THE PRESIDENT'S REPORT

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The Fifteenth Annual Report & Financial Statement of the University of New South Wales Cricket Club are presented for your approval.

The advent of the 1964/65 season saw the expansion of the Club to five teams three in the Municipal & Shires Competition (the "C" Shires being instituted only this season) and two in the "fixtures" organised by the City & Suburban Association.

This was the most successful season in the Club's history. The First Eleven emulating the success of the Seconds in 1963/64, won the Club's first "A" Shires Premiership and with the assistance of the Second, who finished fourth in their division, the Club's first win in the Shires Club Championship was recorded.

It was on the initial suggestion of this Club that the third division (officially referred to by the curious name of the "Unofficial C" Division) was formed and, despite the fact that acute ground shortages enabled only seven clubs to participate, this was a most successful competition in which your Club finished in third place.

In his first full season as Captain of the Firsts, John Chegwyn deserves great credit for building this team into the fine combination which wrested the A Grade Premiership from Auburn-Lidcombe after that club had held it for three years. Despite a few setbacks early in the season, the team rose to the occasion and finished the season by winning the final outright. Harold Bundy's Second Eleven was unable to repeat its 1964 triumph, despite the fact that it finished in a better position than last year at the end of the 12th round, before the elimination round. The abolition of semi-finals as such left the team without a chance of taking the premiership again. Our congratulations are extended to Hammie Lennartz and his Burwood side in winning a well-deserved victory, their first for nine years.

Sutherland Shire carried out the C Grade trophy and had a fine season. It must be recorded here that they were beaten only twice during the season, once by us. This was only this club's second premiership in any Shire Grade and we take this opportunity of congratulating them on their elevation to the Grade Competition in the coming season.

The two City & Suburban teams had mixed seasons; the Fourths finishing the year with an almost unbroken string of victories, but the Fifts, often short, met little success. This is no reflection on the efforts of this team, or its hard-working skipper, Bill Vagg, as they gave of their best at all times, but found difficulties in maintaining interest in the City & Suburban type of cricket which has its limitations in being of a non-competitive split-time basis.

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In Intervarsity, the University did not fare as well. We were hosts to both Queensland and Western Australian Universities, losing by eight wickets to the former and receiving an innings drubbing from the latter after an encouraging start to the game on a poor wicket. In our third Intervarsity fixture we played New England at Armidale and won by an innings after piling up 359 runs in our first innings.

From these results it can be seen that there is considerable room for improvement. Success, however, can only become a reality if all players make themselves available for these important matches.

Annual Intravarsity matches against Wollongong and Newcastle were again played at the end of November at Kensington as trials for the Intervarsity matches. A return game was played in February against Newcastle University College at Newcastle. This game was the last Intravarsity game to be played against Newcastle and the Club looks forward to playing the Newcastle University in an official Intervarsity game next season.

Fewer social matches than in the past were played, only against the Randwick Club and the Prince Henry Medical Faculty. It is unfortunate that we could not arrange to meet Paddington in the usual social fixture, the more so now, as that club's future is in doubt following its removal from the Grade ranks just at the time of this report going to press.

The Club's Fourth Annual Dinner was held later than usual on 25th May, to enable Premiership Caps to be presented. The Dinner was highly successful and this may have been partly due to the fact that it was held during the vacation and all part-time students were able to attend. We appreciate greatly the attendance of Messrs. J.W. Chegwyn, a State selector and Vice-President of the N.S.W.C.A., and E. Wykes, an international umpire, for proposing the toasts to cricket, whilst George Borwick, a Vice-President of our Club and former international umpire, proposed the toast to the Club. Michael Reidy responded on behalf of the Club. Captain John Morris presented the trophies and Mr. Fred Snell, Secretary of Randwick, representing the N.S.W.C.A., presented the Premiership caps.

This was a season of broken records and mention should be made here of the efforts of the following players: firstly, John Middleton, became the first player to take fifty wickets in a season in the Firsts and to prove himself useful in other spheres took the phenomenal number of twenty-one catches and boosted his total of runs for the Club to over 1100. Well done! Kevin Daly made a new Club record of 161 not out against Sutherland "A", whilst in the Thirds, Bob Vagg, became the Club's first "denfer" man by taking 10-30 against Lindfield.

The Executive Committee of the Club has made a further application to the N.S.W.C.A., for admission to the District Grade competition, but our application has been again declined and it is suggested that the new Committee investigate further the future prospects of the Club.

Tim Creer, a member of the Committee, was also Secretary of the Council of Municipal & Shire Cricket Clubs and it was this body, re-formed after a lapse of six years which ran the "C" Grade competition, after the initial moves for this competition to come into being had been made by Messrs. Bundy, Garland and Creer of this Club.

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The Club had the use of four excellent grounds during the season; at Kensington, Prince Henry Hospital and two at David Phillips Field, Daceyville. Frank Gaskell, the groundsman at Kensington is to be congratulated on the excellence of the wickets of that ground. The job of the groundsmen at Prince Henry and David Phillips was much harder, particular at the latter ground where at the start of the season the ball had a tendency to go underground on the brand new wickets. By the end of the season these wickets had vastly improved and the efforts of the groundsman, Frank Terrence in this regard are greatly appreciated.

Thanks are also due to the staff of the University Amenities Office, Mr. I. Crac'nell, Mr. Ian Moutray and the secretarial work done on behalf of the Club by Mrs. Stevens. Their co-operation and interest throughout the year were greatly appreciated.

It is hoped that the Club's lean years are now well behind and that the future is a bright one. It is now that the Club must take stock of its present situation to ascertain the direction in which the future lies.

## FIRST XI REPORT

The 1st XI climaxed the 1964/65 season by attaining its first ever Premiership victory, as well as collaborating with the 2nd XI to give the Cricket Club its first Club Championship win. These successes represent a milestone in the Club's history and are a reward, not only to the cricketers who were privileged to play in these teams, but also to the numerous officials who have been striving for these honours since the Club's inception. Every member of the 1st XI can certainly feel proud to have achieved so much for themselves and the Club from the season just ended.

With the new regulations introduced this season by the N.S.W.C.A., the team was automatically ensured a place in the final, being Minor Premiers at the end of the twelfth round. In this match, we were to eventually meet our old rivals, Auburn-Lidcombe, and it was a pleasure to be able to turn the tables on them by defeating them in both encounters this season. But various stumbling blocks had to be crossed before the Minor Premiership was ours and these were overcome by a number of fine individual and team performances. Perhaps the finest individual effort belonged to Kevin Daly, who scored his maiden century for the Club in the first match against Sutherland. Kevin came in when the score was 2-0 and left the crease at six o'clock with the score at 9-349, his own contribution being a magnificent 161 not out, a new Club record.

Indeed it was a season of records for "A" Shires as four wicket partnership records were broken, the bowling aggregate topped by John Middleton with 51 wickets; the catching record for a fieldsman broken by John Middleton with a phenomenal 21 catches; the wicketkeeping record broken by John Pigott with 21 dismissals; the record team score smashed with 9-349(c); and the batting average taken out by Kevin Daly with an average of 44. These were some of the major factors contributing to the successful season enjoyed by the team.

Then again, it was the unusual strength in depth in the batting order which rescued the team on a number of occasions. It is interesting to note that, of the four wicket partnership records that were broken, three were for the 6th, 7th and 8th wickets. This is indicative of the number of times in which runs were at a premium and it fell onto the shoulders of the lower order batsmen to retrieve the position. Together with the good season enjoyed by higher order batsmen, this was a vital contribution to the side being dismissed for under 200 only on three occasions.

Throughout the season there were a number of fine individual batting performances. It would not be fair to select for comment any particular innings as it would be doing an injustice to those players who had batted so well but for whom space would limit sufficient comment. Instead, it is satisfying to note that during the season no less than 18 scores of over 50 were recorded, these being made by Kevin Daly, Bob Smith, John Chegwyn, John Pigott, Michael Reidy, Don Clark, Graham Sylvester and Max Gosling, with Bob Smith and Kevin Daly being the century makers. John Middleton narrowly missed joining this list with 48 not out in the final.

For the final Bob Ballantyne was promoted from No. 9 to opener after the team was shocked by the sudden illness and subsequent withdrawal of its regular opener, Bob Smith. Bob had batted so well and so consistently during the season that it was a pity for him to miss the final; his absence leaving a gap which was difficult to fill. But Barry Andrews, joining the team for the final, splendidly rose to the occasion when he and Graham Sylvester steered the team through a tense early morning period on the second Saturday to eventually take the University XI to a first innings lead. This, of course, was after Bob Ballantyne and Mike Reilly, with 84 and 54 respectively, had put the team in a commanding position at the end of the first day's play.

Allied with the batting success were the achievements of the fieldsmen as catches were held which undoubtedly swung the fortunes of many games to our advantage. This season 79 catches were held by fieldsmen, as compared to the previous season's tally of 41, reason in itself for the improved performance of John Pigott, who capably performed his duties behind the stumps after several seasons' lay-off. Reflecting on John Middleton's feat in taking 21 catches, it should be pointed out that three of these were taken in the first innings of the final and undoubtedly were among the best catches seen all season.

The bowling was of a good standard throughout, with John Middleton being the spearhead of the attack, taking 51 wickets for the season, an effort which speaks for itself. John was ably supported by Peter Ward, Don Clark, Geoff Garland, Bob Ballantyne and Ian Potter with Kevin Daly succeeding in breaking a few troublesome partnerships. Indeed, each bowler had his "match to remember" with a fine performance rewarded with a bag of wickets. Peter Ward did not bowl better all season than when he mesmerised the Auburn-Lidcombe batsman into a batting collapse in the competition round, finishing with 7-38. Don Clark captured 30 wickets during the season and was probably the most accurate and effective spin bowler of his type in the "A" Shires Competition. Don turned the ball appreciably both ways and was a constant source of trouble to the opposing batsmen.

Geoff Garland had particularly good games against Burwood and in the "semi-final" match against Sutherland, despite limited opportunities throughout the season and Bob Ballantyne, with 5 wickets in the final and Ian Potter, with 6 wickets in the match against Canterbury, were also successful. Ian, originally selected as Vice-Captain, unfortunately declared himself unavailable after the 6th round and his absence, particularly at that stage of the season, was a blow to the Club. In fact, as the season progressed, five members of the 1st XI were away for periods of two matches or more, but good performances by Barry Andrews and Alex Taylor in their absence helped to keep the team at the top of the competition.

Various other fine performances come easily to mind when reflecting on the season's play - John Pigott's hard-hitting knock against Roseville, John Middleton's hostile bowling against Canterbury and Pennant Hills, the batting of Graham Sylvester and Kevin Daly against Auburn-Lidcombe in the first round, Bob Smith's chanceless century against Lane Cove, and the grand recovery partnerships by Kevin Daly and John Middleton against Epping and Sutherland. Similar recovery efforts were instigated by Don Clark and Bob Ballantyne against Burwood, with Don Clark and Graham Sylvester battling against the oppressive heat to register a partnership of 112 against Sutherland in the semi-final game.

In closing this report, I thank the various players who formed the 1st XI at different stages of the season for the sporting manner and the alert keenness with which they played each game, these factors engendering a team spirit which ensured that each player, in addition to being able to look forward to playing each week, would do his utmost for the team in all situations.

## SECOND XI REPORT

The 1964-65 season was again a most successful one for the second XI. At the start of Round 13, we were placed third, so that up to this point, the seconds had had their most successful season to date.

Our performance in Rounds 13 and 14 make us think that we might have once again won the premiership had the normal semi-final and final matches been played. The facts are, however, that the competition was finally won by Burwood and we extend our congratulations to Hammie Lenartz and his team.

Clearly, the reason for our not taking out the premiership a second time, was our most unreliable batting. Time and again we failed to get going with batting line-ups that should have been good for at least three hundred runs. Notable examples of this type of failure are the dismissal for 68, by Auburn of a team that read like a who's who of University batting and also the dismissal by Burwood for 83, of a team that was capable of getting 200 for the loss of 3 wickets in the second innings. In neither case could the wicket nor light be blamed. I hope that the coming season will see more pressure being exerted by younger players in the lower grades for batting positions in the Shire sides.

The same type of criticism cannot be made of the team's bowlers, for it was in this department that we were strongest. In Ray Bayfield and Ian Lowe we had an opening attack that most A Shire sides would have been proud to have owned.

With one notable exception, our fielding was consistently below that required to win competitions. The notable exception was Clem Barrington, who, for the second year in succession, doubled the previous record for dismissals by a wicket-keeper with this club. In case the full significance of this achievement is not apparent at first glance, it should be noted that a batsman who wished to equal Clem's feat would have to score approximately one thousand runs in one season and two thousand in the next. Since our present system for awarding trophies does not cater for wicket-keepers, I hope that Clem will accept mention in this report as indicating that his feat has not gone unnoticed.

In concluding this report, I would like to thank everyone with whom I played during the season for making my task as Captain both simple and enjoyable.

### THIRD XI REPORT

The 3rd XI this year played in the new "C" Grade Municipal and Shires Competition. Seven teams played in this competition and although this made two byes necessary, the cricket was enjoyed by all. The team finished in third place behind Sutherland and Auburn.

Most of the matches throughout the season were marked by low scoring and many times only a few runs meant the difference between victory and defeat. A few more runs in some matches (particularly against Epping, who beat us by five and seven runs in two matches) could have put the team within striking distance of the leaders.

The main strength of the team lay in most matches in the bowling. This is perhaps best illustrated by the fact that five bowlers finished the season with an average of less than ten. These bowlers, Frank Martin, Jim Hollington, Phil Schofield, Bob Vagg and Bruce Dockrill, between them took three-quarters of the wickets to fall.

While on the subject of bowling, a number of performances are worthy of note. Phil Schofield finished the season with 51 wickets at an average of 9.36. Bob Vagg put up an outstanding performance against Lindfield with 10-30 in one innings. Phil Schofield also took seven wickets on two occasions ... 7-38 against Auburn and 7-23 against Lindfield.

Despite the good performances by the bowlers, only on a few occasions did the batsmen perform really well. A score of 238 against Auburn was a good effort as were scores of 182 and 178 against Burwood and Epping respectively, although the latter was not sufficient for a win. Apart from these, the batting was disappointing.

An exception to this was the consistent batting of Jim Hollington throughout the season. Jim scored 344 runs at an average of 28.67 and held the batting together on a number of occasions. In one case, against Sutherland, he batted throughout the innings to score 68 not out. A number of other good innings such as Jim Phipps (57), Laurie Berecry (52), Jock Salmon (97), Keith King (48 n.o.) and Phil Schofield (46 n.o.) were also played but unfortunately these were not repeated often enough.

Another factor which of course has its effects on lower teams is the constant change of players, but this, particularly it seems in a University Club, is to be expected. All told, 33 players played with this team at some stage, but of these, only thirteen played more than three matches.

In concluding, I would like to thank all who played for their cooperation at all times; a fact which helped to make the season most enjoyable for me personally. I would also like to thank Tim Creer who captained the team during the period of my injury and Tom Sullivan and Phil Schofield both of whom acted as vice-captain at various times.

Whilst the above statistics show that the team did not quite break even they do not reveal the complete story which is most encouraging, for despite a very poor start, the team finished full of running and could be one to watch next year.

The first half of the season proved somewhat of a disappointment as the team could only manage one victory in its initial eleven matches. Much of our early failure was due to our bad batting - the bowling at all times maintained a high standard. However, whilst I do not offer this as a complete excuse, it must be said in fairness to the batsmen that some of the wickets left a lot to be desired.

The latter part of the season saw a marked improvement and consistency in the batting with a result that the team won all but two of the matches in this period.

Opening bowler Dick Preiss deserves special mention; he bore the brunt of the bowling throughout the season and turned in a fine performance capturing 53 wickets which is a Club record for City and Suburban - congratulations Dick.

Our other opening bowler, Mick Waterhouse, who secured 30 wickets at an average of 13.5 can be well pleased with this performance as can Bruce Dockrill and Laurie Berecny, who captured 16 wickets (average 8.2) and 12 wickets (average 7.08) respectively even though they bowled in only four or five matches.

Of the regular batsmen, Dave Webster showed much improvement and played a number of fine innings as did Laurie Berecny and Dave Bell, who always batted in true City and Suburban style. Daryl Lacey, after being sadly out of form early in the season, came back with a vengeance with two fine innings of 79 and 67 against Hunters Hill and Nondescripts.

There were a number of individual performances worthy of note. Geoff Garland's unconquered 92 vs. Nondescripts, Ted Harvey's 80 not out vs. Briars and a magnificent 76 not out by Kev Daly vs. Radio Physics, which included a sixth wicket partnership of 108 with Laurie Berecny (39)

Wal Burke had the best individual bowling figures capturing 6 for 13 in the match against Cumberland. Dick Preiss twice took six wickets in an inning 6 for 19 vs. B.D.Y.S., and 6 for 21 vs. Sutherland.

The highlight of the season was the team's score of 3 for 195 in 110 minutes in the match at Birchgrove Oval against Nondescripts, thanks to a record opening partnership of 121 by Geoff Garland and Daryl Lacey. Unfortunately, the match resulted in a draw after rain forced play to be abandoned.

### C I T Y & S U B U R B A N " B "

In accordance with the rise in the number of students attending the University and with a view to affecting a corresponding rapid growth, the Club this season fielded a fifth team, making a second team in the City and Suburban Competition.

The season was divided into two sections, separated by a period of byes during January. The division was more marked, however, than the draw would indicate. The first section was characterised by close and well-fought matches, five of the eleven being decided by less than ten runs.

The most notable characteristic of the second section was, that during it, the team averaged seven to eight players, a number of which were drawn from non-playing higher teams or interested spectators. Under these conditions, the games frequently went into a second innings and were well described as "non-competitive social matches".

Matches, during the season worthy of note are: the loss by one run against Nondescripts at Birchgrove; the win by two runs against Manly at Centennial Park; the loss by two runs against Briars at David Phillips Field and the loss by 121 runs against Old Cranbrookians at David Phillips Field, despite our score of 127.

This last match did not commence until after two o'clock and during the 220 minutes of play, a total of 375 runs were scored, with Cranbrook scoring 248 runs in their 120 minutes at the wicket. This mammoth score included a 96 partnership in 25 minutes and a half century by Gulliver in 13 minutes, before being dismissed for a total of 70 runs, scored in 25 minutes. The next time we met Cranbrook we managed to keep their score down to 219.

There were a number of fine individual efforts during the season, the most notable being the bowling and batting performance of both Alan Evans and Dave Starr.

The overall results for the season were three first innings wins, two matches drawn, sixteen losses on the first innings, and one outright loss. Despite the lack of numerous victories, and the reasons for it, the season was not a dismal failure for the fifth team. Firstly, the team provided a means by which a number of club members were able to play when they would not have been able to do so had only four teams been fielded; secondly, it gave the Club the opportunity to observe some players who will no doubt be playing in higher teams in the coming seasons; and thirdly, it laid the foundation for the further growth of the Club in the future.

In conclusion, I should like to thank the many members of the team for their cooperation during the season and especially those members who continually turned up even while knowing they would only make the team's sixth man.

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The team that was selected to play against a strong Western Australia University touring side was J. Chegwyn (Captain), D. Rogers (Vice-Captain), J. Pigott, T. Creer, A. Christlo, J. Middleton, T. Collins, I. Lowe, I. Mackay, G. Garland and D. Watts.

On reputation, the strength of the W.A. University team lay in their batting, but their bowling won the game for them.

Because of the dampness of one pitch, the game was two hours late in starting and when Inverarity won the toss he breathed a sigh of relief and sent New South Wales University in to bat. In scoring 187 on this pitch, the N.S.W. side put up a fine performance as the popping and turning ball made batting difficult.

Rogers' play off the back foot was masterly and while he took a few risks his 52 was an example the rest of the team should have followed. Christlo's 24 and Pigott's 21 were bitter-sweet affairs; bitter in that they did not fulfill their earlier promise; sweet in that "it was beautiful while it lasted". Most other batsmen got off the mark and some even looked promising but mostly through improper technique on the damp wicket they played into the bowler's hands.

Jock Irvine with 4-69 and N. Parr with 4-40 were the principle wicket takers. Both were at the most medium pacers, but succeeded in bowling to a length and to a field. Irvine's off-cutter on the damp pitch was quite vicious.

Given twenty minutes to bat out the day, W.A. University was unlucky to lose a wicket on the last ball of the day.

Inverarity and Oats opened the second day's play on a hard true wicket and Inverarity soon showed his class with a lightning pull and a cut for boundaries. However, at 9 he misjudged a faster ball and was bowled. Campbell joined Oats and this pair slowly added to the score taking no chances, but hitting out at the loose ball. In this period particularly Low bowled very well, and it was no surprise when he trapped Campbell L.B.W. for 35.

Irvine joined Oats and gave us a delightful exhibition of hard, purposeful hitting; favouring the front of the wicket with drives and pulls. Only 6 runs short of his century Irvine drove hard a low and Mackay picked up a smart catch. Oats followed soon after but in playing the sheet anchor role had helped himself to a neat 65.

The University of N.S.W. XI defeated the University of New England XI comfortably by an innings and 17 runs. The bowling was of a similar standard on both sides, their fielding was of a higher standard than ours, but our batting was far superior in all departments.

The University of N.S.W. won the toss and batted first on a good, firm pitch and in oppressive heat. After a reasonably poor start, 1-14, 2-45, opener Graham James and Kevin Daly settled down and both batted well. Daly was out shortly after lunch for 34 and then Warren Brock joined James and the two put on 85 in smart time before James was out for a chanceless 63. Brock was out for 55 to the second new ball and then John Rowland pounded the attack for a hard-hitting 81, which included many fine pulls. Graham Richardson's 35 and Allan Evans' 23 also made valuable contributions.

This side was a very strong batting side and it was pleasing to note that everyone went for their shots at all times. The total of 369 was made in 250 minutes and included 52 boundaries - 66% of the total - and this was indicative of the batsmen's willingness to hit the ball hard.

New England lost one wicket before stumps and on the next day after being 3-102 at one stage collapsed suddenly to steady bowling from off-spinner Brock, who took 5-41 of 21 overs. He got good support from Allan Evans 2-36 and John Rowlands 2-30.

Forced to follow on New England were 2-96 shortly before stumps but collapsed to be 5-103. On the third day they batted stubbornly, but the last two wickets fell to Bob Vagg's first over with the new ball shortly after lunch.

Our bowling attack was never hostile at any stage, but the bowlers attacked the stumps and the New England batsmen found it difficult to pierce the field and score runs. Allan Evans finished with match figures of 6-95 and showed ability to swing the ball and bring it back sharply from the off. Warren Brock's 6-96 was steady without being very penetrating and tied the batsmen down throughout his marathon 41 overs. Graham James came to light with three much needed second innings wickets for 25 and Bob Vagg picked up three wickets, although he did not bowl as well as he can.

The fielding was not of a very high standard and at least ten catches were put down. The ground fielding was reasonably good with Graham James outstanding. The team mixed well and we were treated to a tremendous time by New England.

Our side could have been made much stronger by the inclusion of a good fast bowler and a good spinner, but nevertheless, the side turned on a very fine performance against the New England side, which unfortunately was below full strength.

The remaining W.A. University batsmen offered little resistance and their last wicket fell at 245, a lead of 58 runs.

Middleton and Lowe were the most successful bowlers, taking 6-75 and 3-51 respectively. Whilst Middleton bowled consistently, Lowe at times was very dangerous and worried most batsmen with his swing and speed.

New South Wales University scored only 39 runs in their second innings, thus losing outright by an innings and 19 runs. Paul Magnus was the chief wicket taker bagging 7 wickets for 12 runs. This most decidedly was his day, but whilst he bowled fast and accurately the batsmen did exactly what he wanted. I predict that it will be many years before the University of New South Wales cricketers forget this bumbling experience.

It was a pity that the game should have ended so quickly, for a number of New South Wales University bowlers were looking forward to W.A.'s second innings. However, that was not to be.

The Western Australian tourists proved themselves able cricketers and most likeable chaps off the field. At least we can say we won the boat race.

This was due to good bowling by Garland and Ballantyne, but N.U.C., per media of John Rowland in particular, fought back and soon hit Garland out of the attack. Rowland was stumped off Don Clark with the score at 144, but the tail wagged sufficiently for the final score to be 171, the first time a Newcastle side had been all out at Newcastle for quite a considerable time. Bob Ballantyne was the best of the New South Wales bowlers, finishing with 3-45 from a sustained 15 over spell.

Kensington started poorly against the hostile attack of Kevin Gilbert and Chegwyn, Gosling and Daly were out with 50 runs on the board. Clark and Ballantyne then took the score to 80, when Ballantyne was out, and then in a dour partnership between Clark and Peter Ward a further 44 runs were added. With time running out three more wickets fell before stumps, Don Clark being the last out for an excellent 47, an innings which had held the side together. The score at stumps was 9-148, 23 runs whort of the Newcastle score.

In the fifteen matches played between the Newcastle and Kensington Clubs since 1955, we have only won three. We look forward to meeting them in a full three day Inter-Varsity fixture in the near future when we might be able to balance up our previous poor results against them.
