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REPORT OF THE GENERAL COMMITTEE

The Sixteenth Annual Report and Financial Statement of the University of New South Wales Cricket Club are presented for your approval.

The Club fielded five teams for the 1965/66 season. Four of these teams played in the Municipal and Shire Competition, and one team played in the fixtures organised by the City and Suburban Association.

The 1965/66 season was the Club's best to date. The First XI retained their "A" Shires Premiership without being beaten; the Second XI gained fifth place in the "B" Shires Competition and enabled the Club to comfortably hold the Municipal and Shires Competition Club Championship Trophy for its second consecutive year.

Last season only seven teams contested the "Unofficial C" Division Shires Competition. This season, twenty teams played in this Division, which has become the official "C" Shires competition under the auspices of the N.S.W. Cricket Association. The Club fielded its Third XI and Fourth XI in this competition. The Third XI finished in nineteenth place, while the "Graded" Fourth XI took out tenth position.

Our Fifth XI played in the City and Suburban Competition.

John Chegwyn once again captained First XI. The 1965/66 season was the most successful season for the Club's Firsts. They were undefeated throughout the season, and a drawn final, because of rain, possibly prevented them from gaining 100 competition points which is a very commendable achievement. They finished with 94. The Second XI, under Rob Lucas, finished fifth in the competition won by Epping, who have been runners-up in this Division for many years and we extend them our congratulations.

The new C Shires Division was won by Balmain I team, and we congratulate them on their success. Tim Creer's Third XI was the enigma of the season. This team was just not meant to win. In the "clash" with our Fourth XI, the Thirds were beaten. However, the Third XI provided many players throughout the season for the higher teams. This prevented the settling down of a regular Third XI which must affect a team's performance. The Fourth XI, captained by John Hall, turned in a creditable performance to finish tenth in the C Division Competition.

The Fifth XI, skippered by Bill Vagg, won 7 matches during the season. Whilst they at present play in the non-competitive City and Suburban fixtures, it is important to realise the potential worth of our Fifth XI, and, as well, the Fourths and Thirds. If we are admitted to the Grade Competition sometime in the future, we must be able to field strong teams every week. To do this, especially over the long vacation period, we are going to need cricketers of quite some potential in our Fifth XI, and possibly a Sixth XI.

The performances of the University in Intervarsity matches indicate that we must make a concerted effort to field stronger teams. Our game against Queensland University resulted in our being defeated by an innings in two days, playing under perfect cricketing conditions. This is the worst performance of this University in an Intervarsity cricket match. In our only other Intervarsity fixture during the season, we beat Newcastle in their first Intervarsity match. It was during this match that Graham Sylvester scored a chanceless 204 runs, the highest score ever in the Club. Congratulations, Graham, a very fine innings.

Another Intervarsity match was arranged against New England University, but they were unable to field a team, and other mutually acceptable dates could not be arranged.

The highlight of next season will be an Intervarsity match against the University of Western Australia in Perth during January, 1967. We have been given the honour to play in the first Intervarsity cricket match to be held in Perth, and it is even more important that we field a good team. Incidentally, a new U.N.S.W. Sports Association ruling means that no player should be unavailable for financial reasons.

The 1965/66 Intravarsity match against Wollongong was drawn because of rain.

One of the Club's best performances was recorded last season. A combined New Zealand Universities cricket team toured Australia, playing matches against individual Universities before playing a combined Australian Universities XI in a "Test" Match in Melbourne. During the tour, the New Zealand team was beaten only three times out of their eleven matches - by University of N.S.W., by Melbourne University, and in the Test Match. Their defeat by us was the first on tour after four successive wins. John Middleton captained our team on this occasion, and his bowling certainly spear-headed the Wales attack. Fine batting by Graham James secured him a position in the combined Australian Universities team. The University of N.S.W. certainly made its presence felt in Australian University cricket by this performance.

Four social matches were played in the 1965/66 season. We played Randwick District Club twice, I.Zingari, and Sydney University. These social games are a most enjoyable day's cricket, and we urge more Club members to take a keener interest in these fixtures.

The Club's Fifth Annual Dinner was held on 31st May. Over fifty people attended, and made it a most successful evening. Captain John Morris proposed the toast to cricket, and Mr.R.Flockton, former State and International player, replied. The toast to the Club by Mr.Dunnicliff from the Epping Club, was responded to by John Middleton on behalf of the Club. Mr.B.Sheidow, representing the N.S.W.C.A. presented the "A" Shires premiership and Shires Club Championship trophies. Mr.J. McKenzie, President of the Shires Council, presented individual trophies to Club members.

A Club Single Wicket Competition was held in March. This was a highly successful day, and some good cricket and sportsmanship has ensured this of being a regular fixture in the Club's calendar.

The Club organised a golf weekend at Leura in early April. This weekend attracted about 30 club members in all, and proved to be a very enjoyable time.

During the current term of office, the General Committee appointed an "Apparel Sub-Committee" to investigate the design of Club caps and the possibility of having a Club tie. On the recommendation of this Committee, it has been decided to adopt a new pattern cap, largely due to the fact that in the past our caps have been somewhat "non standard" in their design. The new caps will be "unveiled" at the Annual General Meeting, when the Premiership caps are presented. At the time of writing it would appear that, due to economical factors, the proposed Club tie will not be adopted for the time being.

Tim Creer, a member of the Committee, is also Secretary of the Council of Municipal and Shire Cricket Clubs. It was this body which ran the "C" Shires competition in 19.64/65 and which had this competition accepted by the N.S.W.C.A. as an official competition for the 1965/66 season.

Once again the Club had the use of four ovals during the season — on the campus at Kensington, Prince Henry Hospital, and two at David Phillips Field, Daceyville. Next season the oval on the campus will probably not be available. Part of the University's building programme necessitates the moving of the oval across the campus towards the Main Building. The Club will then use the other three ovals until the new field on the campus is available. The work of Frank Gaskell, the groundsman at Kensington, and Frank Terrence, groundsman at David Phillips Field, was greatly appreciated.

We would also like to thank Mr.I.Cracknell and Mr.I.Moutray and their staff in the Amenities Office, for the advice given and secretarial work done, during the year. Without this assistance, the general administration of the Club would be infinitely more difficult.

The Club now appears to have overcome its teething problems. The number of players is increasing each season, and the Club is becoming a closer-knit body. The social activities organised are designed to ensure that each member is aware that he belongs to the Club. Intervarsity matches are the "cream" of University sport, and the Committee urges all Club members to avail themselves of the opportunity to play in these fixtures. For the Club to continue its successes, it must be remembered that there is more each player can do than simply play on a Saturday afternoon. The future aims of the Club are fairly clear, and quite ambitious. The Club needs the continued support of all members.

FIRST ELEVEN REPORT

The 1965/66 season saw the 1st XI climax a successful season by becoming Premiers for the second year in succession, this time, however, managing to remain undefeated.

The team had basically three changes from the previous season's side, with Harold Bundy, Barry Andrews and Ian Lowe, the "newcomers", all consolidating their positions with strong performances throughout the season. But the fact that the team was undefeated was the only real change from the performance of last year. In a somewhat remarkable comparison exactly the same number of catches, seventy nine, were held by the fieldsmen. with John Pigott increasing his tally of wicket-keeping dismissals by three. Indeed, John's performances at times verged upon brilliance and he was a constant source of confidence and inspiration to the bowlers. As was the case last year, there were four wicket partnership records broken and it is significant that of these, three were for the sixth, eighth and ninth wickets, thus denoting the all round batting strength of the side. Slightly more wickets, 186 to 177, were taken this season by our bowlers and the batting averages, on the whole, were on a par with the previous year. So, purely on the basis of statistics, there was every reason to expect the team to do as well, if not better, than the season before,

However, turning from statistics to the personality element, several players had outstanding performances for the season. John Middleton, after a relatively quiet start, began to strike form in the fourth round match against Lindfield and from then on proved a force to be reckoned with. John smashed his own club record for most wickets in a season, boosting his total to 58, a really fine effort, but perhaps his best performance was when he took 6-31 off 17 overs against Auburn-Lidcombe when we defeated this team in the fifth round.

Geoff Garland had an impressive season and with subtle variety for a bowler of his type, he managed to snare 47 wickets. Geoff seemed to be called upon to do more bowling than in other seasons and proved his ability by taking 6-25 off 12 overs against Roseville in the semi-final.

These two bowlers were ably supported by Ian Lowe and Don Clark. Ian bowled consistently well during the season and with a little more luck would have finished with more handsome figures. Don's strength lay in his all-round ability - if he didn't get wickets he would score runs and if he didn't score runs, he would get wickets. Two of Don's fine batting performances come easily to mind. First, his fighting century against Burwood which enabled us to declare at 9-216, after being a desperate 8-91, and secondly, his dynamic partnership with John Pigott against Ryde when these two added 113 runs in 67 minutes to put the side in a winning position after being 5-50.

John Pigott had a remarkable run of batting success after the seventh round. In his last six completed innings, John scored 357 runs, the climax being his century against Canterbury in the twelfth round when he scored 102 runs out of the team's 182. This feat of John's was a major factor in helping the First XI to remain undefeated in the latter half of the season.

Kevin Daly batted consistently during the season and for the second season in a row topped the batting averages. Kevin was unlucky to miss out on his century against Burwood in the thirteenth round, scoring 96, but undoubtedly his finest knock during the season was his 72 not out against Auburn on a wicket that was, to say the least, uncooperative and on a field laden with thick grass. Graham Sylvester also played a stylish knock in this game to finish with a plucky 59. It was in the abovementioned match against Burwood that Harold Bundy capped a number of fine performances during the season by notching the third century for the team for the season with a hard-hitting 104 in 150 minutes.

But aside from these fine individual performances, there were a number of concerted team efforts which highlighted the season. Ninety one runs were scored in 32 minutes in a race against the clock to defeat Pennant Hills outright in the all day game in the sixth round, a victory which pushed the team to a clear lead in the Competition Table. This followed exciting matches against Canterbury and Roseville, the latter game demonstrating the batting strength of the team when we tallied 5-319 in 230 minutes in reply to Roseville's 9-309 declared. Indeed, during the season the First XI were dismissed on only three occasions. Then followed solid victories over all the other Clubs in the Competition, a feat which led the team to meet Auburn-Lidcombe in the Final.

For the Final, play was curtailed due to inclement weather, to approximately one half of one day's play, a disappointing end to a dry season. This limited time available ensured that the match finish in a draw and, being Minor Premiers, we were adjudged Premiers for the 1965/66 season.

I would like to thank everyone with whom I played during the season for their continued support, making my task as Captain both simple and enjoyable, particularly John Middleton who, as Vice-Captain, was a true source of strength.

SECOND XI REPORT

The Second XI had a successful 1965-66 season though not finishing higher than 5th. The team contributed to the Club retaining the Club Championship and, in terms of matches won and lost, performed as well as the "seconds" of the previous two seasons.

Our congratulations go to Epping for winning the premiership and there is no doubt that they and Burwood were the two best teams in the Competition.

At the beginning of the season the side lacked experience with names like Bundy, Lowe, Kemp and Salmon missing. Taking into account the usual high turnover of players, the team welded into a solid combination without having great striking power in either batting or bowling.

In the field the team had its best days when it bowled out Canterbury, Auburn and Bexley each twich in one day. The best batting efforts were 5-277 against Pennant Hills in under 3 hours, and 9-270 against Bexley whe, for once, the team batted right down the list. An interesting fact is that the team was only dismissed ONCE after the 4th round and that was on a wet wicket against Burwood. Bad days were had when Lindfield bowled us out cheaply twice on a good wicket and on two occasions when, after obtaining first innings points easily, the batting failed dismally when chasing quick runs for outright wins. Luckily the tailenders staved off the deserved defeats on both occasions. In the field, the worst day was against Canterbury whom we had beaten outright early in the season. Innumerable catches were dropped, costing us any chance of reaching the final.

Turning to individuals, Darryl Lacey, returning from the lower grades, batted better than ever before with the Club. His 81 at Pennant Hills was the best innings of the season and he played lone hands in both innings at Lindfield. His slip fielding was superb with 13 catches in the first 9 matches. Jim Hollington was a solid opener and made a fine "100" against Auburn. Ted Harvey and Dave Pocock started the season well but their batting fell away later. Both these young players must give more attention to their fielding. Alan Bishop, late in the season, showed batting promise and his fielding was excellent. Alex Taylor always looked like runs but didn't get them this season. Max Sosling, when with us, was always more than welcome, performing well with both bat and ball. He made a grand "100" against Canterbury.

Twenty teams took part in the new 'C' Division M.&.S Competition, including two, the thirds and fourths, from your club. Out of this twenty, the thirds finished 19th, the "Phantom" Fourths, tenth.

whilst this may look like a case for a full "enquiry by the stewards" there were many factors which occurred during the season which undoubtedly contributed to this state of affairs. Not the least of these was the selection policy to maintain the fourths with as little disruption to the basic team as possible when they were doing far better than us and had a show of reaching the semi-finals.

This was a situation which never should have arisen... and the fact that it did, is a reflection on every member of this club. The selectors did not want to disrupt any team except where promotion on merit was justified. This theoretical ideal is impossible to achieve in practice, as it is obvious that unavailability of players is inevitable for what might be termed legitimate reasons. However, when a team is upset due to some individual deciding to go fishing... or taking part in some activity which makes it quite clear that he is only playing cricket when there is nothing better to do, then there should be cause for concern. And, in the season just past, this was exactly what happened.

Those players in all grades who carried on in this manner should seriously consider whether they can call themselves good club or leam members. We are playing four competitive grades in this club, and in this cricket we play to win, not just to have a game of cricket very so often.

he combined load of 'legitimate' unavailability, and the other brand, eft the selectors in a position where it became almost impossible o maintain even the nucleus of the competitive teams, and no team as harder hit than this one. In fifteen rounds, thirty-seven players ere selected for the thirds and in no fixture did the same eleven take he field together. And, it was not until the thirteenth round that layers were actually dropped to the thirds due to poor form. Several ad, of course, done the yo-yo act.

ith these facts in mind, it is not strange that this team was unable o settle down as a unit. At the start of the season we were a team f 'strangers' each not fully aware of the other's ability and this ituation was never entirely corrected.

ortunately, the first round apart, when we received a merciless hrashing from Balmain 1, the spirit of the players made each game pleasure to take part in, and there were times when we played ogether like a team inspired. Those who played will never forget he stirring finish against Auburn when, in a race against the clock, utright victory was missed by four runs after a first innings deficit f 50. Or against Manly 2, when our opponents needed 40 to win with ix wickets in hand and 80 minutes to go, and we won the game by nine ms at ten to six. Close results were in fact our forte, and only 5 runs in five games cost us 30 competition points.

FOURTH XI REPORT

The team finished tenth in the competition in a field of twenty and I think can be well pleased with its performances throughout the season, winning more than half of the matches played. If there was any feature of our play that prevented the team achieving a better record, I would say that it was our unreliable batting - one week 4-216, the next all out for 77.
