved an enerttaining 35 not out to complete a good all round effort. Win number one for the food guys. Unfortunately, the game turned sour when with 12 overs left, the Penrith Captain, Mr Sullivan, made us field for a second time. They scored 10 runs in what was probably the most boring session of grade cricket I've ever been a part of. Future 3rd grade captains, please take note!!

Game three saw us host Wests for our first home game, who decided to make use of the perfect batting conditions. To be competitive, our slow bowlers had to bowl well, and that they did. Porno once again displayed his improving skills to finish with 26/2/4/79. Not be outdone, Lamby at the other end bowled 20 overs of medium pace top spin to take the honours with 20/8/4/48. 227 in these conditions seemed a comfortable target. However, the 7 overs before stumps saw us slump to 2-9 after 2 interesting umpiring decisions. The now traditional run-out early on day 2 opened up the contest. An initially scratchy Greg Hackney (65) fought hard to eventually top score, but it was his partner, Dan Bowcock who got the ball rolling with a typically attractive 51 in short time. Alex Williams continued his food form with 40, again in quick time. 3 quick wickets then saw us fall to 7/187, still 42 short. 2 more wickets saw us struggling at 9/206, with the unknown Groggles batting jack. But the invaluable experience of Kurly Kovacs guided his partner over the line for yet another nail biter that gave the good guys 2 wins out of 3.

Game four saw the failure of me to convince my big sister to get married in the winter. UNSW bowled St George out for 201, with Porno again taking the honours with 22.1/11/4/27. He was well supported by North Coast recruit Adam Kinkead (8/1/3/20) and Bruiser (14/2/2/55). The chase was shaky at times but when Kurly and Porno got together 7/167, they again safely saw the side through to victory. Kurly made 29 not out, Dan Bowcock, 59 and Crewers 42.

At Hawkesbury, for game five, I lost the toss and we were asked to bowl on the hard, flat wicket prepared for us. My pre match pep talk was disrupted by the efforts of my late arriving opening bowler, attempting the simultaneous tasks of eating a sandwich and lacing up both boots. I then decided it was time for a come back.

A fierce opening spell by Groggles allowed me to mop up the pieces. At 9/69, it took a bazaar injury to end the innings, when the star not out batsmen fell over and called for an ambulance on 33. 9 declared for 113 was the total required in the 37 overs left for day one. I rediscovered the fun of new ball bowling to finish with 15/5/6/33, set up by a great spell from Groggles 12-5/5/2/26. The total was passed with 32 runs coming off the last 4 overs of the day as Paul Urquart (71) lead us to 3/114 at stumps. Day 2 was a chase for fast runs with Hackers (36\*) and myself (38) enjoying a quick slog to reach 6/209, 95 in front.

We disposed of Hawkesbury a second time for 161, with the best numbers coming from Quince 15/6/2/33 and Lamby 9/3/3/25.

This left us 67 to get in 6 overs. A brave effort saw us reach 3/39. As the season turned out, another 4 overs in this match may have been all we needed.

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Our next opponents, Campbelltown produced the most dramatic game of the season. Batting first at a hot hard DP, we were unbelievably soon in trouble, and were bowled out for a dismal 82. The amazing reply saw Campbelltown move from 3/58 to 7/77 and eventually all out for 82. A first innings tie. The last man being stumped by Kurly off Porno (the batsman making the fatal mistake of dancing down the wicket and playing for spin). I still can't believe that in those conditions, (next door, first grade bowled well to restrict Campbelltown to just under 300) how they could not manage to squeeze another run from somewhere. That is the beauty of the game we play. The stars with the ball were Groggles 7/2/4/18 and Porno 4/1/3/11. Our second attempt saw us reach 3/127 at stumps off 31 overs.

I ended our second innings at 4/255 after 57 overs, with Crewers making 128 not out and Damage 55. This left a generous target of 256 off 56 overs in very favourable conditions.

The visitors were soon in trouble at 4/23, but some good middle order batting saw the score reach 4/122 off just 25 overs. The target suddenly looked rather close. We had a game on hour hands. That was until Kinky hit the crease to take 3/11 off 8 overs. With one wicket needed for a memorable victory, the visitors held out the last 15 overs to leave us wondering if we would ever get an outright!

The next game against Gordon saw us again batting first in very favourable conditions at DP. Things were looking pretty awful until Kurly lead a rear guard action, making it look easy on his way to 60 not out to help us to 186.

The 15 overs before stumps gave us a chance to fight out way back into the game with one or two quick wickets. For not the first time during the year, Lamby pulled off a breathtaking catch at short leg to grab the crucial first wicket and swing the balance of the game. This gave us the momentum we needed and 3 more quick wickets before stumps saw Gordon at 4/51.

A broken finger to Kurly was a big blow to the team, but after an unlucky start, where Gordon reached 83 in quick time, wickets fell pretty quickly, with the 10th falling at 132. Another great win to the good guys. Groggles, Bruiser and myself shared the honours with 10/1/3/48, 8/1/2/36 and 16/3/3/39 respectively.

Our good form carried over to our next game at Manly. Bowling first, we soon reduced the home side to 5/46. A middle order recovery, eventually broken by Lamby just before tea, saw Many to a total of 151. Lamby again showed his value in cleaning up the tail with 3/16 off 6 overs along with another sharp catch at short leg.

The 25 overs before stumps saw us reach 1/89 with the experienced Jebby leading the way. We eventually declared at 8/227 on a damp day two with Jebby 60 and the debutant, Tim Martin 31. Alex Lamb topped off another good all round effort with 31 not out.

The game was put out of its misery with Manly 1/51 in their second innings.

Before our next game against Randwick I thought I'd try a little experiment to see how far my ankle would bend. The results were surprising but the consequence diasterous. Due to the relative difficulty in batting with crutches I handed over the reins to Henry for this 60 over contest.

A superb start of 9 runs from 6 overs by Groggles on a traditionally flat DP would unfortunately bear no fruit as Randwick steadily built the foundation of their innings. The word had quickly got around that the ex test great, Geoff Lawson was playing at DP and there were soon three or four people spread all around the ground hoping to catch a glimpse.

Once again, the introduction of the slow men tightened things up, with Lamby and Quince bowling well before lunch. Two run outs in the three overs after the break turned the innings around and eventually enabled the UNSW boys to bowl Randwick out for 215 in the last over. With three run outs, the best of the bowlers were Bruiser 6/0/1/16 and Lamby 12/3/1/26.

Lamby, who had started to show some good form in his last few outings played a responsible, attractive innings of 80 which swung the game. He came to the wicket at 4/28 and departed at 7/191 with 7 overs to go.

Henry's match winning innings of 56 not out saw the UNSW boys home with 5 balls to spare. Henry showed the maturity and experience equal to his years in guiding the side home to our eighth win on the trot.

Another home game against Mosman was our next encounter. Heavy overnight rain saw a delayed start, with the rain having little or no effect on the superb playing surface at DP. Mosman decided to bat first and Groggles again started strongly, taking the first two wickets. Unfortunately he lacked support, with the captain still limping around on a heavily strapped ankle. Mosman (although very slowly) made the most of the easy conditions and finished day on 3/141.

A quick slog and a declaration was expected early on day two, but it wasn't to be. Even with the lunch score on 6/273 after 86 overs, they continued with no urgency. Luckily, the three wickets after lunch came pretty quickly and left us with a target of 292 off 72 overs after they had batted for 92 overs. Groggles worked hard throughout the long innings to finish with 26/6/3/63 (despite 13 no balls).

Paul Urquhart and Searly got us off to a great start posting 81 in the first 20 overs. Todd Hoare batting at number three came to the crease with 211 required off just 52 overs. Todd began cautiously, and then set about the run chase in an epic display that showed great technical skill along with outstanding powers of concentration, patience and temperament for a man of just 18 years. We still required 41 runs off 5 overs when Todd reached his deserving hundred. With the job only half done, Todd along with Lamby, continued to steer the side home to a deserving victory.

Another entertaining finish, another win, the ninth in a row, which took us to the top of third grade with just five games left. Time to possibly reschedule those planned Easter holidays??

The 60 over contest against Easts was always going to be a spiced up affair. On a slow low turner, Easts scrambled together 192. All the bowling stats were helped by the slow out field and difficult wicket, but there were good contributions from Searly 10/2/3/27 and Quince 12/3/1/23.

Once again, early wickets allowed our opposition to apply pressure during the chase. Scoring runs was hard work with boundaries along the carpet a virtual impossibility. At 5/77 we were in all sorts of trouble. Lamby and I put together a hopeful partnership of 57. Matt Sanders then gave us a ray of hope with a typically quick fire 28 that took the score to 172.

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We eventually fell just 14 runs short in a disappointing performance.

We approached the next game against North Sydney, who were struggling near the bottom of third grade, with renewed determination. We had played good cricket all year and didn't want the loss of the last game to interrupt our charge for the finals.

As it turned out, this game, our twelfth game of the season, was the first game in which we were comprehensively outplayed over the two days. North Sydney decided to bat first on a well grassed wicket containing plenty of juice. We once again went into the game a little under strength in the seam bowling department. Although Groggles beat the bat many times, he probably lacked a little experience in not forcing the batsmen to play more often when the wicket was helpful early on. This is perhaps being a little harsh on Greg who has bowled consistently well all season, however, the valuable lesson to be learned is to make hay while the sun shines.

It was again the unlikely hero in Paul Searle who picked up the first two wickets, but the batsmen fought well in the difficult conditions, helped along by a little wayward bowling from us.

Greg returned to the attack and deservingly picked up a couple of wickets, but more importantly gave good support to Quincy at the other end who finished up with 27/7/5/60 despite being hit for some rather large sixes. Greg finished up with 22/4/2/45 and Searly gave good support with 8/1/2/28.

A total of 222 proved difficult to chase with their 'experienced' lineup making good use of the healthy mat of grass on the wicket, bowling a full length and a tight line. We were soon in trouble at 4/16, and slipped further to 5/35. Lamby continued his good form looking easily our most comfortable batsman and top scoring with 35. Our only hope was our partnership of 40, but when I fell and Lamby soon after the game quickly slipped away. We were eventually bowled out for 115.

The next game was at home against Sutherland who were only one point behind us in fourth position. We batted first in good conditions and again our top order failed which left us struggling at 5/68. Most batsmen struggled, apart from Crewers, who was aggressive and dominate. However, when he fell for 37, this left us 6/104. Quince then came to the crease and for 50 overs he had the answer to every physical and verbal challenge the Sutherland boys could throw at him.... and that was to BLOCK! Quincy's

determined, fighting, patient innings would only yield 19 personal runs, but more importantly, he held up one end and contributed to several partnerships that helped us post a moderately competitive score of 210.

Some rain during week two saw us start 30 minutes late and juiced up the wicket just a little. Groggles had earned a promotion to second grade which made room for the debutant, Eric Zenner (Hagar). Hagar was on soon after a failed attempt by myself to open the bowling. Hagar's first spell was impressive. He moved the ball both through the air and off the responsive wicket at a nice lively pace and was rewarded with two early wickets. One Sutherland batsmen played and missed many times early on off Hagar but survived to go on and eventually play a match winning innings of 83. Micky Debello came back well in his second spell to give us a ray of hope at 5/178, but it wasn't to be as Sutherland eventually passed us 6 down. The best numbers were from Hagar 20/1/3/54 and Micky 20/4/2/46.

At home against Bankstown we thought was our last chance at a semi final spot after our last three losses pushed us out of the top four. Bankstown won the toss and batted first on yet another perfect DP track in uncomfortably windy conditions. Despite a good opening spell from the trio of Groggles, Hagar and Micky, Bankstown built a solid platform with an opening partnership of 149 after some easy chances were missed.

A good fightback late in the day could not restrict the visitors declaring at 9/302 with 6 overs remaining. At stumps we were 19 for no wicket.

Kurly, promoted to open the batting (as nightwatchmen only!) was out early on day two. Runs were never a problem but wickets fell rather constantly. We were 3/90 off 29 overs when Todd Hoare fell. Sohail and Lamby then put on an encouraging 52 before they fell for 23 and 45 respectively. At 6/184, Hagar and I put on 40 before Hagar fell for 14. With 82 needed off the last 20 overs, wickets in hand was the key. At 9/278 I was joined by Quince with 25 needed in 5 overs. Unfortunately we fell 23 runs short in another exciting finish.

The loss last week of fourth placed Sutherland gave us a mathematical chance of making the finals. The last game of the season was another 60 over contest against Balmain. Unfortunately the game was spoilt by the nature of the wicket at Ryde. At the end of the hottest, driest summer for fifty years we were presented with a soft, uneven, grassless strip cut from a beautifully lush square. It played worse than it looked. In a disgraceful game of village cricket, Balmain were soon in trouble at 8/89, but managed to slog their way to 157. This was more than enough as we slumped to 5/28 in reply as our top order batsmen found themselves defending their noses from their medium pace trundlers. After the last

four losses it was obvious we didn't have the fight or fortune left needed to get us through this one. We were eventually bowled out for 111.

Despite our disappointing end to the season we have a lot to be proud of. During this season, we won two or three of the most exciting, tense games I have ever played in. The first innings tie against Campbelltown, the one wicket victory against Wests and the tough run chase against Mosman. Add to this our many other close games; the one wicket loss to ND's, the nail biting finish at Penrith, the hard fought win against Gordon, the 5 balls to spare against Randwick, even the unsuccessful chase against Bankstown. These were great games. Good fun and hard fought.

In the end we finished on 51 points, a vast improvement on last years effort of 6. Generally, the success was a result of 11 guys playing well as a team. This is evidenced by the fact that no bowler took more than 30 wickets, and no batsmen scored more than 330 runs, yet we won nine out of fifteen games.

However, there were a couple of consistent individual performers who made a great contribution over the season.

Greg Dennis lead the bowling from the front. He consistently troubled top order batsmen on one of Sydney's best batting wickets, DP. He finished with only 28 wickets, partly due to his failure to really cash in when the conditions suited him (no five wicket hauls and only one four wicket haul), and partly due to the fact that he was often very unlucky. It's quite often that these types of bowlers take more wickets in the higher grades.

Porno came and went taking 19 wickets at 14.73 in just five games. His improvement over the last two years has been outstanding.

Alex Lamb had a superb alround year. He is a captains dream. He had a major influence on many games either with the bat, the ball or in the field. He scored 312 runs at 24, with a top score of 80. He also took 16 wickets at 18.75. To top that off, he took 11 catches, about half of which would have been once in a lifetime stuff for all of us average cricketers. Lamby's ability to pull off such brilliant pieces of fielding was a great lift to the side, and a kick in the guts to the opposition. Lamby often gave our side the initiative and momentum to push home the advantage while in the field.

Lamby is very closely followed, if not matched, in the field by Sohail. Sohail topped the third grade aggregate with 325 runs at 23.21, but is also a major asset in patrolling the covers. Sohail often allowed me the luxury of leaving only one man in front of square because of his great skills. He was deservingly awarded the club fielding award at the annual dinner. He held 9 catches and executed 2 run outs during the season.

Bowie also chalked up 314 runs for the scason but failed to post a big score. Bowie is one of our most free flowing, fast scoring batsmen when in touch, which is such a valuable asset at the top of the order. Some hard work on shot selection, I'm sure, will see him achieve better things.

Last but not least, the return of Kurly Kovacs was a great asset for us. Apart from his keeping and batting skills, the wise, experienced head on his shoulders made a major contribution to several of our great victories this season.

To all the other guys who played third grade, thankyou for your contributions. I enjoyed the season immensely. After a season like that, anyone who is not looking forward to next year is either very hard to please, or is just plain stupid!

### SIXTH GRADE REPORT

On its face the 1997-98 season was a difficult season for 6<sup>th</sup> Grade. The team finished out of the semi-finals of the Moore Park & South-East Cricket Association First Grade competition for the second year in a row, winning just 4 games and losing 9, with one draw. Several of the defeats were heavy, and the team played one or two short on several occasions. And to add insult to moderate performance, the powers that were at Association level saw fit to penalise the team 6 competition points for a trivial delay in paying a trivial fine for a trivial 'offence', i.e. missing a routine Association meeting. This resulted in the team occupying next to last position on the table.

However this is to paint too negative a picture. In previous seasons I have written that the characteristics of 6<sup>th</sup> Grade mean match results cannot be an exhaustive test of success. Rather, success is a combination of factors, of which our scoreboards are but one. Other, arguably more important, factors are the success of 6s as a feeder for the Grade teams and the ability of the club simply to field 6 teams week after week, even in holidays. Most important of all is the enjoyment that the players gain when they get out of the house and onto the field on a Saturday afternoon.

So analysed, the season was, on balance, a success. The route to 5<sup>th</sup> Grade was not well travelled, although Mark Dorge became a regular there this season. And as already noted, the team was also short of players at times, partly (paradoxically!) due to the lack of a 7<sup>th</sup> Grade side. However the team which emerged thoroughly enjoyed its cricket – and off-field activities – and played competitively when not short-staffed.

Scason highlights were many. From a team perspective, most satisfying perhaps was the Round 7 win against Costello's, when an afternoon's tight bowling and fielding saw off the then undefeated competition leaders, despite a modest UNSW total. Not far behind was the win at Kensington against Randwick, if only for the rare majesty of a Jason Finlay 50. Anthony "Knoll" Greenhill on a seaming track provided an economical – and extremely effective – sideshow.

Individual performances of note were Ruche Wickremasena's century against a rather unpleasant Pagewood Hotel (plus a 50 against Glebe), dual 50s by Andrew Cavill and Anthony Wunsch, as well as half-centuries by 50s by Andrew Simmons, Dean Wenke, Chris Jameson and the transient Brett Laybutt and Andrew Rooke. Anthony Greenhill (twice) and Dean Wenke picked up 5 wicket hauls, while Anthony Wunsch, Ben Vonwiller and Martin Dilger all performed strongly throughout the season. Johan Rayappu also bowled well in at times difficult circumstances.

Overall, the team was slightly constrained by lack of batting depth and perhaps lack of bowling variety - 8 right arm medium pacers in one game may be slightly too many! However it is again worthwhile to stress that the best measure of the team's success was the enjoyment we had on and off the field (including a club best-practice performance at the Harbour Cruise). It was a pleasure to be a part of the team.

Leading roles among the 6th Grade cast of 10s were played by:

Chris Anderson: Ando's season was once again a mighty battle between the embedded magic of a 30+ year old "Don Bradman" bat and a 0.30 blood alcohol level 8 hours before game time. (Against Glebe, the hangover arrived after he was out!) The hangovers won narrowly, the battle to be resumed on the rugby field.

Andrew Cavill: Cav's role changed this season from off-spinning all-rounder to specialist batsman and handy sledger. Unlucky not to be given more opportunities with the ball (denied by a multitude of medium pacers), Cav nevertheless picked up a wicket or two in the mid-season friendlies (held offshore but not all overseas). Cav also scored two fifties, including a thunderous 68\* in 10 overs against Botany.

Martin Dilger: Pickles made a big impression in his first season with the club, both with his pace and with his in-depth knowledge of the Harold Park form. Genuinely quick at times, his company was often enjoyed significantly more by team-mates than by batsmen. Marty also shared the partnership of the year, making 16\* not out (if you believe the umpire) as Finlay raced to 50.

Jason Finlay: 100/1 represented both Jase's ratio of runs conceded to wickets taken and the odds of him making 50. However at the recently renamed Finlay Oval (nee Kensington), Jase cracked an extraordinary 56 not out to take the team from the brink to a winning position. His straight driven four of the back foot through lush grass will live in the memory.

Anthony Greenhill: 'Knoll' returned to the fold this year after an extended holiday the previous season, and was once again the mainstay of the attack. With 25 wickets at 15, Knolly once again proved that tailwinds, run-ups and high front shoulders are all over-rated.

Andrew Jones: Miscellaneous work, family and dental commitments saw the erstwhile skipper miss just about every second game for much of the season. These and an undoubted giant international conspiracy denied him the opportunity to play himself into form, score centuries, play for Australia etc.. Fortunately, however, Ben (and Christoph)Vonwiller also denied him the opportunity to make as many cricket-related phone calls as in previous years, for which he is very grateful. How else would he have found the time to run Warbs out?

Brett Laybutt:

Spoke at the pace Warbs runs, and approximately as often. Rolled his own cigarettes, and also manufactured late cuts at strange times. The form batsman of the opening rounds, Brett disappeared after Christmas in circumstances not yet fully understood.

Patrick Mills:

Young English redhead whose scoring ability was manifested mainly in off-field activity. Loose shots aplenty!

Johan Rayappu: His early-season opportunities limited by a glut of medium pacers, Johan showed admirable perseverance to come back in the second half of the season and be a valuable member of the team, both on and off the field. If he pitches the ball up a little more often, Johan will take a lot of wickets in the park.

Andrew Simmons: Able Seaman Simmons contributed strongly early on, but became elusive as the season progressed. This may have had something to do with his questionable navigational abilities, which saw him trying to find Booralee Park, Mascot, by first heading to Wollongong. If he doesn't go AWOL, or inadvertently invade New Zealand, Simmo will score a lot of runs for the club.

Ben Vonwiller: Kombi lived up to his nickname this season, not being particularly fast, but moving people around very effectively, both with the ball in hand and as stand-in skipper. Under-rewarded in wickets, and in partners who stuck around, Ben also carried the bulk of the administrative burden this season. for which the team owes him a huge thank-you.

Ben Wakeford: The other Pom, Ben was certainly older and probably somewhat wiser than his hormonal compatriot. Nonetheless, he found the methods of unorthodox attack employed by many Moore Park batsmen a challenge to comprehend. Despite this, and despite the unfriendliness of astroturf relative to the average Surrey greensward, Ben was a useful contributor with bat and ball, and we trust he enjoyed his season with the club.

Matt Warburton: "Shorts" was a Moore Park revelation, in look if not in batting style. A useful contributor with the bat (and wit), Warbs would have scored more runs had he not been run out twice late in the season. However, for a political strategist, he showed an unusual aversion to backing up.

Dean Wenke:

One of the "Three Ws" of the bowling card, Deano made a big impact in his first season. Swung the ball both ways, and did a little off the field wicket as well. The new Knolly, just waiting for a wind to bowl into.

Ruche Wickremasena: On the field, Ruche shows good technique, but at times poor shot selection. Off the field, .... Anyway, Ruche had a good season - he scored a fair number of runs, smashed a great hundred against Pagewood and kept wicket well. Most of all, he was on time to almost every game! However to go further he needs to keep his drives down, especially late on Saturday nights.

Anthony Wunsch: Same, same. Lots of wickets and lots of runs, exceeded only by attempted sledges of Cav. Wunschy even tried to increase his sledging opportunities by offering his long-time team-mate a job! As ever, Wunschy was consistent with bat and ball, and would have been the team's player of the year, were it not for some dubious off-field performances involving early nights, sobriety and proper behaviour.

Those of you fortunate enough to witness Tim Buckett's 1997 Barr Turn speech would agree that it was a memorable one. As well as including the obligatory review of Club shockers from the previous season, it bravely pioneered the use of live music and erotic audio visuals. This was a resounding success with many of those present.


However Tim's presentation and final Barr Turn selection did not meet with everyone's approval. Aside from the many who felt they didn't need to see his slide show it was also apparent that many of the Club's Old Guard, while acknowledging that my declaration on a 98 not outed Alex Williams was in keeping with the spirit of stupidity intended for recipients, the other reasons given were not and threatened the identity of the award. Greg Livingstone in particular took the selection as a personal affront, maintaining that it was the culmination of a "shit speech" and had been made to someone for being "normal", perhaps even seeing this as some sort of slight on his own existence. I would normally treat such an offering as just another manifestation of Livo's bitter and twisted character and let it through to the keeper but I was forced to play a shot when Club El Supremo Greig Robinson took me aside, explained the history of the Barr Turn and affirmed that the award should be made for on field incidents. Not for settling down. Not for lack of personal integrity. Not for porking adventures, unless of course you managed one during a game.

I view cricket's traditions as dubious. I am firmly convicted that it is an individual sport dressed up as a team game and that its outdated traditions help gloss over the fact that it is riddled with selfishness, hypocrisy and cheating. Arguments against this thesis are spurious and naive. However for some reason I took Robbo's words to heart. Perhaps because as Chairman of Selectors he straddles the Club as a colossus of integrity, I was persuaded that tradition had its place in the Barr Turn and that in my search for candidates I should concentrate on on-field incidents. Well, so much for resolve. My look back begins with an incident which occurred some three months before the playing commenced.

In July last year the Sydney Cricket Association called a meeting of lower Grade and Shire captains to discuss the coming season. This was the same Association that had recently attempted to add us to their scrapheap and had at one stage reduced us to an old fashioned whip around for anticipated legal costs. Many of us had felt that soon we would be faced with the absolutely unthinkable - the choice between life without Grade cricket or life at another Club, playing alongside people with whom we had naturally developed a poor relationship through years of opposition, macho posturing and more recently, their consideration of the issues regarding the future of the competition, which could be summarised as a vague notion that there should be less Clubs, that they shouldn't be the ones to go and the smart arsed students who did dodgy declarations should be.

It is history now that due to the efforts of Andrew Jones, Chappo, Orca, Livo, Henry, Disco and many others we survived, but it was time for the Club to truly get our house in order so that such a threat wouldn't repeat itself. One area immediately targeted was administration. The Club had a proud tradition of an effective but somewhat casual approach to this area. Finances were creatively and expertly controlled but not always documented. Assets were definitely held but exactly where was sometimes uncertain with

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investigation invariably unearthing a haphazard trail of back sheds and garages with pissed off wives to match. This form of administration relied heavily on anecdote and while this kept faith with the Club's larrikan traditions and made for tremendously entertaining committee meetings, the time had come for us to toe the line a bit more, empty out all the pockets of Jacky Jourdain's trousers and start getting our forms in on time.

So back to the meeting in July. Our Club was represented by the three lower Grade captains from the previous year - myself, Rob Stark and Matt Sanders. Unquestionably this was a good start to the Club's new era - 100% attendance at the first Association meeting and after a couple of cheap beers in the tasteful surroundings of the NSW Cricketer's Club we felt ready to contribute, to be constructive and to be heard.

Unfortunately the meeting proved to be a physical and emotional ordeal. It became apparent early on that the Grade and Shire Clubs did not share common problems and that much of the night would be spent with half the room wondering what the other half was going on about. This coupled with the Association's version of the Channel Nine commentary team in charge of proceedings, made for an excruciatingly boring evening. It was the unique form of boredom that was dished up regularly during our childhoods. It was the same feeling you got when you went shopping for furniture for three hours with your parents. The same feeling you got when you had detention after school or religious commitments on perfect sunny days.

The discussion dragged remorselessly on, eventually moving onto one day games. The Shires captains were pushing for a reduction in overs from 120 in a day to 100, their arguments being that many teams were incapable of batting for 60 overs and that the early start meant that many players were unavailable.

I would say that while most of the Grade captains found these reasons preposterous, emotional exhaustion was pushing us to agree to the change. Then, a dissenter. With a loud "excuse me" up shot Rob Stark's hand. "It seems to me that we are all missing the point here" he said as he climbed to his feet. "No one seems to realise that 50 overs per innings will mean less hours of cricket and therefore less time away from the missus .......and if you've got a missus like mine you'd know what I mean". As the room went into a second of shocked silence and then uproar he headed out the door in the direction of the bar and then reappeared in another doorway closer to the Channel Nine commentary team. "Thank you" he said, and disappeared.

That wasn't all. Later in the evening the subject of player awards was discussed. Nothing of great significance was suggested until Starky again piped up. "I reckon for any bowler who takes five wickets in an innings ...the Association should buy him a root" was his offering. Not long after we made our apologies and took an early exit, Starky suggesting it was a good night to drink drive because it was pissing down. His effort had saved the night in one sense but perhaps left us with the feeling that our new administrative era was on hold for a bit.

Our first pre season training confirmed that many things were back to normal. On 12 July Capital and Guava began lobbying for higher spots in the batting order. Livo had calmed down after his computer course or whatever it was that had encouraged him to produce

truckloads of paperwork for us to fill out the previous year and announced that we would be concentrating on skills this season. We liked the sound of this and we very happy to help him unload his mountains of witches hats and tennis racquets, so long as it meant we never had to do written homework about our failures again.

The Club's pre season trip to Dubbo was a success and although we actually didn't play any real cricket, we got the chance to parade our fashionable new Club clothing. As we proudly walked down the main streets of the town in uniform one word screamed itself to anyone watching -Professionalism. The highlight of the weekend was a probably a distinctly unsober local's exchange with a distinctly sober Henry after recognising him in the pub as "you don't have to tell me who you are...Geoff... er... don't tell me, .....Geoff er don't tell me .....er........ Jeff Thomson!" He then recognised Tex Norbury "from the TV" before we felt we had to stop him. There was also Dave Carson being hit in the head without playing a shot at practice and Matt Hayward slowly disrobing during fielding drills within view of the Club's coaching clinic for Dubbo's up and coming juniors worth a mention and as it turned out, a sign of things to come.

The season proper started with a one dayer against Northern District with our flagship team, Fifth Grade, returning to the top of the table despite recently appointed captain Gav Harris embracing his new responsibilities by declaring himself unavailable. In First Grade we paraded our new signing Ian Salisbury and manufactured a dream game with Slates winning a head to head with the Test Captain to the tune of 152 to 30-odd and perpetual big kid Disco getting 50. The day was also remarkable for Darren Stephen taking his first Test wicket and later superstitiously sitting in the same exposed and windswept spot on the hill at Asquith Oval throughout Slate's innings. Shakin' only allowed himself a quick break at afternoon tea before sprinting back to the same windswept spot just in time for the resumption of play. It must be a concern that Shakin's occupation is teaching. Does he tell his students that they will pass their exams if they wear the same socks and underpants they had on the last time they passed one? Does he acknowledge that ability and preparation might count for something? Do his students lapse into depression when their favourite pen runs out of ink, convinced that they will never write anything decent again?

With the season underway there were more signs that things were back to normal. The opposition had stopped saying that we wouldn't be playing in the competition next year and had returned to saying that we shouldn't be. And there was also the sight of Zac Zavos peddling his hand made cricket bats, allegedly supplied by one of his connections in England. There was a distinct lack of interest from our Club despite assurances from Zac that they were quality, with most of us taking him at his word but finding it hard to part with our cash because we harboured secret thoughts that while they looked fine, they sounded like something you knocked up in Year 7 Woodwork and consigned to use with tennis balls only after a couple of nasty jarring incidents. Early in the season Zac bravely asked Disco to give one a test run and in doing so sparked one of the first of a couple of hundred abusive and fruitily languaged E-mails sent by our First Grade captain over the next six months. Not to be deterred, Zac, like some sort of modern day Dennis Lillee, continued to market his bats and use them in the middle. This ultimately restricted him to only two hundreds before Christmas and it was no surprise when he mysteriously declared himself unavailable for an alleged overseas trip, no doubt accepting that the whole project

had gone horribly wrong and that it would be wise to lie low for a while. Well I put it to you tonight Zac Zavos that the bats you used to score those hundreds were made in England by craftsmen and the bats you tried to sell us looked identical but were more likely put together in a back shed in Queens Park by you.

In our run up to the Christmas break we showed a significant improvement over the previous season with five Grades still realistically entitled to fight off any suggestion from our loved ones of a weekend away at the end of March. However this new dimension of regular winning lifted the lid on the pressure cooker and gave some of us the chance to show another side of our characters. Beetle Von Willer was a good example. After Fourth Grade were cruelly robbed of a win against Gordon by the sort of inefficiency unique to Councils and other public sector utilities during the festive season, Beetle pursued justice through official channels and won. As we gazed fondly at the six points he had single handedly secured for us it was easy to forget that the same passion which led to this remarkable and sensible result had left some of us astonished and embarrassed on the field only months before. On the first day of an early game against Penrith in Fourth Grade it was the yahoo session after tea at Dave Phillips. Jungle was bowling to a young hormone who had done the hard work earlier in the day and was now sailing down the aisles filling his shopping trolley with easy runs. One shot sailed long and straight towards the sightscreen at long on only to be intercepted by a careering Beetle very close to or perhaps on the boundary line. For a fleeting moment he had his hands on the ball but to say there was any measure of control over events was to merge small measures of truth with large Showing his experience Jungle set about waving his arms in measures of fantasy. characteristic fashion and "negotiated" two runs instead of six with the umpire and the batsman while running in to bowl the next ball before anyone was ready. However while all this was happening, Beetle was extracting himself from the undergrowth behind the sightscreen and mustering the bare faced affrontery to claim a dismissal. On the field we could hear him shouting about something down amongst the shadows at the end of the ground but none of us believed for a moment that he could be possibly appealing for a catch. "He's given two, don't worry about it" we reassured him. "I caught it....he's out" was his frantic response. Beetle will no doubt still claim that the catch was legitimate, that control can be measured in microseconds and that benefit of the doubt should be thrown completely out of the window. But at that moment last October at least ten fair and balanced people thought the Barr Turn had been sown up and that anyone given out as a result of Beetle's acrobatic efforts would have been entitled to be a bit pissed off.

Another incident worth repeating from our successful first half occurred in Fifth Grade against Hawkesbury. After a late start due to rain Fifths bowled Hawkesbury out for 90, leaving Zac Zavos and Andrew Lindsay to negotiate the opening batsman's nightmare- a short bat in fading light with dismissal carrying with it the prize of another trip to Hawkesbury next week to do not much more than score, get the drinks and watch your team mates bat in perfect conditions. Mercifully for them huge black clouds rolled in and the umpires took them off, commenting in expert fashion as some umpires do that they couldn't see them getting back on that day. However it hadn't yet rained and the stumps were left in. Not long afterwards a meteorological miracle was complete and the clouds had passed without leaving a drop of rain behind. Before long the umpires had their hats back on and let captain Gav Harris know that play would re-start in 10 minutes. This all

seemed fairly routine for Gav until he was faced with Lindsay and Zavos clad only in underpants refusing to return to the field. They were adopting the position that the umpires' comments when leaving the field were binding and they would not move another muscle (and given their state surely everyone present was going to be able to verify this) until stumps were drawn. Ten minutes of negotiation produced no joy for the Uni captain and before long he found himself giving a delicate explanation to the umpires as to why his batsmen weren't ready. As the fielding side looked on some sort of sanity eventually prevailed with the re-appearance of two hastily equipped openers still vehemently protesting the injustice of it all. Lindsay was dismissed before stumps and read every word of the following Saturday's Sydney Morning Herald, while Zavos survived and went on to score a century on Day 2, despite every shot sounding like it had been hit with a fence paling.

The Club also got on the Internet this season. I have mentioned Disco's ever expanding use of

E-mail which had many in the Club and Dave Quinlan in particular wondering when he got a chance to do any work. His exchanges with Matt Hayward which dealt almost exclusively with Hayward's turkey neck-like genitalia sparked some controversy when they were published in a sealed section of the Club newsletter. For many years he had made his personal mission to play the shot at every opportunity to every type of ball and now was his chance to spread his gospel at grass roots level. In Paul Searle we had the nineties breed of cricketer who had a cynical view of human nature, played it hard and could do a bit of everything. And in Alex Lamb we had a passionate, driven perfectionist who didn't rate any opposition and was always keen to articulate these feelings to them.

Initially outsiders observed a fascinating battle of wills between the four managers for dominant influence on the team but by the end of the competition there was little doubt that Lamby had prevailed. To anyone watching it seemed that there was a team of little Lambies out there. Wide eyed crazy cricketers who had been sent out to war. A half fit wicketkeeper repeating "Lamby said no pain no gain" as he walked out to the middle swathed in bandages. Players appealing excitedly from all parts of the ground on every occasion the ball came into contact with pad. And Lamby himself doing his bit on the other side of the boundary by sidling up to opposition batsmen to give appraisals of their inability to handle the pressure. Things like "You're gonna get out mate. You're not good enough. You're not going to able to handle it out there mate".

Our season's second half was anti-climactic on the field after promising so much. However our packed, well organised and memorable social calendar provided other cause for celebration. In particular the Cricket Olympics gave us somewhat surprisingly our first nude participant - Darren Stephen who finished off his leg of the First Grade Stumps relay with a tastefully scrotum baring forward roll beneath the well lit and heavily populated Café DP private boxes. And we saw our inaugural Veterans' handicap sprint winner - Jungle who warmed up by running phantom in the open hormone's event. A little known fact about this night is that Mike Gregg lied about his age to his disadvantage thinking that he would not need the 18 metres start he was entitled to in the handicap only to lose to Jungle by half a metre.

As this dinner approached I received plenty of advice about who should receive the award but mostly these suggestions came from people who had a general feeling that a particular individual was a psycho. Many people suggested Capital but couldn't point at anything in particular. I did at least get one good story. During the 2<sup>nd</sup> Grade season there was some healthy competition between the squad of fast bowlers in the team. This group is perpetually in a state of punchiness about the batsmen in their team not getting enough runs and their fieldsmen not hanging on to their catches. These topics are to be avoided if you find yourself in conversation with them, unless of course you are fascinated by the statistics they have stored in their heads ready for quick release if the opportunity presents itself. Before one game it was noted in the dressing room that Capital was one wicket in front of Traff. Traff then took the first wicket to fall that day so Sludge thought it would be a good idea to use this as a motivational tool for Capital at the start of his next over. With Capital at the top of his run Sludge called from slip "Come on Capital - Traff's equal with you now." This was too much for Capital. He called back from the distance of 50 or so metres "Well if you could catch he'd still be two behind".

Others said Tim Martin and Simon Gerber deserved it for again just being themselves. Give me a story I pleaded.
