## REPORT OF THE GENERAL COMMITTEE

The Sixteenth Annual Report and Financial Statement of the University of New South Wales Cricket Club are presented for your approval.

The Club fielded five teams for the 1965/66 season. Four of these teams played in the Municipal and Shire Competition, and one team played in the fixtures organised by the City and Suburban Association.

The 1965/66 season was the Club's best to date. The First XI retained their "A" Shires Premiership without being beaten; the Second XI gained fifth place in the "B" Shires Competition and enabled the Club to comfortably hold the Municipal and Shires Competition Club Championship Trophy for its second consecutive year.

Last season only seven teams contested the "Unofficial C" Division Shires Competition. This season, twenty teams played in this Division, which has become the official "C" Shires competition under the auspices of the N.S.W. Cricket Association. The Club fielded its Third XI and Fourth XI in this competition. The Third XI finished in nineteenth place, while the "Graded" Fourth XI took out tenth position.

Our Fifth XI played in the City and Suburban Competition.

John Chegwyn once again captained First XI. The 1965/66 season was the most successful season for the Club's Firsts. They were undefeated throughout the season, and a drawn final, because of rain, possibly prevented them from gaining 100 competition points which is a very commendable achievement. They finished with 94. The Second XI, under Rob Lucas, finished fifth in the competition won by Epping, who have been runners-up in this Division for many years and we extend them our congratulations.

The new C Shires Division was won by Balmain I team, and we congratulate them on their success. Tim Creer's Third XI was the enigma of the season. This team was just not meant to win. In the "clash" with our Fourth XI, the Thirds were beaten. However, the Third XI provided many players throughout the season for the higher teams. This prevented the settling down of a regular Third XI which must affect a team's performance. The Fourth XI, captained by John Hall, turned in a creditable performance to finish tenth in the C Division Competition.

The Fifth XI, skippered by Bill Vagg, won 7 matches during the season. Whilst they at present play in the non-competitive City and Suburban fixtures, it is important to realise the potential worth of our Fifth XI, and, as well, the Fourths and Thirds. If we are admitted to the Grade Competition sometime in the future, we must be able to field strong teams every week. To do this, especially over the long vacation period, we are going to need cricketers of quite some potential in our Fifth XI, and possibly a Sixth XI.

The performances of the University in Intervarsity matches indicate that we must make a concerted effort to field stronger teams. Our game against Queensland University resulted in our being defeated by an innings in two days, playing under perfect cricketing conditions. This is the worst performance of this University in an Intervarsity cricket match. In our only other Intervarsity fixture during the season, we beat Newcastle in their first Intervarsity match. It was during this match that Graham Sylvester scored a chanceless 204 runs, the highest score ever in the Club. Congratulations, Graham, a very fine innings.

Another Intervarsity match was arranged against New England University, but they were unable to field a team, and other mutually acceptable dates could not be arranged.

The highlight of next season will be an Intervarsity match against the University of Western Australia in Perth during January, 1967. We have been given the honour to play in the first Intervarsity cricket match to be held in Perth, and it is even more important that we field a good team. Incidentally, a new U.N.S.W. Sports Association ruling means that no player should be unavailable for financial reasons.

The 1965/66 Intravarsity match against Wollongong was drawn because of rain.

One of the Club's best performances was recorded last season. A combined New Zealand Universities cricket team toured Australia, playing matches against individual Universities before playing a combined Australian Universities XI in a "Test" Match in Melbourne. During the tour, the New Zealand team was beaten only three times out of their eleven matches - by University of N.S.W., by Melbourne University, and in the Test Match. Their defeat by us was the first on tour after four successive wins. John Middleton captained our team on this occasion, and his bowling certainly spear-headed the Wales attack. Fine batting by Graham James secured him a position in the combined Australian Universities team. The University of N.S.W. certainly made its presence felt in Australian University cricket by this performance.

Four social matches were played in the 1965/66 season. We played Randwick District Club twice, I. Zingari, and Sydney University. These social games are a most enjoyable day's cricket, and we urge more Club members to take a keener interest in these fixtures.

The Club's Fifth Annual Dinner was held on 31st May. Over fifty people attended, and made it a most successful evening. Captain John Morris proposed the toast to cricket, and Mr.R.Flockton, former State and International player, replied. The toast to the Club by Mr.Dunnicliff from the Epping Club, was responded to by John Middleton on behalf of the Club. Mr.B.Sheidow, representing the N.S.W.C.A. presented the "A" Shires premiership and Shires Club Championship trophies. Mr.J. McKenzie, President of the Shires Council, presented individual trophies to Club members.

A Club Single Wicket Competition was held in March. This was a highly successful day, and some good cricket and sportsmanship has ensured this of being a regular fixture in the Club's calendar.

The Club organised a golf weekend at Leura in early April. This weekend attracted about 30 club members in all, and proved to be a very enjoyable time.

During the current term of office, the General Committee appointed an "Apparel Sub-Committee" to investigate the design of Club caps and the possibility of having a Club tie. On the recommendation of this Committee, it has been decided to adopt a new pattern cap, largely due to the fact that in the past our caps have been somewhat "non standard" in their design. The new caps will be "unveiled" at the Annual General Meeting, when the Premiership caps are presented. At the time of writing it would appear that, due to economical factors, the proposed Club tie will not be adopted for the time being.

Tim Creer, a member of the Committee, is also Secretary of the Council of Municipal and Shire Cricket Clubs. It was this body which ran the "C" Shires competition in 1964/65 and which had this competition accepted by the N.S.W.C.A. as an official competition for the 1965/66 season.

Once again the Club had the use of four ovals during the season - on the campus at Kensington, Prince Henry Hospital, and two at David Phillips Field, Daceyville. Next season the oval on the campus will probably not be available. Part of the University's building programme necessitates the moving of the oval across the campus towards the Main Building. The Club will then use the other three ovals until the new field on the campus is available. The work of Frank Gaskell, the groundsman at Kensington, and Frank Terrence, groundsman at David Phillips Field, was greatly appreciated.

We would also like to thank Mr.I.Cracknell and Mr.I.Moutray and their staff in the Amenities Office, for the advice given and secretarial work done, during the year. Without this assistance, the general administration of the Club would be infinitely more difficult.

The Club now appears to have overcome its teething problems. The number of players is increasing each season, and the Club is becoming a closer-knit body. The social activities organised are designed to ensure that each member is aware that he belongs to the Club. Inter- varsity matches are the "cream" of University sport, and the Committee urges all Club members to avail themselves of the opportunity to play in these fixtures. For the Club to continue its successes, it must be remembered that there is more each player can do than simply play on a Saturday afternoon. The future aims of the Club are fairly clear, and quite ambitious. The Club needs the continued support of all members.

FIRST ELEVEN REPORT

The 1965/66 season saw the 1st XI climax a successful season by becoming Premiers for the second year in succession, this time, however, managing to remain undefeated.

The team had basically three changes from the previous season's side, with Harold Bundy, Barry Andrews and Ian Lowe, the "newcomers", all consolidating their positions with strong performances throughout the season. But the fact that the team was undefeated was the only real change from the performance of last year. In a somewhat remarkable comparison exactly the same number of catches, seventy nine, were held by the fieldsmen, with John Pigott increasing his tally of wicket-keeping dismissals by three. Indeed, John's performances at times verged upon brilliance and he was a constant source of confidence and inspiration to the bowlers. As was the case last year, there were four wicket partnership records broken and it is significant that of these, three were for the sixth, eighth and ninth wickets, thus denoting the all round batting strength of the side. Slightly more wickets, 186 to 177, were taken this season by our bowlers and the batting averages, on the whole, were on a par with the previous year. So, purely on the basis of statistics, there was every reason to expect the team to do as well, if not better, than the season before.

However, turning from statistics to the personality element, several players had outstanding performances for the season. John Middleton, after a relatively quiet start, began to strike form in the fourth round match against Lindfield and from then on proved a force to be reckoned with. John smashed his own club record for most wickets in a season, boosting his total to 58, a really fine effort, but perhaps his best performance was when he took 6-31 off 17 overs against Auburn-Lidcombe when we defeated this team in the fifth round.

Geoff Garland had an impressive season and with subtle variety for a bowler of his type, he managed to snare 47 wickets. Geoff seemed to be called upon to do more bowling than in other seasons and proved his ability by taking 6-25 off 12 overs against Roseville in the semi-final.

These two bowlers were ably supported by Ian Lowe and Don Clark. Ian bowled consistently well during the season and with a little more luck would have finished with more handsome figures. Don's strength lay in his all-round ability - if he didn't get wickets he would score runs and if he didn't score runs, he would get wickets. Two of Don's fine batting performances come easily to mind. First, his fighting century against Burwood which enabled us to declare at 9-216, after being a desperate 8-91, and secondly, his dynamic partnership with John Pigott against Ryde when these two added 113 runs in 67 minutes to put the side in a winning position after being 5-50.

John Pigott had a remarkable run of batting success after the seventh round. In his last six completed innings, John scored 357 runs, the climax being his century against Canterbury in the twelfth round when he scored 102 runs out of the team's 182. This feat of John's was a major factor in helping the First XI to remain undefeated in the latter half of the season.

Kevin Daly batted consistently during the season and for the second season in a row topped the batting averages. Kevin was unlucky to miss out on his century against Burwood in the thirteenth round, scoring 96, but undoubtedly his finest knock during the season was his 72 not out against Auburn on a wicket that was, to say the least, uncooperative and on a field laden with thick grass. Graham Sylvester also played a stylish knock in this game to finish with a plucky 59. It was in the above-mentioned match against Burwood that Harold Bundy capped a number of fine performances during the season by notching the third century for the team for the season with a hard-hitting 104 in 150 minutes.

But aside from these fine individual performances, there were a number of concerted team efforts which highlighted the season. Ninety one runs were scored in 32 minutes in a race against the clock to defeat Pennant Hills outright in the all day game in the sixth round, a victory which pushed the team to a clear lead in the Competition Table. This followed exciting matches against Canterbury and Roseville, the latter game demonstrating the batting strength of the team when we tallied 5-319 in 230 minutes in reply to Roseville's 9-309 declared. Indeed, during the season the First XI were dismissed on only three occasions. Then followed solid victories over all the other Clubs in the Competition, a feat which led the team to meet Auburn-Lidcombe in the Final.

For the Final, play was curtailed due to inclement weather, to approximately one half of one day's play, a disappointing end to a dry season. This limited time available ensured that the match finish in a draw and, being Minor Premiers, we were adjudged Premiers for the 1965/66 season.

I would like to thank everyone with whom I played during the season for their continued support, making my task as Captain both simple and enjoyable, particularly John Middleton who, as Vice-Captain, was a true source of strength.

SECOND XI REPORT

The Second XI had a successful 1965-66 season though not finishing higher than 5th. The team contributed to the Club retaining the Club Championship and, in terms of matches won and lost, performed as well as the "seconds" of the previous two seasons.

Our congratulations go to Epping for winning the premiership and there is no doubt that they and Burwood were the two best teams in the Competition.

At the beginning of the season the side lacked experience with names like Bundy, Lowe, Kemp and Salmon missing. Taking into account the usual high turnover of players, the team welded into a solid combination without having great striking power in either batting or bowling.

In the field the team had its best days when it bowled out Canterbury, Auburn and Bexley each twice in one day. The best batting efforts were 5-277 against Pennant Hills in under 3 hours, and 9-270 against Bexley when, for once, the team batted right down the list. An interesting fact is that the team was only dismissed ONCE after the 4th round and that was on a wet wicket against Burwood. Bad days were had when Lindfield bowled us out cheaply twice on a good wicket and on two occasions when, after obtaining first innings points easily, the batting failed dismally when chasing quick runs for outright wins. Luckily the tailenders staved off the deserved defeats on both occasions. In the field, the worst day was against Canterbury whom we had beaten outright early in the season. Innumerable catches were dropped, costing us any chance of reaching the final.

Turning to individuals, Darryl Lacey, returning from the lower grades, batted better than ever before with the Club. His 81 at Pennant Hills was the best innings of the season and he played lone hands in both innings at Lindfield. His slip fielding was superb with 13 catches in the first 9 matches. Jim Hollington was a solid opener and made a fine "100" against Auburn. Ted Harvey and Dave Pocock started the season well but their batting fell away later. Both these young players must give more attention to their fielding. Alan Bishop, late in the season, showed batting promise and his fielding was excellent. Alex Taylor always looked like runs but didn't get them this season. Max Gosling, when with us, was always more than welcome, performing well with both bat and ball. He made a grand "100" against Canterbury.

Of the bowlers, Phil Schofield moved the ball around as much as any bowler in the competition. His 11 wickets in one day at Bexley was a highlight of the season. Ray Bayfield seems to bowl better with every new gray hair. His figures suffered because batsmen often weren't good enough to get an edge. Bob Vagg bowled well with 6-25 at Lane Cove being a fine effort. Bob would do even better if he bowled more on the stumps. Bob Turner, in his first season with the Club, was always accurate and was very successful in the first half of the season. Jim Pratley is developing into a good cricketer and when his leg-spinners are more accurate will do well. Our wicketkeepers John Tainsh and Clem Barrington performed their difficult job well and by their application should have been an example to some in the field.

The fielding of the side left much to be desired. Some players, especially younger ones, must realise there is truth in the sayings that "catches win matches" and "a run saved is a run scored". The ability was there but often the application was not.

THIRD ELEVEN CAPTAIN'S REPORT

Twenty teams took part in the new 'C' Division M.&S Competition, including two, the thirds and fourths, from your club. Out of this twenty, the thirds finished 19th, the "Phantom" Fourth's, tenth.

Whilst this may look like a case for a full "enquiry by the stewards" there were many factors which occurred during the season which undoubtedly contributed to this state of affairs. Not the least of these was the selection policy to maintain the fourths with as little disruption to the basic team as possible when they were doing far better than us and had a show of reaching the semi-finals.

This was a situation which never should have arisen... and the fact that it did, is a reflection on every member of this club. The selectors did not want to disrupt any team except where promotion on merit was justified. This theoretical ideal is impossible to achieve in practice, as it is obvious that unavailability of players is inevitable for what might be termed legitimate reasons. However, when a team is upset due to some individual deciding to go fishing... or taking part in some activity which makes it quite clear that he is only playing cricket when there is nothing better to do, then there should be cause for concern. And, in the season just past, this was exactly what happened.

Those players in all grades who carried on in this manner should seriously consider whether they can call themselves good club or team members. We are playing four competitive grades in this club, and in this cricket we play to win, not just to have a game of cricket every so often.

The combined load of 'legitimate' unavailability, and the other brand, left the selectors in a position where it became almost impossible to maintain even the nucleus of the competitive teams, and no team was harder hit than this one. In fifteen rounds, thirty-seven players were selected for the thirds and in no fixture did the same eleven take the field together. And, it was not until the thirteenth round that players were actually dropped to the thirds due to poor form. Several had, of course, done the yo-yo act.

With these facts in mind, it is not strange that this team was unable to settle down as a unit. At the start of the season we were a team of 'strangers' each not fully aware of the other's ability and this situation was never entirely corrected.

Unfortunately, the first round apart, when we received a merciless thrashing from Balmain 1, the spirit of the players made each game a pleasure to take part in, and there were times when we played together like a team inspired. Those who played will never forget the stirring finish against Auburn when, in a race against the clock, outright victory was missed by four runs after a first innings deficit of 50. Or against Manly 2, when our opponents needed 40 to win with six wickets in hand and 80 minutes to go, and we won the game by nine runs at ten to six. Close results were in fact our forte, and only 5 runs in five games cost us 30 competition points.

For was the team without talent. Individually the honours were shared by Peter Southwell-Keely and Alan Bishop. Pete joined the team after the first few matches and up to Christmas his performances were not outstanding. The advent of 1966 saw a remarkable change, and in the games in which he was fit he took 35 wickets at an average of just over 5. In all of his 43 wickets in the season 37 were either clean bowled or lbw. At his peak "the Sprite" is one of this club's fastest bowlers and will surely be in higher teams next season.

Alan Bishop came to this club after many seasons on matting, and was slow to settle down on turf. Once he found his feet he treated us to some excellent displays of sound technique and tremendous application. He was unlucky to miss the coveted 'ton' twice, being out for 90 & 98 during the season.

John Phipps developed tremendously from a "push and prod" opening batsman to the middle of the order where he was able to unfold strokes not credited to him in the past. As Vice-Captain he showed himself to be a fine student of the game, whose counsel was always valued. His fielding was also out of the top drawer and he missed nothing that mattered, but the fieldsman of the team was undoubtedly Dave Webster whose versatility and anticipation left nothing to be desired. Dave is one of those useful cricketers whose ability to score runs at the right time or pick up the vital wicket makes him one of the most valuable members of a team. Two others who deserve mention are Peter Nicholls and Stan Livingstone. Peter has the potential to develop as a medium pacer of the finest order. Stan, despite a mid-season lapse of form, showed particularly at the end of the season just what a valuable bowler he is to this club. We did not see enough of Bruce Dockrill or Cliff Roberts for the team to reap the full benefit of these two talented cricketers' abilities.

Finally, I would like to say that the season was a good experience for all concerned. Despite our handicaps we played to win, and to enjoy the game. That successes were rare did not dampen our enthusiasm and I am optimistic as to the results next season.

FOURTH XI REPORT

The 1965-66 season marked the entry of the Fourth XI into competitive cricket, as the Club's No.2 team in the newly formed Municipal & Shires "C" Grade Competition.

The team finished tenth in the competition in a field of twenty and I think can be well pleased with its performances throughout the season, winning more than half of the matches played. If there was any feature of our play that prevented the team achieving a better record, I would say that it was our unreliable batting - one week 4-216, the next all out for 77. Fortunately, however, we were able to win three or four matches despite indifferent batting, mainly due to some fine individual performances.

The highlight of the season was our match against Balmain 2, which provided a most exciting finish. After trailing by 3 runs on the first innings we were set 168 runs in 135 minutes for outright victory. When our 9th wicket fell with fifteen minutes left for play we still required 11 runs. Geoff Clark joined Allan Evans who was 46 and gradually the scores were levelled. Allan settled the issue with the first ball of the last over when he hit Balmain's fast bowler over long on for six.

Allan Evans, Dave Starr and John Frazer were the mainstays of the batting and could nearly always be depended upon to contribute a reasonable score. John Frazer made the highest individual score of 79 in the match against Wests. He was closely pressed by Allan Evans who topped the half century on two occasions with scores of 77 not out against Auburn and 60 not out against Balmain 2, the latter innings was, in the circumstances, the best individual performance of the season. Dave Starr made his top score of 73 in the "grudge" match against the 3rd XI. Tom Downes, John Knight and Dave Bell also made a number of useful scores.

The bowling maintained a good standard throughout the season. Slow left-hander Geoff Clark in his initial year with the Club was leading wicket taker and top of the averages. Geoff captured 38 wickets at an average of 13.18 and as he gains experience will no doubt add to his bag. Another newcomer, Ron Connors, was second in the averages, taking 21 wickets at 13.82 unfortunately Ron was only available for the first half of the season and was lost to the team just when reaching top form.

ick Preiss secured 19 wickets but was very much handicapped by unresponsive wickets. Tom Downes, although he bowled in only four matches, captured 11 wickets - he was almost unplayable on the damp wicket in the match against Auburn.

Our wicket-keeper Dave Bell did a splendid job behind the stumps figuring in 17 dismissals, 8 catches and 9 stumpings - his combination with Geoff Clark proved most effective.

The team's fielding was in the most part fairly good except in one department. The exception was slip fielding where there is considerable room for improvement; a number of reasonable chances were put down during the season.

The Fourth XI enjoyed its cricket and I would like to take this opportunity to thank every member of the team for his help and cooperation throughout. I also wish to thank the Club's Teams' Secretary, Geoff Garland, who ensured that we also took the field with a full side.

INTERVARSITY REPORTU.N.S.W. versus University of Queensland14-16 December, 1965

It is probably fair to say that the performance of this team was very disappointing. Our traditional opponents, the University of Queensland, proved far too good and won effortlessly by an innings.

The home team won the toss and elected to bat first on a fast, true wicket at St. Lucia No.1 oval. Early Queensland batsmen had considerable difficulty with the opening attack of Vagg and Lowe, the former swinging the ball disconcertingly in the heavy atmosphere. Only Howard Stack looked confident, and when Pratley captured his wicket for a solid 63 shortly before lunch, the Queensland total of 3-91 looked unimpressive.

After lunch Queensland captain Terry Powell began to take charge, but when he swung Pratley high to Vagg at square leg the home team was 5-161. Wicket-keeper John Maclean was then badly missed from the third ball he missed, but settled down to play a hard-hitting innings of 90. He and Bill Manning thrashed the bowling in an aggressive partnership of 126, Manning remained 55 not out when the innings was declared closed at 39. The N.S.W. fielding became quite ragged during this onslaught, some relatively easy catches went begging.

Pratley bowled very well throughout the innings, and was unlucky not to finish with better figures than 2-43. Opening bowler Ian Lowe secured three wickets in a long spell, and Ashley Byron's accurate bowling was rewarded with two wickets. Bob Vagg and Peter Southwell both bowled very well in the morning session, and were unlucky not to finish with better figures.

N.S.W. was left 40 minutes batting time on the first day, and the Queensland bowlers let fly a venomous assault. Alex Christlo glided to the fifth ball of the innings down into the gully, where John Evans made a glorious diving catch. Alan Bishop was dismissed in the next over, so that Max Gosling and Ashley Byron became associated with the N.S.W. at 2-0. They batted solidly to carry the total to 35 at stumps, when Byron was dismissed for 28 on the next morning the partnership added 47.

disastrous collapse then ensued. Only Geoff Goodwin, who contributed 15, gave any real support to captain Max Gosling. Max carried his bat for a stylish 65 not out, but the innings closed for a dismal 117. Speedster Morgan bowled extremely well, to finish with 5-48, and the fielding of the home team throughout the innings was superb.

Following on, N.S.W. gave an even more dismal display and were dismissed for 81. Max Gosling again top-scored with 33, and Ashley Byron, batting No.8, was 26 not out when the innings closed. Medium-pacer Bill Lavarack wrecked the middle batting, and finished with the impressive figures of 5-16. The Queensland fielding was again exemplary.

Queensland thus defeated us by an innings, with almost a day to spare. They were by far the better team, and our congratulations go to them on their fine victory. Inexperience undoubtedly contributed greatly to our batting collapses, and our fielding lapses were of considerable assistance to the home batsmen. It is a little dispiriting to be on the wrong end of the sort of hiding this team received, and it is to be hoped that more of the experienced players of the club will be available for future Interschool matches to prevent repetitions of this debacle.

U.N.S.W. Versus N.Z. UNIVERSITIES

Winning the toss, N.Z. Universities sent U.N.S.W. into bat on a pitch that had been softened by  $\frac{1}{2}$ " of overnight rain. It was soon obvious that the pitch, whilst causing the ball to lift, was fairly slow and did not worry the batsmen as first feared. The opening bowlers, Gowland and Edward, had to be careful as the approaches to the wicket were far from firm but when Gowland began to stretch out in his seventh over, he strained a back muscle, preventing him bowling for the remainder of the game. However, up to this moment he had not worried the batsmen and it was left to Edward and off-spinner Beban to dismiss the U.N.S.W. batsmen. Two batsmen in particular they found hard to shift. In scoring 56 and 51 respectively, James and Pigott were mainly instrumental in U.N.S.W. making a reasonable score. Their batting was a mixture of much defence and little attack, tight bowling causing them to earn every run. Both Lucas and Clark looked set but were out to very fine catches.

In mid-afternoon N.Z. Universities began their first innings but at the close of play were 9 down for 105. By the afternoon Beban had showed us that the wicket had quickened quite considerably with the ball still bearing suddenly off a good length. Vagg struck a great blow for U.N.S.W. by bagging the first two wickets. After a short but glorious innings Thorne hit a firm catch to Lucas off Middleton's slower ball, after which Garrod, Barry and Henderson followed in quick order. Disappointing bowling from the spinners allowed the tail to wag a little before the end of the day's play.

Barry closed N.Z. Universities innings and sent U.N.S.W. in to open the second day's play. The pitch had dried out and played quite evenly, and with Gowland out of the bowling, Barry was forced to ring the changes often in an attempt to dislodge the U.N.S.W. batsmen. It was Edward however, who did the most damage mainly with leg cutters. James & Pigott again shone in the second innings with shots all around the wicket. Some of Pigott's drives were breathtaking. Healy's second innings showed definite promise of a big score, before being bowled by a beautiful ball from Edward. Slings and Andrews found the bowling much to their liking and batted out until Middleton closed the innings, leaving N.Z. Universities 278 runs to bat in 170 minutes. At this stage the pitch was perfect for batting and a rate in excess of a run a minute was easily attainable.

When Middleton bowled Collinge's first ball of their second innings, N.Z. Universities decided to close the game up and bat out time. All batsmen excepting Thorne and Garrod attempted to do this. These two players went out to attack the bowling and after Thorne had again fallen to the slower ball, it was left to Garrod to score runs. Even though Garrod effectively cleared off loose balls, the spinners Clark and Garland dominated play.

With most batsmen not attempting strokes it was a question of probe, probe, probe by the bowlers. Garland was deadly accurate with variations in flight and spin giving him two LBW decisions and a stumping. Clark's bowling was outstanding, the ball biting off a good length both from his leg break and googly. Clark, in fact, has never bowled better and his effort was worthy of a state player. Gosling finally cleaned up the tail with 10 minutes to spare.

In losing outright by 185 runs, N.Z. Universities suffered their worst defeat on tour, due mainly to their lack of wrist spinners, Gowland's breakdown, and inadequate batting. U.N.S.W. were superior to their opponents in every department and thoroughly deserved their win.

at Newcastle No. 2 Sports Ground.

After winning the toss, New South Wales was happy to accept first use of an excellent wicket but suffered an initial setback when Graeme James was bowled by Collins with the third ball of the match and Jim Healey was caught at the wicket with the score at 36. Graham Sylvester joined Terry Andrews and together this pair took the score to 183 when Andrews timed a drive to be caught at mid-off for 75. Wickets fell steadily until Peter Southwell-Keely, the last man, joined Sylvester with the score at 271. Batting very well, this pair took toll of the tiring Newcastle attack to add 91 when Sylvester was dismissed (on the morning of the second day) for a magnificent 204, the first double century scored for the Club, scored in 315 minutes.

Newcastle commenced confidently until Ian Lowe rendered Curran "hors combat" for 20, then bowled Archibald for 13 and the home side retired for lunch at 2 for 74. Except for a sharp chance to Andrews from a luckless Bob Vagg immediately after lunch, Derek Rogers, the Newcastle skipper, pounded the rather thin New South Wales attack to a score 155 runs until he dragged a very wide ball from Lowe into the stumps. When Mendel missed a full toss from Peter Horwitz the innings soon closed for 350, only 4 minutes before stumps on the second day. Ian Lowe in a gutsy performance on this bowler's graveyard, bowled unchanged between tea and stumps to finish with 5-103..

After winning for the second time on the morning of the third day, James Healey laid the foundation for a large score with a partnership of 89 in 91 minutes. When, however, Healey was stumped by Rogers for 77 at 2 for 110, New South Wales slumped badly to 8-152 to the fully flighted off-breaks of Booth and Brook. Tail-enders "Sprite" Vagg, obstructed effectively while Alan Bishop collected a polished hundred out to boost the total to 183 and leave Newcastle 125 minutes short of a score 196 runs to win the match.

Derek Rogers accepted the challenge and thrashed his way to 58 in less than an hour when he lifted Horwitz to Sylvester at long-off. Runs were abundant but wickets fell quickly to a hostile Ian Lowe and a steady Bob Vagg. Notwithstanding a hurricane 59 from Terry Collins in 45 minutes, Newcastle innings closed at 168 - a deficit of 27 runs.



Fortunes fluctuated remarkably during the game, highlighted by the outstanding performances of the respective captains, Graham Sylvester and Derek Rogers. Proving that he doesn't "just run fast" Ian Irvine captured ten wickets for the match, shattering the stumps on no less than seven occasions in what must rank as his greatest performance for the Club. Altogether New South Wales seemed to take the initiative in "obtaining" first use of the wicket while the Newcastle side relied rather much on Derek Rogers to both score runs and take wickets. In all, a most enjoyable match in which it was indeed pleasing to extract a little vengeance for some many past defeats at the hand of the late Newcastle University College. The team's thanks are warmly extended to Harry Bradford, who worked ceaselessly to make our visit such an enjoyable one.

For the first time for many seasons, N.S.W. was pleased to play host to Sydney at Kensington in a one day match. Losing the toss, as usual, John Chegwyn opened with Jim Healey on a lively wicket, but with the score at 10, both openers were back in the pavilion, both dismissed by Jakes. Barry Crews and Mick Reidy led the revival to take the score to 71, when Barry Crews was caught and bowled by Cross. Reidy found another partner in Ian Pigott and this pair batted well to take the score to 134 without further loss at lunch. Sydney's bowling tightened considerably after lunch, on the now excellent wicket and while runs were at a premium, Reidy completed a graceful and polished half-century. Alan Crompton, particularly in this period, really showed himself to be a class batsman with a cast iron defence and a fine array of strokes.

Coming behind the clock Sydney attempted to force the pace against the desperate N.S.W. attack and wickets fell rapidly so that at stumps Sydney were 7-173. It was only as time ran out that John Chegwyn, that most penetrating and wily leg-spinner, was able to make inroads into the Sydney batting.

The one day match is of insufficient duration to achieve a meaningful result between the two Universities, and we look forward to further matches in the coming seasons.
