# PRESIDENT'S REPORT

This report is written at a time that is likely to prove to be a most important transitional period in the Club's history - at a time when we have battled honestly on the cricket field over the last year but have had to fight even harder off the field.

In terms of on-field results, the Club again struggled in the higher grades although always competitive and always with the humour, enjoyment and sportsmanship that is the style of this Club. Previous season patterns were re-visited with 1<sup>st</sup> and 2<sup>nd</sup> Grade starting with high expectations, struggling early and then consolidating late in the season with some impressive wins. The lower grades, especially 4<sup>th</sup> and 5<sup>th</sup> Grade, performed brilliantly.

5<sup>th</sup> Grade were joint minor premiers under the new skipper, Matt Sanders, who carried on the fine tradition from Rob Stark (and, indeed, his predecessors) and just failed to go all the way. 4<sup>th</sup> Grade played strongly throughout and Jim Robson, now into his fifth decade of life, again excelled.

The real drama took place at the New South Wales Cricket Association level where the Club, along with five other clubs, were nearly dismissed (pun intended) from the Grade competition. The earlier decision to reduce the competition from 20 to 16 clubs was rescinded after the 6 clubs were afforded the opportunity to present their credentials and their observations on the NSWCA's draft Management Plan in an appropriate way and before an appropriate forum. The decision by the Board of the New South Wales Cricket Association explicitly acknowledged "being impressed with the detail of the affected Clubs' plans".

The whole process, which effectively consumed for 6 months or so every spare moment of time of a number of the Club's Executive and Committee members, was distressing.

It is inappropriate to comment further on these events in this report, suffice it to say that the Club must emerge stronger from the cathartic experiences to ensure its own survival because, sadly in my opinion, it cannot rely on a broader goodwill and commonsense within the cricket fraternity.

Recent months have suggested to me a renewed vigour within the Club to put its house totally in order as the foundation stone upon which the Club's future fortunes will depend. This is a marvellous Club, rich in heritage and tradition notwithstanding its comparatively short history in Grade, and the dogged fight has been worth it and must remain so.

It would be fitting to conclude by acknowledging at a time of significant personal disappointment the extraordinary contribution Geoff Lawson has made, and continues to make, to this Club. He is a favoured son.

# UNIVERSITY OF NSW CRICKET CLUB 1ST GRADE REPORT

#### 1996/97

How can you summarise our season?

On the scoreboard this year's 1st Grade side unfortunately ranks as the worst since the first couple of years of our existence in the grade competition. That's not a big rap and cannot be accepted given the levels of performance and success this club has achieved particularly in 1st Grade.

However, as I look back over the season, essentially there are only positive aspects that stand out. The reason these aspects stand out is the influence they will have on a bright, positive and successful future for the team (provided certain fundamental weaknesses are addressed).

These positive aspects ironically derive from the major problems facing the side this season being, firstly, the fact that we were a relatively inexperienced team who lost arguably its two best players for the start of this season (at least, that is, the two most proven performers), and secondly, we were required to play in an outrageous environment of uncertainty as to the continued existence of our club. Nevertheless:

- in all but two games (Waverly and Sutherland) we proved very competitive and could have conceivably won any or all of our matches. Even the Waverly 1st innings disaster almost yielded outright points for us with them being 9 down and well short of the target we set.
   Only winning 2 games did not reflect our competitiveness. Even faced with the above problems we were a competitive team;
- the two games we did win were right at the end of the season at a time when sides with less
  than perfect team morale and intestinal fortitude would have been losing outright. It was
  truly inspiring to finish the season playing so well given everything that had transpired
  during the season (and particularly the nonsense that was happening off the field). In the
  last game against ND's, while some of the side were engrossed in submissions rather than
  cricket, we belted them even though we had by far the worst of the conditions; and
- Benny Nott's batting and Wazza's bowling were first-class (literally), although not
  consistently at that level as would force the selectors to take note.

As a team we can hold our heads high. The commitment, teamsmanship, loyalty, and overall enjoyment factor, were probably unparalleled even among the sides enjoying greater successes on the field. Even when we don't win (which we should not accept) these achievements are worthwhile and will hold us in good stead as a team and as individuals on or off the field. It is feasible to assume that, if we could have retained just one player we could have won 4 or 5 more games. The difference between us winning and losing was that fine a line.

Our critical and insurmountable weaknesses this year warrant at least passing reference:

- we were at least one proven batsman (probably two) short of being guaranteed a top half finish. [NB there was only one century scored by mere mortals in the entire season, and that was a 2nd innings hundred as it was];
- we continue to drop too many catches and, inevitably, one or two of those catches will be critical (Gordon and Randwick, at least, would almost certainly have been won);
- we have some very talented young players who suffered from some initial bad luck, destroyed confidence, but most significantly a lack of experience (and experienced teammates) to enable them to cope with the slumps and regain their form;
- our spinners were unable to exert pressure often enough and consistently enough at a first grade level; and
- there was NO pressure being applied to the struggling 1st grade players from the lower grades.

A summary of the individual players seasons reads something like this:

#### Michael Slater

His numbers were magnificent and his batting at its brilliant best. Slats' impact on the side when he is available to play is enormous and always positive. We always appreciate the opportunity to play cricket next to champions such as Slats (and Henry) and I believe the younger players are using these opportunities to learn from Slats. Slats' club involvement, in these times of increasing commitments and obligations for "the stars", is superb and appreciated by us all.

Good luck in the UK Slats. You descrive your return to the test side and you will undoubtedly continue your successes at that level. We look forward to playing some more cricket with you next year (first-class commitments permitting).

#### John Horley

Jackster's year, performance wise, was average. However, with Traff's injuries and Pratty's apparent reluctance, Jack stood up as the logical next leader in first grade. His efforts as the vice-captain were invaluable and he assisted me both on and off the field in what was a very difficult year for me.

Unfortunately I tend to continue to describe Jack as having enormous potential as an allrounder. This is a function of his under-performing (in my view), with natural skills that most first graders would kill for. I believe Jack has at least 2 or 3 outstanding years ahead of him.

#### Ben Nott

Ben's batting ability was evident on many occassions this year and he deserved to top the averages. A run of bad luck (that probably even surpassed Carso's), mainly in the middle of the season, prevented him from passing 500 runs and, indeed, possibly approaching records. Notty's commitment and 'ticker', combined with his unquestionable ability, suggest a bright

future. His keeping was good although occassionally untidy. Generally, however, when the catches and stumpings came the untidyness disappeared (which is when it matters).

Notty's main areas for improvement would seem to be in concentration and in tidying up his keeping. Notty is a great team man and an integral element of the team's excellent morale. Big things are anticipated for Notty and he has the right attitude, and propensity to listen and learn, to achieve them.

#### Warren Saunders

The pick of our bowlers this year, Wazza was at times unplayable. Seeing Rodney Davidson incapable of getting his normally inpenetrable defensive bat on almost 3 overs straight from Wazza, was watching a first class standard performance. His efforts against Bankstown where he was again generally unplayable (on the wicket at a time when it was about 50% as 'juiced up' as when their "hormones" were bowling, and then into the gale the next week on the miraculously transformed road) was further evidence of his ability and potential.

Consistency and an extra yard or two of pace will make a big difference to Wazza's chances of progressing even further. Wazza always displays plenty of guts and determination with bat, ball, and in the field. After a meteoric rise over the last few years, Wazza is probably the first man picked in the side and he can take enormous pride in his achievements. A "superior" level of fitness should be his initial aim.

#### Brad Schirmer

Sneaky had a better year than his statistics suggest. Being a little concerned about his skills against the slower bowlers, Sneaky stuck up his hand to jump into the opening role (to save the captain at a time when his focus on cricket began to wane) and did a pretty good job. Although not reaching huge scores he occupied the crease for important periods of time (particularly in the Slats 'support show').

Sneaky's fielding was not up to his own extremely high standards. This, and getting his feet moving (like they did at the end of the prior season) are the main areas Sneaky should focus on for next year.

#### Dave Carson

A very talented young player who ultimately contributed well short of expectations on the field, but invaluably contributed in our off the field dramas.

Carso had no luck early on. The first false, or half-false, shot he played ended in dismissal, and his confidence was slowly eroded away. If his skipper could have shared a little good fortune with him (maybe a nick past leg stump, or a nick onto the pad and wide of short-leg) his season could have been a different story. Anyway, there is no point dwelling on bad luck. For the future of this club (and obviously in his own self-interest) Carso has to come through with the goods in first grade. I think it is a little bit of a shot selection issue and using his head a little more in the way he bats in certain conditions.

Carso's ground fielding is superb (a 1986 Pratty-esque/1976 Livo-esque arm). His chinamen or orthodox breakers have much potential but will need a little work along with his catching. Another quality team man in a quality "team".

#### Anthony Pratt

A slow start to the year saw our emerging spinner heading towards No 11 in the batting order, and an average of 50+ with the ball. His batting at the end of the year was back to "No 4" material and his bowling got back to something like last year.

Pratty still contributes a lot in the field and with bat and ball. Consistency with his bowling is a concern (as it has tended to be with his batting). On condusive wickets and/or when he manages to get it all together, Pratty's bowling is impressive. His "sledge" contributions have fallen away but he otherwise continues to be the consistent club social identity.

#### Mathew Hayward

Started full of promise with bat, and even more so with the ball. Knocking Phelpsy over with a 'pearla' was a highlight, as was his match saving innings in the 2nd innings of that game.

Hayers can bat and his bowling is underrated. Jungle's physical condition at age 41 leaves Hayers for dead which is obviously a limiting factor in his performance. He can be a top line first grader and should continue to aim for this. His sledging is ordinary and should be discouraged at all costs. Great to have in the team but taking him out in public should be approached with caution and done at your own risk.

#### Greg Hackney

A meteoric rise for Hackers to make his 1st grade debut in the first game this year. Mainly playing as a bowler Hackers had some early success (not surprisingly, also with the bat). Hackers tended to be a little inconsistent and went for way too many runs for an 'offie'. In fact his bowling lost it a little, probably as a result of continuing niggling and restricting injuries. The bowling showed some signs of improvement at the end of the season, at the same time that his undoubted batting skills seemed to desert him. His 70\* saved us from the most humiliating team batting performance against Waverly.

#### Darren Stephens

Shaker's impressive form in 2's saw him force his way into a side that already had 3 performing seamers. Bankstown, Petersham and NDs were great exhibitions of hitting the deck hard and getting real movement while forcing the batsman to play 99 times out of a hundred.

Shaker has a good cricket brain and gets on well with everyone (except the skipper at centre wicket practise). He proved a wonderful asset to the team and our success rate improved while he was there. There were occasions when he and Wazza were bowling where it would have required a test player to get a bat/nick on them.

Like Wazza, Shaker would benefit from a yard or two of extra pace (and a less dodgy back).

AJ started poorly and a certain level of laziness outside off stump seemed to cause his demise. The belting of Randwick's attack to all parts of the ground in pursuit of unlikely outright points had everyone believing he was back to his best and just needed to be let loose from whatever shackles were restricting him. However, it took a short stint in seconds to bring about some consistent and impressive performances in first grade at the end of the year.

#### SECOND GRADE 1996/97

There is no hiding the fact that 1996/97 was, overall, a disappointing year in Second Grade. In what was always going to be a tough and testing period for the club as a whole, it was imperative that the top few grades improved their performances to lift UNSWCC back up to the upper regions of the Club Championship. It is now history that this was not the case but through the disappointment of our season's underachievements, there were several positives which came out of the season which can be focussed on and used to keep improving in the seasons ahead. Our season record of 1 outright win, 4 wins, 2 draws and 8 losses could have been tipped a lot more favourably in our direction.

In searching for reasons for our lacklustre performances, you probably need look not much further than our batting display. Our typical innings was 3/30, 5/100 and all out around 200. Consistently our middle/lower order were forced to save the remnants of our first innings to post a score to bowl at. If it were not for the success of Dougy Morson and Dave Trafford in our middle order and a couple of stirring partnerships between Dave Gainsford and Dave Ouinlan, our season would have been a whole lot worse. Our top six batsmen were just too inconsistent and mixed the odd good innings with poor shot selection and lack of concentration. Having said that, it was encouraging to see Hamish Nott start to recapture his best form towards the end of the year and he gained some invaluable experience with a couple of games in 1st grade. Steve Norbury, on promotion back to Second Grade, looked better and better as the season went on and Paul Urquhart also had a taste of 1st Grade for the first time after some solid mid season performances. As already mentioned, the contributions of the middle to lower batting order are to be commended. Dougy Morson keeps improving his batting enormously each year and deservedly scored his first 2nd Grade 50 during the year and topped the batting aggregate. Dave Trafford displayed a consistency with the bat to suggest that he can lay claim to "all rounder" status and his sensible batting proved invaluable in many pressure situations. It would be remiss of me not to mention Dave Gainsford, Dave Quinlan and Micky Debello who all played their part in magnificent match winning partnerships under extreme pressure to win games against Fairfield and Parramatta.

Probably the second most important area where we let ourselves down during the year was our catching. I could say in all certainty that missed chances cost us 2 games this year and maybe more. Concentration and practice are vital in this respect and to threaten for the title in coming years, an improvement must be made as critical games are so often decided by critical catches.

The most satisfying part of our game for the entire season was in the bowling department. It is not an understatement to say that we had one of the top few attacks in Second Grade and consistently troubled opposition batting lineups. Three bowlers took more than 15 wickets and averaged under 20 for the season which is a great achievement. Tim Buckett terrified batsmen in his 2 games and Darren Steven bowled some magnificent spells in the first half of the season and could have easily picked up a larger bag of wickets. Both deserved their promotion to 1st Grade where they proved they have the ability to succeed at that level. Dave Gainsford was his usual aggressive self and more often than not took the crucial wickets which created holes in the opposition. Dave Trafford, after semi-retiring to 2nd Grade with a back complaint, still managed to collect 26 wickets and Mark Mullen snuck up behind the lot of them to snare 31 wickets for the season. Our depth of bowling should be the platform to launch our improvement over the next few seasons.

#### Season Highlights

- The first game of the season vs Gordon resulted in a scoreline that brought back memories of the U/10's when Gordon were 5/9 overnight with Tim Buckett and Shaker running riot, eventually taking 4/47 and 5/48 respectively in a first round win. Mark Leahy produced a fine 2nd innings batting display only to fall desperately short of his first 2nd grade hundred with 99 while Tim Buckett smashed 58 in quick time.
- A victory against Randwick was set up by Paul Urquhart with 57, Traff with 47 and then Traff and Shaker 3 wickets each, despite some dispute about moisture content at the VG and some entertaining post match literature provided by the opposition.
- The moisture content became a serious issue when, three quarters of the way through the
  game against Mosman, political comfort took precedence over cricket reality and a bone dry
  field became a mini lake as sprinklers saturated the ground due to a fault in the air
  conditioning at the square house, forcing the game to be abandoned.
- Shaker's hat trick against his old club North Sydney in taking figures of 5/33, even despite
  the relatives turning up late, Dougy Morson's first 50 in 2nd grade and Dave Carson's
  "reincarnation" as a batsman with a magnificent 119 in the 2nd innings even though he
  persisted in playing hook shots off his forehead.
- Hamish Nott's twin half centuries vs Sutherland, the eventual premiers, punctuated by some most entertaining sledging/dribbling from Capital.
- AJ's return to form with a typically stylish 94 against Sydney Uni with Mullos 4/37 and Traff 3/16 rounding off a well needed victory.
- Parramatta was one of the finest moments of the season when, Parramatta at 8/135 looked in all sorts of trouble, then made 269 with Capital 4 wickets and Traff 3. Lats combined inventive banter with an awesomely struck 60 but UNSW were then 8/229 requiring 41 to win when Capital and Quince shared in one of the most inspirational partnerships in recent memory scoring 29\* and 11\* each to seal a magnificent victory.
- 2nd grade lived up to the growing reputation as "club function specialists" against Fairfield. Set 122 to win on first innings with Mullos taking 4/21, UNSW typically made hard work of it with Micky Debello finding form at no. 11 to pass them 9 wickets down. In the 2nd innings we were set 143 to win after Traff took 4 wickets and a sensational outright win was consummated on the pub crawl that night as Tex, Hamish, Dougy and Bowie all contributed with the bat.
- Tex overcame numerous muscle spasms to score 89 against Northern District and Quince relived days of past glory in unleashing every shot in the coaching manual on his way to 40\*, ably assisted yet again by Capital with 35 in a ninth wicket stand of 59.

A cricket season with the UNSWCC does not pass by without many good times, on and off the field, shared by all participants. This season was no exception and despite the difficult environment under which we played for most of the season, I was never in doubt of the desire, ability and commitment of all who played 2nds this year and I thoroughly enjoyed my first season as captain and thank the whole team for their support and advice throughout the season. With this season's difficulties now behind us, it is now time to regroup and focus on succeeding in the seasons ahead.

#### THIRD GRADE - 1996/97 SEASON

Third Grade started the season well with two wins but could only manage one more in the following thirteen games. Many of our losses could be put down to poor batting, with four games lost by margins of 20 runs or less (or 1 wicket) where even an average batting performance would have seen us win.

For various reasons Thirds lacked stability, with 28 players appearing in the Grade in the season. Unavailablities continue to be a problem in our Club at this level and in addition the side through mainly it own doing lost any real semi-final chance after the loss against Bankstown in January. With our lower Grades performing well and requiring stability, Third Grade were rarely putting a balanced or in-form team on the field from then onwards.

Our batting lacked experience at Third Grade level and this showed in pressure situations where we struggled to put significant partnerships together and often lost wickets in bunches. Our lower middle order and tail rarely contributed (our statistics heavily underline this). In the top order we performed somewhat better. We were unfortunate to lose Darren Sue to injury after he looked like he would do a good job for us (such as his important innings in our win over Manly) but generally we were getting reasonable starts in the first half of the year from Paul Searle and Peter Carson before they left us for greener pastures.

Our pace bowling was our strong point and in fact we sometimes had on embarssment of resources to call on. We usually made inroads with the new ball and kept sides to acceptable totals (Fairfield excepted!). Our spin bowling was generally not penetrating, although its effectiveness may have been influenced by the small totals we were often defending. However there is certainly an opportunity for a spinner to stick up his hand for Thirds. Whoever this is, be it from within the current team or from below, it will be through putting in the work at practice so that they know where it will be landing on Saturdays.

In a big squad the following players played half a season or more in Thirds:

Alex Williams had a solid season with the bat but would rue the occasions where he got a good start and then lost his wicket. Overcoming his "mid-40s crisis" would see him return the sort of scores he used to achieve against us for Randwick. He may have been slightly unlucky to not reach a hundred against Manly. His fielding at gully was always of a high standard.

Life was never dull with Luke Latimer in the side. He showed improvement in all areas of his game and rarely played Thirds without making a major contribution to the team's performance. He had a consistent season with the bat and played crucial aggressive innings' in two of our wins. With the ball he often took the surprise wicket but could also be relied upon to do the hard slog. Luke's excellent figures in Thirds reflected his dedication to training and an improved pre-match preparation. A bit of stretching wouldn't go astray and would probably make him less prone to injury.

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Paul Searle batted with good technique and temperament at the top of the order and would have had better figures with an even share of luck. His fielding close to the wicket was generally excellent.

Tim Buckett found himself playing Thirds as a batsman due to injury. He added some determination to our middle order and to average just under thirty whilst not 100% fit was a good performance. His cameo bowling spells were usually frightening for batsmen at this level and underlined the loss his fitness problems have been to the Club.

Dan Culhane was close to retirement at the halfway stage of the summer but turned it all around when he returned to bowling his natural inswing. By doing this and relaxing he bowled with pace, accuracy and endurance. His performance against Petersham was the standout pace bowling spell of the season, as his ridiculous figures that day suggest.

Russell Thomas was capable of bowling both the very good and the very bad. His form certainly suffered when his work commitments made it difficult for him to train but he finished the season on a steadily improving note. Some serious work on his run-up and rhythm would allow him take full advantage of his ability to take the ball away from the bat and see him get more opportunities with the new ball.

Nigel Dornan started the season where he left off the year before and was rewarded with wickets and promotion to Seconds. His second half was disrupted by unavailability and in a full season he may have had very impressive numbers.

Peter Hemphill's off-spin showed plenty of promise and hopefully he will continue to work hard on it. He bowled in some difficult situations but was always looking to take wickets rather than contain. His sledging needs a lot of work.

Cameron Heil probably didn't enjoy the season as much as he might have. He struggled with the new job of wicketkeeping but showed an improvement towards the end of the summer and took some good catches. His batting looked technically sound and with a few long innings and some work on rotating the strike he will develop into a good top order player. Hopefully he will put this season behind him and stay keen.





#### SIXTH GRADE REPORT

The 1996-97 season was a successful one for 6th Grade, despite the team ultimately finishing out of the semi-finals of the Moore Park & South-East Cricket Association First Grade competition. Indeed this statement holds despite the team winning just 4 games but losing 8, with one draw and one tie as well.

This is because the characteristics of 6<sup>th</sup> Grade mean that match results cannot be an exhaustive test of success. Rather, success is a combination of factors, of which our scoreboards are but one. Other, arguably more important, factors are the success of 6s as a feeder for the Grade teams and the ability of the club simply to field 6 (and 7) teams week after week, even in holidays. Moreover, clearly of more importance is the enjoyment that the players gain when they get out of the house and onto the field on a Saturday afternoon. On all these measures the season was a success. It was always a pleasure to join the team, however constituted and wherever playing, from the glorious tracks at DP (thanks, Ray Galway) to the slightly more basic arenas of Moore Park, Rowland and Booralee. ## SEVENTH GRADE REPORT

Playing in the Moore Park Cricket Association 3rd Grade competition, UNSW 7th Grade had an up and down season, recording some excellent wins but unfortunately just missing out on the finals.

One of the unique things about playing 7th Grade is the extraordinary turnover of players. Our line up was almost as unsettled as the Australian top order. Generally anytime a 7th Grader played well he would find himself quickly promoted, meaning that we had to search for new talent virtually every week. This resulted in us having four different captains for the season and regularly playing without a full complement of players.
